This issue was released to commemorate the centenary of the Islands independent administration. The design showing the heads of H.M. the King and King William IV was a first for both the Colony and the Empire. This issue was the first time that the head of King William IV had appeared on a postage stamp. The stamps were printed by Waterlow & Sons Ltd.

This series was placed on sale at Georgetown on 5 December 1932 and at Cayman Brac on 20 December 1932, replacing the then current issue, which was withdrawn during the period the Centenary set was on sale. The issue was withdrawn from sale at Cayman Brac on 20 March 1934 and the remaining stock returned to Georgetown. The issue remained on sale at Georgetown until being withdrawn on 5 May 1934. The previous issue was then brought back into use.




