
Map of Anguilla



Letter headed 'Parsonage Anguilla June 20 1837' addressed to her sister in London letting her know that they had arrived in Anguilla. Sent privately to Basseterre then carried by private ship to Bristol where it received the step type 'BRISTOL/SHIP LETTER'in black being the seventh type used from 1806 until 1842. Charged 1/6d. on arrival made up of 8d. Ship letter charge to Bristol plus 10d. inland rate for 122 miles from Bristol to London.




Letter headed Anguilles 16th June, 1851 from R. Gumbs carried privately to St. Christpher addressed to the Attorney General concerning the Will of Col. Gumbs with regard to the Valley and Road Estate in Anguilla.



Message headed 'from Police Sta.Anguilla' Crocus Hill dated 23rd November, 1885 sent via St. Kitts where the 1½d. Postal card was cencelled with the 'A12' numeral The datestamp shows the date 'NO 7' it should have been 'NO 27' it arrived in London on 14th December, 1885. This is the only recorded example of prepaid mail from Anguilla prior to the opening of the Post Office in 1900.



'A12' duplex showing code letter 'AN' in datestamp sent out from the G.P.O. London on 10th May, 1900 in use until about 1927. The 'AN' signifying Anguilla. Registered cover dated 3rd July, 1919 from Anguilla via St. Kitts on the 4th July, 1919 addressed to Chicago where it arrived on 24th July, 1919. Manuscript registration number 'No.143'. Twopence registration fee plus 1½d. War Stamp paying the postage to the U.S.A.



'ANGUILLA/FOREST' T.R.D. 29mm. diameter single circle in black used from February 1928 until 1931 on a commercial cover dated 14th October, 1929 from Forest sent via St.Kitts on 17th October 1929 addressed to New York.



The Governor of the Leeward Islands signed an Order in Council No.S.R.O. 26 dated 1927 called 'Post Offices, Names of' order. By this order the Governor ordered that there should be set up on Anguilla sub-post offices known as Forest, East End, The Road and Blowing Point. The Temporary Rubber Datestamps 29-30 mm. diameter single circle were used from 1927 until 1931.



'ANGUILLA/FOREST' T.R.D. 29mm. diameter single circle in black on a registered cover dated 30th March, 1931 from Forest to Australia where it arrived on the 25th May, 1931 apparently not sent through St. Kitts. Forest postmaster stated that his office opened in 1928.

'ANGUILLA/ROAD' T.R.D. 30mm. diameter single circle in black in use from 1927 until 1931 on a registered cover dated 13th January, 1930 from Road backstamped Anguilla Valley on 14th January, 1930 sent via St. Kitts on 24th January, 1930 addressed to England where it arrived on the 8th February, 1930.



'ANGUILLA/ROAD' T.R.D. 29mm. diameter single circle used from 1928 until 1931 on a airmail cover dated 15th July, 1930 sent via St.Kitts on 17th July, 1930. Flown from Antigua on 19th July, 1930 to St. Thomas arriving same day and arrived Tortola on 22nd January, 1930 Returned from Tortola on 28th July, 1930 back to Anguilla. Re-addressed to the U.S.A. and Posted at the Anguilla Forest post office on 29th September, 1930.



'ANGUILLA/ROAD' T.R.D. 30mm. diameter single circle in blue on a registered cover dated 23rd March. 1931 from Road sent via St. Kitts on 31st March 1931 addressed to Australia. The postmaster Mr. J.F. Cumbs signed the slip below.





'ANGUILLA/BLOWING PT.' T.R.D. 29mm. diameter in black used from 1927 until 1931 on a registered cover dated 4th January, 1929 from Blowing Point sent via Anguilla Valley on 12th January, 1929 addressed to the U.S.A. arriving on 28th January, 1929. Showing date and 'BLOWING PT.' in small letters 3mm. high.



'ANGUILLA/BLOWING PT.' T.R.D. 29mm. diameter in black on a registered cover dated 22nd March, 1931 from Blowing Point sent via St. Kitts on 27th March, 1931, New York on the 2nd April, 1931 and arrived Australia on the 30th April, 1931. Postmaster stated that his office opened in 1927

'EAST END' T.R.D. 29mm. diameter single circle in black used from 1927 until 1929 on a registered cover dated 12th January, 1929 from East End via Anguilla Valley the same day addressed to the U.S.A. Arrived Oakland on 28th January, 1929. At this moment this is the only cover known with this cancellation.



East End Post Office was opened in 1927 but by 9th April, 1931 it was closed so this registered cover was cancelled at Valley Post Office on the 9th April, 1931 and sent via St. Kitts on the 15th April, 1931 to Australia where it arrived on 8th June, 1931. The enclosed slip was signed by the postmaster a Mr. J. Richardson.

Anguilla Sob Post Offices Valley single circle 242mm. diameter with 'star' used from 31st July, 1927 until November, 1951 on a cover dated 23rd October, 1933 sent through St. Kitts on 26th October, 1933 addressed to England.



'ANGUILLA/VALLEY' 25mm. single circle with asterisk dated 8th February, 1928 cancelling the 1d. postal stationery envelope with a pair of Leeward Islands \(\frac{1}{4} \text{d.} \) stamps making up the \(\frac{1}{2} \text{d.} \) postage rate to England.



Registered cover dated 24th July, 1929 from Anguilla Valley sent via St.Kitts on the 25th July, 1929 addressed to Bristol, landed at Plymouth on the 12th August, 1929. Shows the manuscript 'Anguilla' in pencil followed by the Registration number 'No. 807' in red ink applied at Anguilla. Charged 2d. registration fee plus 2½d. postage.



First Airmail from Anguilla to the U.S.A. via Antigua. Cover dated 14th February, 1930 from Anguilla sent via St.Kitts on 20th February, 1930 to Antigua from there it was sent by air to the U.S.A. arriving on the 2nd March, 1930. Charged 1/1d.



'ANGUILLA/VALLEY' third type postmark single circle 24½mm. diameter with asterisk used from 1927 until about 1937. Registered cover dated 18th July, 1932 from Anguilla via St. Kitts on the 21st July, 1932 addressed to Michigan where it arrived on 30th July, 1932. Manuscript registration number 'No.590' in red. Charged 2d registration fee plus 3½d. postage.



Registered cover dated 18th September, 1930 from Anguilla Valley with the stamps being cancelled with the third type 'ANGUILLA/ VALLEY' single circle 242mm. diameter. Sent via St. Kitts on the 26th September, 1930 addressed to England being sent via New York on the 8th October, 1930.



Green label applied by the American Censorship office to a cover dated 4th May, 1943 from Anguilla Valley addressed to New York. At New York it was censored by number '9834' who found a stamp missing and applied the label.

The enclosure mentioned in this correspondence—

ONE ST. KITTS-NEUIS (1/2D)

CANCELLED STAMP ON COVER

was found to be missing when the letter was opened by the censor.

Censored cover dated 12th April, 1943 from Anguilla sent via St. Kitts on 16th April, 1943 where it was opened and resealed with brown tape tied by the boxed 'Crown/PASSED/BB/8' in red used from May, 1942 until April, 1943. This handstamp with curved corners was not known used in other islands of the West Indies. Charged 3d. this being the rate to the U.S.A. in operation from 1940 until 1947.



Registered cover from Anguilla Valley dated 11th July, 1942 sent via St. Kitts on the 16th July, 1942, New York on 17th August, 1942 then forwarded to England. 'R' in black in oval applied at Anguilla with the blue registration label showing 'Anguilla'.



Underpaid cover dated 19th January, 1933 from Anguilla Valley showing the 'T' in black tax mark applied at St. Kitts on the 25th January, 1933 addressed to the Cayman Islands. Missent to British Guiana where on the 5th February, 1933 it received the double circle 'MISSENT TO/BRITISH GUIANA' before being forwarded to the Cayman Islands. On arrival at Georgetown on the 1st March, 1933 the Centenary ½d. & 1d. stamps were used to pay the postage due of 2d.
