The first two grounds of Appeal I "Because from the evidence it appears that the provisions referred to in the conviction relating to the above named Eva Andrews were sowed by her from the soil and were then and there carried away by her and provisions so severed and so carried away cannot be the subject of larceny as set forth in the said conviction" 2 "Identical with the former one mentioning Mary Jane Andrews instead of Eva Andrews" amount to much the same thing that under the circumstances the defendants were not guilty of larceny though they took the provisions away.

It seems to be clear that they were not guilty of larceny at common law but rather of pretrial larceny or still more probably of trespass as they took the provisions away quite openly and without any intention of secretly appropriating them.

It does not seem necessary to notice all the grounds of appeal but only the more important ones and I think that ground 7 is good as it ought to have been specified how many bananas etc. were taken though it would not be necessary to prove the actual number to have been stolen.

As to the 8th ground it does not appear from the report of the proceedings that the Magistrate did refuse to take the evidence of John Andrews and I cannot admit oral evidence to vary the account of the proceedings given by the Magistrate.

As to ground 9 no doubt the acts complained of were done in the exercise of a claim of right but I doubt whether that claim was sufficiently substantial to oust the jurisdiction of the Magistrate.

As to ground 10 the complaints which were on the same facts were heard together for convenience sake and without objection made.

On the whole facts I think the case was rather one of trespass than of larceny and I therefore hold the conviction to be bad.

This conviction must be reversed and the appeal allowed with costs.

SIR,

I have the honour to forward the Annual Report on the Postal Service of the Colony for the year 1893.

The usual Statements and Returns are appended and will be found to contain detailed information of the work performed in this Department during the year.

Under the head of Revenue there is a total increase on that of the past year by no less a sum than £475. 1. 3.

Under the head of Expenditure there was a large increase; but this was due to payments made on account of Sea and Territorial Transit charges for the years 1889, 1890 and 1891, and also on account of payments made to the Imperial Post Office for local contribution on account of loss on packet contract for the year 1893 and for arrears of same due on the re-arrangement of amount payable by St. Vincent. These three items are responsible for no less a sum than £1,260. 13. 2. The Estimates for 1893 provided for only £758 of this amount. (See appendix A.)

It will be observed that the Inland Post shews a slight increase both in number of Letters &c. dealt with and in Revenue therefrom. The totals are:—Paid Letters 26,478, Other Articles 1,648, Official Letters 13,446, and Packet Letters 37,207. The Inland Registered Letters also shewed an increase on that of the previous year—the totals being 1893, 379 and 1892, 224. (See appendix B.)

From the statement of Mails despatched it will be seen that the total number of Letters (including 1,730 Registered) was 42,335 and Other Articles (including 26 Registered) 4,441. (See appendix C.)

I have prepared a return of the undelivered mail matter dealt with during the year, from which it will be seen that in comparison to the number of letters &c. sent away from St. Vincent, those returned are very small. (See appendix D.)

The Money Order business shews an increase of £672. 13. 4. in the amount paid in St. Vincent but a sum of £76. 6. 4. less than the previous year in the amount sent away. This difference was not however from smaller business with the United Kingdom, but from a falling off in the Intercolonial business. I may here however mention that the Colonial Bank now issue Demand Drafts on London at a cost of 5d. in the £ whereas we charge 6d. and a reduction in the present commission I feel sure would be much appreciated and would at the close of this year shew an increase not only in orders issued on the United Kingdom but in the commission as well. (See appendix E.)

The Inland Money Order system was brought into force in February last, and the Branch Post Office at Georgetown was the first office opened as a Money Order Office. After six months' operation this office having shewn good results your Honour was pleased to authorize the extension of the system and from the 1st October Money Order Offices were opened at Union, Marrouallie and Chateaubelair. The total amounts were:—Inland Orders £328. 16. 9½.—Foreign Orders (issued at the Branch Offices) £595. 13. 2. and Foreign Orders (advised from Head Office for payment at the Branch Offices) £125. 4. 0. (See appendix F.)

The Parcel Post transactions again this year shew an advance on that of the previous year, the totals being:—Parcels received, 1,163 with 3,662 rates—despatched, 392 with 891 rates. Inland Parcels despatched, 116 with 318 rates and received, 30 with 62 rates. The amount received for Customs duty was £80. 13. 11. (See appendices G and H.)

During the year I visited all the Branch Offices and some of them twice. I found everything in order, as far as could be expected, on each occasion.

I am pleased to be able to state in this report that the Government were able to carry out my recommendation to remove all Post Offices, where practicable, from the Police; and at the end of the year Colonarie, Peruvian Vale and Calliaqua alone remained at the Police Stations.

The working of the Post Office Department as a whole was satisfactory and I am pleased to add that the staff at this office gave me their willing support and assistance. Very few complaints were made during the year about missing letters and every effort was made to ensure the correct mailing of letters to their respective addresses.

During the first twenty-eight days of November, statistics were taken on which to base the payments to be made for sea and territorial transit charges for the years 1892, 1893 and 1894. The weight of mails despatched during the period was Letters 33,238 grammes, Other Articles 18,284 grammes and received, Letters 34,984 grammes and Other Articles 330,359 grammes.

Some of the improvements to the office recommended by me and approved by your Honour in 1892 were carried out during the past year and have afforded some of the much required room besides allowing greater privacy in the office than heretofore. But your Honour must have observed how cramped we still are, and the great necessity of further accommodation being afforded us in view of increased work in the Post Office. I trust that your Honour will be able to give this increased accommodation at the same time as the Vault is supplied.

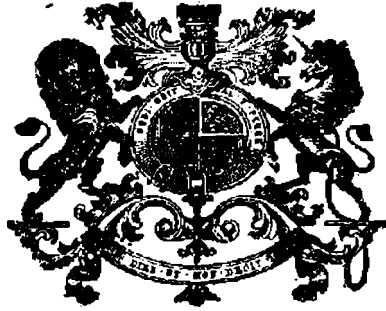

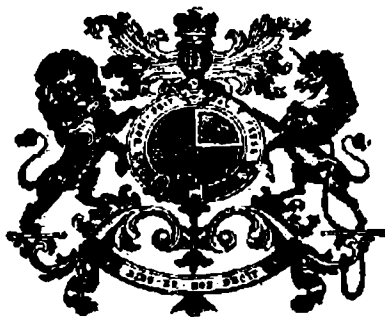

NEWS TELEGRAMS.

NEW YORK, 23th March.—The death is announced of the Rev. Patrick McAllister, Roman Catholic Bishop of Down and Connor, Ireland.

Intelligence from Madrid reports that the Marquis de Campos together with 10,000 troops will sail for Cuba on Tuesday next; also that a credit of 10,000,000 pesetas has been established on account of the Cuban campaign. It is announced that General Rivara will succeed General Callejas as Governor-General of Cuba. The current report contradicting the sanguine statements of an early suppression of the rebellion is creating considerable excitement.

A despatch from Ottawa reports that Sir Charles Tupper, Minister of Justice, has resigned his portfolio. He approves the carrying out of the order restoring parochial schools in Manitoba, but has been overruled regarding a general election before Parliament assemblies on the 18th of April next. The resignation is also announced of Mr. Patterson who has been appointed Governor of Manitoba, the Legislative Council of which State has adjourned without enacting the order re parochial schools (vide bulletin 26th instant).

A semi-official telegram from Caracas received in New York states that England has agreed to cease trespassing on disputed territory in Guiana, and also to accept the appointment of an arbitration commission on the question.

With regard to the report that citizens of any American Republic would be ineligible to sit upon the commission in the adjustment of personal damages in Nicaragua Sir Julian Pauncefote has explained that citizens of the United States are not ineligible according to the ultimatum to Nicaragua (vide bulletin 26th instant), but that only Spanish American citizens were ineligible. This statement considerably allays the existing irritation that United States bona fides are apparently impugned.

Naval intelligence reports that the U. S. S. *Montevideo* will call at San Diego, Acapulco, and Panama while en route to Callao. Market reports state that the cargo of grape-fruit ex the ship

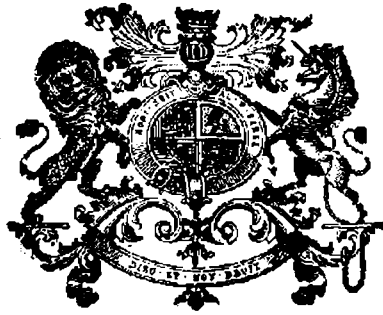

No compensation will be given for any loss of or damage to an uninsured parcel found to have contained on postage anything required to be insured under rule 4 of these rules nor beyond the actual amount of damage sustained nor to an amount in respect of any one Parcel exceeding the sum of Fifty Pounds.

7. Parcels tendered for insurance must be securely packed and enclosed in a reasonably strong case, wrapper or cover securely fastened and sealed, and of a

nature calculated to preserve the contents from loss or damage in the Post.

8. Parcels intended for insurance must be posted and prepaid under the same Regulations as an uninsured Parcel similarly addressed, and must be handed in at the General Post Office Kingstown.

9. A certificate of posting, in a form to be approved of, bearing thereon a receipt for the Insurance Fee, must be obtained by the person posting the Parcel.

10. The fee must be paid by means of Postage stamps which the sender must affix to the form of certificate issued by the Colonial Postmaster, and which the Colonial Postmaster will then obliterate with the office date stamp.

11. Such General Rules as to granting compensation as are now or hereafter shall be in force in the United Kingdom shall be taken *mutatis mutandis* to apply to St. Vincent.

12. Every application for compensation must be made by letter addressed to the Colonial Postmaster, and must be made within *three months* after the date on which the Parcel was posted. The certificate of posting must be produced when required.

13. Where a Parcel when delivered bears signs of injury the recipient should call attention to the fact, before leaving the Post Office, and if possible open the Parcel in the presence of the Colonial Postmaster.

14. No legal liability to give compensation in respect of any Parcel for which an Insurance Fee has been paid will attach to the Government of St. Vincent or to the Colonial Postmaster, and the decision of the Colonial Postmaster, subject to the approval of the Governor, upon all questions of compensation will be final.

15. These Regulations shall be read in connection with the Regulations passed the 23rd day of October 1886 and shall come into force on and from the 1st day of June 1895.

NEWS TELEGRAMS.

New York, 20th June.—At Ascot yesterday the race for the Royal Hunt Cup resulted as follows:—*Clarence* 1st, *Victor Wild* 2nd, *Irish Cur* 3rd.

The London *Chronicle* of yesterday in a strong editorial disapproves of the rejection in the House of Commons of the proposal to erect a statue of Cromwell and appealed to the public for subscriptions for that purpose. The same paper to-day announces that sufficient funds have been collected and £3,000 will be handed to the Government to enable the work to be commenced at once.

The *Daily News* denies the report that Mr. Gladstone dissents from the Government's general policy (vide yesterday's bulletin). In the House of Commons last night Mr. Chas. J. Darling, M.P. for Deptford, asked the Government whether they will proceed with the Welsh Church Disestablishment Bill in despite of Mr. Gladstone's opinion, no answer was however vouchsafed.

In political circles it is reported that several small changes have been adopted to meet Mr. Gladstone's criticism—for example, chapels are not to be entirely disendowed but placed under representative administrations.

It is announced that Mr. Jacob Bright has paired with Mr. Gladstone *vide* Mr. C. Villiers.

The Washington correspondent of a New York paper considers that the statement made by the Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to the House of Commons on the 17th instant, in reference to the proffer of assistance to arbitrate upon the Guisasa Boundary question, indicates that the situation has not changed within the last 5 years and that the United States can do no more unless Congress will again take action.

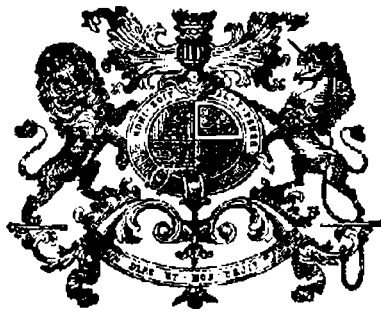
Other Washington news reports that Commodore Bume will succeed Admiral Meade.

LONDON, 20th.—Sugar in stock on the 15th instant was 102,000 tons; last year 73,000 tons.

Commander Handford of the U. S. Navy sails next mail for Panama to relieve Commander Ide of the *Aler* (vide bulletin 12th instant).

The New York *Times* in an editorial expresses the opinion that Spain herself would be alone blamable if England's procedure at Corinto, Nicaragua, should be followed regarding the Mora claim.

The Washington correspondent of the New York *Times* reports that the Havana customs may be seized by the U. S. Government, but a despatch from the Washington correspondent of the New York *World* considers there will be no danger of that but believes that diplomatic relations may possibly be severed until Congress acts upon President Cleveland's report. The despatch adds that Spain conditions payment upon the U. S. recognising certain Spanish claims.

NEWS TELEGRAMS.

NEW YORK, 27th June.—London political news reports that in the House of Commons last night Mr. Akers Douglas a Conservative Whip replying to a question from Mr. Labouchere stated that the Conservatives would dissolve at the earliest possible moment. Mr. Labouchere thereupon moved for the re-elections of those selected as Members of the new Ministry as named in yesterday's bulletin. The Irish Members at once raised a shout of "Judas" when Mr. Chamberlain was named.

In an address to his constituents yesterday Mr. Chamberlain stated that the Unionists will abandon any wild projects of constitutional changes and destructive legislation of the staple proposals of the last Government, and will substitute constructive social reforms, the promotion of imperial defenses and commerce throughout the vast regions now under the British flag.

Colonial circles generally approve the appointment of Mr. Chamberlain as the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

A National Liberal Association manifesto just issued says that great reforms are demanded by the entire nation and should be effected now if not thwarted by an irresponsible oligarchy and that it was more important still to establish a principle that when the two Houses were in conflict that the will of the Representative Chamber should prevail.

The race for the Northumberland Plate run yesterday resulted as follows:—*The Docker* 1st, *Cowberry* 2nd, *Spindle Leg* 3rd.

As reported on the 11th instant Mr. Ramon Williams will resume his duties as American Consul-General in Havana, sailing from New York on Saturday in the *Vesutan*.

The Cuban Clubs throughout the United States will on the 10th of July elect a provisional President of the Cuban Republic.

TRINIDAD, 27th.—Lady Broome leaves here to-day for England.

The Grace memorial fund started by the Queens Park Cricket Club sends a first remittance by to-day's mail.

NEW YORK, 28th.—London news reports that the Prime Minister stated in the House of Lords that no policy could at present be announced beyond the intention to dissolve the present Parliament on the 6th of July which he hoped Her Majesty would approve of. Lord Rosebery expressed his surprise that the policy of the Government was being kept back, and asked for an explanation from the Prime Minister of his having requested the Secretary of State for War to surrender his seals of office on Tuesday next, such procedure being unusual unless it implied censure. The Prime Minister in reply stated he intended only to save the Secretary of State for War the inconvenience of going through the formality of delivering the seals to Her Majesty in person and extremely regretted that he should have incurred any discourtesy towards him by the request. Lord Rosebery at once accepted the apology and the matter dropped.

The *Pull Mail Gazette* reports that Mr. H. Chaplin will be appointed President of the Local Government Board vice Mr. Shaw Lefevre.

The *Standard* reports that Lord Halsbury will receive the appointment of Lord High Chancellor vice Lord Herschell and that Mr. Austen Chamberlain is to be a Junior Lord of the Treasury.

It is reported that 4 Parnellite Members have guaranteed the sum of £20,000 towards the election fund.

In a manifesto issued by Mr. John Redmond he declares that events prove the necessity of reviving the late Mr. Parnell's policy to save Home Rule.

The St. Johns, Newfoundland, correspondent of a New York paper announces that Sir Graham John Bower, Imperial Secretary to the Government of Cape Colony, has been appointed Governor of Newfoundland vice Sir John T. O'Brien.

Harvard University has declined the challenge from the University of Oxford and Cambridge, (vide news bulletin of 6th instant) to contest in field athletics during the month of September in the United States.

NEW YORK, 29th.—Latest London advices regarding the formation of the new Ministry is as follows:—Viscount Cross, Lord Privy Seal; Sir Henry James, Chancellor Duchy of Lancaster; Sir M. W. Ridley, Home Secretary; Marquis of Lansdowne, Secretary of State for War; Lord George Hamilton, Secretary of State for India; Mr. C. T. Ritchie, President Board of Trade; Lord Cadogan, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland; Lord Ashbourne, Lord Chancellor of Ireland; Lord Balfour of Burleigh, Secretary for Scotland. The following appointments will probably also be announced but without seats in the Cabinet:—Mr. Robert Harbury, Financial Secretary to the Treasury; Hon. George Curzon, Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs.

Other news reports that the Queen has created Lord Rosebery a Knight of the Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle.

KINGSTOWN, ST. VINCENT, 16th April, 1895.

Sir,—I have the honour to forward the following Annual Report on the Postal Service of the Colony for the year 1894.

Inland Post.

2. The number of letters and other articles which passed through the Inland Post during the year was 84,238—a decrease of 9,541 upon the figures of the previous year. The offices showing the largest decrease were the General Post Office; Georgetown, Stabbs, Calliaqua, Barrouallie, and Chateaubelair—Branch Offices—and was due probably to the increased use of the Telephone. The total is made up of *Paid Letters* 24,893, *Other Articles* 1,777, *Official Letters* 16,668 and *Packet Letters* 40,900. I submit a summary of the totals of this year as well as that of the previous one:—

11. During the year the insurance of parcels containing valuables between this Colony and the United Kingdom was made compulsory and the cost of insurance was reduced from 6d. on £5 to 5d. on £12 with an additional 2½d. on every £12 after the first, to the limit which is £50.

13. Of course the items “Sale of Revenue Stamps” and “Parcel Post Duties” do not form part of the Revenue proper of the Post Office and I only include them to shew the total amount of money passing through the Office during the year under the respective heads.

14. With respect to the item “Sea and Territorial Transit charges” under the head of Expenditure I may mention that of this sum there was paid to the United Kingdom £275 10 6 (which amount however has been re-adjusted and a sum of £158 10 1 re-credited to St. Vincent in the books of the Imperial Post Office), to the United States of America £5 11 1 to Barbados £23 11 11 to Trinidad £12 8 3 and to St. Kitts 1s. 1d.

General.

15. Branch Offices were opened, in July, at Bequia, and in October, at the Islands of Canouan, Mayreau, and Union, in the Grenadines. No offices ever previously existed at any of these places. To the former there was a daily mail and to those of the latter once a week. Mails for Grenada could thus be sent away every alternate Saturday via Carriacou to which Island they would be forwarded from Union by special boat. It is worthy of consideration whether there should not be a reduction in the Postage on Letters sent by this means to a 1d. per ½oz.

16. Under Regulations passed in Executive Council in September last Postage Stamps were authorised for use for Revenue purposes altho the latter were not similarly allowed to be used for postal purposes. In the interest of the public it is to be recommended that in the future only one description of stamp be allowed for use either as Postage or Revenue and this can be brought about by allowing the present stock of Revenue Stamps to be exhausted without importing a fresh supply.

17. In accordance with instructions received from the Imperial Post Office a Regulation was passed in Executive Council carrying into effect the provisions of the Vienna convention in respect to the prevention of

the fraudulent use of counterfeit stamps or of stamps which had been previously used. Under Ordinance No. 16 of 1886 a penalty of £20 attaches to any one convicted of this offence. I am happy to be able to report that no breach of the regulation above referred to took place during the year.

18. The general work of the Department was carried out throughout the year with but few complaints; and the officers as a whole gave me their ready support and assistance in maintaining the good name which this office has obtained for prompt and at the same time accurate handling and delivery of the mails.

19. In conclusion, I have to express my regret that from the financial outlook being so gloomy the much needed improvements to the General Post Office, which had been approved of, had been obliged to be

abandoned; and I can only hope that so soon as the circumstances of the Colony will allow of it, that they will be carried out.

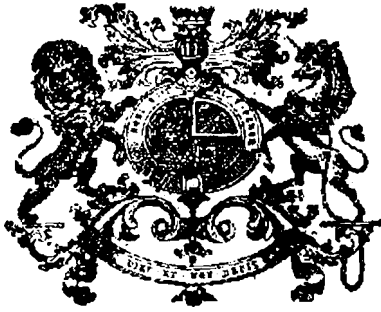

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

THE MAIL SHIPS (RULES) ORDER
IN COUNCIL, 1895.

Windsor, 11th May, 1895.

AT the Court at Windsor, the 11th day of May, 1895.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

Lord President.

WHEREAS section 8 (3) of "The Mail Ships Act, 1891," provides that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make Rules for carrying into effect, as respects British Possessions, the provisions of that Act with respect to the security given by mail ships, and in particular with respect to the commencement of a legal proceeding by service of a writ or process in the Possession, and to the notices to be given to arresting authorities in the Possession, and the evidence to be receivable by such authorities of the security having been given or withdrawn, and the application of the security in discharge of any damages, fine, debt, claim, sum, or forfeiture, where the same are or is recovered or payable either in the British Possession, or under proceedings pending concurrently in that British Possession, and in any other British Possession or the United Kingdom:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Notices of Exemption.

1. Any rules of the High Court of Justice in England, made under the provisions of "The Mail Ships Act, 1891" (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), shall be transmitted by a Secretary of State to the Government of every Possession to which the Act is applied for the purpose of a Convention, and shall be published by such Government in the Gazette of the Possession, and also in such local official Gazettes published in the Possession as the Government of the Possession may prescribe.

2. A copy of every notice and list published by the Board of Trade under the Act, or under any rules of Court made under the Act, shall be transmitted by a Secretary of State to the Government of every Possession to which the Act is applied for the purpose of a particular Convention.

3. A copy of every such Notice and list, signed by a Secretary to the Government of the Possession, or other prescribed officer, shall be published in the official Gazette of the Possession, and a copy of such Gazette Notification shall be kept publicly exhibited in the Court-room of every Colonial Court of Admiralty in the Possession, and a copy of the said Gazette containing any such Notification shall be receivable in evidence by every arresting authority in the Possession.

4. If notwithstanding its exemption, an exempted mail ship is arrested in the Possession, the Government of the Possession, on being informed by the owner of such arrest and of the arresting authority, and on being satisfied that the ship is an exempted mail ship, shall forthwith send a special Notice to the arresting authority, informing him that the ship is an exempted mail ship, and as such entitled to release.

Actions Against Exempted Ships.

5. An action may be commenced against the owners of an exempted mail ship in the like cases, in the same manner and subject to the same rules as an Admiralty action *in rem*, and in any Colonial Court of Admiralty in the Possession in which such an action might have been brought if the ship were not an exempted mail ship.

Orders, by Courts in British Possessions, for Application of the Security.

6. Any order of a Court in a British Possession directing any security to be applied shall recite the name of the Court and of the action or proceeding, the cause of action, and the judgment debt, and shall comprise a certificate by the Judge of the Court that the ship in respect of which the Judgment is given is an exempted mail ship, and might but for such exemption have been arrested and sold in execution thereof, and that the judgment debt is still unsatisfied, and is payable out of the security lodged in respect of the ship in the High Court of Justice in England.

7. The order may require payment to be made either in London to a named agent of the execution creditor, or in the Possession to some named officer of the Court from which the order issues.

8. Every such order shall be sealed with the seal of the Court, and shall be drawn up in duplicate, addressed to the Admiralty Registrar, Royal Courts of Justice, London, and shall be transmitted under cover to the prescribed officer of the Government of the Possession.

9. The said duplicate orders when received by the prescribed officer shall be countersigned by him, and

shall be forthwith transmitted to a Secretary of State, who shall cause one of such orders to be delivered to the Admiralty Registrar and the Admiralty Registrar shall, subject to any direction of the High Court, make an order upon the Paymaster-General for payment of the required sum out of the security in accordance with these Rules.

10. Unless the High Court shall otherwise order, and subject to existing rights of priority of liens, orders for the application of any security shall be paid in the order in which they are received by the Admiralty Registrar; but where two or more orders are received at the same time, they shall be paid in the order of their respective dates.

11. Where the order requires payment to a named agent of the execution creditor in London, the money shall be payable at the rates of exchange current on the day on which the order is received by the Secretary of State.

12. If the order requires payment to be made to a named officer of the Court from which the order issues, such an amount shall be paid out by the Paymaster-General, to a person nominated by the Secretary of State, as will at the rates of exchange current on the day on which the order is received by the Secretary of State be necessary to purchase a draft for the amount of the order payable at sight in the Possession, and such draft shall be in favour of the said named officer of the said Court.

13. Where any action or proceeding against the owners of an exempted mail ship is pending in a Court in a British Possession, involving a claim against the security lodged in the High Court in England, the Court in the British Possession shall transmit to the Admiralty Registrar notice of the pendency of such action or proceeding, stating the nature and amount of the claim and the proceedings taken in regard thereto; and in case of the subsequent discontinuance or other conclusion of such action or proceeding, whereby the security ceases to be affected, the Court shall transmit notice of such discontinuance or conclusion. Every such notice shall be sealed, drawn up, addressed and transmitted to the Admiralty Registrar in like manner as an order for the application of the security.

Miscellaneous Provisions.

14. In every British Possession to which these Rules apply, the Governor in Council may, by Order, prescribe any matter directed by these Rules to be prescribed, or necessary for carrying them into effect.

15. In the application of these rules to British India, the following provisions shall have effect:—

(a.) The Presidencies of Madras and Bombay, the lower Provinces of Bengal, and the Province of Burmah shall be deemed to be separate British Possessions.

(b.) The expressions "Government of the Possession" and "Governor in Council" respectively shall mean the Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal and the Chief Commissioner of Burmah, with respect to the territories administered by them respectively.

(c.) All Orders made in pursuance of Rule 14 with respect to any part of British India shall, be made with the previous sanction of the Governor-General in Council.

16. In the application of these Rules to any British Possession in which there is a Vice-Admiralty Court, and no Colonial Court of Admiralty, these Rules shall be read as if "Vice-Admiralty Court" were Colonial Court of Admiralty.

17. In these Rules "judgment debt" means any

damages, fine, debt, claim, sum, or forfeiture found by any Court to be payable by the owner of a ship, and "execution creditor" means the person entitled to a judgment debt.

Other expressions have the same meaning as in the Act. 18. This Order may be cited as "The Mail Ships (Rules) Order in Council, 1895."

And the Most Honourable the Marquess of Ripon, K.G., the Right Honourable the Earl of Kimberley, K.G., and the Right Honourable H. H. Fowler, three of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

THE following Extract from a communication received from the Curator of the Botanic Gardens is published for general information.

JAMAICA GINGER.

Bulletin No. 18 issued from this Station and published in the Govt. Gazette No. 46 for 18th Oct. last contains amongst other things "A report on the ginger crops of Jamaica." It would appear that Jamaica has special advantages in the large extent of the forest lands for the production of the best quality of ginger, but at the present time there is an outcry against the wholesale destruction of the virgin forests especially as it has been proved that ginger of a good quality can be successfully grown on good and well manured arable land. With the view of putting this to the test about a tenth of an acre of land at the Botanical Station here has been specially prepared by means of deep forking, hoeing and manuring and then formed into little hillocks or banks on which the ginger received direct from Jamaica has been planted.

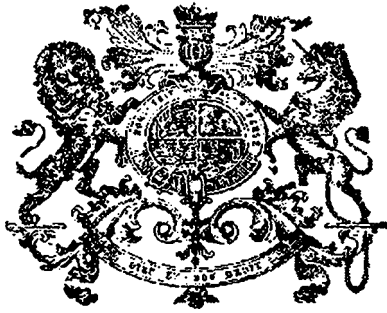

My Lord,—With reference to your despatch No. 121 of the 4th of December relative to the establishment of a penny post between the islands of my Government, I have now the honour to enclose copies of statements prepared by the Postmasters of the three Colonies showing a comparison of receipts from number of letters despatched—treated as single letters—and probable loss of revenue should the postage be reduced from 2½d. to 1d. per ½ oz.

2. The statements include British Guiana, Barbados, and Trinidad, between which colonies and the Windward Islands there is a large correspondence carried on, and it has occurred to me that possibly Your Lordship may be willing to communicate with the Governments of those colonies and the Governors of Jamaica and of the Leeward Islands on the subject of a penny postage system to embrace the British West Indies generally.

3. So far as regards communication between the Windward Islands it appears from the enclosed statements that the annual loss of revenue resulting from a penny postage is estimated approximately as follows:—

Grenada	£36
St. Lucia	£30
St. Vincent	£40

4. It is, I think, reasonable to assume that the reduction of postage would lead to a large increase of letters and a proportionate diminution of the loss. From the St. Vincent statement it will be seen that in 1891 the postal rate of letters was reduced from 4d. to 2½d. with the result that in 1893 the number of letters rose from 1158 in 1890 to 1816 while the receipts showed a decrease of only seven shillings and eight pence.

5. I hope Your Lordship will approve of an immediate reduction in the rate of postage for letters between the Islands of the Windward Group from 2½d. to 1d. per ½ oz.; and will be good enough to communicate with the Governments of other West Indian British Colonies with a view to the establishment of a general intercolonial penny post.

Sir,—I have the honour to inform you with reference to my despatch No. 93 of the 5th instant that the Postmaster General has pointed out that under the Postal Union Convention, two rates of payment are chargeable for the conveyance of letters by sea, viz., 2 francs per kilogramme for letters carried over distances not exceeding 300 miles, and 15 francs per kilogramme for letters carried over longer distances, and that, in dealing with the Royal Mail Packet Company's Service to and between the Islands on the basis of the Postal Union Convention, every West Indian Island has to pay the higher rate for the conveyance of its letters to certain other Islands in the West Indies; which rate is equal to about 1½d. per half oz. letter; the introduction therefore of a general penny postage between the several colonies of the Group would involve a loss

in the case of every letter subject to such higher sea rate, which of course any growth of correspondence would not reduce but would on the contrary increase. The matter will however receive my further consideration in its various aspects.

CHAPTER 44.

An Act to amend the Law relating to the Judicial Committee of Her Majesty's Privy Council. A.D. 1895.

[6th July 1895.]

BE it enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1.—(1.) If any person being or having been Chief Justice or a Judge of the Supreme Court of the Dominion of Canada, or of a Superior Court in any province of Canada, or of any of the Australasian colonies mentioned in the schedule to this Act, or of either of the South African colonies mentioned in the said schedule or of any other Superior Court in Her Majesty's Dominions named in that behalf by Her Majesty in Council, is a member of Her Majesty's Privy Council, he shall be a member of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council.

(2.) The number of persons being members of the Judicial Committee by reason of this Act shall not exceed five at any one time.

(3.) The provisions of this Act shall be in addition to, and shall not affect, any other enactment for the

NEWS TELEGRAMS.

LONDON, 19th December.—The hydraulic gear of the Royal Mail Steamer *Atrato* having broken down, the *Orioles* took her place and sailed from Southampton yesterday with passengers and mails.

There is an apparent improvement in the sugar market in consequence of the report of M. Licht that the estimated Cuban crop will fall short of the usual output by about 300,000 tons.

NEW YORK, 19th.—The correspondence resulting from President Cleveland's message to Congress published both in London and New York shows that Mr. Olney in a despatch to Lord Salisbury explains that Monroeism renders any permanent political union between any European power and any American State unnatural and inexpedient. Lord Salisbury in his reply says the necessary meaning of these words applies to a union between Great Britain and Canada, Jamaica, Trinidad, Honduras or British Guiana and that Her Majesty's Government emphatically deny this; they maintain that the union between Great Britain and her territories in the Western Hemisphere to be both natural and expedient, they cannot entertain or arbitrate on claims involving the transfer of a large number of British subjects who have for so many years enjoyed British rule, to a nation of a different race and language, whose rule being frequently disturbed affords inadequate protection to life and property.

The comments of the London and New York journals continue as already indicated in yesterday's telegrams, but the English press show a calmer tone whereas the American opinions are more excited in their expression, deprecating war, but indicating a readiness for any issue.

All the European bourses are in a state of excitement over the present state of affairs.

The French journals show a tendency to rejoice at what they term England's dilemma. The German press on the contrary uphold England and state that Europe will support the latter against the unbridled claims put forward by the United States.

A despatch from a Washington correspondent of a New York paper reports that the House unanimously passed a vote of appropriation to the amount of \$100,000 for the purpose of carrying into effect the President's proposed commission and that bills have been presented to both Houses appropriating one hundred million dollars for the commencement of military preparations.

NEW YORK, 20th.—London news reports that the press generally shows increasing appreciation of the gravity of the present situation with a decreasing disposition to attribute the President's message to the exigencies of American politics.

The *Times* editorially expresses the opinion that although Americans scarcely understand the meaning of true Monroeism, England must reckon upon their readiness to wage a holy war in defense of it and therefore must be prepared to defend British rights wherever threatened.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer speaking at a banquet at Bristol yesterday said that nothing was impossible not even an Anglo-American war, that kinsmen sometimes were bitter enemies, but nevertheless he disbelieved that other people desired war, and that when Lord Salisbury's true position was fully placed before the United States he expected there would be a peaceful and honorable result,

Address of His Excellency Sir Charles Bruce, K.C.M.G., to the Legislative Council of Saint Vincent, on Wednesday 2nd September, 1896.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,—

When I had the pleasure of meeting you on the 3rd of June last, I informed you that I had submitted to the Secretary of State a scheme for the reorganisation of some of the principal departments, chiefly by amalgamation, with a view to a substantial reduction in the cost of the Establishment of the Colony. I pointed out, however, that some of my recommendations can only be carried out as vacancies occur and that others would probably have to be deferred to the end of the year.

The Secretary of State has generally approved of my scheme and it now remains for me to submit to you the details which the Government have agreed to in the form of a draft Estimate for the service of the year 1897; and to indicate the further measures of retrenchment suggested to be carried out as opportunities may occur.

The Estimate is so framed as to show, for purposes of comparison, the actual expenditure in 1894 and 1895 and the revised Estimate of the current year. For reasons which I will fully explain, the Estimate includes the expenditure on Crown Lands which has not hitherto been included in the general accounts of the Colony.

The Abstract attached to the Estimates gives the following results:—

1894	Actual Expenditure—	£31,791
1895	Actual Expenditure—	29,829
1896	Revised Estimate—	29,186
1897	Draft Estimate—	27,161

In accordance with the policy which guided us in framing the revised Estimate for the current year, I have borne in mind that the scheme of taxation, including as it does the raising of a large proportion of the revenue from taxes on foodstuffs and articles of general use, is justified so long as an ample share of the revenue is appropriated to expenditure on the Medical and Hospital and Charitable services and on the Education vote as agencies serving to extend to the community facilities and conveniences which elsewhere are largely left to be borne by private means and individual enterprise. You will observe therefore, that the draft Estimate submitted to you shows no material reduction under the following Heads:—

Education - - -	£2,380
Medical - - -	1,800
Hospital - - -	2,930
Charitable - - -	570
	£7,680.

With these preliminary remarks I pass on to explain the means by which it is proposed to reduce the public expenditure under other Heads immediately or in the near future.

It is proposed, in the first place, to amalgamate with the offices now held by the Administrator the offices held by the Treasurer. Against the saving of £500 a year, the amount of the Treasurer's salary, must however be set the pension of the retiring Treasurer which will be about £220, and this amount has been provided in the draft Estimate under the Head of Pensions. A further reduction will however be made by amalgamating the boat service of the Customs with that of the Police, and by some minor economies.

It is proposed to combine the offices of Audit Clerk and Inspector of Schools. The duties of these two offices will certainly not overtax the energies of an active public servant and there will be some saving of travelling allowance as well as of salary, as the duties of Audit and Inspection of Schools can be conveniently performed on the same tours of duty. By this arrangement a saving will be effected of about £105 a year.

With the duties of the Police have been amalgamated duties in connection with the Post Office and Telephone Department and, as already indicated, with the Customs boat service. It is further proposed when the time comes for considering the reorganisation of the Judicial offices of the Colony, to transfer to the Chief of Police the office of Inspector of Prisons now held by the Registrar. The draft Estimate for 1897 shows under the Head of Police, Post Office and Telephones a collective expenditure of £4,619 against an actual expenditure of £5,360 in 1894 and £5,017 in 1895; and an estimated expenditure of £4,919 in 1896. It is thought that when an opportunity occurs a further reduction may with advantage be made by transferring the Post Office to the Department of the Chief of Police. There could be no more convenient site for the Post Office than the Police Barracks, and the duties of Postmaster might well be performed by a competent Clerk acting under the general supervision of the Chief of Police. As most of the District Post Offices will now be in charge of the Police it will be of advantage that all officers of the Post Office should be responsible to one head.

The draft Estimate for 1897 shows no material reduction under the Head of Legal Services, but the cost of the legal machinery seems to me out of all proportion to the requirements of the Colony and I believe that substantial reductions can be made as vacancies occur under this Head. I am, of course, aware that some years ago a proposal to combine the Chief Justiceships of St. Vincent and St. Lucia gave rise to strong opposition; but I hardly think that the opposition is likely to be renewed if it is understood that the Chief Justiceship of the three Colonies of the Windward Islands Group can be held by the same person without any infringement whatever of the constitutional independence of each of the Colonies. If this is made clear I cannot but think that the Colonies will agree in welcoming an arrangement which in our present straitened circumstances will afford a measure of relief to each.

I suggest, therefore, the appointment, when an opportunity occurs, of a Chief Justice of the Windward Islands whose emoluments would be defrayed by the three Colonies in approximate proportion to the time of his annual stay in each. I am confident that a collective emolument of £1,200 a year would suffice to secure the services of a competent Chief Justice and, assuming that he would reside in Grenada for six months and divide the other six months of the year between St. Lucia and St. Vincent, the emoluments of the office might be reasonably divided as follows:—

Grenada - - -	£ 600
St. Lucia - - -	300
St. Vincent - - -	300

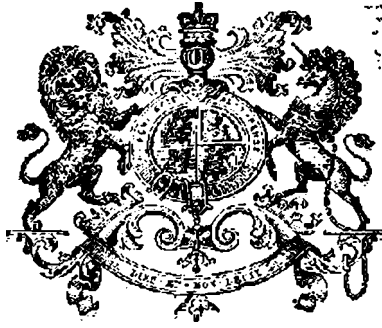

Sir,—I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your No. 811/98 of the 27th ultimo and beg, on my own behalf and that of the Board to whom the letter has now been submitted, to thank Mr. Secretary Chamberlain for having taken note of the substance of my letter of the 11th idem and especially of the observations contained in its concluding paragraphs.

In pursuance of the policy enunciated in that letter, and with a view of still further meeting the desires expressed by the West India Colonies, I have the pleasure to inform Mr. Chamberlain that in addition to the reduction of 2/10d per word recently made for International telegrams, the Directors have decided to make considerable reductions in the Intercolonial rates between British Colonies to come into force early in April, in the hope that some increase of traffic may follow.

I would also beg leave to inform Mr. Chamberlain that it has proved to be impracticable to repair the second cable of the Company between Trinidad and St. Croix and as the absence of this would interfere with the duplication of the system in an important part, the Directors are inviting tenders to restore this line and improve the duplications effected with Grenada and St. Lucia. These more perfect arrangements it is estimated will cost about £55,000 and deplete the reserve fund of the Company to that extent.

The Directors have made these efforts in order to give satisfaction to Mr. Chamberlain and the Colonial Governments and with the view that as far as lies in the Company's power every practicable step should be taken to do what they can in support of the efforts which they understand are to be made to further the commercial and general interests of the West Indies.

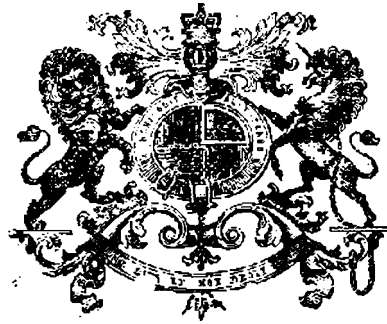

Fortnightly Service between Trinidad, St. Kitts,

and the intermediate Islands, in consideration of a subsidy.

A service of steamers of about five hundred tons net register, to run at a speed of about ten knots, from Port of Spain, Trinidad, to Grenada, St. Vincent, Barbados, St. Lucia, Dominica, Montserrat, Antigua, Nevis, and St. Kitts, once every fortnight, returning within the fortnight to Port of Spain, after calling at the same islands on the return voyage.

The service to begin not later than 30th June, 1899, and earlier if possible.

Combinations of or with existing steam services which will produce the above result, i.e., an additional fortnightly service to that now supplied by the Royal Mail Steamship Company, will be entertained.

The object of this service, which is in accordance with the recommendation of the West India Royal Commission, is to make communication between the islands more frequent and more regular than it is at present, and high speed is not specially required.

Service B.

Fortnightly Service between Trinidad, British Guiana, Barbados and Canada, in consideration of a subsidy.

A service of steamers, of not less than one thousand tons net register, to run at a speed of not less than ten knots, from Port of Spain, Trinidad, and Georgetown, British Guiana, alternately once a fortnight, to Barbados, Bermuda, and a port in the Dominion of Canada, returning once a fortnight, viâ Bermuda and Barbados, to Port of Spain and Georgetown alternately.

The service to begin not later than the thirtieth of June, 1899, and earlier if possible.

The object of this service is to encourage trade in sugar and other products between the West Indian Colonies specified and the Dominion of Canada.

Service C.

Fortnightly Fruit Service between St. Vincent, Dominica and the United States or Canada, in consideration of a subsidy.

A service of steamers of not less than one thousand tons net register to run fortnightly, or twice in every five weeks, from St. Vincent to Dominica, and thence direct to a port in the United States or Canada. The steamers to be fitted for the carriage of fruit, and the contractors to undertake to purchase at fixed rates per bunch all bananas of standard quality offered for shipment. The service not to begin till the autumn of the year 1900, and to be maintained for about six months in each year; the contractors to be at liberty to determine the contract at the end of any season if for three consecutive trips they have failed to secure shipments of a certain minimum quality of fruit to be specified in the contract.

This service for the encouragement of fruit traffic between the islands specified and the United States is recommended in the report of the West India Royal Commission.

Service D.

Fortnightly or Tri-weekly Fruit Service between Jamaica and England, under a subsidy or guarantee.

A service of steamers, of not less than one thousand five hundred tons net register, to run at a speed of not less than fifteen knots, once in every three weeks or thereabouts, from a port or ports in Jamaica to a port in the United Kingdom. The steamer to be fitted for the carriage and cool storage of fruit. The service to begin not later than the autumn of the year 1899.

The object of this service is to develop trade, and especially fruit trade, between Jamaica and the United Kingdom.

The steamers employed in all or any of the above specified services are to be British vessels, classed A1 at Lloyd's, and, except in a case of Service C. should contain first class accommodation for a moderate number of passengers. The vessels employed in Service A are to provide accommodation for third-class passengers to be carried at approved fares.

The borrower will have to submit a detailed statement with the probable cost of the work he proposes to undertake;

No loan will be made for the purpose of replacing obsolete or inefficient machinery or buildings, or for the purpose of paying off any existing mortgage or encumbrance.

Further particulars will be published in due course but, to enable the Government to form some estimate of the amount that will be required, it is requested that any one who wishes to take advantage of the loan will communicate with the Colonial Secretary stating the amount he is likely to require and the property on which the security will be offered.

Mr. Simmons, Mr. MacDonald and Mr. Durrant expressed the opinion that the question of payment of purchase money or compensation paid under the Ordinance dealt with under section 14 should be as in all

other instances in the Ordinance, left in the hands of the Judge, instead of in the hands of the Governor acting on the advice of the Attorney General.

The Colonial Secretary explained that this had been done with a view to facilitating the payment and avoiding an application to and an order by the Judge, which would involve delay.

As no motion however was made the section remained as read. Amendments were made to 15 and 16, sections 17, 18 and 19 were amended, 20 and 21 were struck out and a new 20 added, section 22 was struck out, 23 was amended and became 21, new sections 22 and 23 were added; a new paragraph was added to 28, 29 was struck out a new 32 was added, and at the request of the Unofficial Members the Ordinance was left in Committee until an amended copy could be printed and supplied to the members for their perusal before its final passing.

On the motion of the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Attorney General the Council resumed.

The Colonial Secretary moved for leave to introduce an Ordinance to amend "The Customs Duties Ordinance 1895," and "The Customs Duties Ordinance 1895 (ii.," seconded by the Attorney General, Ordinance introduced and read a first time.

On motion of the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Attorney General the Standing Rules were suspended and the Council went into Committee, Ordinance was considered, Council resumed, Ordinance was read a third time numbered 1 of 1899 and passed.

Council was then adjourned to Saturday the 7th instant at noon.

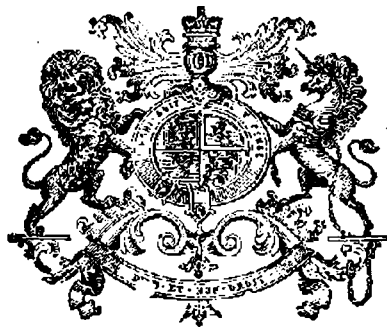

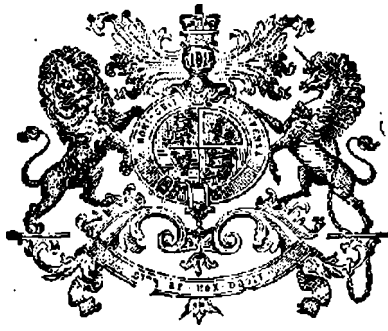

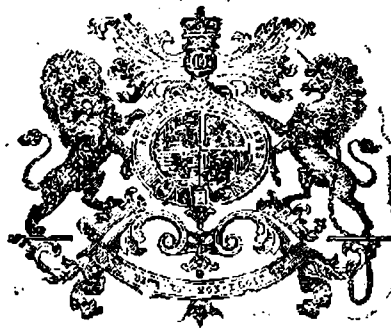

With reference to my despatch No. 125 of the 11th November 1898, I have the honour to transmit the accompanying copies of a Contract which has been entered into between the Canadian Government and Messrs. Pickford and Black for an improved Steamship Service between Canada and certain West Indian Colonies, and towards which Her Majesty's Government are contributing a subsidy of £13,500

2. I trust that this Service, which you will observe is to commence in July next, will do much to promote trade between Canada and the West Indian Colonies, the measures to be taken for the development of which has formed the subject of other correspondence, and also afford in some measure those facilities for trade and communication between the West Indian Colonies themselves, the want of which has been much felt and to which the late Royal Commission drew special attention.

3. I have to add with regard to Article 9 of the Contract that the Canadian Government have been informed that Her Majesty's Government could not assent to any preference being accorded to Canadian Shippers or Merchants as against Shippers and Merchants of the United Kingdom or the British West Indies, and that the payment of the Imperial Subsidy must be conditional on no such preference being given.

4. You should not fail to report to me at once any breaches of Contract on the part of the Contractors should any occur, in order that they may be brought to the notice of the Canadian Government.

AGREEMENT with Messrs. Pickford and Black to establish a Steamship Service between Canada and the West Indies.
25191/99.

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT made this Twentieth day of July in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine,

Between the Honourable the Minister of Trade and Commerce of the Dominion of Canada (hereinafter

referred to as "The Minister," which expression shall include the Minister of Trade and Commerce of the said Dominion for the time being), acting for and on behalf of Her Majesty, of the one part, and Robert Pickford and William Anderson Black, both of the city of Halifax, in the province of Nova Scotia, in the said Dominion, carrying on business in partnership together as steamship agents and brokers under the style or firm of "Pickford and Black" (hereinafter referred to as the Contractors") of the other part.

WITNESSETH, that for and in consideration of the covenants, agreements, stipulations and reservations hereinafter contained on the part of Her Majesty, the Contractors, for themselves and their successors, do covenant, and agree to and with Her Majesty, her heirs and successors, in manner and form and to the effect following, that is to say:

1. The Contractors shall on the first day of July next after the date of these presents place upon the route between the port of St. John, in the province of New Brunswick, and the port of Halifax, in the province of Nova Scotia, as ports of departure in the Dominion of Canada, and Port of Spain, in Trinidad, and Georgetown, in British Guiana, alternately as the ports of arrival, a sufficient number of steamers of the class and description hereinafter defined in clause 3, to perform, and with the said steamers will for the space of five years from that date perform, the following service:—Sailing one vessel in each two weeks from the port of St. John, in the province of New Brunswick, to the Port of Halifax, in Nova Scotia, and thence on the first trip to Port of Spain, in Trinidad, making the trip within fourteen days, calling on all voyages at the following ports in the order named below:—

1. Hamilton in Bermuda.
2. Basseterre in St. Kitts.
3. St. John in Antigua.
4. Plymouth in Montserrat.
5. Roseau in Dominica.
6. Castries in St. Lucia.
7. Bridgetown in Barbados.
8. Kingstown in St. Vincent.
9. St. George's in Grenada.
10. Scarborough in Tobago,

and upon the return voyages from Trinidad to Halifax or St. John, to call at these same ports in the inverse order as given above; and on the next following trip to sail from Halifax to Port of Spain in Trinidad calling on all voyages at the following ports in the order named:—

1. Hamilton in Bermuda.
2. Castries in St. Lucia.
3. Bridgetown in Barbados,

making the trip to Trinidad within eleven days, thence on to Georgetown, in British Guiana, completing the trip within fourteen days, and upon the return trip from Georgetown, British Guiana, to Halifax or St. John, to call at the following ports in the order as given below:—

1. Port of Spain, Trinidad.
2. Bridgetown in Barbados.
3. Kingstown in St. Vincent.
4. Castries in St. Lucia.
5. Roseau in Dominica.
6. Plymouth in Montserrat.
7. St. John in Antigua.
8. Basseterre in St. Kitts.
9. Hamilton in Bermuda,

and continuing trips as above defined alternately to

Port of Spain, Trinidad, and Georgetown, British Guiana, sailing from St. John and Halifax at regular intervals of fourteen days each.

2. Subject to the provisions hereinafter contained, every steamer making any such voyage as aforesaid shall commence and complete the same, and shall arrive at and leave the said intermediate ports respectively, at such times as shall be specified in a time table previously approved by the Minister, and the commencement of each of the said voyages shall be so timed that the steamer making the same shall call at each of the said intermediate ports which is situated in the West Indies or the alternate weeks to those in which the vessels of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company make such calls. At least three calendar months before the commencement of the service, the Contractors shall furnish the draft of the said time table to the Minister for his approval, and when the same shall have been so approved, the Contractors shall publish it at such times and places, and in such manner, as the Minister may from time to time require. During the continuance of this Contract, no alterations shall be made in the said time table, unless the same shall have been approved in writing by the Minister, and published at such times and places, and in such manner, as he may require.

3. The Steamers employed in this service shall be British vessels of not less than 1,000 tons, register, and shall be good, substantial, and efficient steam vessels of adequate power and speed, and supplied with first-rate proper steam engines, and in all respects suited to the performance of the service, and shall be capable of maintaining, and shall maintain, when employed on this service, an average speed of not less than 10 knots an hour, and shall also be provided with proper accommodation for at least 10 first-class passengers, and such second-class and deck passengers as the traffic may require, and shall be fitted with all necessary appliances for the reception, stowage, and carriage of cargo.

4. The steamers to be employed as above specified shall at all times during the continuance of this contract be fully sea-worthy, well officered, manned, victualled, equipped, provided, and furnished, having regard to the service which the Contractors have hereby undertaken to perform, and shall have ample and suitable accommodation for the mails and freight to be carried over the routes specified, and they shall, at all times, carry boats and life-saving appliances in compliance with the law, and shall be in all respects subject to the approval of the Minister.

5. The Contractors shall, during the performance of this contract, convey on each and every trip of the steamers performing the aforementioned services both on outward and homeward voyages, all such mails as shall be tendered to the proper officers or persons in that behalf on the said steamers, by or on behalf of or under the direction of the postal authorities of Canada, or of those at the terminal ports or ports of call herein referred to outside of Canada, and shall deliver all such mails at their proper destinations at the terminal ports or ports of call above referred to, and the expenses of carrying such mails from the post offices to the steamers and from the steamers to the post offices at the terminal ports and at the ports of call shall be borne by the Contractors, who will be subject to all general and special regulations now or hereafter existing during the continuance of this contract in connection with the postal service. For the conveyance of all such mails

no payment shall be made or required over or beyond the amount of subsidy hereinafter mentioned or provided for; this will not however preclude the payment of subsidies in aid of the service by the different British colonies at which calls are made.

6. The said steamers shall be provided with sufficient and convenient accommodation and protection for all such mails to the satisfaction of the Honourable the Postmaster General of Canada for the time being, and the Contractor shall further take all reasonable and necessary precautions for the protection of such mails, while upon the said steamers or while in the Contractors' charge or custody, from loss, damage, or injury in any way, and the Contractors shall be responsible for any loss or damage thereto caused by negligence or want of proper care or accommodation on the part of the Contractors, their agents or servants, or on the part of the officers, employees, or crew on board of the said steamers.

7. The expression "mails" for the purpose of this contract shall be deemed to mean and include all boxes, bags, or packets of or containing letters postcards, newspapers, parcels, books, or printed papers, and all other articles which under the Post Office Act and postal regulations for the time being in force are transmissible by post in Canada, without regard to place either of origin or destination, and also all empty trunks, empty boxes, and other receptacles, stores and articles used or to be used in carrying on the post office services or which shall ordinarily be sent by or to or from the post offices.

8. The Contractors shall not, nor shall any of their agents or servants or officers or crews of the said steamers, receive or permit to be received on board of the said steamers any letters for conveyance other than those contained in Her Majesty's mails or which are otherwise privileged by law, nor the mails of any other country, except such as are specified by the Postmaster General of Canada for the time being.

The Contractors shall carry on each steamer engaged under this contract according to its capacity, on outward and homeward voyages, all the freight passengers which may be reasonably offered or demanded, and at tariff rates, both as to passengers and freight, which may be approved by Governor in Council. No discrimination shall be made as regards rates or charges, directly or indirectly, against Canadian merchants and shippers, who shall always have preference for freights and goods over all other merchants and shippers; and the Contractors shall immediately on the completion of each trip furnish to the Minister and complete copies of the manifests of the cargoes and passenger lists carried on the said steamer performing a trip on its outward and homeward voyages, certified by the proper officers of Customs, as well as copies of the logs and sailing charts duly certified by the master of the steamer, and also such other documents, information and evidence as may be reasonably required by the Minister, to show the volume, extent, and value of the trade carried on by the said steamers and such other Customs certificates, documents, and evidence as may be necessary or as may be reasonably required by the Minister to prove the performance of the services contracted for, and to enable the Minister to determine as to whether this Contract is being carefully and faithfully carried out and performed, and the furnishing of such certificates, documents and information and evidence, as hereinbefore specified, shall be a condition

precedent to the payment of the subsidy hereinafter provided for or any portion thereof.

10. The Contractors shall keep full and proper accounts of and in connection with the working of the service, and shall keep such accounts separate and distinct from any other accounts of or connected with other branches of the business of the Contractors, and in any contingency which in the opinion of the Minister may render such a course necessary, the Contractors shall allow any officer or officers named by the Minister free access to such accounts and all books, papers, and documents connected therewith.

11. The steamers employed in carrying out the provisions of this Contract shall not on any of their voyages either outwards or homewards call at any port in the United States of America.

12. The Contractors shall not convey or permit to be conveyed in any steamers any nitro-glycerine or any other article which in the opinion of the Minister shall be dangerous.

13. The Contractors shall furnish and provide at their own expense the necessary agents required at each and all of the ports aforesaid for the purpose of carrying on the business of the said steamers during the performance of the Contract.

14. The Contractors shall at all times during the performance of this Contract well and faithfully abide by and conform to all such orders and regulations as may be made by the Minister with regard to the business of the said steamers in the performance of this Contract.

15. It is understood that if either of the said steamers shall be, by peril of the sea or other unavoidable casualty, lost, destroyed, or temporarily disabled from performing the voyages herein agreed to be performed according to the true intent and meaning of these presents, the Contractors may in such case, as soon as reasonably may be, having regard to the circumstances, replace the said steamer by another of equal class, speed, equipment, character, and capacity to the satisfaction and approval of the Minister, in case the said steamer has been only temporarily disabled, and continue the service herein contracted for with such substituted or repaired steamer with as little delay as possible under all circumstances, provided, however, that there shall be no payment of any subsidy in respect of any voyage not actually performed.

16. And Her Majesty for herself her heirs and successors, hereby covenants to and with the Contractors, their executors, administrators, and assigns, that the said Contractors well and faithfully performing all and every the covenants, agreements and stipulations hereinbefore and hereinafter set forth and contained, will well and truly pay or cause to be paid, to the Contractors, their heirs, administrators, or assigns, during the continuance of this Contract an annual subsidy of the sum of Sixty-five thousand and seven hundred dollars from and out of the consolidated fund or other proper moneys of the Dominion of Canada, and for another sum of Sixty-five thousand and seven hundred dollars out of moneys provided by Her Majesty's Government (should the same be furnished to the Government of the Dominion of Canada for such purposes, but not otherwise) payable as follows:—On the first day of each month during the continuance of this Contract, the sum of Five thousand four hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$5,475), and a further sum of the same amount, provided the same be

provided by Her Majesty's Government for the purpose as above mentioned, provided, however, that no such payments shall be made until it is shown to the satisfaction of the Minister that all trips called for by the Contract up to that time have been well and properly performed.

17. If and so often as the Contractors shall fail to commence any of the said voyages on the day on which the same ought to be commenced according to this Contract and the said time table, or shall fail to complete any such voyage within the period within which the same ought, according to this Contract and the said time table, to be completed, then (except in any case in which the Contractors shall prove to the satisfaction of the Minister that such failure has arisen from any cause wholly beyond the control of the Contractors), the Contractors shall pay to the Minister in respect of every such failure a sum equal to one twenty-sixth part of the subsidy payable under this Contract, and if any such failure shall occur thrice in any period of two calendar months, then (except as aforesaid) the Minister may, by giving notice in writing to the Contractors, determine this Contract, but without prejudice to the rights of either party in respect of any antecedent breach thereof. All moneys which shall become payable under this clause shall be paid as liquidated damages, and not by way of penalties, and may be deducted by the Minister from the subsidy, or may be recovered from the Contractors by the Minister on behalf of Her Majesty.

18. It is conditioned, declared, and agreed that the payment of subsidy, as hereinbefore stipulated, is subject to the amount specified being provided for the purpose by a vote of the Parliament of Canada, and that if no amount is voted for the purpose, or if any amount voted has become exhausted in payment thereof, and no further sum is voted for the purpose, this Contract or Agreement shall terminate and become void and of no effect, and the party of the first part shall not in consequence be held liable to damages.

19. It is declared to be the true intent and meaning of these presents that the Minister shall have the right at any time during the continuance of this Contract, upon thirty days' notice in writing to the Contractors, their successors or assigns, to determine this Contract, and every matter and thing herein contained, if it shall appear to the Minister that there has been any breach on the part of the Contractors, their successors or assigns, of any of the covenants, agreements, stipulations, or provisions herein contained and entered into on the part of the Contractors, and it is declared and agreed that the Minister shall at all times be the sole and final judge as to whether there has been any such breach, and his determination shall be absolute, final, and conclusive.

20. This Contract shall not, nor shall any right or interest therein, be assigned without the consent in writing of the Minister to such assignment having been first obtained.

21. It is a condition of these presents that no member of the House of Commons of Canada shall be admitted to any share or part of this contract or Agreement nor to any benefit to arise therefrom.

Hurricane Signals and Advisory Messages.

In view of the approach of the hurricane season, beginning July 1st, a few general remarks explanatory of the warnings telegraphed by the United States Weather Bureau to the various stations in the West Indies, etc., may not be out of place, especially as the purpose and significance of the warnings may not be generally understood.

When the meteorological conditions indicate a disturbance, unmistakably of a hurricane character, the hurricane signal, two flags red with black center—placed one above the other,

and used to announce the expected approach of tropical hurricanes, is directed to be hoisted at stations in localities likely to come within the area of dangerous and destructive winds. The signal is usually displayed for a period of 24 hours, or until danger from the hurricane has passed. The stations not within the area of dangerous winds are telegraphed advisory warnings so that parties likely to be interested, particularly those having maritime interests, may be fully warned, and can, therefore, take the necessary steps to avert danger, and thus avoid loss at sea, or otherwise.

Advisory messages are also telegraphed to the various stations when the meteorological conditions indicate the formation of a storm or hurricane, the presence of a storm or hurricane in a specified locality, the progress of a storm or hurricane in a certain direction, or when the disturbance has not sufficiently developed, or is not severe enough at the time of sending the advisory message to warrant the hoisting of the hurricane signal.

These messages are furnished for the information of the public, so that, in case the disturbance threatens any particular locality, the people may be on their guard and take all necessary precautions against danger or damage, in the event that the disturbance should rapidly and decidedly increase in intensity.

These messages are of especial importance to masters of vessels about to sail, fully informing them of the conditions obtaining, so that all necessary measures may be taken by them to avert danger.

All advisory messages do not necessarily mean that a hurricane is imminent or raging elsewhere, but that the meteorological conditions upon which they are based are favourable for the development of a storm or hurricane.

There is no signal of any kind displayed upon the receipt of advisory messages.

Correspondence on the subject of the West Indian Mail Service.

Sir,—With reference to previous correspondence on the subject of the West Indian Mail Service I have the honour to transmit to you the accompanying copy of a despatch which I have addressed to the Governor of Trinidad.

Sir,—In my despatch No. 196 of the 10th July, I informed you that I hoped to address you shortly on the subject of the West Indian Mail Service.

2. I have, as you are aware, been for some time engaged in negotiations with a view to arranging for a call by the Main Line Steamers of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company at Trinidad, and also for the landing and embarkation of passengers and their luggage free of charge at Port-of-Spain.

3. I have now the honour to transmit to you a copy of a letter from the Company to the General Post Office dated the 24th of December last, submitting certain proposals, for the consideration of His Majesty's Government.

4. It will be noticed that in this letter two alternate schemes are suggested the main outlines of which are as follows:—

(A) A service, with a speed of 14½ knots from Southampton to Barbados and of 14 knots over the remainder of the route, omitting Jacmel, but providing for a call by the main line steamers at Trinidad.

Subsidy asked £97,500 for a five years' contract from the date when the amended service begins; £90,000 for a ten years' contract.

(B) A 14 knot service on the main line, calling at Trinidad, Jacmel being omitted, with a weekly instead of a fortnightly intercolonial service. Subsidy asked £97,500 for a five years' contract, £85,000 for a ten years' contract. A further suggestion is also made to take in mails at Plymouth and increase the speed as far as Barbados to 14½ knots, if it is desired to allow a longer time for return correspondence in England. This last modification would involve an additional subsidy of £3,000 per annum.

5. The advantages which these proposals offer are obvious but the following points on the other side may be briefly noticed.

(a) Both schemes omit the call at Jacmel.

(b) The time allowed under the second scheme for return correspondence in this country, unless the additional £3,000 per annum referred to above were paid, is so short that it would be impossible in the case of the greater part of the United Kingdom to answer letters by the return mail.

(c) Only about one day and a half would be available under the second scheme for return correspondence in British Guiana.

(d) The Royal Mail Steamer would under the second scheme leave Jamaica the day before the direct Steamer, thereby partly neutralising the benefit of the present arrangements for a double mail service between that Colony and the United Kingdom.

(e) The advantage offered by the suggested weekly intercolonial service is discounted by the fact that such a service is now already to some extent provided by the existing services of the Royal Mail and of Messrs. Pickford and Black.

(f) The subsidy asked for the call at Trinidad, if the term of the contract remains as at present is too high to be entertained while there appear to be strong objections, which will be noticed more fully later, to extending the present contract to ten years.

(g) Nothing is said as to the landing and embarking of passengers and their luggage free of charge at Port-of-Spain.

6. I accordingly requested that a further enquiry might be addressed to the Company asking whether if the contract were left as at present in other respects, they would be prepared to arrange for a call by their Main Line Steamers at Trinidad for an extra subsidy of £3,000 per annum, and if not what subsidy they would require for such a call, and also what arrangements they would make for the landing and embarking of passengers.

7. I have since received in reply the enclosed copies of further correspondence with the Company from which it appears that they decline to provide for the call at Trinidad, other arrangements being as at present, without an additional annual subsidy of £17,500 with the existing five years' contract of £10,000 with a ten years' contract.

8. With regard to service No. 2 for which in the event of the term of the contract being extended to ten years no additional subsidy is asked the objections already noticed as to the time allowed for returned correspondence in the United Kingdom and in British Guiana appear very serious, and moreover I am strongly of opinion that it would be unwise for the West Indian Colonies at the present time to commit themselves to any arrangement involving the payment of a large subsidy for a mail service for a longer period than that of the existing contract with the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company. The Mail service is not an experimental service for the development of trade, requiring a prolonged period in order to give the experiment a reasonable chance of success; and there is some probability that at the end of another four years the West Indian Colonies generally will be in a better position than at present to determine their exact requirements in respect of mails and passengers and the best means of meeting them. In four years too there may have been time I hope to judge of the practicability of developing a fruit trade between this

country and other West Indian Colonies than Jamaica, as well as of extending and developing their existing trade in other West Indian products; while at the same time the increased interest which has recently been shown in the West Indies makes it reasonable to suppose that what is required may possibly be obtainable on better terms four years hence than would now be forthcoming.

9. Although therefore I much regret that the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company have not found themselves able to arrange for the call at Trinidad for a reasonable increase of subsidy, other conditions, excepting perhaps the call at Jacmel, remaining the same, I should not as at present advised be prepared now to sanction an extension of the Company's contract for a longer period than the existing term. At the same time I shall be glad to consider the views of your Government and of the other West Indian Governments concerned to whom I am communicating a copy of this despatch for publication in each Colony.

10. I have to add that a further representation will be made to the Company urging that both at Trinidad and British Guiana arrangements should be made for the landing and embarking of passengers and their luggage free of charge.

Sir,—The Court of Directors of this Company desire me to thank you for your communication of the 29th ultimo, No. 490757 to which they have given careful attention, in view of the wishes of the Government of Trinidad that the Packets of the Main Line should call there, instead of the Island being served by a Branch Packet from Barbados.

The Court, some time ago, expressed their willingness to meet this question and they now submit to the Postmaster General a Table of Route, by which, in addition to calling at Trinidad outward and homeward with the Main Line Steamer, the speed is increased from 13 knots to 14½ knots from Southampton to Barbados, and to 14 knots thence to Trinidad and Jamaica, resulting in a decrease of nearly two days in the time to, as well as from, Trinidad, and of one day in the length of voyage to Demerara and all the Windward and Leeward Islands, with the same advantage homeward.

Continuing to leave Southampton under the existing arrangements and calculations, with the departure nominally at 6 p.m., but, as at present, as much earlier as possible, the amount of subsidy asked is £97,500, and it would seem to be only reasonable that the present Contract should be extended to five years from the time at which the Company can arrange to begin the service at the higher speed, inasmuch as there is a continual increase of expenditure in the materials and personnel of a Mail Steamer.

I may add that, if it is convenient to the Department, it would be an advantage if the Mails could be sent down to Southampton by a train at 8.55 a.m. from Waterloo Station, as is done in the case of the South American Mail.

With reference to the suggestion in your letter that the charge which the Company may be able to name will be a moderate one, I am to take this opportunity of urging upon the attention of Her Majesty's Government that, in former times, it was well recognised that the shortness of a contract was a serious consideration in the way of incurring expenditure upon new and faster ships. Still greater is the disadvantage at a time when the cost of ships is so much enhanced. For the accelerated service it will be necessary to provide ships, which, in case of having met with bad weather can do a much higher speed to make up lost time, but, nevertheless, if Her Majesty's Government conceded a ten years' contract (which subject was on a former occasion mentioned to you, in reference to what had been done elsewhere) the Court would, in the hope of meeting the case, reduce the above charge to £90,000.

The continuance of the call at Jacmel would be prejudicial to the route, curtailing the interval at Jamaica, and any little irregularity in the service would cause the outward and homeward Packets to be at Jamaica together.

The Court of Directors cannot but think that the amendment of the present service at £97,500 in the aggregate for five years, or £90,000 for 10 years, would present a great advantage to the Public.

I am desired to submit also for consideration a set of tables of routes at 14 knots on the Main Line, the feature of which is that by shortening the stop at Colon the Main Line Steamer will return to Barbados on the homeward voyage a week earlier than at present, and be clear of the outward ship, whereby the transfers will be somewhat reduced, and, in addition, the inter-isular communication is doubled. The intervals between the calls are 5 and 9 days, but, on the other hand, there would be the advantage of avoiding the two days stay at Barbados now incurred, and the inter-colonial vessels would probably pursue their voyages, for instance, from Demerara or Trinidad to St. Thomas and vice versa, without break or transfer at Barbados.

The Court would, however, ask that there should not be the same rigid adherence to Time Table in the case of these extra voyages, not connecting outward or homeward with the Main Line Packets, as is expected of the vessels which do connect with the Main Line.

A drawback in this arrangement inter-colonially is that there would be only one day, eleven hours at Demerara, but that Colony would have two inter-colonial communications in the fortnight and could probably, on the extra occasion, be put in connection with Trinidad, which was at one time advocated.

The time in this Colony for replying to correspondence would be materially reduced, but by embarking the outward mails at Plymouth instead of Southampton, two days could be obtained between the time of arrival at Plymouth and the next departure thence.

The outward Packet might leave Southampton on Thursday about the same hour as at present, and call at Plymouth so as to receive Mails and commence her voyage about 3 a.m. on Friday. This would, however,

mean a speed of 14½ knots to Barbados, with the expense of calling at Plymouth as against the 14½ knots from Southampton already referred to in this letter.

If this service finds favour with Her Majesty's Government the Court of Directors would arrange to perform it for a subsidy of £97,500 per annum for five years or £85,000 for a ten years' contract including the higher speed above mentioned.

It, however, it be actually required that the ship should not leave Plymouth till after the arrival of the 9 p.m. train from Paddington, which, including time occupied in embarkation, would prevent the Packet starting from Plymouth before (say) 6 a.m. the speed requisite would be well over 14½ knots, for which the Company would require an additional payment of £2,000.

I should remark that Tobago is not included in this Plan of routes now referred to, as it could probably be served effectually as regards Mails by Local Steamers for which the Trinidad Government are arranging with this Company.

The Court wish me to add that, as mentioned in my letter of the 21st October last, they have misgivings as to the pecuniary result of this experiment, but their desire is to meet the case of an improved service as far as practicable.

The Court will be glad to go further into any points and endeavour to meet the Postmaster General's views.

I propose to write to you at a later date as regards the last paragraph in your letter respecting landing and embarking passengers at Trinidad.

Sir,—I am desired to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 20th instant, No. 93 B, in which you state that His Majesty's Government have not seen their way to adopt either of the two schemes for the performance of the West Indian Mail Service, explained in my letter of the 24th December last.

That intimation has been received by the Court of Directors with much regret, inasmuch as the Government are not availing themselves of the faster and improved service which the Company have offered in the second scheme mentioned in that letter, and for which with a ten years' contract they have asked only a very moderate increase in the amount of subsidy.

The proposal in question, besides giving a quicker service, and including Trinidad on the Main Line, comprises a duplication of the Inter-Insular service,

making that portion of the route weekly instead of fortnightly,—more frequent communication having been previously advocated by the West India Commission.

Calling at Trinidad with the Main Line Steamer cannot be affected (without prolonging the service beyond that Island and thus seriously injuring the business of the Company) unless the speed be increased; and that necessary increase of speed benefits Demerara and the Islands as well as Trinidad.

Such increased speed, the present higher price of coals, and cost generally of ships and of running them, while no immediate prospect of augmented earnings presents itself, undoubtedly justifies seeking an addition to the subsidy, as, in four years now unexpired of the present contract, it cannot be hoped to compensate for the increased expenditure to be incurred.

But there might be some chance of betterment for the Company during ten years, and, therefore, with a view to place Trinidad on the Main Line, and to give at the same time, the best possible service to the West Indies as a whole, the Court of Directors, as the difficulty arises from the amount of subsidy asked, would, on a ten years' contract, be prepared to meet His Majesty's Government by foregoing the moderate increase in question, which is practically only the price of coal.

The Court of Directors, therefore, beg that the Postmaster General will be pleased to submit to His Majesty's Government their request that the scheme proposed may be sent to the West Indies in order that the opinion of the Colonies may be heard on the subject, as the Company are prejudiced by their willingness to further the matter not being known there.

As regards the present enquiry in your letter as to the terms for calling by the Main Line Steamers at Trinidad both on the Outward and on the Homeward voyages, I am to state that the answer is virtually contained in the first part of the 24th December letter, and that the Court of Directors are not prepared to undertake the change for the four years that remain of the present contract, except upon the terms therein named.

Including Trinidad after Barbados involves an increase of speed so as to arrive at Colon in the same time as at present, which it is necessary to do in the interests of the Company's business, as I have mentioned already regarding the special scheme, and the Court have stated in that letter the reduction that would be made for a ten years' contract (the period recently accorded by the Government to another Contractor for a new West India Line) which length of contract might give the means of recouping the Company for their extra expenditure in carrying out the service.

The Court of Directors cannot refrain from claiming that the Company now in their 60th year of West India Mail Contract Service, are surely entitled to the fullest consideration at the hands of His Majesty's Government, particularly as the services which the Government have thought sufficient for the West Indies, and have been, from time to time willing to pay for, have been acknowledged to be performed by the Company efficiently and with perfect regularity.

With reference to enquiry 2 in your letter, the Court of Directors desire me to state that they will communicate

with their Superintendent in the West Indies with a view to landing and embarking passengers at Trinidad without expense to the Government.

Sir,—I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 27th instant on the subject of the West India Mail Service.

Before laying the further proposal of your Directors before the Treasury, the Postmaster General desires to be quite sure as to the details of the schemes now put forward. As he understands your letter, the Company now offers the following alternative arrangements for serving Trinidad by the Main Line Steamers.

(1) A service on the lines of the existing service, the departures from and arrivals in this country being in alternate weeks, but the speed to be $14\frac{1}{2}$ knots from Southampton to Barbados and 14 knots between Barbados and Trinidad.

Subsidy (a) on contract terminating June 1905—£97,500 or (b) on contract terminating in 1910, £90,000;

(2) A service at about $14\frac{1}{2}$ knots on the main line, the mails to leave Plymouth at 3 a.m. on Friday and the homeward mails to be due at 4 a.m. on the previous Wednesday, the stop at Colon to be reduced from 12 to 5 days.

Subsidy £80,000 a year on a contract terminating in 1910.

The offer of service No. 2 for £85,000 a year in your letter of the 24th of December last included an inter-colonial service in the weeks when there was no service in connexion with the main line packets. This additional inter-colonial service, is, however not now desired by the Secretary of State for the Colonies and I am to enquire whether its omission from the scheme would affect the amount of the subsidy asked for, and whether in the altered circumstances anything could be done to lengthen the interval for replying to correspondence at Demerara, which, according to the time tables supplied with your former letter, would be cut down to 1 day 11 hours.

The Postmaster General notes with satisfaction that your Directors have communicated with their local superintendent with a view to landing and embarking passengers at Trinidad without expense to the Government. Perhaps you will kindly say whether the expense to the passengers will also cease under the proposed arrangements.

Sir,—In reply to the enquiries which you have been good enough to address to this Company, at the request of the Postmaster General, with the view of being certain as to the position the Company takes in regard to their last offer for the performance of the West India Mail Service with Trinidad introduced on the Main Line, I am desired to remark that Jaemel has been omitted from the Itinerary Outward and Homeward, and dealing with Tobago will have to be adjusted under Service marked 1, with which exceptions the Court of Directors concur with your paragraph as to Service marked 1, (and a and b), and as to Service marked 2.

As regards your further enquiry, under the Head of Service 2, I am to state that it is noted that the additional Inter-insular communication so freely spoken of as a necessity is not now required, but the omission of the duplication from the Company's proposal would not affect the amount of the subsidy asked for, as four inter-colonial ships with full crews, and all attendant expenses, would be required just the same for the contract work, and a longer interval at Demerara could not be provided, without, for instance, causing a later arrival at Plymouth.

The Court thought that it was desired to overcome the uncertainty of the terms on which passengers could get landed and embarked at Trinidad, and they were willing to endeavour to arrange a regular means of getting that work done and at as small a charge to the passengers as possible.

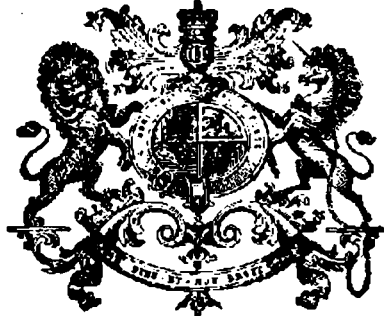

WHAT TO DO FOR CASSAVA POISONING.

If a person after eating cassava feels or looks ill, medical aid should be obtained at once without any delay. That is to say, the doctor should be called, or the patient should be taken to the doctor, or to the nearest hospital, dispensary, or almshouse, where medical aid can be obtained as soon as possible. A few minutes may make all the difference, and no time should be lost.

The doctor can inject some medicine under the skin of the arm which may save the patient's life. Therefore lose no time.

While waiting for the doctor to come, or for the cart or trap to take the patient to the doctor, there are several important things to be done which anyone can do. The following things should be done:—

1. Place the patient in the open air, or near the open door of the house.

2. Make the patient vomit by tickling the back of the throat with a finger, a feather, or a piece of grass, and, if he can swallow, make him drink water at intervals after each vomit so that the stomach is washed out thoroughly. If he does not vomit freely, get someone to mix a tablespoon of 'ground' mustard in a tumbler ('half-pint glass') of warm water—for a child, a teaspoonful of mustard in half a tumbler of water) and make him drink it off.

3. If the patient begins to get insensible or 'lifeless': Take the clothes from the upper part of the body and pour a large stream of water out of a jug or bucket from a height of three or four feet on to the back of the head, the spine and chest. This should never be left undone.

4. Afterwards dry the body with a rough towel or any coarse garment, and put on some dry clothes and blankets, shawls, or anything to keep him warm. Continue to rub the arms and legs *briskly* to keep up the circulation. If he gets cold, put some bottles filled with hot water round about him.

5. All this time hold 'smelling salts' to his nostrils every now and then.

6. As soon as the stomach is empty and nothing but water comes up when he vomits, give a strong dose of rum, whisky, or brandy diluted with twice as much water; and if it comes back at once, repeat the dose.

7. If anyone near by knows how to carry out what is called 'artificial respiration,' it should be done if the patient gets very bad and stops breathing.

Those in charge of persons suffering from cassava poisoning should not despair. Some of the worst cases have recovered after energetic treatment. Remember that the patient's life is at stake, and there is no time to consider whether 'wetting him will give him a cold' or any idea of that kind. What is recommended above should be done without fail.

Every letter packet tendered for insurance must be enclosed in a strong cover, which must be securely fastened and sealed with fine wax, in such a way that it cannot be opened without either breaking the seals or leaving obvious traces of violation. Envelopes with black or coloured borders must not be used. Seals must be placed over each flap or seam of the cover of a packet; and if the packet is tied round with string or tape, a seal must be placed on the ends where they are tied.

7. All the seals on a letter must be of the same kind of wax, and must bear distinct impressions of the same private device. Coins must not be used for sealing; and the device must not consist merely of straight, crossed, or curved lines which could readily be imitated.

8. If a letter tendered for insurance does not, in the opinion of the officer of the Post Office to whom it is tendered, fulfil the foregoing conditions as to packing and sealing, it is his duty to refuse to insure it. Nevertheless the onus of properly enclosing and sealing the letter lies upon the sender; and the Post Office assumes no liability for loss arising from defects of the cover or the seals which may not be observed at the time of posting.

9. The amount for which a letter is insured (which must not exceed its actual value) must be written by the sender both in words and in figures at the top of the address side of the cover, thus:—"Insured for fifteen pounds (£15)." No alteration or erasure of the inscription is allowed. If a mistake is made, the entry must be completely obliterated and an entirely new one made by the sender.

10. The amount to be insured is limited to £120. The sums payable for insurance including registration is:—8d. for the first £12 of insured value and 4d. for each additional £12.

11. The fee must be prepaid, in addition to the full postage, by means of postage stamps, which the sender must affix to the cover of the letter.

12. As few stamps as possible should be used to prepay the postage and insurance fee. They must not be folded over the edge of the cover, and when more stamps than one are used, they must be affixed with spaces between them.

13. A certificate of posting must always be obtained by the sender of an insured letter. He may also obtain an acknowledgment of the delivery of the letter under the same conditions as those applicable to registered letters.

14. Letters which, although addressed to a country or place to which the insurance system does not extend, have been irregularly insured, will be forwarded as registered letters; and if they or their contents are lost in the Post, the regulations as to the compensation payable in the case of registered letters will be applicable.

15. When an insured letter is redirected from one country to another, a fresh insurance fee becomes payable for each such transmission. If this fee is not prepaid, it is collected from the addressee on delivery. Insured letters can only be redirected to countries which have adopted the insurance system.

16. Compensation for the loss in the post of a letter or its contents will not exceed the amount of the actual loss, and will not be paid at all for a letter containing any prohibited article, or for any letter which has been delivered without external trace of injury and has been accepted without remark; nor does it follow as a matter of course that compensation will be given when loss arises from tempest, shipwreck, earthquake, war, or other causes beyond control. No claim for compensation will be admitted if made more than a year after the letter was posted.

17. No legal liability to give compensation in respect of any letter for which an insurance fee has been paid attaches to the Postmaster either personally or in his official capacity. The final decision upon all questions of compensation rests with the Postal Administration of the country in which the loss has taken place.

18. Any insurance effected with the Post Office contrary to the foregoing regulations is invalid.

Minutes of a Meeting of the Kingstown Board, Monday, 23rd March, 1903.

The minutes of the meeting held on 6th March were read and confirmed.

A letter was read from His Honour the Administrator, No. 123 of 13th March, conveying the approval by the Governor-in-Council of the Board's Estimates for the current year, with the exception of the proposed increase of £20 per annum to the salary of the Warden which the Council was unable to sanction in view of the present state of the Town finances.

The Board accepted the Estimates as amended by the Governor-in-Council.

A letter was read from Mr. Francis Sardine asking for a remission of the rates assessed against him for Stock-in-Trade in respect of the year 1903, as at present his business is closed. The Board decided to defer consideration of the matter to a later date, and directed the Warden to so inform Mr. Sardine.

A letter was read from Mr. R. E. Harold asking to be allowed to erect an approach of concrete to his building at Halifax Street, and a treader at each door. Permission granted.

A letter was read from Mr. J. R. McLeod bringing to the Board's notice that he was unable to obtain a supply of water tubing for the purpose of extending the Water Supply to his premises at Lot No. 85.

The Warden was directed to order 200 feet of $\frac{1}{2}$ inch tubing from St. Lucia for use until a supply has been obtained from England.

A letter was read from the Ven'ble Archdeacon Turpin asking the Board to remit the Water rate charged against the Anglican Schoolroom, the building being used for Educational purposes.

The Board remitted the rate and directed the Warden to inform the Treasury.

A return of all monies received by the Warden during the month of February was laid before the meeting.

At the request of Mr. James E. Richards the Board granted that gentleman an interview to discuss certain matters in connection with a building erected by him near Victoria Park.

Mr. Richards appeared and discussed the matter with the Board. He subsequently submitted a sketch showing certain alterations which he proposes to make to the building in question and which he hoped would meet with the Board's approval.

The Board promised to give the matter due consideration at the next regular meeting.

The meeting was adjourned to Friday the 3rd April at 12 o'clock noon.

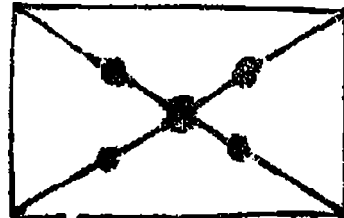

Now therefore it is hereby ordered by the Governor in Council as follows:—

The limits of the existing First District are hereby varied and the said District shall hereafter consist of that part of St. George's Parish which lies to the West of the Great Head or Warrawarron River, and of that part of the parish of St. Andrew South of the Ridge running from Biaha point to Mt. St. Andrew, separating the Buccament Valley from Clare Valley etc., the boundaries of which District are shown by a red line drawn on a copy of the Admiralty Chart of St. Vincent which is recorded in the Registrar's Office at Kingstown in Liber X5 page 528.

The existing First District, exclusive of that portion thereof mentioned in the last preceding paragraph hereof, and the existing Second District are hereby united into one District, which shall hereafter be named the Second District, and which shall consist of the whole of the Island of St. Vincent (with the exception aforesaid), and the islands of Bequia, Mustique, Balliccaux and Battowia and all other of the Grenadines north of Carouan.

The Third District shall consist of all such other of the Grenadines as form part of this Colony and are not included in the Second District.

The Magistrate of the First District shall reside in Kingstown, or within one mile thereof.

The Magistrate of the Second District shall have his residence in Kingstown, but shall spend a portion of each week in different parts of his District, according to such standing instructions as he may from time to time receive.

The said Order in Council of the 22nd day of March 1902, and every previous Order is hereby revoked.

This Order shall take effect on the 1st day of November, 1903.

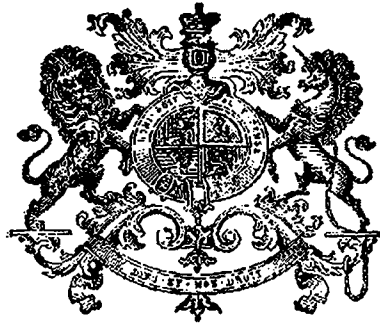

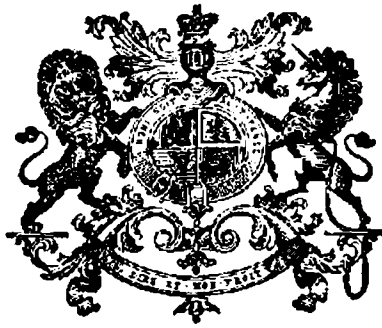

WHEREAS by clause 21 of "The Post Office Ordinance 1882" it is provided *inter alia* that it shall be lawful for the Governor-in-Council from time to time to rescind regulations not being inconsistent with the said Ordinance touching the matters contained and referred to in the said clause:

AND WHEREAS on the 23rd day of October 1886 certain regulations were duly made and published by the Governor-in-Council by virtue of the authority and power vested in him by the above mentioned clause:

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to rescind regulation 1 Sub-section N of the said regulations which relates to the issue of orders for money from the Post Office in this Colony and payable at any duly authorised Post Office in the United Kingdom and for the payment of orders for money issued from any authorised Post Office in the United Kingdom and payable in this Colony:

Now it is hereby ordered by the Governor-in-Council as follows:—

Regulation 1 Sub-section N as aforesaid is hereby rescinded and the following substituted:

1. The maximum amount for which a Money Order may be drawn in the United Kingdom upon Saint Vincent is to be fixed by the British Post Office, and the maximum amount for which a

Money Order may be drawn in Saint Vincent upon the United Kingdom is to be fixed by the Governor-in-Council; on the understanding, however, that in neither country shall this amount exceed £40. The maximum amount fixed by the Governor-in-Council for Saint Vincent is £40.

The minutes of the preceding meeting held on 19th February were read and confirmed.

The Chairman informed the Board that application had been made for a $\frac{3}{4}$ inch Water Service in lieu of the one inch service previously applied for to be used in cooling the engine of the Cotton Factory.

At the Chairman's suggestion the Board, after due consideration, agreed to the laying on of the service from the fire supply; but decided to disconnect it in the event of its causing any decrease in the fire tank which now has a daily overflow.

A letter was read from His Honour the Administrator forwarding a copy of "The Amending Kingstown Board Ordinance, 1904" recently passed by the Legislative Council, and advising the Board to take early action in the matter of publishing the Assessment List for the current year.

The following resolution was then moved by Mr. Nairn and seconded by Mr. Harold :—

That it is very regrettable that after the draft Amending Kingstown Board Ordinance had been submitted for the consideration of the Kingstown Board that the Government should have passed the said Ordinance without regard to the representations made by the Board.

The Board adopted the resolution and desired the Chairman to forward this expression of opinion to His Honour the Administrator.

A letter was read from His Honour the Administrator forwarding for the Board's information an enclosure from the Audit Clerk reporting that on a visit to the Office of the Town Warden, he had found cash in hand to the amount of £41.

It was thought undesirable that money should be allowed to accumulate in the Office, and the Warden was instructed to pay into the Treasury weekly or whenever his collections amounted to £5.

The Chairman submitted the Estimates of the Board's Revenue and Expenditure for the current year which were revised and corrected.

On the motion of Mr. Proudfoot, seconded by Dr. Newsam, the Estimates as revised were passed.

At Mr. Proudfoot's suggestion the Board decided to erect a concrete crossing over the drain in Halifax Street near the premises at present occupied by the Colonial Bank.

The minutes of the preceding meeting held on 5th August were read and confirmed.

REGULATIONS made by the Governor-in-Council under "The Post Office Ordinance 1882."

1. On and from the 1st October 1904 the system of sale and payment of Postal Orders existing in the United Kingdom shall be in force in this Colony, subject however to the following exceptions:
 - (1) Postal Orders issued in this Colony shall be payable only in the United Kingdom, and only Postal Orders issued in the United Kingdom shall be payable in this Colony.
 - (2) The issue and payment of Postal Orders in this Colony shall be confined to the General Post Office only.
 - (3) The issue of Postal Orders shall be restricted to the following denominations, viz. :—
6d., 1/-, 1/6, 2/-, 2/6, 3/-, 3/6, 4/-, 4/6, 5/-, 5/6, 6/-, 6/6, 7/-, 7/6, 8/-, 8/6, 9/-, 9/6, 10/-, 10/6, and the poundage payable thereon shall be for orders from 6d. to 1/6, one penny each, for orders from 2/- to 5/-, two pence each; for orders from 5/6 to 10/6, three pence each.
2. All of the denominations of Postal Orders issued in the United Kingdom from 6d. to 21/- shall be payable in this Colony.
3. The Treasurer shall receive and keep all blank Postal Orders supplied to the Colony by the Postmaster General of the United Kingdom and shall from time to time issue to the Colonial Postmaster such orders as he may require for sale to the public.
4. The Postal Order regulations of the United Kingdom, except where inapplicable or at variance with any local regulations, now or hereafter in force, shall govern the sale and payment of Postal Orders in this Colony, and the Colonial Postmaster shall be governed by the rules, regulations and instructions issued to Postmasters in the United Kingdom by the Postmaster General of the United Kingdom, except where inapplicable, or at variance with local regulations, or instructions issued by the Governor.
5. The forms of Postal Orders to be issued in this Colony shall be those of the Postal Orders in use in the United Kingdom, supplies of which are from time to time to be obtained by the Colonial Postmaster from the Postmaster General of the United Kingdom.
6. The accounting for the Postal Orders issued, paid and unissued, shall be done by the Colonial Postmaster in such form and manner and at such times as may be required by the Postmaster General of the United Kingdom.
7. The Treasurer and the Colonial Postmaster shall keep such records of unissued Postal Orders in their hands, respectively, as the Governor shall approve, and the Postmaster shall keep such further records of the orders issued and paid by him as the Governor shall approve.
8. The hours for the issue and payment of Postal Orders in this Colony shall be daily from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., Wednesday (when the hours shall be from 10 a.m. to 12 noon) Sundays and Public Holidays, excepted.
9. Whenever the regulations of the United Kingdom are applied locally the words "Colonial Postmaster" shall be read for "Postmaster General," wherever the latter occur, except in cases where payment is delayed or refused by the Colonial Postmaster, in which case the obligation of the Colonial Postmaster to report to the Postmaster General of the United Kingdom shall remain.

* * * * *

3. If an Order be not paid within three months from the last day of the month of issue, a commission equal to the original poundage will be charged in respect of each further period of three months, or any fraction of three months, which has elapsed. The Commission thus paid must be affixed in Postage Stamps to the back of the Order. Postal Orders presented for payment more than six months after the month of issue are not paid until reference has been made to the Chief Office in London.

HOURS OF BUSINESS.

4. Postal Orders are sold and paid at all Money Order Offices during the hours in which such offices are open on weekdays and at all other offices, with the exception of those marked thus † (pages 49 to 272‡), they can also be purchased and cashed, but occasionally there may be a delay of one day or, at most, two days.

SPECIAL NOTICE TO SENDER AND PAYEE.

5. The person to whom a Postal Order is issued *must*, before parting with it, fill in the name of the person to whom the amount is to be paid, and *may* fill in the name of the Money Order Office at which the amount is to be paid. The person so named *must*, before payment can be made, sign the receipt at the foot of the Order, and *must* also fill in the name of the Money Order Office, if that has not been already done. *The insertion of the name of the paying office affords a safeguard against payment being made to a wrong person.* A Postmaster may require the person presenting the Order to sign his name on the Order before its payment, although the receipt has been already signed.

6. Every person to whom a Postal Order is issued should keep a record of the number and cypher to facilitate inquiry if the Order should be lost. If the Order is of the New Pattern the Counterfoil should be torn off and retained.

MISARRIAGE OR LOSS.

7. In case of the miscarriage or loss of any Postal Order, unless proof can be given to the satisfaction of the Postmaster General that the name of the payee was inserted in the Order before the holder parted with it, and unless the number of the Order can be furnished, the Postmaster General cannot undertake to trace the Order with a view to accounting for the miscarriage or loss thereof.

8. After a Postal Order has once been paid, to whomsoever it is paid, the Postmaster General will not be liable for any further claim.

PAYMENT THROUGH BANKERS.

9. If a Postal Order be crossed, payment will only be made through a Banker and if the name of the Banker be added, payment will only be made through that Banker.

10. No Postal Order will be paid, even though presented for payment by a Banker, unless the name of the payee be inserted in the body of the Order.

11. A Postal Order presented by, or through, a Banker for payment will not (in the absence of an express arrangement between such Banker and the Postmaster General to the contrary) be paid until after such Order has been examined at the Chief Office in London.

DEFERRING PAYMENT.

12. The holder of a Postal Order may, in writing, on the face thereof, direct that payment be deferred for any period not exceeding 10 days; but in such case the name of some Money Order Office at which the Order shall be paid must be inserted in the body. Payment of the Order will then not be made until the period specified by the holder has elapsed.

13. The Regulations under which Postal Orders are issued allow the Postmaster to delay or refuse the payment of an Order, but he must at once report his reasons for so doing to the Postmaster General.

ERASURES OR ALTERATIONS, &c.

14. If any erasure or alteration be made, or if the Order is neither stamped nor signed by the issuing Postmaster, or be cut, defaced, or mutilated, payment may be refused.

Convention for the Exchange of Postal Money Orders between the United States of America and the Colony of Saint Vincent, West Indies.

The Post Office Department of the United States of America, and that of Saint Vincent, being desirous of establishing a system of exchange of Money Orders between the two countries, the undersigned, duly authorised for that purpose, have agreed upon the following articles amending the existing Convention.

ARTICLE I.

Issue.

The transfers of sums of money may be made by means of Postal Money Orders from the United States and its possessions (excepting the Philippine Islands) to Saint Vincent, and from Saint Vincent to the United States, and its possessions (excepting the Philippine Islands).

ARTICLE II.

Form, Maximum, etc.

Sec. 1. The Money Orders issued in the United States and its possessions for payment in Saint Vincent, shall conform, as nearly as practicable, to model "A," hereto annexed, and the Money Orders issued in Saint Vincent for payment in the United States and its possessions shall in like manner conform to model "B," also hereto annexed.

Sec. 2. Each order shall be delivered to the remitter, to be forwarded to the payee, by and at the expense of the remitter.

Sec. 3. In filling up the Money Order and Advice, and the receipt of payments, the writing must be in the English language, and in Roman letters and Arabic numerals, without erasure, alteration or obliteration, and no Order shall contain a fraction of a cent.

Sec. 4. The maximum amount of each Money Order is fixed at one hundred dollars.

Sec. 5. The Money Orders issued in the United States for payment in Saint Vincent shall be drawn in United States currency, (dollars and cents) only, and the Money Orders issued in Saint Vincent for payment in the United States shall likewise express the amount in words as well as in figures in dollars and cents. The amount in Sterling money deposited by remitters may also be entered in the orders and advices issued in Saint Vincent.

ARTICLE III

Transmittal of paid orders as basis of settlement.

Sec. 1. On the 1st of each month (on the next succeeding day if such date falls on Sunday) each Administration shall prepare in duplicate a list of all money orders, issued in the other country, which have been paid at and received from its post offices, and have been audited.

Sec. 2. These lists must exhibit in detail, and in alphabetical order by States, Territories or Possessions, as the case may be, the names of the issuing offices, the serial numbers printed on the orders, and the amount of each order. The sum total of each sheet of paid orders must be stated in the summary attached to the list in dollars and cents.

Sec. 3. The lists shall be numbered consecutively throughout the fiscal year, beginning with No. 1 on the 1st of July of each year.

Sec. 4. One certified copy of each list shall be transmitted on the part of the United States to the Colonial Postmaster at Kingstown, Saint Vincent, and, on the part of Saint Vincent, to the Auditor for the Post Office Department, Washington, D.C.

Sec. 5. Each list shall be accompanied by all paid orders entered therein, and shall be forwarded by registered mail.

Sec. 6. Each Administration shall promptly acknowledge to the other the receipt of each list, and shall as soon after receipt as possible, give notice of any errors which may have been discovered therein.

Sec. 7. In case paid money orders returned to the Administration which issued the orders, be lost or destroyed in transit by mail, it is agreed that a certified copy of the corresponding lists, presented by the Administration which made the transmittal, shall within a reasonable time be accepted as a satisfactory voucher and evidence of payment of the orders described therein.

ARTICLE IV.

Currency.

Sec. 1. It is agreed that in all matters of account relative to money Orders, which shall result from the execution of the present Convention, the pound sterling shall be considered equivalent to four dollars and eighty-seven cents of the money of the United States.

Sec. 2. The above rates shall also be applicable to the payment in Saint Vincent of amounts of money Orders issued in the United States, as well as to the issue in Saint Vincent of money orders payable in the United States.

ARTICLE V.

Fees.

Sec. 1. A fee, to be fixed by the country of origin, shall be collected from the remitter upon each sum of money transmitted under this Convention.

Sec. 2. Each Post Office Department shall communicate to the other the tariff or schedule of the fees to be established by it under the provisions of this Article, and also any subsequent change therein.

Sec. 3. The person entitled to payment of a Money Order issued in pursuance of this Convention shall not be subjected, under any pretext whatever, to any commission or tax on account of the payment of such Order.

Sec. 4. Each of the contracting Post Office Departments shall keep the fees which it receives for Money Orders issued within its jurisdiction, and no commission or charge will be made by either Administration for any services performed in connection with the exchange of Money Orders.

ARTICLE VI.

Payment, Endorsement.

Sec. 1. Payment of a Money Order in pursuance of this Convention can be exacted only at the paying Post Office named in the order, and cannot be exacted until after the receipt by that office of the Advice required by Article VIII. hereof, but the Postal Administration of the country of payment may, at its discretion, cause a Money Order to be paid at an office other than that named in the Advice.

Sec. 2. Each of the two Departments reserves the right to authorize the transfer, within its territory, by means of endorsement, of the ownership of Orders originating in the territory of the other.

ARTICLE VII.

List of Offices.

Sec. 1. Each Post Office Department reserves the right to designate the post offices of its country which may be authorized to issue and pay money orders under the provisions of this Convention, and shall furnish to the other from time to time, a list of the post offices so authorized, and shall also promptly report any changes to be made in said list.

Sec. 2. The lists furnished by the United States shall include the name of the State, Territory, or Possession in which the money order office is situated.

ARTICLE VIII.

Advices.

Sec. 1. A Post Office in either country which issues a Money Order payable in the other is required to transmit to the Post Office charged with its payment, by the first mail after the issue thereof, an Advice corresponding to the Money Order in number, date and amount.

These advices must be enclosed in envelopes specially provided for the purpose, and are to be carried free of charge. The address shall include the State, Territory or Possession, if payable in the United States.

Sec. 2. Each Advice shall legibly express the following:—

1st. In printed characters, the name of the issuing office, and the name of the State, Territory, or Possession in which it is situated, and the number of the corresponding order.

2nd. In written characters—

(a) The name of the paying office and the name of the State, Territory, or Possession in which it is situated.

(b) The amount in United States currency deposited by the remitter or to be paid to the owner of the order, the date of issue of the order, and the signature of the issuing postmaster.

(c) The surnames and the given names or initials of the given names, of the remitter and payee, as well as the address of the payee.

The business designation of a mercantile concern or firm, or the ordinary name accorded to a corporation, society or organization, may, however, be used.

Sec. 3. The Advices required by this Article shall, if issued in the United States, conform as nearly as practicable to model "A (1)," and, if issued in Saint Vincent, to model "B (1)," both of which are hereto annexed.

ARTICLE IX.

Duplicate Advices.

Sec. 1. At the request of the paying office, a lost or missent Advice will be replaced, without delay, by the issuing postmaster with a duplicate thereof.

Sec. 2. Application for duplicate Advices shall be made upon blanks conforming to model "C," hereto annexed.

Sec. 3. In no case may an issuing postmaster change the place of payment of an order by means of a second or duplicate Advice.

ARTICLE X.

Payment—Limitation upon correspondence.

Sec. 1. The orders drawn in pursuance of this Convention shall be subject, as regards payment, to the regulations that govern the payment of domestic money orders in the country of payment. Each Administration shall be responsible for the payments made within its territory.

Sec. 2. Only in sending Advices to the offices of payment, in applying for duplicate Advices and in making inquiries regarding the payment or repayment of original orders, shall postmasters in either country be permitted to correspond directly with postmasters in the other country. All other correspondence concerning money order business shall be conducted through the respective Post Office Departments of the United States and Saint Vincent.

ARTICLE XI.

Invalid Orders and Advices.

Sec. 1. The Money Orders issued in pursuance of this Convention shall be valid until the expiration of twelve months from the last day of the month in which issued.

Sec. 2. After the expiration of that period, the Advices of unpaid Orders shall be returned to the Administration of the country of origin, for its disposal, together with a detailed statement.

Sec. 3. Payment of the amount of an invalid order may be made by means of a duplicate, to be issued by the Administration of the country of origin, and sent direct to the Department of the country of payment.

ARTICLE XII.

Duplicates.

Orders, lost or destroyed, will be replaced with duplicates to be issued by the Administration of the country of origin, and sent to the Department of the country of payment.

ARTICLE XIII.

Repayments.

A Money Order, or a duplicate thereof, may be repaid to the remitter, payee or endorsee, upon presentation at the issuing office, provided the corresponding Advice is in the possession of the issuing Postmaster. For this purpose, in case the Advice has been sent to the office of payment, it shall be returned by the paying to the issuing postmaster upon the request of the latter. In case of loss of the Advice, a certificate from the paying postmaster to that effect shall be furnished in lieu of the Advice.

ARTICLE XIV.

Accounts, Balances.

Sec. 1. Within six weeks after the close of each fiscal quarter, two copies of an account similar to model "D" hereto annexed shall be prepared and transmitted to the Auditor for the Post Office Department of the United States by the Colonial Postmaster at Kingstown, Saint Vincent, exhibiting the balance found due on the exchange of Money Orders during the quarter, one copy of which, after proper verification and acknowledgment, shall be returned to the Colonial Postmaster at Kingstown, Saint Vincent. The latter will then send an acknowledgment of receipt to the Post Office Department of the United States.

(a) If this verified account shows a balance in favour of the Post Office Department of Saint Vincent, that of the United States will transmit therewith a Banker's bill of exchange, payable on demand in London, England, in sterling money for the amount of said balance due the Post Office Department of Saint Vincent. The latter will then send an acknowledgment of receipt to the Post Office Department of the United States.

(b) If, on the other hand, said account, after verification and acknowledgment, as aforesaid, shows a balance in favour of the Post Office Department of the United States, then the Post Office Department of Saint Vincent will, upon receipt of the certified copy of the same, transmit to that of the United States a sight bill of exchange, for the amount thereof, payable in New York in Dollars or payable in London, England, in sterling money. The United States Post Office Department will then send in return an acknowledgment of receipt.

Sec. 2. If, pending the settlement of an account, one of the two Postal Administrations shall ascertain that it owes the other a balance exceeding one thousand dollars, the indebted Administration shall promptly remit the approximate amount of such balance to the credit of the other.

Sec. 3. The expense attending the remittance of bills of exchange shall invariably be borne by the Post Office Department by which payment is made.

Sec. 4. Payments may also be made in money, or by drafts or bills of exchange, on other points than London and New York, by mutual agreement between the two Departments.

ARTICLE XV.

Use of Vouchers.

Each Administration agrees to place temporarily at the disposal of the other any paid Order, the return of which shall have been requested.

ARTICLE XVI.

Modification of Details.

The two Postal Administrations may, by mutual agreement, make modifications, if found expedient, in matters of detail connected with the execution of the provisions of this Convention, in order to provide for greater security against fraud, or for the better working of the international system.

ARTICLE XVII.

Suspension of Conventions.

Each of the two Administrations is empowered, under extraordinary circumstances which may be of a nature to warrant the measure, to suspend temporarily the Money Order service between the two countries, provided, however, that notice of such suspension be given to the other Administration immediately, and, if deemed necessary, by means of the telegraph.

ARTICLE XVIII.

In effect.

This Convention, when duly signed, shall take effect on the First of October, 1904, and shall be in force until one year after one of the contracting Administrations shall have notified the other of its

intention to terminate it. During such year the Convention shall continue to be executed fully and entirely without prejudice to the adjustment and payment of the accounts after the expiration of the term in question.

Done in duplicate and signed at Washington on the 29th day of July 1904 and at Grenada on the 31st day of August, 1904.

REGULATIONS made by the Governor-in-Council under "The Post Office Ordinance 1882."

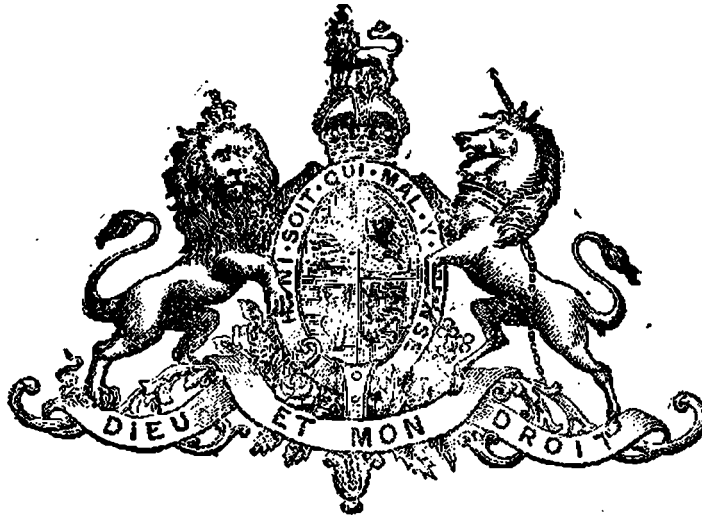

REGULATIONS made by the Governor-in-Council under the authority of "The Post Office Ordinance 1882"—Clause 21.

1. These Regulations shall come into force on the 14th day of August 1905.

2. From and after the coming into force of these Regulations the rate of postage for book packets sent by Inland Post shall be one half penny for every four ounces weight or fractional part thereof.

3. A packet containing two or more newspapers shall not be liable to a higher rate than the book postage upon it would be.

4. Regulation 1 of the Regulations made by the Governor-in-Council on the 29th day of February 1892 and so much of Regulation 1 of subsection II of the Regulations made by the Governor-in-Council on the 23rd day of October 1886 as is inconsistent with these Regulations are hereby rescinded.

RULES made by the Governor-in-Council under the authority of "The Post Office Ordinance 1898" providing for the payment to Masters of Vessels of remuneration for the conveyance by them on behalf of the Post Office of postal packets.

1. In these Rules "postal packet" means anything in course of transmission by post from the time of its being delivered to a Post Office to the time of its being delivered to the person to whom it is addressed.

"Parcel" means any postal packet which is posted as a parcel in accordance with the provisions of any Ordinance relating to the Post Office or of any Regulations or Rules made under the authority of any such Ordinance which may now be or hereafter come into force.

"Master" as applied to a vessel, means the person (not being a pilot) for the time being in charge or command thereof.

AN ORDINANCE to amend "The Post
Office Ordinance 1882."

[28th December, 1906.]

Be it enacted by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council of Saint Vincent as follows :—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as "The Post Office Ordinance 1882 Amendment Ordinance 1906" and shall be read and construed as one with "The Post Office Ordinance 1882" (hereinafter termed the principal Ordinance) and may be cited therewith and with "The Post Office Ordinance 1898" as "The Post Office Ordinances 1882 to 1906." Short title

2. Section 13 of the principal Ordinance is hereby amended by omitting therefrom the words "General Post Office in Kingstown" in the fourth line thereof and by substituting therefor the words "Post Office of the Port of Entry" and by omitting from the said section the last paragraph thereof commencing with the words "Any Master" and ending with the words "twenty pounds" and by substituting therefor the words "Should it be desired to enter any vessel at a time when the Post Office is not open the Master shall deliver all such letters and make declaration as aforesaid to the Treasurer instead of to the Postmaster whereupon the Treasurer shall dispense with the certificate of the" Amendment of Section 13 of the Post Office Ordinance 1882.

No. 17 of 1906. Postmaster before mentioned and shall as soon as he conveniently may after the opening of the Post Office deliver any letters so received by him to the Postmaster who shall upon application made by the Master pay to him the sum of one penny for each letter as provided in section twelve hereof.

Any Master of any vessel who shall fail to make any declaration required by this section or who shall make any such declaration that is untrue in any material particular or who shall retain and fail to deliver to the Postmaster or to the Treasurer or who shall deliver to any addressee any letter contrary to the provisions of this section shall upon summary conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds and in default of payment thereof to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding one calendar month."

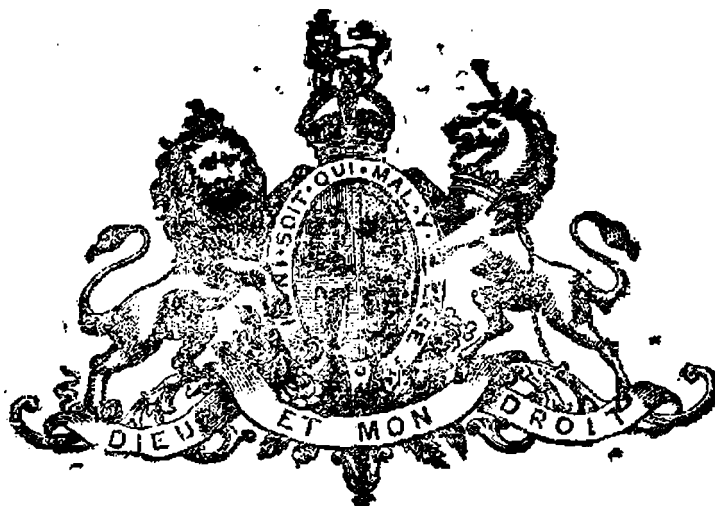

IT is hereby notified for general information that the General Board of Health of Barbados has authorized the admission into that Colony of animals from St. Vincent which have been successfully vaccinated as a protection against Anthrax, on the following conditions:—

- (a.) A period of not less than 14 days nor more than one year to have elapsed since the date of the last vaccination;
- (b.) All fodder put on board with the animals must be from an uninfected place; and
- (c.) Certificates in support of these requirements to be sent with each shipment.

The Government of Trinidad has consented to the free admission of stock from St. Vincent on similar conditions, and it is hoped that the same facilities will very shortly be afforded by the Government of St. Lucia.

It will thus be seen that the only way in which owners of stock can dispose of them in the islands mentioned is if they first have them duly vaccinated.

Vaccination is being carried out free of any charge by the Government, and parties desirous to have their animals vaccinated can make arrangements for this with the Government Veterinary Surgeon or the officers who are acting as his Assistant Vaccinators, Mr. T. Osment and Mr. J. F. H. Otway.

Applications to ship cattle under the conditions mentioned should be made to the Government Veterinary Surgeon, and the certificates of vaccination which the Vaccinating Officers issue must be brought to him with the animals intended for exportation.

sian Government for the adhesion of Russia to the Brussels Sugar Convention; at which meeting a Protocol providing for the admission of Russia to the Brussels Sugar Convention on certain conditions was drawn up for submission to the Governments of the various Powers represented on the Commission.

2. It will be seen from the correspondence included in the Parliamentary Paper that this Protocol has since been signed on behalf of the several contracting States and of Russia; but the date within which Ratifications of the additional Act of the 28th of August last, and of the Protocol of the 19th of December, were to be exchanged, which was originally fixed for the 1st of February, has been extended.

3. I have to add that His Majesty's Ratifications of the Act of the 28th of August and of the Protocol of the 19th of December were deposited at Brussels on the 14th instant.

assistance, and that he felt assured that the Colony, whose welfare would be immeasurably promoted if he was allowed to do so, would never begrudge him the loan he had alluded to from the Eruption Fund were it at the disposal of the inhabitants.

The Administrator then referred to certain points touched on by Honourable Members in the course of their remarks. He specially noted the suggestion of Mr. Simmons as to the possibility of insurance against Eruption. He had not been aware that any such insurance had as yet been effected within the Colony. He personally was in accord with the views of members. While recognizing the necessity for prudent disposal of the balance of the fund, he failed to see why some portion might not be loaned on adequate security in the island for the express purpose of restoring Eruption damages. He had followed the speeches of Honourable Members with interest, and would duly report the result of the meeting to His Excellency the Governor with his own views in the sense expressed by him.

The Council was then adjourned *sine die*.

2. School will be kept daily on each day of the week from 10 to 4 from Monday to Saturday, the Head Master, however, being at liberty to close school for one whole or two half days in every week, to allow of the due performance by him of his duties as Inspector of the Primary Schools of the Colony.

5. The fees will be £2 per term for each scholar except those under ten years of age in the lowest form for whom the fees will be £1. 6. 8 per term. But when two or more brothers in forms above the lowest attend, there will be a reduction made of 6/8 for the second and 13/1 for the third.

All Fees will be payable into the Treasury in advance.

Parents who have more than one boy attending may, however, pay by three monthly instalments, in advance, reckoning from the date of the first day of the term, instead of paying the whole at the commencement of the term.

No fee will be received in respect of any boy except on presentation of the Head Master's certificate that the preliminary examination (*vide infra* para. 6) has been passed.

No boy will be admitted to the School at the commencement of any term (or month) unless he satisfies the Head Master that the fees have been prepaid.

6. No boy will be admitted to the School who does not first pass a satisfactory qualifying examination in reading, writing and elementary arithmetic. The examination in respect of the coming term will be held on Monday, 14th September, at the School, beginning at 10 o'clock.

CASH ON DELIVERY SERVICE.

Regulations made under the authority of the Post Office Ordinance, 1882.

1. On and after the 1st September, 1908, the Postmaster undertakes, on certain conditions, to collect from the addressee the value of an article sent by post and to remit it to the sender by Money Order or Postal Order.

2. The service shall apply to parcels (uninsured or insured) insured letters and registered packets of all kinds sent from St. Vincent to the United Kingdom, and to similar packets sent from the United Kingdom to St. Vincent.

3. The amount to be collected under the "Cash on Delivery" system shall be called the "Trade Charge".

4. The maximum Trade Charge shall in no case exceed £20.

5. A special Fee of 2d. shall be charged on every packet (the word "packet" here and in the regulations which follow includes insured letters and parcels) bearing a Trade Charge posted in St. Vincent; and in addition, a fee will be charged in the United Kingdom for the delivery service. The delivery fees to be charged in this Colony on such packets when received from the United Kingdom shall be as follows:—

When the Trade Charge exceeds £10 but not £15	0	9
When the Trade Charge exceeds £15 but not £20	1	0

The fee due to the office of posting must be paid with the other postal charges; but the amount of the fee due to the office of delivery will be deducted, with the Commission on the Money Order or Postal Order by which the remittance is made, from the amount paid by the addressee.

6. The sender of a packet on which a Trade Charge is to be collected will be required to sign a declaration that the packet is sent in fulfilment of an order from the addressee.

7. The sender may arrange under certain conditions for the Trade Charge on a packet to be reduced or cancelled. For this purpose the certificate of posting must be produced at the office at which the packet was posted, where full information can be obtained.

A fee of 4d. will be charged in connection with applications for reducing or cancelling a Trade Charge.

POSTING.

8. Packets on which Trade Charges are to be collected shall be accepted at the General Post Office in Kingstown.

9. The sender must—

(a.) Write, on the cover of the Packet, his name and permanent address, the amount in British currency of the Trade Charge in figures and words, and the name of the office on which the Money Order or Postal Order is to be drawn. These particulars may be written on the back of the packet if there is not room for them to be written clearly in front. No erasure or alteration of the entry of the money is allowed. An incorrect entry must be completely obliterated and a fresh entry made;

(b.) Fill up a Request Form (to be obtained at the General Post Office in Kingstown) which includes the prescribed declaration that the packet is sent in fulfilment of an Order;

(c.) Prepay the special fee, by affixing 2d. in postage stamps to the Request Form. The other charges must also be prepaid.

10. He must then hand in the packet at the office, where he will receive a Certificate of posting, which he will be required to give up when he presents the Money Order or Postal Order to be cashed.

DELIVERY.

11. Packets bearing Trade Charges will be delivered only at the General Post Office in Kingstown. Notice of the arrival of such a packet will be sent to the addressee.

12. No such packet will be delivered or allowed to be opened by the addressee until the amount of the Trade Charge and any other charges due have been paid. But the addressee will see from the entry on the packet the name and address of the sender, who must have sent the packet in fulfilment of an order.

13. The packet will be kept at the Post Office for 15 days, including the day of arrival, and, if not called for by that time, will be treated as undeliverable.

14. Cheques will not be accepted in payment of Trade Charges.

15. In no case will a Trade Charge, once paid, be refunded to the addressee.

PAYMENT OF MONEY ORDER OR POSTAL ORDER TO SENDER OF PACKET.

16. The sender of a packet on which a Trade Charge has been collected will receive in a closed envelope the Money Order or Postal Order representing the amount, less the deductions referred to in Regulation 5. When cashing the Order, he must present and give up at the paying office the Certificate of posting which was given to him when he handed in the packet.

Post Office undertakes responsibility for the due remittance of the amount to the sender of the packet.

Mail Ships.

THE MAIL SHIPS RULES, 1908. DATED JUNE 3, 1908.

RULES OF COURT made by the Lord Chancellor and the Judges of the Supreme Court pursuant to the Mail Ships Acts, 1891 and 1902, together with the Scale of Fees fixed with the concurrence of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury.

The following Rules under the Mail Ships Acts, 1891 and 1902 (in these Rules referred to as the Acts), may be cited as the Mail Ships Rules, 1908.

General.

1. All matters within the jurisdiction of the High Court under the provisions of the Acts shall be assigned to the Probate Divorce and Admiralty Division, and all jurisdiction in relation thereto may be exercised by a Judge at chambers.

2. Every application to the Court under the Acts shall be intitled in the matter of the Acts, and of the Order in Council applying the Acts as regards the postal service in respect of which the application is made, and shall be signed by or on behalf of the owner of the ships or ship in respect of which the application is made (in these Rules referred to as the owner), or by a secretary or assistant secretary of the Board of Trade, as the case may be, and shall be filed in the Admiralty Registry.

Hearing of Application.

3. On the filing of any application under the Acts, the Court shall appoint a day for the hearing thereof, having regard to the notice (if any) required to be given in respect of that application; and after the hearing the Court may make such order thereon as the Court may think just.

Notice.

4. Where in any proceeding relating to security notice is required by the Acts or these Rules to be given, such notice shall be a notice of three clear days, except where these Rules otherwise provide, but the Court or a Judge may in any case permit such shorter notice as the justice of the case may require.

Mode of fixing Security.

Contents of Application to fix security.

5. Every application to the Court to fix the nature and amount of the security which the owner ought to place under the control of the Court for the purpose of the Acts shall be divided into paragraphs, describing—

- (i.) The postal service in respect of which the owner is subsidised and the names of the ports or places between which the service is performed, and at which the ships touch in the ordinary course of the service.
- (ii.) The Government, whether British, colonial, or foreign, from which the owner receives a subsidy in respect of the service.
- (iii.) The nationality of the ships engaged in the service.
- (iv.) The maximum number of ships proposed to be employed and the number intended to be simultaneously engaged in the service, and the aggregate tonnage of such numbers respectively and the tonnage of the largest ship intended to be employed.
- (v.) The amount for which the owner proposes to give his bond, and the nature and amount of the security whereby he proposes such bond to be guaranteed.
- (vi.) The documents filed with the application in accordance with the Acts and these Rules.

Certificate and affidavit.

6. Together with the application shall be filed the certificate of the Secretary of State that the owner is subsidised for the execution of the postal service described in the application, and also such evidence on affidavit or otherwise as may be necessary in support of the statements made in the application.

Notice to Board of Trade of application to fix security.

7. Ten clear days before the day appointed for the hearing of an application to fix the nature and amount of security, the owner shall serve upon the Board of Trade a notice of the application, accompanying the same with copies of the application and of the affidavits and documents filed therewith.

Security consisting of cash or Government securities.

8. Where an order fixing the nature and amount of security directs that the security shall consist partly of cash or Government securities, such cash or securities shall be paid and brought into Court, and subject to the Acts and these Rules shall be lodged and dealt with in all respects according to the provisions of the Rules for the time being in force relating to funds in Court.

Disposal of income or dividends accruing on security.

9. Where the security given consists of cash or Government securities the Court may make orders for the disposal of any income or dividends accruing thereon, but any such order may be cancelled or varied if it appears to the Court, having regard to pending claims or other circumstances, that such income or dividends ought to be applied to the enhancement of the security.

Investment of cash security.

10. Where the security given consists partly of cash, the Court may, on the application of the owner, and in accordance with the Rules for the time being in force relating to funds in Court, direct such cash or any part thereof to be invested, and, if necessary, accumulated.

Procedure carrying out exemption.

Notice of exemption.

11. On the completion of the security in accordance with the order of the Court, the Admiralty Registrar shall forthwith give information thereof to the Board of Trade, and thereupon the Board of Trade shall publish a notice, intitled in the matter of the Acts and of the Order in Council whereby the Acts are applied as regards the postal service in respect of which the security has been given, and of the Order in Council (if any) whereby the Acts are applied to any British possession, and reciting so much of the order of the Court as relates to the maximum number and tonnage of the ships to which the security is to apply, and requiring all arresting authorities to take notice that from and after the date therein mentioned (being the day on which the security was completed in accordance with the order of the Court), all the ships of the owner actually engaged in the said postal service are to be deemed exempted mail ships within the meaning of the Acts.

List of ships entitled to exemption.

12. As soon as may be after security is given in accordance with an order of the Court, the owner shall lodge in the Admiralty Registry a list of the ships actually engaged in the postal service, in respect of which the security has been given, mentioning the tonnage and port of registry of each ship, and shall also from time to time, as often as any ships are added or substituted for the purposes of that postal service, lodge in the Admiralty Registry a corrected list as aforesaid. A copy of every such list shall be transmitted to the Board of Trade for publication.

Arrest of exempted mail ship.

13. If notwithstanding its exemption any exempted mail ship is arrested in the United Kingdom, the Board of Trade on being informed by the owner of such arrest and of the arresting authority, and on being satisfied that the ship is an exempted mail ship, shall forthwith send a special notice to the arresting authority informing him that the ship is an exempted mail ship, and as such entitled to release.

Applications to make security sufficient, or to vary and withdraw.

Application by Board of Trade to make security sufficient.

14. Every application to the Court by the Board of Trade to require that any security shall be made sufficient, shall recite or describe the previous orders of the Court (if any) relating to the security, and shall also state the nature and amount of the security for the time being under the control of the Court, and the names and tonnage of the ships to which the security for the time being applies, and the causes, whether pending claims, variation of the conditions of the service or otherwise, whereby it appears to the Board of Trade that the security has become insufficient, and such application shall be accompanied by such evidence (if any) on affidavit or otherwise as may be necessary in support of any statements made therein which are not within the cognizance of the Board of Trade.

Application to vary or withdraw security.

15. An application by an owner to vary or withdraw any security shall recite or describe the previous orders of the Court relating to the security, and the nature and amount of the security for the time being, and in case

of an application to vary shall state the grounds upon which, and the mode in which, the owner desires the security to be varied. Every application to vary shall be accompanied by such evidence on affidavit or otherwise as may be necessary in support of the application.

16. An order of the Court for the withdrawal of security shall, in the first instance, be provisional, but the Court may, subject to these Rules, make the order absolute on the application of the owner.

17. When a provisional order has been made for the withdrawal of security, the Admiralty Registrar shall give notice thereof to the Board of Trade, and thereupon the Board of Trade shall publish notices to all arresting authorities, in like manner as herein-before provided, reciting such order and notifying that, after the day named in the notice (such day not being earlier than a reasonable time after the publication of the notice), the Court may, on the application of the owner, make the order absolute, unless it appears to the Court that any pending claims exist for the purposes of which the security is required.

Cesser of Exemption.

18. Where on the application of the Board of Trade an order is made that any security shall be made sufficient within a time fixed, and default is made therein, or where an order for the withdrawal of any security is made absolute, the Admiralty Registrar shall forthwith notify the Board of Trade of such default or order absolute, as the case may be, and the Board of Trade shall thereupon publish a notice to the effect that the mail ships in respect of which such default is made or such order is made absolute, have since the date of the default or order absolute, as the case may be, ceased to be exempted mail ships.

19. Without prejudice to any other mode of proof a notice published by the Board of Trade containing the names of the exempted mail ships of any owner, or until such notice is published a like notice declaring that all ships of the owner engaged in the postal service to which any security applies are exempted mail ships, shall be evidence of the exemption of any mail ship named in such notice or proved to have been at the date of an arrest actually engaged in the said postal service, but such evidence may be rebutted by any subsequently published notice by the Board of Trade containing a corrected list of the exempted mail ships of that owner, or declaring that the ships of that owner have ceased to be exempted mail ships, or by proof that the number and tonnage of the ships for the time being engaged in the postal service in respect of which the security was given exceeds the number and tonnage of the ships to which the security applies.

Procedure in case of actions against Exempted Mail Ships.

20. An action may be commenced in the High Court against the owners of an exempted mail ship in the like cases, in the same manner, and subject to the same rules as in an Admiralty action *in rem*.

21. Every order of the Court directing any security, consisting of cash or Government securities to be applied shall be forthwith notified by the Admiralty Registrar to the Paymaster-General.

22. In making orders for the application of the security, the Court may, so far as circumstances permit, give the like directions as

to priorities as the Court could give in the case of proceeds of property under the control of the Court.

Publication of Notices by Board of Trade.

23. Where any notice respecting any exempted mail ship or any security is by these Rules required to be published, the Board of Trade shall forthwith publish the same in the London Gazette, and also, if the case so requires, in the Edinburgh or Dublin Gazette, and where the exemption or security affects any British possession the Board of Trade shall also forthwith send a copy of such notice to a Secretary of State for publication in that possession, and every notice so published shall be deemed to be notice to all arresting authorities in each part of the United Kingdom, and in such British possession respectively.

24. The Forms in the Schedule, with such variations as circumstances may require, shall be used in proceedings under the Acts.

As regards the question of over-production, I don't think that you need trouble in the least about this. We can move off all that the West Indies can produce; it is of course, principally a question of price.

I see on looking up our recent sales, that during the last couple of months, we have been selling a good deal more than has been forwarded, and the stock of West Indian Cotton in Liverpool in our hands, which

Appointments to be provisional and during pleasure.

XLII. All Commissions to be granted by the Governor to any person or persons for exercising any office or employment shall, unless otherwise provided by law, be granted during pleasure only; and whenever the Governor shall appoint to any vacant office or employment of which the initial emoluments exceed 100% per annum, any person not by Us specially directed to be appointed thereto, he shall, at the same time, expressly apprise such person that such appointment is to be considered only as temporary and provisional until Our allowance or disallowance thereof be signified.

Suspension of Officers.

XLIII. Before suspending from the exercise of his office any Public Officer whose annual pensionable emoluments exceed 100%, the Governor, or in his absence the Administrator acting under his direction, shall signify to such Officer, by a statement in writing, the grounds of the intended suspension, and shall call upon him to state in writing the grounds upon which he desires to exculpate himself; and if the Officer does not furnish such a statement within the time fixed by the Governor, or fails to exculpate himself to the satisfaction of the Governor, the Governor shall appoint a Committee of the Executive Council to investigate the charges made, and to make a full report to the Executive Council. The Governor or in his absence the Administrator shall forthwith cause such report to be considered by the Council, and shall cause to be recorded on the Minutes whether the Council or the majority thereof does or does not assent to the suspension, and if the Governor, or Administrator acting under his direction, thereupon proceeds to such suspension, the Governor shall transmit the report of the Committee, and the evidence taken by it, together with the Minutes of the Proceedings of the Council, to Us through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State by the earliest opportunity. But if in any case the interests of Our service shall appear to the Governor to demand that a person shall cease to exercise the powers and functions of his office instantly, or before there shall be time to take the proceedings hereinbefore directed, the Governor, or Administrator acting under his direction, shall then interdict such person from the exercise of the powers and functions of his office.

Governor to promote religion and education.

XLIV. The Governor is, to the utmost of his power, to promote religion and education in the Islands.

Regulation of power of pardon in capital cases.

XLV. Whenever any offender shall have been condemned by the sentence of any Court in any of the Islands to suffer death, the Governor, or in his absence the Administrator, shall call upon the Judge who presided at the trial to make to him a written Report of the case of such offender, and shall cause such Report to be taken into consideration at the first meeting thereafter which may be conveniently held of the Executive Council of the Island in which the trial was held, and he may cause the said Judge to be specially summoned to attend at such meeting and to produce his notes thereat. The Governor, or in his absence the Administrator acting under his direction, shall not pardon or reprieve any such offender unless it shall appear to the Governor expedient so to do, upon receiving the advice of the said Executive Council thereon; but in all such cases the Governor is to decide either to extend

The Governor shall punctually forward to Us, from year to year, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, the annual books of returns for each of the Islands, commonly called the Blue Books, relating to the Revenue and Expenditure, Defence, Public Works, Legislation, Civil Establishments, Pensions, Population, Schools, Course of Exchange, Imports and Exports, Agricultural Produce, Manufactures, and other matters in the said Blue Books more particularly specified, with reference to the state and condition of the Islands respectively.

XLVII. The Governor shall not upon any pretence whatever quit the Windward Islands without having first obtained leave from Us for so doing under Our Sign Manual and Signet, or through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, except during his journey to or from any Island included in his Government.

The Governor, during any such journey, shall not be considered absent from the Windward Islands within the meaning of the said recited Letters Patent.

XLVIII. The Administrator of any of the Islands must not absent himself from his Government without having first obtained leave from the Governor.

The Governor shall report all such absences as they occur to Us through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State.

XLIX. In these Our Instructions the term "the Governor" shall, unless inconsistent with the context, include every person for the time being administering the Government of the Windward Islands.

ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTIONS passed under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet, to the Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Windward Islands respecting the Legislative Councils of these Islands.

Dated 31st May 1909. ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTIONS to Our Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Our Islands of Grenada, Saint Vincent, and Saint Lucia, and their Dependancies, and to Our Lieutenant

Governor or other Officer for the time being administering the Government of Our said Islands and their Dependencies.

Preamble.

WHEREAS by certain Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date the Seventeenth day of March 1885, constituting the Office of Governor and Commander-in-Chief (therein and hereinafter called the Governor) in and over Our Windward Islands, now comprising Our Islands of Grenada, Saint Vincent, and Saint Lucia, and their Dependencies (which said Islands and their Dependencies are hereinafter called the Islands), it was, among other things, provided that there should be in each of the said Islands a Legislative Council, which, unless otherwise provided by law, should consist of such persons as were immediately before the publication of the said Letters Patent Members of the Council, and of such other persons as might be directed by Instructions under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet:

And whereas by certain Instructions under Our Sign Manual and Signet bearing date the seventh day of May 1908, We did, amongst other things, direct that the said Legislative Councils should be constituted as therein is set forth; and also that the Minutes of the proceedings of the said Councils should be transmitted to Us through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State twice in each year:

And whereas We are minded to make additional provision respecting the provisional appointment of Members of the said Councils: and also to provide that the Minutes of the proceedings of the said Councils shall be sent to Us at shorter intervals:

Now therefore We do, by these Our Additional Instructions under Our Sign Manual and Signet, revoke the Twenty-third, Twenty-fourth and Thirty-eighth Clauses of Our aforesaid Instructions of the Seventh day of May 1908, but without prejudice to anything lawfully done thereunder, and We do hereby direct and enjoin and declare Our will and pleasure that the aforesaid Instructions shall henceforth be construed as if the following clauses had been inserted therein in place of the Twenty-third, Twenty-fourth, and Thirty-eighth Clauses thereof.

“XXIII. Whenever the person discharging the functions of Colonial Secretary or of Attorney-General or Treasurer of any of the Islands is administering the Government thereof, the Governor may, by an instrument under the Public Seal of such Island, appoint some other person holding office in the Island to be provisionally an Official Member of the Legislative Council thereof during the period of such administration.

Whenever any Official Member of the Legislative Council of any of the Islands shall, by writing under his hand, resign his seat in the Council, or shall die, or be suspended from the exercise of his functions as a Member of the Council, or be declared by the Governor by an Instrument under the Public Seal of such Island to be incapable of exercising his functions as a Member of the Council, or be absent from the Island, or shall be acting in an office the holder of which is an *ex officio* Member of the Council, or shall be incapacitated by illness or other sufficient cause from attending any meeting of the Council, the Governor may, by an Instrument under the Public

Seal of such Island, appoint some person to be provisionally an Official Member of the Council in the place of the Member so resigning, or dying, or being suspended, or declared incapable, or being absent, or sitting as an *ex officio* Member, or being incapacitated as aforesaid. Such person shall forthwith cease to be an Official Member of the Council if his appointment is disallowed by Us, or if the Member in whose place he was appointed shall be released from suspension, or, as the case may be, shall be declared by the Governor capable of again discharging his functions in the Council, or shall return to the Island, or shall cease to sit in the Council as an *ex officio* Member.”

“XXIV. Whenever an Unofficial Member of the Legislative Council of any of the Islands shall die, or become incapable, or be removed from his seat in the Council, or be absent from the Island, or if he resign by writing under his hand, or if his seat become vacant, the Governor may, by an Instrument under the Public Seal of the Island, appoint in his place a fit person to be provisionally an Unofficial Member of such Council.

Such person shall forthwith cease to be a Member of the Council if his appointment is disallowed by Us, or if the Member in whose place he was appointed shall return to the Island, or shall be declared by the Governor capable of again discharging his functions in such Council.

Whenever an Unofficial Member of the Legislative Council of any of the Islands shall be acting in an office in the service of the Government, he shall while so acting cease to sit in the Council as an Unofficial Member, but the Governor may appoint some other person to be provisionally an Unofficial Member in his place during the period that he is so acting.

Such person so appointed shall forthwith cease to be a Member of the Council if his appointment is disallowed by Us, and shall in every case vacate his seat in the Council as soon as the person in whose place he was appointed shall cease to be disqualified to sit in the Council as an Unofficial Member thereof.”

“XXXVIII. Minutes shall be regularly kept of all the proceedings of the said Legislative Councils, and, at each meeting of the said Councils, the Minutes of the last preceding meeting shall be read over and confirmed or amended as the case may require, before proceeding to the despatch of any other business.

The Governor shall transmit to Us, through one of Our Principal Secretaries of State as soon as possible after each meeting, a full transcript of the Minutes thereof.”

Repairing Grant to Primary Schools, £20.—The Administrator explained that this was a new sub-head which would be legally authorised as soon as certain contemplated amendments to the Education Code were formally passed. This would be done shortly and it was necessary in the meantime to vote the amount. He added that the Government intended to contribute towards the cost of repairs of schools a sum equal to that proposed to be expended in any one case by the denomination, and that the Government would retain a lien on the building to the extent of the amount of the repairing grant paid out of the Treasury.

Honorarium and Expenses of annual Examination of Secondary School, £10.—The Administrator explained that it was considered more satisfactory to all concerned that the Secondary School should be examined annually in future, and the amount provided was intended to cover the expenses of an Examiner from one of the neighbouring Colonies for the purpose.

Supply of Maps to Secondary School, £20.—The Administrator also explained the necessity for this vote, which was, after some discussion, approved.

Head 14, Postmaster, £175.—Mr. MacDonald said the Unofficial members again wished to refer to the inadequacy of the salary of this officer. In days gone by when the work of the Postmaster was less than at present the pay was £300, and it seemed only fair that the salary should be put on a proper basis again. The responsibilities of the Postmaster under present-day conditions were great. The question was raised in the Council two or three years ago, he said, and it was agreed then that the salary should be placed on the incremental scale from £175 rising to £200 by £10 annually. This was however not approved, he concluded, on submission to higher authority and the salary remained at £175. The Unofficial members were of opinion that the pay of the office should be £200.

The Administrator said he intended making a similar recommendation when the Estimates for 1911-12 were under consideration. Since however the hon'ble member wished to press the matter he thought that perhaps by trenching on some other head of expenditure it would be found possible to spare £10 for addition to the Postmaster's salary in 1910-11. His Honour promised to recommend to the Secretary of State that the salary be placed on the incremental scale rising by £10 per annum to £200.

District Post Offices, £85.—The Administrator explained that this vote had been increased from £58 in the present financial year to the above figure, in order to permit of the establishment of a Money and Postal Order Office at Layou, District Post Offices at Troumaca and Cumberland, and the increase of the salary of the Postmaster at Barrouallie on the institution of the Postal Order system there.

(The Council here adjourned for luncheon.)

On resumption the consideration of head 15 (Telephone Department) was proceeded with.

The Administrator stated that during the adjournment he had had a conversation with the Supervisor of Telephones on the subject of hon'ble members' remarks at an earlier stage of the proceedings respecting the present condition of the Telephone system. That Officer had informed him that occasional Linesmen had been employed to assist the ordinary employees after heavy weather, but that such services were unsatisfactory when compared with that of the permanent Linesmen, whose duty it was to regularly inspect the lines at all times. Difficulty was also experienced, the Supervisor said, in working the district exchanges

owing to the frequent transfer of the Police Constables who worked these exchanges, from one station to another which prevented them becoming familiar with the switchboard. Before the Police took charge these exchanges were worked by private individuals who were paid regular salaries, but with the necessity which arose in later years for economy in every Department of the service in St. Vincent it was found necessary to transfer their charge to the Police. His Honour again referred to the favourable comparison which the system bore to those of other Colonies on which larger sums were expended.

Mr. Simmons expressed himself as being satisfied with all but the working of the Central Exchange. He understood, he said, that the salary at present paid was for the services of only one Operator. He urged that the amount be increased so as to permit of the employment of an assistant.

Mr. Hazell agreed with Mr. Simmons. He suggested that £15 be added to the vote for the Operator's salary to be paid conditional on extra assistance being employed.

Mr. Simmons suggested an increase of £20 for the special purpose.

Further discussion ensued. It was finally agreed, on the suggestion of the Administrator, that the pay of the Operator be increased from £85 to £90 in view of her long service, and that an additional amount of £10 be provided as an allowance to her for extra assistance, which His Honour thought would ensure the more satisfactory working of the Exchange.

Mr. MacDonald suggested that there should be more systematic inspection of the telephone lines by regular Linesmen and that reports to the Supervisor of such inspection should be insisted upon. The Linesmen should not wait till after heavy weather to inspect. Extra men would not, in his opinion, be needed if the permanent employees performed this work regularly.

Mr. Hazell suggested that a charge should be authorised for the transmission of messages through the telephones of private individuals. He thought there should also be some system of regular inspection of the telephone instruments.

Mr. Simmons agreed. He thought the use of switches between buildings in the same district or town, belonging to one person, if authorised, would have the effect of increasing revenue from rental. The present Regulations only permitted the use of switches between buildings in the same premises. This he said had the effect of debarring persons controlling several places of business in one centre from making as much use of the system as they would otherwise do, owing to the higher rental for direct communication with the exchange.

The Administrator promised to enquire into and give consideration to the several matters referred to by the hon'ble members.

Head 16—Miscellaneous: Contribution from General Revenue to Kingstown Board Fund, £100.—Mr. Hazell referred to the reduction of this contribution in recent years. The amount used to be £200, he said, and was given to the Board in the first instance to represent rates on the large buildings which the Government owned in the town. He feared that the effect of the reduction would be to compel the Board to increase its rates in order to enable it to meet its liabilities and at the same time maintain the principal town in the Colony in the condition its importance demanded.

already in the Colony, this oil did not always come quite up to the standard required by the present Bill.

The Administrator gave the necessary assurance.

The Council then resumed, on motion of Mr. Shaw, seconded by Mr. Kernahan.

On motion similarly made and seconded the Bill was read a third time, by Title, and passed.

The Council agreeing, standing order 13 was by resolution suspended to enable the votes to be considered and passed at that meeting.

Referring to the vote of £41 His Honour said he desired to take the opportunity to publicly congratulate Mr. Shaw and Mr. Simmons, who formed the Luncheon Committee, and Dr. G. B. Mason, the Honorary Secretary, on the very creditable manner in which they had performed the task entrusted to them.

Mr. Shaw thanked His Honour for his kind remarks. He thought however, he said, that the success of the luncheon was due not so much to the Committee as to the energy of the Honorary Secretary.

Mr. Simmons also thanked His Honour. He thought great praise was due to Dr. Mason and those who worked with him for the success which attended the luncheon.

The vote was unanimously passed.

In explanation of the other vote the Administrator said that hon'ble members would remember having passed a vote for £16 16/- for the refund to the Government of Dominica of Dr. Mason's tuition fees in respect of a course at the London School of Tropical Medicine, on the transfer of that officer to this Colony. The Secretary of State had recently informed the Governor that the actual amount of the fees was £16. 18. 9 or a difference of two shillings and nine pence, which, in the circumstances, His Lordship stated, the Legislative Council might not be unwilling to vote.

His Honour informed the Council, with reference to the hope expressed by the Unofficials at the time of the passing of the previous vote, that the Secretary of State had concurred that in the event of the transfer of Dr. Mason to another Colony of the Windward Islands Government within three years of that date the whole of the amount of the fees would be refunded to St. Vincent. His Lordship said he would endeavour to obtain a refund of a proportion of these fees should that officer be transferred to another Government within the period mentioned.

The vote was on the motion of the Administrator, seconded by Mr. Hazell, unanimously passed.

that grown on the Leeward Coast is interesting, but I question if the inference is correct that this factor of strength may be produced on the Leeward Coast by using seed from the Windward Coast.

2. The experience of investigators tends to show that within certain limits,—such as are under consideration by Mr. Oliver—strength in cotton depends largely on the conditions under which the cotton is grown and that it is not a Mendelian character which will be carried in the seed. The same seed will give rise to cottons of various degrees of strength according to the conditions under which the crop is grown.

3. The advice I would give the St. Vincent planter is to select on the Leeward Coast the plants and seeds bearing the strongest lint, and to use the seed for planting in the Leeward districts. In this way it may be possible to get a strain of cotton giving strong lint under the moister conditions of the Leeward Coast. I doubt if it will be got by using Windward seed.

4. In making selection of course attention must be paid to other desirable qualities such as length, fineness, evenness of lint and productiveness of plants.

ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS made by the Governor in Council under the authority of section XXI of "The Post Office Ordinance 1882."

1. The Additional Regulations made by the Governor in Council the 10th day of August, 1909, are hereby repealed.

2. The amount received from a dealer or other person for the purchase of stamps shall be brought to account in the Post Office Cash Book on the same day that it is received.

3. The sums received from each Dealer or other person shall be placed to the credit of his account in a book to be called the "Stamp Dealers Subsidiary Ledger", and the stamps supplied shall be entered to his debit under the dates of the transactions.

4. The Stamp Dealers Subsidiary Ledger shall be balanced at the close of each financial year. Balance Sheets shall be made out from this ledger at the end of each quarter, which must agree with the balances shown for the same period under the head 'Remittances for Stamps' in the principal ledger of the Department.

5. The orders or requisitions for stamps received from Dealers shall be submitted to the Colonial Secretary, and these, on being approved, shall be executed in the order of their receipt.

6. A foil or list showing the numbers, denominations, and values of stamps supplied shall be enclosed with the stamps to the Dealer or other person.

7. No standing orders for the supply of new issues of stamps shall be received and orders shall only be accepted for a definite supply of stamps in current use.

8. Should it be impossible to supply at the same time all the stamps requisitioned for, then the unused portion of the remittance shall be returned to the Dealer or other person giving the order.

9. No information as to new issues of stamps or contemplated changes in stamps shall be furnished to any Dealer or other person.

10. No obliteration or cancellation of stamps (whether of old or present issue) shall take place except in the ordinary course of correspondence transmitted through the post.

11. Should, however, addressed envelopes, letters or any postal packet whatsoever bearing stamps of or sufficient value to cover the payment of postage be received from a dealer or any other person with the request that they be posted by the Postmaster, and no infringement of the postal laws or regulations in connection with the same would be caused thereby, the article or articles may be posted singly and transmitted in the ordinary course of the post.

12. It shall not be permissible for the Postmaster to affix stamps to envelopes or other postal matter, with the object of having them cancelled.

13. After the stamps have been supplied and forwarded to the Dealer or other person, the responsibility of the Postmaster shall cease.

14. Any stamp or stamps whether of present or old issue forwarded to the Postmaster with a request for exchange shall be returned to the sender with a statement that such exchange is not permissible.

15. These Regulations shall come into force on the 10th day of October, 1910.

Confirmation of Minutes.

Mr. Shaw moved that the minutes of the preceding meeting of 16th June and of the adjourned meetings of 17th and 18th June last, which had been printed and circulated among members, be taken as read and confirmed.

Mr. MacDonald, referring to the discussion which took place at the adjourned meeting on the 17th of June in regard to the power sought to be taken by the Government in clause 35 (c) of the Bill for the Public Health Ordinance, said, that he did not himself object to the compulsory vaccination of contacts in the case of small pox, as it would appear from the minutes he did. What he meant at the time to convey was that the adoption of the clause as it stood would meet with opposition on the part of a considerable number of people who objected to compulsory vaccination.

The paragraph of the minutes in question was amended as follows:—

"Mr. MacDonald said he hardly thought it would be judicious that vaccination in the case of small pox should be made compulsory, as it was sought to do in the sub-clause, in view of the fact that it might meet with opposition on the part of certain people who objected to compulsory vaccination."

Mr. Shaw's motion was then seconded by Mr. Griffith and the minutes were confirmed.

The Census Ordinance, 1910.

On motion of Mr. Shaw, seconded by Mr. Griffith, the Council resumed consideration in Committee of the Bill for the Census Ordinance 1910.

In Committee the Bill was gone through without amendment.

On motion of Mr. Shaw, seconded by Mr. Griffith the Council resumed.

On motion similarly made and seconded the Bill was read a third time, by Title, and passed.

On motion of Mr. Shaw, seconded by Mr. Griffith the Council resumed consideration in Committee of the Bill for the Public Health Ordinance 1910.

The Administrator stated that the various amendments which had been made to the Bill up to the time of the adjournment of the last meeting of the Council had all been inserted in the copy before hon'ble members, which had been checked by the Chief Justice.

Referring to sub-clause 26 (3) of the Bill which prohibited the sale of milk of less density than 1.025 Mr. Shaw informed the Council that since the passing of the sub-clause a communication had been received from the Imperial Commissioner of Agriculture on the subject of the use of the Lactometer for the detection of adulterated milk, which went to show that with a Lactometer graduated (as those commonly in use for this purpose were) at 60° F. the density of pure milk ranged from 1.030 to 1.032 and it had been found with a density so low as 1.027. It was considered therefore that the minimum density of 1.025 fixed in this connection in the sub-clause should be allowed to stand, having regard to the fact that nearly all the milk supply of St. Vincent was derived from cows which were grass fed and was in consequence not likely to come up to the standard of the better quality of milk.

Continuing, he stated that it was thought advisable to alter the wording of the sub-clause as passed, in order to specify that for the purposes thereof milk shall be tested by a Thermometer graduated at 60° F.

Mr. Shaw then moved with that object, and in order to avoid misconstruction of the intention of the sub-clause through the erroneous insertion of the words "falls to" between the words "authority" and "show" in the 2nd line thereof the substitution of the following sub-clause therefor:—

"(3) Any milk which, when tested by a Medical Officer or a Government Veterinary Surgeon by means of a lactometer of a pattern approved by the General Authority, and graduated at 60° Fahrenheit, shows a density of less than 1.025, shall be presumed, until the contrary is proved, to be impoverished milk."

The motion was seconded by Mr. Griffith.

Mr. Simmons drew attention to the fact that it was possible to increase the density of milk by adding foreign substances thereto which may not readily be noticed and that therefore, although the milk might be watered, it would not be possible to detect it by means of the lactometer.

Mr. Shaw stated that such cases could only be verified by an Analyst, and there was no qualified Analyst in the Colony; but most people could tell when milk had been watered, which latter was the common form of adulteration practised in this Colony.

5. That, in the event of the alteration to the Convention mentioned in paragraph 5 of this Report being made, the Government should secure representation of this Colony on the Central Quarantine Authority.

**REPORT ON THE POSTAL DEPARTMENT FOR THE
PERIOD 1ST APRIL TO 31ST DECEMBER, 1919.**

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
SAINT VINCENT, B.W.I.
1st July, 1920.

Sir,—I have the honour to submit the report on the Postal Department of this Colony and its dependencies for the nine months, April—December 1919, accompanied by the usual Returns.

SECTION I.—INLAND SERVICE.

2. The resignation from the 1st April of Mr. C. W. Bowman as District Postmaster at Mayreau, from which date that office has remained closed, reduced the number of Post Offices to seventeen and these were maintained throughout the nine months. Of these, eight were of the first class and nine of the second class. Three of the former were worked by private individuals and the Police worked two of the latter. The re-opening of the posting receptacle at Tyrrell Street, Kingstown, on the 24th April increased the number of posting places to twenty.

Communication.

3. The mail services mentioned in the last report were maintained throughout the nine months and mails were despatched by special Car on five occasions.

Letters and Other Articles.

4. In Table 1 is shewn the exchanges in the Inland Post which consisted of 61,786 letters and 23,127 other articles. These figures shew an increase of 2,987 letters and 7,254 other articles on the figures for the year 1918-19. This Table also shews, in detail, the work done by each office.

Parcel Post.

5. The number of parcels handled by the Inland Service during the period April—December was 592 as against 599 in 1918-19. Of these 147 were dealt with at Georgetown as shewn in Table 2.

Registered Articles.

6. Table 3 gives detailed information regarding this service. 2,580 registered articles were dealt with as against 3,343 during 1918-19.

Money Orders.

7. Detailed information as to the amounts of Money Orders issued and paid at each of the Money Order offices is given in Table 4. The value of Orders issued during 1918-19 exceeds that of Orders issued during the nine months April—December by £33 3 11, and of those paid by £49 17 6.

SECTION II.—FOREIGN AND COLONIAL SERVICE.

8. Fortnightly calls during the nine months were made by the Canadian Royal Mail Steamers. Mails for the United Kingdom have been despatched via Barbados, Grenada, Trinidad and Canada and the United States of America. Other lines called occasionally during the nine months.

Mail Conveyance and Receptacles.

9. Mails were brought to the Colony by 42 steamers and 71 sailing vessels,

Sir,—With reference to my despatch No. 33 of the 24th of May, I have the honour to transmit to you the accompanying copy of correspondence with the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company with regard to the arrangements to be made for the Intercolonial Mail Service after the termination, on the 10th November, of the Company's agreement with the Postmaster General of the 6th June, 1907, relating to the 'Transatlantic Mail Service.

2. You will perceive that the Court of Directors propose that, after the termination of the contract of the 6th June, 1907, the Transatlantic steamers shall proceed from Southampton and Cherbourg via the Azores direct to St. Thomas on the outward voyage, there connecting with the Intercolonial Steamers, and that on the homeward voyage the connexion shall be made at St. Thomas on an after the 9th of January next. The main line steamers will continue to sail fortnightly up to the 21st of December next, and the question of further departures from Southampton after that date, and at what intervals, is engaging the most earnest consideration of the Court of Directors. The effect of the change will be to increase materially the time taken by the voyage to the southern Islands and Demerara.

3. His Majesty's Government had hoped that the service which was inaugurated in 1907, while affording reasonable facilities to the West Indian Colonies, would also enable the Directors of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company to carry out their intention to place the West Indian service on a commercial basis. During the few years which have elapsed, the service has, I understand, been on the whole satisfactory to the Colonies concerned, but unfortunately it does not appear to have been financially successful. The Directors inform me that the Transatlantic service has been carried on at a heavy pecuniary loss, and that in the absence of a sufficient subsidy, the only alternatives appear to them to be to seek more remunerative means of running the vessels hitherto employed in the trade or to withdraw them altogether. His Majesty's Government do not consider that they would be justified in asking Parliament to provide at the expense of the taxpayers of the United Kingdom, in addition to the payment from Imperial funds under the Intercolonial Mail Contract, the subsidy which would be required to induce the Company to continue the Transatlantic Service on its present basis, and there can be no doubt that the West Indian Colonies would not be in a position to find the necessary amount. In these circumstances I have felt bound to consider very carefully the alternatives mentioned in the Company's letter of the 21st September.

4. Since the date on which the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company gave notice to terminate the agreement relating to the Transatlantic service, the question of the conveyance of the mails to and from the West Indies has received the earnest consideration of the Postmaster General and myself, and it has also engaged the attention of the Royal Commission on trade relations between Canada and the West Indies. I trust that in the near future a satisfactory arrangement may be evolved. For the present, however, the Postmaster General has not found it possible to arrange a new contract in substitution for that which expires on the 10th of November. After that date, therefore, the Company will be in a position to conduct their Transatlantic service as they please, and the immediate question for the consideration of the Governments concerned is whether they will insist on the maintenance of the present itineraries of the Intercolonial steamers without reference to any connection with the Company's Transatlantic Service, or whether they will consent to such modifications as will bring the Intercolonial service into relation with that service.

5. It is not satisfactory that the port of transhipment should be in a foreign Colony, and this could hardly be contemplated as a permanent arrangement. But I do not think this fact need prevent the acceptance of the Company's proposal as a purely temporary and provisional arrangement to allow time for the negotiation of a more satisfactory service. I greatly regret the increase in the length of the voyage to the southern islands and British Guiana, but I consider that to refuse consent to the Company's application will serve no good purpose. The Intercolonial service would lose the greater part of its utility if not connected with a Transatlantic service, and His Majesty's Government are not empowered under section three of the Contract to insist on connection with any service other than a transatlantic packet service maintained by the Imperial Post Office. The modification of the Intercolonial service now proposed appears to be the best that can be effected in the interests of the West Indian Colonies as a whole, and indeed the only practicable one in the circumstances. Accordingly I propose to consent, possibly with some modifications, to the re-arrangement of the Intercolonial time table as a purely provisional and temporary measure, pending the conclusion of more satisfactory arrangements, and provided the fortnightly service is maintained and to instruct you to invite the Legislatures to agree to the payment of the subsidy on these terms.

6. The time table enclosed in the Company's letter of the 21st September will secure direct communication between the Colonies of the Windward Group for so long as the provisional arrangement lasts.

7. The time table submitted shows that during the period of transition the Mail will arrive at and depart from several Colonies on the same day. Some inconvenience is, I fear, inevitable will the change is being carried out, but I propose to call the attention of the Directors to the matter and shall not fail to urge them to use their utmost endeavours to mitigate the inconvenience as far as possible. I also propose to make representations to the Company which I trust will have the effect of shortening the period of transit between this country and the Southern islands and British Guiana.

The Court of Directors will be glad to learn the decision of the Earl of Crewe as early as possible in order that the necessary arrangements may be made.

Sir,—I am directed by the Earl of Crewe to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 12th instant (a.m.) in which you state that it is proposed that after the 10th November next the West Indian Transatlantic Passenger Steamers shall proceed from Southampton and Cherbourg via the Azores direct to St. Thomas, and enquire whether his Lordship will give permission for the Intercolonial steamers to connect with the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company's main line steamers at that island.

2. Lord Crewe would be obliged if the Court of Directors would be good enough to furnish him with further information on certain points which require to be taken into consideration in dealing with this proposal. His Lordship would in particular desire to learn whether it is intended that the Transatlantic steamers shall continue to sail fortnightly from Southampton on fixed dates, how the change in the port of transhipment would affect the time-table of the Intercolonial Service, and how it is proposed to provide for communication with Trinidad. It would be convenient if the Court could furnish an approximate time-table of the proposed new service.

3. I am to observed that no mention is made of a call at Jamaica and I am to inquire whether it is proposed that the Main Line Steamers shall continue to call at Jamaica on their way to and from New York.

Sir,—With reference to your letter of the 15th instant No. 28383 the Court of Directors desire me to say in answer to the enquiries of the Secretary of State:—

1. The enclosed pro forma time tables will indicate the manner in which the change of Port of Transhipment would affect the movements of the Intercolonial Steamers and show the connection with Trinidad.

2. It should be observed that the Transatlantic steamers leaving Southampton on the 26th October and 9th November under the existing contract with His Majesty's Postmaster General are timed to connect with the Intercolonial Steamers at Barbados on the Homeward voyage on

the 13th and 27th December respectively, by which dates the outward Transatlantic steamers will be calling at St. Thomas, so that on two occasions the outward mails for the various Islands and British Guiana would be transhipped at St. Thomas, while the Homeward Mails were still being transhipped at Barbados. The pro forma time tables enclosed herewith are designed to cover this transition period after which the outward and homeward mails would in each instance (so long as the service is maintained) be transhipped at St. Thomas as shown in the case of the Transatlantic Steamer leaving Southampton on the 21st December.

If it is thought desirable it would be possible to give the Intercolonial Steamer going down to Barbados via the Northern Islands (during the transition period) longer time at each or at any rate some of the Islands so as to afford the opportunity for replying to mails by the same steamer.

3. With reference to the enquiry made by the Secretary of State as to the continuation of the fortnightly departure from Southampton the Company's Transatlantic Steamers will continue to sail fortnightly until 21st December inclusive. The question of further departures from Southampton after that date and at what intervals such departures shall be made is one which is engaging the most earnest consideration of the Court of Directors but the Secretary of State will no doubt appreciate the fact that steamers may be run remuneratively at certain seasons of the year with a frequency which it will at other times be found impossible to maintain.

4. With regard to Jamaica, the Secretary of State will observe from the pro forma time tables that the Transatlantic Steamers outward bound will call at Jamaica after visiting Colombian Ports and Colon and that on the homeward voyage they will call at Jamaica after leaving Antilla.

5. The Court had hoped by the extension of the Company's service to New York in November 1905 thus opening up a new source of revenue, in conjunction with the arrangement made with the Postmaster General in June 1907, to have been able to carry on without loss a service of considerable public utility which the Company has performed for close upon 70 years.

The result, however, has not fulfilled the expectations of the Court and the directors feel that they are no longer justified in continuing the heavy pecuniary loss. In the absence therefore of a suitable payment for the service by His Majesty's Government, the only alternative appears to be to seek more remunerative means of running the vessels hitherto employed in the trade or to withdraw them altogether.

Sir,—With reference to Clause 2, subsection 3 (b) of the West Indian Transatlantic Mail Contract dated 6th June, 1907, I beg to state for the information of the Postmaster General that it is proposed that, commencing with the "Tagus" leaving Southampton on the 14th instant, and the same vessel due to leave New York on the 15th proximo, the West Indian Mail Packets of this Company shall call at Antilla, Cuba, after leaving Jamaica on the outward voyage and on the way to that Island on the homeward voyage.

In order to make this additional call it is proposed that the outward Mail Packets shall arrive at Barbados on the Monday instead of Tuesday, as at present and thence keeping ahead of the current schedule as shewn on the * enclosed time table.

You will observe that although the packets are timed to arrive at New York a day earlier than at present they will leave that port and arrive at Barbados and Southampton in accordance with the present itinerary.

Sir,—I am directed by the Postmaster General to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 23rd of this month No. 29256/1910 which was accompanied by a copy of a letter from the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company with pro forma time tables of the proposed West Indian Mail Service via St. Thomas.

2. As it does not appear probable that the new service to the West Indies by way of Canada which has recently been under consideration by His Majesty's Government is likely to take definite shape in the immediate future, the Postmaster General is very desirous that some "modus vivendi" should be arrived at which would secure, on favourable terms, the performance of a direct service from this Country to the West Indies working in connexion with the existing Intercolonial Service.

3. The proposals of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, while meeting to a certain extent the first of these requirements, are open to the objection that the transshipment of mails will take place in a foreign port. It is obvious, however, that in the absence of any control over the Service by this Department, and in view of the Company's statement that the Barbados call can only be continued at a grave financial loss, the substitution of St. Thomas for that port must be regarded as a lesser evil than the alternative of sending the mails by way of New York. Indeed in the first instance the mails will be conveyed in British vessels throughout the whole of their transit between this Country and their destinations in the West Indies, the mere transference of the bags from one ship to another in a Danish Colony giving rise to no transit charges to this Department. In the case of conveyance by way of New York, however, not only does the objection of a foreign port come in but if the mails are carried forward by a line of steamers subsidized by another Administration, transit charges for that part of the Service will be incurred.

4. The Company's proposals for the period of transition appear to the Postmaster General to be the best arrangement which can be made in the circumstances; and he is disposed to agree in principle to the acceptance of that part of the time table. He would, however, wish if Lord Crewe sees no objection, to avail himself of the offer made in the footnote to the "Islands" part of the itinerary that the stop at some of the Islands should be of longer duration in order that a longer period would be available for the inhabitants to answer their correspondence. To this end he would propose that the Intercolonial steamers should leave St. Thomas on the 6th and 20th of December, immediately after the transshipment from the Main Line Packet has taken place, and that the two days thus gained should be distributed among the more important Islands.

5. After the period of transition is over it will be seen on reference to the time table, that the Company propose that the round voyage from St. Thomas to Demerara and back should occupy 20 days while the stay in port at St. Thomas, during which time the steamer is doing nothing, will amount to 8 days. The period of transit for mails from this Country to Demerara under this proposal will be 21 days out and 20 days home, to Trinidad it will be 19 days out and 18 days home, to Barbados 17 days out and 16 home. These long periods will not commend themselves to the public, and this Department would probably find itself obliged to use the more speedy route by way of New York. Even if it were decided to send only specially superscribed correspondence by the latter route, there can be little doubt that on the facts of the case being recognised, superscription would be generally adopted, and, moreover it is thought that those Colonies which could

secure a better Service in the homeward direction by the use of the New York route would not hesitate to adopt it.

6. In these circumstances the Postmaster General is of opinion that, subject to Lord Crewe's concurrence, pressure should be exerted upon the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, to induce them to alter the mode of distributing the mails after their receipt at St. Thomas. The service should be run in such a manner that Trinidad and Demerara are served by a steamer going direct to and from St. Thomas, while the "Islands" boat should proceed direct to Barbados and return to St. Thomas via the Islands. A service run on these lines would, it is thought, be more in accord with the principle upon which the present Contract for the Intercolonial Service is framed than that which the Company propose.

7. The adoption of the Post Office proposal would curtail the stay of the ship at Demerara, and the Islands would receive one call only for the delivery of the outward and collection of the homeward mails. The periods of transit from this Country would be for Demerara 16 days out and 15 days home, for Trinidad 15 days out and 17 home and for Barbados 15 days out and 17 home; thus showing a gain as against the Company's proposals of 3, 4 and 2 days on the outward voyage, while in the homeward direction Demerara and Trinidad gain 5 and 1 days respectively. Barbados however would be one day worse off. On the whole the question appears to be a choice for the more important Colonies between a fast mail service and a longer stay in harbour.

8. I am to enclose a memorandum on the Company's proposals which has been prepared by Commander Foakes the Nautical Adviser to the Post Office.

9. The Postmaster General will be much interested to hear the result of the communication which Lord Crewe will no doubt cause to be made to the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company.

Notes on pro forma Time Tables submitted by Royal Mail Steam Packet Company on the 21st September, 1910.

The first voyage on which the Main Line Packet will adopt the proposed itinerary both out and home via St. Thomas is that commencing at Southampton on the 23rd of November. The round voyage to New York and back will occupy 59 days in place of the 61 days of the present voyage in which calls are made at Barbados and Trinidad.

It is not proposed to criticise the transatlantic section of the service which the Royal Mail Company propose to run after the expiration of the present Contract.

The period of transit to those Colonies served by the Intercolonial steamers under the old and new conditions, as well as during the transition period, is shown on the annexed Appendix marked A.

That part of the Time Table submitted by the Company which illustrates the old conditions requires no comment.

With regard to the transition period it may be remarked that so far as the outward voyages are concerned they are not under Contract, but the homeward portions are the remainder of these voyages which commenced before the Contract had expired and are still under the control of the Postmaster General.

With regard to the Intercolonial Service during the transition period the Company propose to run two steamers, one starting from St. Thomas proceeding to Demerara and calling at Trinidad on the outward journey only, and the other serving the Islands from North to South, both vessels meeting the homeward Main Line boat at Barbados. After completing these trips the Intercolonial steamers will have to proceed to St. Thomas to meet the next Outward bound Mail Boat. On the second voyage shown on the Time Table however it will be observed that instead of both Intercolonial steamers proceeding to St. Thomas in the manner just described, one boat will leave Barbados on the 27th of December and proceed to Demerara, and, starting from that port on the 1st of January 1911, she will return by way of Trinidad and the Islands collecting the Mails for conveyance from St. Thomas to this Country by the Main Line Packet sailing homewards from that port on the 9th of January. The other Intercolonial steamer will in the meantime have gone to St. Thomas to meet the outward Main Line Packet due on the 3rd of December and take on the mail for distribution to all the Islands and Demerara.

With reference to that part of the Time Table marked "New Service" it appears that the Company propose to employ one boat for the Intercolonial Service throughout instead of as heretofore running one steamer direct to Trinidad and Demerara while the other serves the Islands. This will place the three most important Colonies viz: Barbados, Trinidad and Demerara in the worst position. Strong representation should be made to induce the company to employ both Intercolonial Steamers for distributing the mails in such a manner that Trinidad and Demerara are served by a direct connexion with St. Thomas, while the Islands boat proceeds direct to Barbados and returns to St. Thomas via the Islands.

If this view be adopted it will be necessary to increase the speed of the Intercolonial Steamers on this service or to re-arrange the homeward sailing of the Main Line boats from St. Thomas. It will probably be found the easiest course to compromise the matter by delaying to a slight extent the despatch of the Main Line Steamer by a small increase in the speed of the Intercolonial boats to allow sufficient time for the voyage from St. Thomas to Demerara and back. According to the Company's present proposal only six days elapse between the arrival of the outward Main Line Packet at St. Thomas and the departure thence of the next homeward bound vessel. No inconvenience would be likely to arise if this interval could be increased to 7 days but this is a matter for the consideration of the Company.

In any case it can be shown that the adoption of these suggestions will increase the usefulness of the service, or in event of their rejection it will probably be necessary to divert the bulk of the mails for Trinidad and Demerara to another route.

A specimen Time Table (Marked Appendix B) illustrates the foregoing suggestions. To summarize the above remarks

(1) The Service under the old conditions must be accepted
 (2) The Service during the transition period appears to be as well arranged as circumstances will admit, the colonies receive one call only instead of a call outward and homeward and the same steamer which conveys outward correspondence collects the homeward mails, this, however, cannot be avoided and the Company's proposals should, it is thought, be agreed to.

(3) The Company's proposed Time Table for the new service of the Intercolonial steamers cannot be accepted as it gives too long a period of transit to the three most important Colonies, that is, Barbados, Trinidad and Demerara. If the Company object to a revision of this Time Table it may be necessary for this Department to require the Intercolonial steamers to connect at Barbados with the Royal Dutch or other Line from New York.

A statement marked Appendix C shows the period of transit between Southampton and the various Colonies if the Post Office proposal be adopted.

Sir,—I am directed by the Earl of Crewe to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 21st of September, in which you enclosed pro forma time tables to indicate the effect on the movements of the Intercolonial steamers of the substitution of St. Thomas for Barbados as the port of transhipment.

2. Lord Crewe is consulting the Governments of the West Indian Colonies concerned by telegraph with regard to the re-arrangement of the Intercolonial service proposed in your letter of the 12th September, and will address a further communication to you on the receipt of their replies, which they have been asked to send as soon as possible. The Court of Directors are, of course, aware that, as was stated in the letter from this Office of the 23rd of August, 1907, the consent of the legislature of Barbados to the payment of the share of the subsidy allotted to that Colony was made conditional on Barbados remaining the port of transhipment and that the combined Court of British Guiana added to their vote the proviso that if the headquarters were transferred to Port of Spain a certain specified time should be allowed to British Guiana for reply to letters.

3. I am to observe that it appears from the time tables that with the service proposed the mails would arrive at and depart from several Colonies on the same day during the transition period.

4. After the period of transition is over it would appear that the Company propose that the round voyage from St. Thomas to Demerara and back should occupy 20 days, to be followed by 8 days stay in port. The period of transit for mails from this country would be 21 days out to Demerara and 20 days home, 19 days out to Trinidad and 18 days home, and 17 days out to Barbados and 16 days home. These long periods of transit would probably prevent the General Post Office and the Colonial Post Offices from making use of the Company's steamers for mail purposes. Lord Crewe is however advised that, assuming the fortnightly Transatlantic service to be maintained, the running of the two Intercolonial steamers might be so arranged as to enable Barbados, Trinidad and Demerara to be reached in considerably less time than that indicated by the pro forma time table, and he is in telegraphic communication with the Colonies on the subject.

AS there appears to be some misapprehension in the minds of the public as to duties which should be

performed free of charge by Medical Officers and as to those which should be performed on payment, it is hereby notified for general information that Section 6 of the Medical Officers Ordinance of 1902 specifically lays down as follows:—

“The duties of each Medical Officer within his District shall be as follows”—

“(1) To afford free medical aid to all *paupers*, to all labourers' children under ten years of age, to all labourers over sixty years of age and to any destitute woman in childbirth.

“(2) to afford medical aid to any *labourer* not entitled to gratuitous medical aid under the Ordinance, who may require his services, for such remuneration as is in accordance with the table of fees fixed in the Rules made by the Governor in Council.

“(3) In cases of *sudden illness* in his District to attend and give medical aid without demanding payment. But this

THE following telegram from the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies is published for general information:—

"With reference to my predecessor's telegram of September 27 (I) have to inform you that subsidy of £55,000 in lieu of poundage payments now made by General Post Office and West Indian Colonies for direct transatlantic service with headquarters at Trinidad has been offered to and refused by Royal Mail Steamer Packet Company who ask for subsidy of £68,000. In making their offer His Majesty's Government have had in mind £15,000 offered by Trinidad and were prepared in order to meet desire of West Indian Colonies for direct communication with United Kingdom to ask Parliament for £40,000 which is more than double present poundage payments by General Post Office and will be in addition to Imperial share

of Intercolonial subsidy. His Majesty's Government greatly regret failure to secure direct communication but does not consider that the circumstances justify greater contribution from Imperial Funds. In view of long period of transit for mails to Barbados, Trinidad and Demerara provided under Company's proposals and of cancellation of homeward voyage of steamer of December 21st and further irregularities in main line service Postmaster General will now be obliged to make such arrangements as are possible for mails utilizing intercolonial steamers to the best advantage for purpose. Proposed time table sent by mail.

"As time will not permit of consultation beforehand His Majesty's Government relies on adherence of Colonies concerned to arrangements under which His Majesty's Government undertake to provide half cost of intercolonial service in expectation that other half will be paid by West Indies."

THE following Resolutions which were passed by the Legislative Council on 23rd instant, are published for general information:—

Reciprocity with Canada.

Be it resolved that this Council is of opinion that the Colony of St. Vincent should grant reciprocity to Canada generally on the lines laid down by the Royal Commissioners in Parts iv to vii of their Report on Trade Relations between Canada and the West Indies and specifically on the lines laid down in the Report of the Committee appointed by the Administrator to consider the recommendations in that connection by the Royal Commission.

Transatlantic Mail Service.

Be it resolved:—That this Council, in order to maintain a direct Mail Service between the West Indies and the Mother Country, would be willing to contribute a sum of £200 per annum towards the Royal Mail subsidy in addition to the present contribution to the Intercolonial Service.

2. This Council however although recognising the sum in question to be but an extremely small portion of the total difference of £13,000 which would have to be made up by the West Indian Colonies in order to meet the present demands of the Royal Mail Company is of opinion that, prior to the ratification of any contribution, various points of utmost importance to the West Indies in any mail contract should be considered and settled. These points are:—

- (a) The arrangement of maximum freight rates.
- (b) The period of the new mail contract which in the opinion of this Council should not exceed five years.
- (c) The revision of the Intercolonial Contract so as to make it coincident with and dependent upon the duration of the main line contract.
- (d) The mail facilities to be extended under the new contract.

3. With a view to meeting the new situation which has arisen involving considerations of grave financial and other concern to the whole of the West Indies, this Council is of opinion that a fresh conference should be convened at Barbados in order to discuss the position and to negotiate with the Royal Mail Company whereby better results may be achieved than can possibly be attained by individual action on the part of each Colony.

4. This Council also undertakes in the event of such a Conference taking place to vote the necessary sum of money to defray all reasonable expenses of delegates from this Colony.

THE following despatch from the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies is published for general information. Owing to extreme pressure of work in the Printing Office the enclosures to this despatch, which are lengthy, have not been published but may be seen at the Government Office by any person interested. Attention is drawn to the fact that the "transition period" referred to in paragraph 2 is now practically over. The Secretary of State's telegram of the 9th December already published in the Gazette gives an account of negotiations with the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company which have taken place more recently than those mentioned in this despatch.

Sir,—With reference to my predecessor's despatches of the 27th of September and 10th October, I have the honour to transmit to you the accompanying copy

of further correspondence with the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company with regard to their application for permission to connect their Intercolonial Steamers with the Main Line at St. Thomas.

2. You will perceive that the itinerary of the Intercolonial Steamers proposed by the Company in their letter of the 21st of September has been accepted, subject to certain modifications, for the "transition period" but that I have for the present withheld my consent to the itinerary proposed in connection with the Main Line Service, which is to commence on the 21st of December. During the "transition period" the outward steamer will proceed to St. Thomas, but transshipment to the homeward steamer will take place at Barbados.

3. The subject of mail communication between the United Kingdom and the West Indies is engaging the earnest attention of His Majesty's Government, and they will not fail to give careful consideration to the views of the West Indian Colonies before entering into any permanent arrangements with regard to the mail service, though it will of course be understood that I am not in a position to give an assurance that it will be possible to meet those views.

Confirmation of Minutes.

The Minutes of the preceding meeting of the 27th September and of the meeting of the 7th October last, which had been circulated among members, were, on the

motion of Mr. Shaw, seconded by Mr. Griffith, taken as read and confirmed.

Steamship Proposals contained in the Report of the Royal Commission.

The Administrator stated that a special meeting of the Council had been called to consider the following telegram from the Secretary of State for the Colonies to His Excellency the Governor:—

"Would be glad to receive as soon as possible your observations on proposals contained in Report of Royal Commission for Steamer service with Canada both with regard to original recommendations for cargo service and proposals for mail service. You should ascertain views of business community and of members of Legislature".

His Honour then touched briefly on the circumstances of the meeting of the Council held on the 7th October last, when transition arrangements were considered, and added that he had attempted to keep Hon'ble Members and the community in general in touch with events on this subject. Hon'ble Members had probably been unable to understand the recent discussion of the question in Trinidad—a discussion which was explained by a despatch which he had received on Monday night with reference to a correspondence between the Colonial Office, the General Post Office and the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, concerning a 'modus vivendi' after the steamer leaving on the 21st December had finished its round. He was not however going to ask Hon'ble Members that day to form a resolution with regard to the service proposed by the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, and by the General Post Office. This was a subject which was being seriously considered by the larger Colonies of Barbados, Trinidad and British Guiana, whose lead we could only follow. The Administrator then went on to say that while not desiring to stifle discussion on that question he would ask Hon'ble Members to confine themselves to questions raised in the telegram from the Secretary of State, and to the terms of the motion which he was bringing forward on behalf of the government. He then pointed out that the Royal Commission evolved the scheme providing for a mail service via Canada when the question of the termination of the Royal Mail contract was put forward. Hon'ble Members must ask themselves whether this Colony could be satisfied with the mail service via Canada. The whole matter rested on whether the Imperial Government would be willing to re-open the question of subsidising a direct line. The Colony of St. Vincent could not afford to make proposals for offering sufficient subsidy to sway financial considerations. On the other hand it was not wise for the Council to refuse definitely the service proposed by the Royal Commission in paragraphs 161—164 of their report.

The Resolution had therefore been so worded so as to point to the feeling which existed of maintaining a direct service.

At the same time it was not the intention to make Canada believe that there was no desire for closer relationship with her, for this was not the case. In fact, he continued, he would take this opportunity of expressing on behalf of St. Vincent the deep sense of appreciation of the paragraph in the Report in which recommendations were made for the placing of arrow-root on the Canadian free list; which recommendation, he hoped, would materialize both to the advantage of St. Vincent and that closer relationship with Canada which it was so important to foster.

The following Resolution was then formally moved:—

"WHEREAS His Majesty's Government are not prepared to ask Parliament for a further subsidy for the present direct Mail Service from and to the United Kingdom, and whereas it is highly essential to this Colony that a fast Mail Service be maintained with the United Kingdom, resolved that this Council regards with favour the alternative scheme for a Mail Service from the United Kingdom via Canada and Cargo Service from Canada as proposed by the Royal Commission in paragraphs 161—164 of their report.

"Resolved in addition that had His Majesty's Government been prepared to subsidise further the present or other direct line of Mail Service from and to the United Kingdom, this Council would have gladly accepted the proposals for a cargo and passenger service between Canada and the West Indies on the lines laid down by the Royal Commission in paragraphs 144—146 of their report, as providing a service quite suited to the needs and requirements of St. Vincent to-day and as laying the foundation for a closer relationship with Canada which it is the desire of this Colony to cultivate".

Mr. Shaw, in seconding the resolution, said that he was in perfect agreement with the words used by His Honour. Although closer relations with Canada were to be desired, yet they should not interfere with the relations between the West Indies and the Mother country. At the same time he considered that if a direct service could not be maintained, then service via Canada was the next best thing, and ought therefore to be accepted. He therefore supported the motion as expressing these views.

Mr. Simmons, seconded by Mr. Hazell, moved for leave to introduce certain amendments to the Resolution. Leave granted. He proposed to insert the word 'if' after the first "Whereas" of the Resolution, and instead of the words "regards with favour" to read "would in the circumstances regard as satisfactory." In the second paragraph of the Resolution he proposed to alter the word 'had' before "His Majesty's Government" to "were" and to leave out the word "been," and to alter "would have gladly accepted" to "would gladly accept," and at the end to add the words "But this Council again urges the importance of the maintenance of a fast direct mail service from and to the United Kingdom." The Resolution would then read as follows:—

"Whereas if His Majesty's Government are not prepared to ask Parliament for a further subsidy for the present direct Mail Service from and to the United Kingdom, and whereas it is highly essential to this Colony that a fast Mail Service be maintained with the United Kingdom, resolved that this Council would in the circumstances regard as satisfactory the alternative scheme for a Mail Service from the United Kingdom via Canada and Cargo Service from Canada as proposed by the Royal Commission in paragraphs 161—164 of their report.

"Resolved in addition that were His Majesty's Government prepared to subsidise further the present or other direct line of Mail Service from and to the United Kingdom, this Council would gladly accept the proposals for a cargo and passenger service between Canada and the West Indies on the lines laid down by the Royal Commission in paragraphs 144—146 of their report as providing a service quite suited to the needs of St. Vincent to-day, and as laying the foundation for a closer relationship with Canada which it is the desire of this Colony to cultivate; but this Council again urges the importance of the maintenance of a fast direct mail service from and to the United Kingdom".

Mr. Simmons urged that the main point was a direct service with Great Britain via Canada. Direct Service would remain in some form or other whether there was a subsidy or not. If no subsidy could be obtained, passengers would have to pay more in order to be able to travel direct. He would not like to see, he added, the suggestion of the Royal Commission shelved or abandoned.

Mr. Shaw accepted the amendments on behalf of the Government stating that they more nearly expressed his views than the original Resolution.

His Honour then put the Question, and the Amendments were unanimously adopted.

Recommendations of the Central Quarantine Authority.

Mr. Shaw, seconded by Mr. Griffith, moved for leave to bring forward on behalf of the Government a resolution which differed from that printed in the Legislative Council Minute No. 6. of 1910, but which had been decided on after further consideration. Leave granted.

The Resolution was then read as follows:—

Be it resolved—(1) That this Council is of the opinion that this Colony should agree to the renewal of the West Indian Sanitary Convention for a further period of five years from the 31st December next.

(2.) That this Council approves and is willing to adopt the attached recommendations made by the Central Quarantine Authority at a meeting held in Barbados in September 1910 for the modification of the quarantine regulations annexed to the

West Indian Intercolonial Sanitary Convention of 1904, with the exception that this Council does not see its way at present to vote the necessary sum of money for the payment of the salary of a Bacteriologist in this Colony; and further that this Council is of the opinion that no good would be gained by contributing towards the salary of a Bacteriologist stationed in any other of the Windward Islands, as it would not be possible with the available means of communication between the Islands to make any practical use of the services of such an expert.

Mr. Shaw then went on to explain that the Central Quarantine Authority has no power to alter the regulations of the Convention, but that it could only discuss and advise. Barbados objected to the present Convention on the grounds that the provisions against bubonic plague were not sufficient, and the same objections were raised by a Committee in St. Vincent of which he had been Chairman.

Bubonic plague, he continued, was primarily a disease of animals, more especially of rats, and might therefore exist in any locality more than 10 days after the last case of human plague. Plague is in this respect different from Yellow Fever, Cholera, and Small Pox.

Other Colonies had taken the same view and Grenada had actually legislated to prevent the importation of rats and other vermin, and St. Vincent ought to take similar precautions.

He then discussed the question of a Bacteriologist, and stated that the Colony was not prepared to adopt the recommendation of the Authority.

A Bacteriologist was defined by the Authority as a man who had practiced Bacteriology in England as his whole study for several years. A small Colony like St. Vincent could not afford to pay such a man £600 or £700 a year, nor would he have sufficient work to do. It had been suggested that St. Vincent might employ a bacteriologist in common with other Colonies, but His Honour had taken the opinion of Dr. Durrant on this subject, and he had reported that a bacteriologist would be of no use unless he were actually on the spot.

Mr. Shaw, in answer to a question put by Mr. Simmons, stated that the resolution agreed with the principals laid down by the recommendation of the Central Quarantine Authority.

Mr. Simmons then moved for leave to propose an amendment in order to bring the Resolution more into accord with the recommendation of the Sanitary Convention. Leave granted. Mr. Simmons proposed in paragraph 2 of the Resolution to read instead of "that this Council does not see its way at present &c." the words "that while this Council is in sympathy with the object of the proposal it does not see its way at present &c."

Mr. Shaw, seconded by Mr. Griffith, then moved the Resolution as amended by Mr. Simmons, which was unanimously passed.

Recent Defalcations in the Colony.

The Administrator then stated that before the Council was adjourned, there was one other matter to which he would like to draw the attention of Honourable Members. He much regretted to have to report serious embezzlement in the Revenue Office at Georgetown. Defalcations had taken place by the Revenue Officer, Mr. Cyril Inniss, to the extent of £689 5 6. Since the Government had become aware of them, everything had been done to secure an arrest of Inniss who had unfortunately got clean away and every effort was being made to safeguard the position of the revenue; moreover the Government was considering the possibility of safeguards for the future. His Honour went on to explain that all these frauds had been made through the Savings Bank; they had begun in 1905 and had continued ever since. He then pointed out the difficulty of obtaining suitable and trustworthy men as officers in the out districts. He proposed to ask the Council to place temporarily the salary of the Revenue Officers at Chateaubelair on the same basis as that of the Revenue Officer at Georgetown. By certain re-arrangements in the Post Office, the £9 necessary for this could be saved, and during the present financial year it would

Sir,—I have the honour to transmit to you the accompanying copy of a correspondence with the General Post Office on the subject of the proposals made to the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company for the continuation of the direct Transatlantic service to the West Indies.

2. You will have been informed of the substance of this correspondence by telegraph but you will no doubt desire to publish the text of the letters to and from the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company for the general information of the public in the Colony.

3. The letters which have passed between the General Post Office and this Department explain the circumstances in which His Majesty's Government have proposed to the Company a time table for their Intercolonial Service which I fear cannot but result in serious inconvenience to passengers. I regret this result, but the Company's action has left the Government no practicable alternative.

Sir,—With reference to recent correspondence on the subject of the determination of the Contract for the Transatlantic Service from this Country to the West Indies, I am directed to acquaint you, for the information

of the Secretary of State, that the Postmaster General has been unable to come to terms with the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, for a continuance of the Service, and I am to enclose copies of the correspondence with the Company in which an offer of an inclusive subsidy of £55,000 per annum has been made by this Department and refused by the Company.

2. As Mr. Secretary Harcourt is aware, the only other shipping Companies engaged in West Indian Trade with any degree of regularity are those of the Leyland and Harrison Lines. The vessels of these Companies are not run in such a way as to be suitable for a mail service, owing to the fact that they do not call at any West Indian Colony on the homeward voyage. The Postmaster General has ascertained that the Companies are unable to make any change in the homeward itinerary, and that any attempt to arrange a regular fortnightly departure from this Country would result in a complete dislocation of their trade, which they are unwilling to face.

3. In the meantime it appears necessary to make temporary arrangements for the mail service by employing the Harrison Line Steamer "Traveller" on the 31st of December for the outward voyage direct to Barbados to be followed by the adoption of the route of New York in conjunction with the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company's Intercolonial Service. I am to submit the annexed time table for Mr. Secretary Harcourt's consideration and I am to suggest that if approved, the Company should be instructed to comply with it.

Sir,—With reference to recent correspondence on the subject of the Transatlantic Mail Service to the West Indies carried out under the Contract of the 6th of June 1907 which terminated on the 10th of this month, I am directed to acquaint you, for the information of the Court of Directors of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, that the Postmaster General is now in a position to make a definite offer for the continuance of the service under the following conditions, viz:—

(1) As far as possible the main conditions of the late contract with regard to speed, frequency and itinerary would be adhered to, but the Postmaster General would require the Mails for the Windward and Leeward Islands and for British Guiana to be carried on to Port of Spain, Trinidad, for transshipment at that port to the Company's Intercolonial Packets. Port of Spain would thus take the place of Barbados as the headquarters of the Company in the West Indies.

(2) Due consideration would be given to the Company's commercial requirements, and such modifications as may from time to time be necessary for those purposes would be provided for in a new Contract.

(3) Payment for the conveyance of Mails by weight would cease absolutely, and all postal facilities afforded by the service under Contract would be paid for under an inclusive subsidy at the rate of £55,000 per annum.

(4) The new Contract would contain the usual provisions as to Time Tables, security of mails etc. which are common to all Contracts between the Postmaster General and Shipping Companies.

(5) The agreement would be made for a period not exceeding three years on and from the date of despatch of the first steamer from Southampton under the proposed Contract, and would be terminable at the end of that period or at any time thereafter by 6 months' notice on either side.

The Court of Directors will of course understand that this offer is subject to the approval of His Majesty's Treasury, and that no Contract will be binding until it has been approved by the House of Commons.

The Postmaster General will be glad to be made acquainted with the decision of the Court of Directors as soon as possible.

Sir,—I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter dated 22nd November 1910, intimating that the Postmaster General is now in a position to make a definite offer for the continuance of the Transatlantic Mail Service to the West Indies for a period not exceeding three years at an inclusive subsidy (that is, including the present poundage) of £55,000 per annum.

The Court of Directors have carefully considered the proposals contained in your letter, but seeing that the additional payment which you have been good enough to propose would not cover the loss which the Company sustains in carrying out the service, they regret that they are unable to see their way to accept it.

In order to put the service on a commercial basis the subsidy should be £60,000 more than the poundage payment which the Company has been receiving recently, but in view of the historic connection between His Majesty's Government, the Company and the West Indian Colonies the Court of Directors are prepared to enter into a Contract at a lower sum than they would be justified in accepting on strictly business principles. The lowest sum, however, which they can possibly accept is £50,000 more than was provided under the poundage basis.

The Court of Directors think that, on consideration, the Postmaster General will recognise that a three years' contract is far too short for the Company, which has to organise and make arrangements throughout their large system, nor does it afford the Company that stability and certainty which they undoubtedly ought to have in carrying out a contract of this nature.

The Company would submit that the contract should be for not less than ten years, but in any case it should run concurrently with the present Intercolonial Mail Service Contract and not terminate before the expiration of that contract.

Sir.—I am directed by Mr. Secretary Harcourt to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 28th of November (518096) enclosing a copy of correspondence with the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company and of the time-table of the Intercolonial service which the Postmaster General proposes to suggest to the Company in view of the failure of his effort to obtain a renewal of the direct Transatlantic service contract.

2. Mr. Harcourt has carefully considered the matter as it is clear to him that the adoption of the proposed time-table must be attended by serious inconvenience to passengers; but he recognises that the cancellation of the homeward voyage of the steamer of the 21st of December, and the probability of further alterations in the main line service affecting passenger traffic, render inevitable the withdrawal of the time-tables previously suggested by the General Post Office. In these circumstances Mr. Harcourt can but acquiesce in the efforts of the Postmaster General to make the best use possible of the Intercolonial service for mail purposes until such time as the demands of the passenger traffic produce the offer of facilities from some other source than the main line service of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company.

regarding the proposals for reciprocity as outlined by the Royal Commission in their Report on Trade Relations between Canada and the West Indies.

After congratulating the Committee on the business like way in which they had dealt with the matter before them, His Honour went on to say that the question of Reciprocity was one which, while it affected the Official Members of the Council, concerned still more nearly the Unofficials and those who were permanent residents in the Colony. A Resolution therefore on this subject would come more properly from the Unofficial side. All the various factors had been fully set forth in the Report of the Royal Commission and in that of the Committee which he had appointed; he would therefore only reiterate what had already been said in the Council, namely that if it were possible to come to reciprocal arrangement with Canada such as would benefit both the parties concerned, it was a step which should be taken as soon as possible.

Mr. Hazell, seconded by Mr. Simmons, then begged to move the following resolution. Leave granted.

Be it Resolved—That this Council is of opinion that the Colony of St. Vincent should grant reciprocity to Canada generally on the lines laid down by the Royal Commissioners in parts iv to vii of their Report on Trade Relation between Canada and the West Indies and specifically on the lines laid down in the Report of the Committee appointed by the Administrator to consider the recommendations made in that connection by the Royal Commission.

Mr. Shaw said that he would not add anything to what had already been said but that he begged to support the resolution.

Mr. Kernahan also spoke in support of it, and added that with regard to paragraph 3 of the Committee's Report, the views there set forth met with those which he had already expressed to Administrator Cameron.

The Resolution was then unanimously passed.

Science Teaching at the Grammar School.

The Administrator formally laid before the Council Legislative Council Minute No. 7 of 1910 relative to the appointment of the Resident Master of the Agricultural School as Science Master of the St. Vincent Grammar School.

It was invidious, he said, that the peasant classes only should receive agricultural education; the Government had responsibilities towards all classes. The Council had already before then all the necessary details of the scheme in the correspondence which had been laid; he considered it therefore unnecessary to give any further explanation. His Honour then moved the following Resolution which was seconded by Mr. Simmons and unanimously passed:—

Be it Resolved—“That this Council concurs in the proposals outlined in Legislative Council Minute No. 7 of 1910 for the introduction of the teaching of science in the Kingstown Grammar School and also approves of the sum of £20 being included in the annual estimates in future for this purpose and of the expenditure of the sum of £6 this year from the lapsed balances of the Imperial Grant-in-aid to Agriculture.”

The Administrator then moved that the Standing Orders be suspended in order to take a special note for £3 from the lapsed balances of the Imperial Grant-in-Aid to Agriculture. This was seconded by Mr. Simmons, and unanimously carried.

The Mail Service.

The Administrator stated that there was one other matter to be considered before the Council Adjourned. The previous evening he had received the following telegram from the Governor:—“With reference to tele-

gram from Secretary of State for the Colonies December 9th let me know as soon as possible whether Legislative Council will agree to contribution of £200 to secure direct Mail Service.” This telegram, together with that of the 9th December, had been circulated last night in order to give Hon'ble Members at least a few hours to consider so important a question.

The Royal Mail had demanded £68,000, while the Imperial Government had offered £40,000, and Trinidad £15,000, on the condition that that Colony should become the Headquarters of the Steamship Company. The question then arose how the remaining £13,000 was to be contributed; it was apparent that the Imperial Government was not prepared to go beyond its offer of £40,000 and consequently if the West Indies desired to retain a direct Mail Service, they must manage to make up the deficit themselves. Having realized that, they must go on to consider the question of how much St. Vincent itself could afford. British Guiana had offered £3,000 inclusive of poundage but they were unable to contribute any such sum in this Colony. They had been asked for £200, but this would only mean an additional £137, as £63 was already being contributed through poundage.

His Honour went on to say that he did not however consider that it was wise from a business point of view either for the West Indies to contribute £13,000 or for St. Vincent to offer £200, without first knowing exactly what they were going to get for it. If it were possible to come to some arrangement with the Royal Mail Company by which maximum freight rates would be fixed and questions of the period of contract and facilities (such as daylight service), it would be all right to pay £200 a year.

The only possible means of settling these questions and of ensuring a 'quid pro quo', was to induce the colonies to sit in conference once more as they had done a few weeks ago. The whole question affected the Unofficial members more nearly than the Official members, though the question of convening any conference would have to be left to that Colony where the conference took place. In conclusion the fact remained that St. Vincent had been directly asked by His Excellency the Governor to say if they were willing to contribute £200 in order to secure a direct Mail Service. Little time had been given to consider the question, but time was short, and during so busy a season it would not be possible to convene another meeting of the Legislative Council before the middle or end of January.

His Honour concluded by asking for an expression of views on the matter from Hon'ble members.

Mr. Simmons, seconded by Mr. Hazell, then begged for leave to move a resolution which had been so framed in order to express the view that the Colony should not be too hasty in committing itself to a definite contribution. A direct service he considered to be only worth £200 if compensations such as a daylight service and so forth were forthcoming. Moreover all difficulties, such as the fixing of freight rates, should be settled then before it was too late, while negotiations were still in progress.

He then read out the following Resolution:—

Be it Resolved:—That this Council, in order to maintain a direct Mail Service between the West Indies and the Mother Country, would be willing to contribute a sum of £200 per annum towards the Royal Mail subsidy in addition to the present contribution to the Intercolonial Service.

2. This Council however, although recognising the sum in question to be but an extremely small portion of the total difference of £13,000 which would have to be made up by the West Indian Colonies in order to meet the present demands of the

Royal Mail Company is of opinion that, prior to the ratification of any contribution, various points of utmost importance to the West Indies in any mail contract should be considered and settled. These points are:—

- (a) The arrangement of maximum freight rates.
- (b) The period of the new mail contract which in the opinion of this Council should not exceed five years.
- (c) The revision of the Intercolonial Contract so as to make it coincident with and dependent upon the duration of the main line contract.
- (d) The mail facilities to be extended under the new contract.

3. With a view to meeting the new situation which has arisen involving considerations of grave financial and other concern to the whole of the West Indies, this Council is of opinion that a fresh conference should be convened at Barbados in order to discuss the position and to negotiate with the Royal Mail Company whereby better results may be achieved than can possibly be attained by individual action on the part of each Colony.

4. This Council also undertakes in the event of such a conference taking place to vote the necessary sum of money to defray all reasonable expenses of delegates from this Colony.

Mr. Hazell begged to support the motion, adding that it was however unavoidable that steamers should go to some island on Sunday.

Mr. Shaw, speaking in support of the motion, said that the paying of the extra £187 was a matter for the Unofficial Members to consider. Personally he was sorry that Demerara had started so soon to make offers to the Royal Mail, and that matters should be forced in so hurried a manner. It would have been better first to have held another conference before offering any definite sum of money, and to have seen what offer Barbados might be willing to make in order to keep the headquarters there. If Barbados made some offer, the Royal Mail would perhaps be willing to accept lower terms. At all events it was unwise to offer a definite sum blindly without first knowing the exact terms of the contract.

Mr. Kernahan also spoke in support of the motion, and suggested that His Honour might approach the other colonies in order to convene a conference at Barbados.

Mr. Hazell asked if the Administrator knew what proportion of the £13,000 each of the colonies was going to pay.

The Administrator replied that the matter had not yet been discussed at all. The Imperial Government would safeguard the interests of the West Indies as far as possible, but as regards freight rates no steps had yet been taken to settle this matter, and it was one which the West Indies must settle for themselves. The question of headquarters had not yet been thrashed out; if a conference were to meet at Barbados it was possible that all the Leeward and Windward Islands and perhaps British Guiana as well, might demand that Barbados should be made headquarters, and this would certainly be most convenient for St. Vincent. Moreover such a conference would be able to consider matters which lay outside the province of the Imperial Government. With regard to Mr. Kernahan's suggestion, the most he could do would be to forward their Resolution to His Excellency and state that such a wish had been expressed. In order to make the effect felt earlier, the Resolution would be telegraphed by the West Indian and Panama Company, and no doubt if it appealed to the other colonies, they would take action accordingly.

On the motion of Mr. Simmons seconded by Mr. Hazell, the Resolution was then put to the vote, and passed unanimously.

Adjournment.

On the motion of Mr. Shaw seconded by Mr. Kernahan, the Council adjourned *sine die*.

REPORT ON THE POSTAL DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR
1909-10.

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
ST. VINCENT, B.W.I.,
11th June, 1910.

Sir,—I have the honour to submit the annual Report on the Postal Department of the Colony of St. Vincent and its Dependencies for the official year 1909-10, together with the annexed Returns, (15), exhibiting the postal work in its various branches.

Charge of the Post Office.

2. The administration of the Department was in charge of Mr. E. A. O. Sardine from 19th September to 10th December, 1909; during the remainder of the year it was managed by me.

SECTION I.—INLAND SERVICE.

Post Offices and Posting Places.

3. During the year under review, several improvements and additions were contemplated, but it was not found possible to bring them into effect until the following year. In consequence of the above anticipated changes not having taken place during the year, the number of Post Offices (14) and posting places (17) remained unchanged at the close of the year.

Communication.

4. The mail services in the preceding year were maintained during the year under report. The Leeward Route was performed by a five-oared boat, connecting the three Leeward Post Offices; the Windward Route by Coach, connecting the six Windward Post Offices (including Mesopotamia in the interior connecting with the Coach on the Windward Highway by a foot messenger service); and the Grenadines Route by a sailing vessel connecting the four Grenadines Post Offices and Carriacou (a dependency of Grenada). In the conveyance of the internal mails of the Colony, there was covered an estimated distance of 25,792 miles, subdivided into 17,680 miles by sea and 8,112 miles overland.

Letters and Other Articles.

5. A comparison of the number of letters and other articles received and despatched in 1909-10 and 1908-09 is set out in Table I, wherein the work done by each Office under this head is exhibited. The totals indicate an increase in both letters and other articles.

Parcels Post.

6. This service is recorded in Table II. Twenty-one parcels less were transmitted in this year, the total being 424 as against 445 in the previous year.

Registered Articles.

7. The figures for 1909-10, 1908-09 and 1907-08 are 2,351, 2,376, and 2,206 respectively. A comparison of the work done by each Office for this service in 1909-10 and 1908-09 is shown in Table III.

Money Orders.

8. Inland Money Orders to the value of £282 11 6 were issued and £281 6 0 were paid during the year as compared with £282 2 2 issued and £289 9 8 paid in the previous year. The Money Order business was carried on at five Offices other than the General Post Office, and at each of these, Foreign Money Orders are also issued and paid. Particulars of this service are set forth in Table IV.

SECTION II.—FOREIGN AND COLONIAL SERVICE.

Mail Service.

9. Throughout the year a regular fortnightly mail service was maintained, so far as St. Vincent is concerned, by the Intercolonial and Ocean Steamers of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company under contract, with the British West India Islands (except Grenada), British Guiana, Jamaica, Central America, the United Kingdom and places in transit. Two steamers specially built for the West India Mail Service, with twin screw, shallow draught, modern accommodation and equipment, commenced operations during the year. A modification was made in the Time Table fixing the hour of arrival at this port at 5 p.m. instead of at 8 p.m. and 9 p.m. This change took place on 3rd August, 1909, and has been a source of great satisfaction to the inhabitants of the Colony as well as to passengers, who are able to land in the afternoon and visit places of interest in the island.

The Pickford and Black Steamers performed the Canadian-West Indian Mail Service, calling at this port both ways at intervals of 24 days. The Steamers of the Direct Line and East Asiatic Line that called here for cargo afforded opportunities to the Mother country. Mails from the United States were conveyed principally by Steamers of the Trinidad Trading and Shipping Line, and thence by the Royal Mail Steamers. Those for the United States were despatched via Barbados and Grenada. The Steamers of the Quebec Steamship Company seldom call here from the United States; American Foodstuffs and other cargo conveyed by them for St. Vincent are landed at Barbados to be re-shipped by the island traders.

Mails from the Northern Islands for St. Vincent were landed at Barbados during the week's interval of the Royal Mail Intercolonial Mail Service and were often received here as transit Mails by sailing opportunities.

The regular means of conveyance of our Mails to Grenada in the course of the year was by the Grenadines vessel to Carriacou where it connected weekly with the Grenada coasting steamer.

Mail Conveyance and Receptacles.

10. In 1909—10 mails were received by 98 steamers and 65 sailing vessels and despatched by 109 steamers and 85 sailing vessels; in the previous year 109 steamers and 81 sailing vessels brought in mails and 111 steamers and 94 sailing vessels took away mails.

The year records a total of 2,029 mail packages handled by the Department; subdivided into:—630 bags, 11 parcels of correspondence, and 105 parcel post receptacles received; 573 bags of correspondence and 86 parcel post receptacles despatched; and 624 transit mails.

Letters and Other Articles.

11. In correspondence received, an increase in letters as well as in other articles is shown: both letters and other articles in correspondence despatched show an advance over the previous year's figures. Tables V and VI give the volume and direction of correspondence dealt with during the year, which sum up to 213,882 in number as against 203,437 in 1908—09, being an increase of 10,445 articles of correspondence handled during the year.

The total number of letters received and despatched was 161,969 ; and of this, Trinidad took the first place with a total of 47,109 or 29 % ; the second place was given to the United Kingdom showing a total of 27,790 or 17 % ; Barbados came third with 23,026 or 14 %, followed by the United States reaching 21,000 or 13 %.

Parcels Post and Import Duty.

12. The utility, convenience and facility marking this service are demonstrated by the yearly growth of the transactions as given hereunder :—

By the use of this branch of the postal work, the public are able to import at a moderately cheap rate of transmittal small quantities of articles not generally obtainable in the Colony and also, besides others, those of a fragile nature. In Table VII it will be seen that quite 63 % of the importations is recorded against the United Kingdom ; The United States taking the second place with only 15 %. The Import duty collected on 1,998 parcels and 364 other articles delivered by the Department during the year was £158 13 1 and was duly transferred to the General Revenue of the Colony at the end of each quarter as shewn in Table XV.

Money Orders.

13. The Money Orders issued in the year under review (with the exception of the United States and Canada where no British Postal Order Service was carried on), as compared with those of the previous year, show a general decrease of £704, which is accounted for by the preference of the use of the British Postal Order Service in making remittances to the United Kingdom and the British West India Islands. The United States showed an increase of £44 and Canada a decrease of £157 as recorded in Table VIII.

In Orders paid, a total increase of £233 is recorded, of which the United States claimed fully £167. The total amount of Orders paid reached the sum of £5,397, to which the United States contributed £3,203, and the United Kingdom only £452, exclusive of British Postal Orders.

In the heading United States are included remittances from the Canal Zone of Panama (a territory of the United States), where large numbers of tradesmen and labourers of this Colony from time to time emigrate in search of more lucrative employment in the works of the Panama Canal, and return to their homes at different periods.

British Post Orders and Poundage.

14. Year after year the British Postal Order Service makes steady progress. In 1909—10 there were 2,561 orders issued to the value of £1,101 0 4½ as against 2,291 to the value of £1,059 3 1½ in 1908—09. Those paid in 1909—10 reached 1,668 in number and £768 6 1 in value as against 1,459 in number and £685 8 0 in value for the previous year. Tables IX and X give the details of the different denominations of British Postal Orders issued and paid during 1909—10.

The local poundage derived from the issue of these Orders amounted to £13 13 5. To this was added the allowance made by the London Office in respect of the working of this Service, being at the rate of £1 per 1,000 Orders dealt with, which was £4 4 6 making a total amount of poundage £19 17 11. This sum was duly transferred to the General Revenue of the Colony as shown in Table XV.

Registered Articles.

15. Although remittances are mostly made by Money Orders, Postal Orders and other Bills, yet the registration system claimed an appreciable amount of responsibility in safeguarding the transmission through this medium of valuables in the nature of large numbers of American Dollar Bills and Colonial Bank Notes during the year. Table XI shows the work done in this connection. The number of Registered Articles dealt with in 1909—10 was 4,151 as compared with 4,154 and 3,596 in 1908—09 and 1907—08 respectively.

Insured Letters.

16. I feel pleased to be able to record that in accordance with the terms of the Insured Letter Agreement dated 26th May 1906, this Government effected the extension stipulated therein to the maximum limit of £400. Regulations affecting this increase and fixing the insurance fees were made by the Governor in Council on the 2nd day of September, 1909.

Owing to the Colonial Bank of St. Lucia not being the winner of a "two penny half penny" case as to establishing the legal right of the discounting of Colonial Bank Notes exchanged at a branch other than that of issue, such notes being returnable by the exchange branches to the branches of issue, greater responsibility in this service was manifested. This diversity of procedure is responsible for the large increase recorded in Table XII against the 34 insured letters despatched being of the value of £4,174, and an increase of £2,515 as compared with the value of those despatched in 1908—09. The aggregate value of insured letters dealt with was £4,804 9 0 and 41 in number as against £2,134 9 4½ in value and 27 in number. The insurance fees collected on the 34 insured letters despatched was £6 7 0.

Registered and Insured Parcels.

17. Parcels can be accepted for Registration only to the United States of America and its territories: to all other places which participate in the insurance service they can be insured; the limit of insurance is £400. In Tables XIII and XIV are to be found the figures in respect of this service, representing a total of 77 registered parcels to the value of £61 11 2 and 140 insured parcels to the value of £458 13 0 dealt with during the year under review.

Trade Charges.

18. The Cash on Delivery Service established in the latter part of 1908 and fully described in my last Report was an innovation that did not receive much attention by the general public in that year as the transactions for 1908—09 recorded only 6 Cash on Delivery parcels with Trade Charges amounting to £5 14 11. It is pleasing to note, however, that this service was attended with success during 1909—10 and as the public are learning to appreciate its use, it showed signs of advancement at the close of the year.

The number of "C.O.D." parcels dealt with during 1909—10 rose to 90, and in value £95 19 9½; the delivery fees collected on this account amounted to £1 9 8.

Returned Correspondence.

19. The returned correspondence received from abroad for return to their respective senders reached the total of 970; of these 737 were delivered and 233 were unreturnable to the writers for want of address and chiefly for want of signatures. The total number of postal articles returned to places abroad as undeliverable by the Colony was 1,201 out of a total of 129,831 articles received during 1909—10.

SECTION III.—REVENUE.

20. The Department collected the sum of £2,183 5 10 during the year under report. This amount was duly transferred to General Revenue as detailed in Table XV. The collections for 1908—09 and 1907—08 were £1,932 16 4 and £1,582 5 6 respectively. The amounts realized from Import Duty and Revenue Stamps not being revenue of the Postal Department when deducted from the above figures leave the Revenue of the Post Office as £1,615 10 3, £1,232 6 3 and £1,010 14 5 for 1909—10, 1908—09 and 1907—08 respectively.

The increase in revenue in 1909—10 is £383 4 0 or 31% over 1908—09 and £504 15 10 or 49·9% over 1907—08.

21. Postage and Revenue Stamps to the value of £1,877 10 10 were sold during the year under report. Of this amount the sales to Dealers abroad contributed no less a sum than £650 3 9 as compared with £504 0 5 in the previous year.

The Expenditure recorded was 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ % less than that of 1908—09 and as compared with the expenditure of 1907—08, 21 $\frac{1}{2}$ % more.

* Five quarters' subsidy of £100 each were paid in 1908—9, of which, payment of one quarter could have been made in 1907—08.

The excess of Revenue over Expenditure, £458 8 7, represented the gain of the Postal Department in 1909--10.

SECTION V.—GENERAL AND DEPARTMENTAL REMARKS.

Appointments, Leave of Absence.

23. Mr. E. A. O. Sardine was appointed to act as Colonial Postmaster during the absence on vacation leave of Mr. V. J. Monplaisir for eleven weeks in 1909.

Office Accommodation.

24. An enlargement of the Post Office building took place in the middle months of 1909 with the very satisfactory result of better and more suitable office accommodation existing thenceforward. The furniture in the sorting department was re-arranged to ensure greater facility and quicker despatch in dealing with the mails. The conversion of a window into a door in the Money Order Department for the convenience of the public met with general satisfaction.

Conclusion.

25. It is pleasing to me, in concluding this Report, to be able to say that the heavy responsibilities attached to this Department and assigned to the several Officers of the Postal Service of this Colony were, on the whole, satisfactorily discharged, and the work efficiently performed during the year under review.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Official Assessor
will be in attendance at the Court House in
Kingstown on Friday the 17th day of March, 1911,

It had been decided when the post of armourer in Grenada fell vacant to send a man from the Windward Islands to Enfield Lock to learn the trade who would then return and repair arms either on his visits to the other two islands, or at the armourer's shop at Grenada which was to be fitted up with all necessary tools and implements. The £28 represented St. Vincent's share of this expense of training an armourer.

The Council approved of this item.

Continuing, the Administrator explained the necessity for a House Allowance of £25 to the Sergeant-Major, as the present quarters inside the prison were totally unsuitable for a married man with a family. It was impossible to say at present what use could be made of those quarters, but they would be kept in repair, and in the case of future appointee to the post of Sergeant-Major might be used again.

After the Administrator had pointed out under *Head 11, Hospitals and Asylums*.—the necessity for attendants at the dispensaries of the Medical Officers of 3rd and 4th districts, the Council went on to the consideration of *Head 12, Poor Relief*.—Mr. MacDonald suggested that the Government should, by means of an advisory committee in each district scrutinize the poor relief list

His Honour promised to go into the matter with the Chief Relieving Officer, though he did not think it would be possible to form such a committee in all districts, for in any case he pointed out people were put on and struck off the list from month to month. The Chief Justice remarked that some years ago a Poor Law Ordinance had been passed to establish Poor Law Boards, though for some reason it had not been put into force.

Head 13, Education.—Grant-in-Aid of the St. Vincent High School for Girls.—The Administrator informed the Council of the deputation which had come to him in connection with Miss Ince's School, and the reasons why the Government desired to institute a high school for girls and to subsidise this, and the necessity for widening the scope of entry and imposing certain Regulations. The Council approved of this item.

Head 14, Post Office.—Contribution to Imperial Mail Subsidy. The Administrator formally laid before the Council further correspondence in connection with the Direct Mail Service Contract. His Honour then went on to say that the Resolution passed at the previous meeting of the Council was a conditional one. The question now to be decided was whether St. Vincent should be willing to pay the additional £137, being an increase of £200 for subsidy minus £63 hitherto paid for poundage, without getting those conditions. Mr. Simmons thought that the Council should record something to show that Trinidad had acted hurriedly in the matter of offering subsidy, and that later inconveniences would arise from that hurry. Had there been more delay better business would have been transacted.

Mr. MacDonald thought that the situation had better be accepted.

At a later stage of the meeting the following resolution moved by Mr. Shaw and seconded by Mr. Simmons was unanimously passed:—

Be it resolved.—That this Council expresses its satisfaction at the assurance of a direct mail and passenger service with the United Kingdom and is willing that this Colony's share of the £1000 to be contributed by the Windward Islands should be devoted towards making up the deficiency in the West Indian half of the Intercolonial subsidy.

The Council however hopes that the itinerary of the intercolonial boats will be so arranged as to provide an equally convenient service to this Colony to that enjoyed prior to the termination of the late Main Line Contract.

Head 14, Conveyance of Inland Mails.—The Council was informed by the Administrator that Mr. Spence's tender for the conveyance of Windward Mails which had only just been received and which was the only one sent in, was for £120 and was to provide for a service that would carry passengers and mails to Georgetown and back once a week in a covered cart with two seats one to be reserved for Government Officials. The other mails were to be carried twice a week under the same conditions as before. For the Leeward Mails it had been

decided after the inspection of boats to accept Mr. Walker's contract for the conveyance of passengers and mails in an almost new 5 oared boat for £77 whilst £2 was to be allotted for conveyance of mails from Troumaca village to the Bay. The contract for the Grenadine mails remained the same. The Administrator asked that the total be allowed to remain at £252 to allow £3 for extra mails.

The Council approved of the acceptance of these contracts. His Honour explained that the Contingencies vote had been increased from £10 to £15 to allow the Postmaster to pay more frequent visits to the district Post Offices.

Head 15, Telephone Department.—The Administrator informed Hon'ble Members that the salary of the Supervisor of Telephones had been increased from £90 to £105 which included travelling allowance. This increase had been applied for by Mr. McLeod last year, but could not then be considered. The Colony could now afford it, and it was a well deserved increase. Provision had also been made for an extra linesman at £15, in order to have a man to relieve the other 3 linesmen in case of emergencies and sudden breakdowns. The £40 for the purchase of new instruments was partly to provide for continuous ringing receivers at the exchanges and partly as an annual provision in order not to have to pay a lump sum when instruments had to be renewed.

Head 16, Miscellaneous.—With reference to the application of the Panama Telegraphic Company for an increase of subsidy from £300 to £400, the Council unanimously resolved that the following telegram be sent to the Company:—“Legislature regret unable increase telegraph subsidy owing heavier expenditure on Royal Mail subsidy and census in April next.”

In answer to question put by Mr. MacDonald the Administrator promised that he would go into the question of having the Court House insured for more than £100 and into the question of insurance generally. It was also decided that £5 should be added under this head for the Labour Bureau.

Head 22, Southern Grenadines District.—Commuted Travelling and subsistence allowance to Medical Officer, Carriacou, £20.

It was explained by the Administrator that this sum had been included in the Estimates in order to pay Dr. Hughes for the monthly visits which took him from 3 to 4 days, and for which the £2. 2/- allowed hitherto were not sufficient remuneration. This, it was hoped, would avoid the possibility of having suddenly to provide for another medical officer for the Southern Grenadines.

The Administrator then moved that the Estimates of Expenditure as amended shall stand as part of the Estimates. Mr. Shaw seconded the motion which was carried unanimously.

At this point Mr. Simmons asked to be assured that the export tax on cotton sold to the Government Cotton Factory should be paid by the grower and not by the Government.

The Administrator replied that the Government was not going to pay such initial prices to the growers that it would lose thereby, but that the prices paid would ensure the growers paying the tax.

Mr. Simmons predicted that before very long the price of cotton would suddenly fall, and asked how the Government could then avoid having to pay the tax. Continuing he said that he considered that some arrangements ought to be made by which all growers of cotton should contribute to the export tax. At any moment a sudden fall of prices might take place which no man on earth could foretell, and then the Government would have to meet the deficit and pay the export tax.

The Administrator explained that when the Co-operative buying scheme was started the price of cotton was taken at 1/6 all round; then 2 cents were deducted for ginning and baling, and the remaining 35 cents divided by 5. Next year it would perhaps be better to deduct the 2 cents, then the export tax, and then divide by 5, to ensure the tax being paid by the grower.

Returning to the detailed consideration of the Estimates, the Administrator said that there was one further matter to be mentioned; His Excellency the

2. No responsibility for any loss of, or any injury to, any animal so depastured shall attach to the Government, or to any officer, or employé of the Government.

3. The Government do not undertake that the pastures shall furnish sufficient fodder for animals, or to fix any limit to the number of animals which shall be admitted in the pastures.

4. Upon any animal being discovered in a state of emaciation, or to be suffering from any infectious or contagious disease the Ranger shall notify the owner of its condition, and request him to feed it or remove it from the pasture.

5. When the owner of an animal is unknown, the Government will undertake to supply such food as will be deemed necessary for the animal's support and all charges for the feeding and care of the animal shall become a lien on the animal so supplied. If such charges be not paid within fifteen days, the animal may be sold at public auction and the proceeds of sale be paid into the Treasury. Any surplus moneys arising from such sale after payment of all charges and expenses shall be at the disposal of the Governor in Council and may be applied for by any person who shall satisfy the Commissioner of the Southern Grenadines that he is entitled thereto within six months from the date of sale, after which time such surplus shall be appropriated to General Revenue.

6. The pasturage fees shall be payable in advance at the Revenue Office, Union Island, on a "Required to be received" form initiated by the Overseer. Such fees shall be at the following rates:—

7. The owner of any animal which may die or be injured shall remove such animal within three hours after he shall have received notification of such fact from the Ranger.

8. Should the owner of any animal which may die or be injured on the pastures fail to remove such animal within three hours after due notification by the Ranger, the Overseer shall direct the same to be disposed of in such manner as he shall deem fit, and the cost of burving or removing or otherwise disposing thereof shall be paid by the owner to the Overseer. Until the cost shall have been paid no other animal belonging to such owner shall be received, and such cost shall be deemed to be a charge upon any other animals depastured by such owner and may be recovered by sale at public auction of any of such other animals; any surplus of the proceeds of the sale which may remain after payment of the amount of such costs and of the expenses of the auction sale shall be paid to the owner of the animal or animals so sold.

9. No animal shall be tethered or staked or fastened to any fence or have any food thrown to it within twenty feet of any fence or public road.

Owners not conforming to this or any of these Regulations will render their animals liable to be removed from, and not afterwards to be re-admitted to the pastures.

10. A Pasture Book shall be kept by the Ranger in which shall be entered—

(a) Date of admission of the animal, (b) name of

the owner of animal (c) the description of the animal (d) date of removal of the animal.

11. It shall be competent for the Overseer in his discretion to refuse to admit any animal sought to be depastured on any of the pastures and to cause any animal to be removed therefrom.

The Overseer shall exercise general control over the pastures, and in his absence, the Ranger shall act on his behalf, and report any changes to him as soon after as possible.

12. Any animal may be removed at any time from the pasture by the owner, on application to the Ranger and on payment of any sum which may be due to the Government.

13. These rules shall come into force on the 1st June, 1911.

The minutes of meeting of 21st ultimo were read and confirmed.

His Honour the Administrator in a letter No. 146 of 27th February last informed the Board that a mosquito campaign and sanitary inspection for a week in each month would be undertaken by the Government around the boundaries of the Town commencing the first week in March, and asked that similar inspection be made within the Town.

The Board appreciated the action of His Honour; and was informed from the Chair that inspection of yards &c. in Kingstown chiefly by the Assistant Town Supervisor was continuous.

In a letter No. 141 of 24th ultimo the Board was informed by His Honour the Administrator, that with reference to the Board's letter No. 9 of 28th January, on the subject of the Rose Place Drain, a loan of £200, had been transferred to the Town and that the first instalment of repayment will be payable at the Treasury in January 1912.

The Chairman informed the Board that the acting Audit Clerk had recently inspected the Books of the Town and reported on certain outstanding debts, a list of which was submitted, and had also complained that

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL MINUTE.

(No. 2 of 1911.)

HON'BLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,

I have the honour to lay before you copy of a despatch from the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies relative to the Royal Mail Service and to state that the following resolution on the subject will be introduced on behalf of the Government at the next meeting of the Legislative Council:—

Be it resolved that this Council is willing to vote an aggregate amount of £600 a year as "this Colony's share of the intercolonial subsidy for the maintenance of a direct mail service with the Mother Country. Further that such contribution shall take effect from the 18th January 1911, the date of the resumption of the regular mail service to the West Indies, and shall be permanent for so long as the intercolonial and main line contracts remain in force whatever re-adjustment may take place in connection with the payments of the Colonies which are more directly concerned with the latter service".

Sir,—I have the honour to confirm my telegram of 14th instant in which I informed you that the continuance of the direct Transatlantic service was assured, and that the service would commence on the 18th instant.

The contract for the new service will be expressed to determine upon the same date as the existing contract relating to the Intercolonial service.

2. In the same telegram I intimated that, although no contribution would be required from the Windward Islands for the Transatlantic service, His Majesty's Government proposed to accept the contributions offered by the legislatures of the three Colonies and to allocate the money to the West Indian half of the Intercolonial subsidy. In the altered circumstances due to the termination of the former Transatlantic contract and the consequent re-arrangement of the service some increase of liability in respect of that subsidy must inevitably fall on the Islands which principally benefit by the Intercolonial service; and, in the opinion of His Majesty's Government, an additional contribution at the rate of £1,000 a year each may fairly be made by the Windward and Leeward Islands for this purpose. The re-arrangement of the service has involved a re-adjustment of the contributions hitherto paid by the Colonies concerned. His Majesty's Government, who are materially increasing the amount paid by them in respect of the Transatlantic service, consider it equitable that the Windward and Leeward Islands should, within the limits of their resources increase their payments to that branch of the service in which they are specially interested, as the sums voted by the legislatures of Trinidad and British Guiana have made it possible to accept the final offer of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company in respect of the Transatlantic service without calling upon the resources of other colonies. In allocating the contributions of the Windward and Leeward Islands as proposed His Majesty's Government conceive themselves to be acting in accordance with the view expressed by the legislatures of Trinidad and British Guiana, which they themselves share, that any Colony participating in the advantages of the service should bear its fair proportion of the increased cost of the service as a whole. His Majesty's Government gladly recognise the readiness displayed by the representatives of the majority of the West Indian Colonies to bear their fair share of the increased cost of maintaining direct communication with the mother country, and they do not doubt that the Legislative Councils of the Colonies under your Government will concur in the arrangement which they propose as being fair in the circumstances.

3. You are aware that when His Majesty's Government entered into the Intercolonial contract, and made themselves responsible to the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company for the whole amount involved, they did so on the understanding that one half of the subsidy would be provided by the Colonies concerned. The withdrawal of the contribution hitherto paid by Barbados on the transfer of the port of transhipment to Saint Thomas has caused a deficiency in the West Indian portion of the subsidy. This is one reason why His Majesty's Government propose to allocate the contributions of the Windward and Leeward Islands to the Intercolonial service. But to avoid any misunderstanding it is desirable that it should be understood that, in the opinion of His Majesty's Government, there are good reasons for asking these Colonies to increase their contributions to the service, apart from any considerations arising out of the undertaking to which I have alluded. The increased payments by the Windward and Leeward Islands to the Intercolonial subsidy must therefore be looked upon as a permanent arrangement for so long as the two contracts remain in force, whatever re-adjustment may take place in connection with the payments of the Colonies which are more directly concerned with the main line service. This being so, the resolutions which you will now proceed to submit to the Legislative Councils should invite authority for the payment of the increased contributions for the whole term of the contract.

4. I am aware that the payments to be made by the Colonies of the Windward and Leeward Islands will in the aggregate be somewhat larger than those for which they were responsible under the contract which terminated in 1905, but I am glad to believe that the financial ability of the Colonies to bear the call on their resources is greater than it was when the previous payments were arranged.

the Bill, and the Council could be sure that the measure would cause no discontent. Later on the Government would come to the Council for a vote of from £80 to £90 in order to bring the Bill into being. Meanwhile he would circulate the report by Mr. Ferguson, which showed that it was hoped that the introduction for this measure would not only increase the revenue, but would lighten the work of the distillers and of audit and make for greater efficiency generally.

In conclusion he would take this opportunity of publicly thanking Mr. Ferguson for his most able report and for the conscientious and energetic manner in which he had investigated the excise system.

In reply to a question put by Mr. Hazell, Mr. Griffith explained that, at present the receivers only hold about one day's distillation; it was proposed that in future they should hold about one week's, and thus the work of the Officer would be greatly lightened as he would pay less frequent visits.

Mr. Shaw said that the Bill left much of the working to Regulations and that the Regulations had been seen by Mr. Conrad Simmons on behalf of the distillers and approved by him.

With reference to the words "deficient or in excess" in section 25 subsection 3, Mr. Kernahan asked whether the rum was not measured by the Excise Officer, and whether any excess or deficiency would not be due to his fault.

The Administrator explained that the distiller or his agent would be present and able to see that the Excise Officer takes the measurements accurately.

Mr. Griffith added that a regular allowance would be made for rum which had been for any length of time in a vat or cask.

Mr. Shaw then moved that the following amendments be made:—

In Section 1 that '1908' be altered to '1911'.

In Section 2, page 3 line 38, the words from 'lodged at' down to '1908' be deleted and the words 'to be lodged at the Office of the Colonial Secretary of the Colony and signed by the Officer administering the Government of this Colony for the time being and dated the 1st day of January 1912', be substituted.

In Section 45, line 6, the word 'form' should be altered to 'from'. That Section 100 should be altered to "This Ordinance shall come into operation on the first day of January, 1912".

These amendments were seconded by Mr. Hutchinson and carried.

On motion similarly made and seconded the Council resumed and the Bill was read a third time by title and passed.

Supplementary Vote.

On motion by the Administrator seconded by Mr. Shaw the Standing Orders were suspended to allow the following Supplementary Vote to be passed—

Head 14. Conveyance of Foreign Mails £13 0 0.

The Administrator explained that £11 of this amount was payment for mails carried by the Royal Mail Steam Packet Co. from 1st January to 10th December 1910. This payment had not been claimed last year and therefore a vote had to be taken now. On this year's estimates, he added, there was no vote for the Conveyance of Foreign Mails, as the amount was being merged into the general vote for subsidy to the Royal Mail Steam Packet Co. The remaining £2 was for occasional mails by sailing vessel to Grenada and other islands.

On motion by the Administrator, seconded by Mr. Shaw, the vote was then passed.

4. On delivery of the cotton at the Factory, the Manager will issue a receipt for the number of bags and actual weight, after the latter has been duly checked. Such receipts will form the basis of all business transactions between the grower and the Factory.

5. For carefully picked and *thoroughly dried* Sea Island Cotton free from leaves, trash, etc., the charge for ginning and baling will be at the rate of two cents (one penny) per lb of lint. The seed will be returned to the grower in the bags in which his seed cotton was sent in.

N.B.—The usual proportion of lint to seed cotton is at the rate of 22 to 26 lbs of lint to every 100lbs of seed cotton. Unless the seed cotton is very thoroughly dried and well picked, beforehand, there is usually a loss in ginning ranging from 2 to 5 lbs per 100lbs of seed cotton.

6. The charge for disintegrating cotton seed for manurial purposes will be at the rate of 12 cents per 100lbs.

7. The charges for ginning and baling and disintegrating must be paid before delivery of the lint and seed from the Factory, except by those who are allowed to settle their accounts monthly.

REPORT ON THE POSTAL DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR

1910—11.

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
ST. VINCENT, B.W.I.,
21st July, 1911.

Sir,—I have the honour to submit the annual Report on the Postal Department of this Colony and its dependencies for the official year 1910—11, accompanied by fifteen Returns tabulated under the several branches of the postal work.

Charge of the Post Office.

2. Throughout the year under review the administration of the Department was managed by me.

SECTION I.—INLAND SERVICE.

Post Offices and Posting Places.

3. District Post Offices at Troumaca and Cumberland were opened on 1st April, 1910. Money Order, British Postal Order and Parcel Post Services were established at Layou on 1st June 1910, at which date, that Office was transferred from the Police to a private individual. The British Postal Order Service was established at Colonarie, Bridgetown and Barrouallie on 1st April, 1910.

The number of Post Offices during the year under report was sixteen, and posting places nineteen. There were seven first-class Offices* and nine of the second class; of the latter, three were worked by the Police.

Communication.

4. The mail services mentioned in my last report were maintained during the year with the following additions: (a) calls were made at Cumberland and Troumaca on the Leeward Coast on the up and down routes three times a week; and (b) there were six extra conveyances from Kingstown to Georgetown on the Windward Route so as to allow sufficient time to the inhabitants of that District for reply to correspondence by the return mail.

The mails of the Colony were thus internally conveyed over a distance estimated at 18,520 miles by sea and 8,200 miles overland, making a total of 26,720 miles traversed.

Letters and Other Articles.

5. It was very noticeable during the year that a large increase in inland correspondence was expected. The cotton purchasing system, the opening of a revenue office at Union Island and district post offices at Cumberland and Troumaca—all these, besides a manifest renewal of activity and prosperity among the increased inhabitants since the Soufrière Eruptions of 1902, in addition to other governmental matters and the taking of a Census, contributed towards this end.

The numerals were 121,222 as against 97,862 in 1909—10, being an increase of fully 23,360 articles of correspondence.

Table I exhibits the distribution in 1910—11 in this respect as well as that in the previous year.

Parcels Post.

6. This service was carried on at seven Offices in 1910—11 as represented in Table II. The total was 342 showing 77 parcels less transmitted as compared with the total of 1909—10.

Registered Articles.

7. The aggregate number of registered articles dealt with in the inland post in 1910—11 was 2,805 as against 2,351 in the previous year. Registered articles to and from places out of the Colony and from and to District Post Offices in the Colony are included in the figures mentioned above. The division in this service is included in Table III.

Money Orders.

8. In Table IV is recorded a comparison of the value of both inland and foreign money order transactions at the seven district post offices and the General Post Office in 1910—11 and 1909—10. As previously stated the office at Layou was, on 1st June 1910, available for the money order business; the large and appreciable transactions at that place quite justified the opening of such an office. At Union Island payment only of money orders was undertaken from 1st January to the end of the year, after this, the office became available for the issue and payment of Money Orders and British Postal Orders, and the receipt and delivery of parcels by Parcels Post.

British Postal Orders.

9. This service was inaugurated in the inland post on 1st September 1909 at the offices of Georgetown and Chateaubelair; it was extended to Barrouallie, Bridgetown and Colonarie on 1st April 1910, and to Layou on 1st June 1910; payment alone was authorized at Union Island from 1st January to 31st March 1911, thereafter the service was established in its entirety at that place.

Owing to the extension of this service in the inland post, additional accounting work was done at the General Post Office, Kingstown.

SECTION II.—FOREIGN AND COLONIAL SERVICE.

Mail Service.

10. The fortnightly intercolonial mail service linking with the transatlantic service of the Royal Mail Company was maintained during the year with the exception of a short interruption owing to the transfer of their West Indian Headquarters from Barbados to the Danish Island of St. Thomas in December, and a cessation of short duration in January, when, the ocean steamers of the Company not having called at these islands, the English Mails were forwarded by the intercolonial steamer to Trinidad and thence for transmission to England via New York by the Royal Dutch Line. Happily, this state of affairs was short-lived for the Mail Conference held at Barbados in November by Delegates from the various British West India Islands and British Guiana bore good fruit in its representation to the Mother Country of the importance of maintaining direct fortnightly communication with England; and it became possible when £20,000 was offered by Trinidad towards a subsidy as well as smaller amounts by the other Colonies and the Imperial Government's contribution of £40,000 for a contract to have been entered into with the Royal Mail Company on 18th January 1911. This Colony's subsidy of £400 has been supplemented by £200 under the new conditions.

The contract is for a period of seven years to run and terminate concurrently with the existing intercolonial contract with headquarters at Trinidad. Thus, a fortnightly mail service with the Mother Country was once more restored with the assurance of regularity and convenience. Owing to this change Barbados has entirely been cut off the intercolonial route, and intercommunication in the Windward Islands resumed.

With but few exceptions, the English and Intercolonial Mails were, as a rule, received after 5.30 p.m., and on some occasions, when the sorting of these mails extended to the small hours of the morning, the strain of night-work was severely felt.

The Pickford and Black Steamers carried on their usual 24 day service throughout the year so far as the Colony is concerned.

Additional opportunities to England were offered by steamers of the "Direct" Line and East Asiatic Line on their occasional calls here for cargo.

The mails to and from the United States were conveyed by the same route as in the previous year.

The Grenadines Mail-boat plied weekly carrying mails to and from Carriacou and Grenada.

Mail Conveyance and Receptacles.

11. The records for the year show 92 steamers and 65 sailing vessels brought mails to the Colony, and 93 steamers and 101 sailing vessels took away mails.

The Department handled over 2,000 mail packages during the year. 733 bags, 11 parcels of correspondence and 129 parcel post receptacles were received; 568 bags of correspondence and 91 parcel post receptacles were despatched; and the mails received and despatched in transit numbered 472.

Letters and other Articles.

12. In 1910-11 a total of 213,538 articles of correspondence is recorded against 213,882 in the previous year, details of which are set out in Tables V and VI. Of a total of 168,785 letters received and despatched, 51,775 were exchanged with Trinidad showing a percentage of 30.68; United Kingdom came second with a total of 29,809 or 17.66%; Barbados recording 24,534 or 14.54% occupied the third place; and the fourth place was given to the United States with a total of 20,181 or 11.96%.

The correspondence received in the Colony, 128,895, showed a distribution of 3.08 per head of the population, whilst 3.10 per head is recorded of the 129,831

articles of correspondence despatched. The population of the Colony according to the Census of 2nd April 1911 was 41,877 souls.

Parcels Post and Import Duty.

13. A steady increase attended this branch of the postal service. In Table VII are itemized the exchanges with the various places.

There were 2,193 parcels and 391 other articles delivered by the Department in 1910-11 on which Import Duty amounting to £193 19 9 was collected as against 1,998 parcels and 364 other articles delivered in 1909-10 with £158 13 1 as Import Duty.

A direct parcel post service superseding the one viâ Barbados was established with the Dominion of Canada. The new service provides for a maximum weight of 11 lbs and a reduction in the postage rates. This supplied a long-felt want and there is every indication of the public's appreciation of the new-departure.

Money Orders.

14. The total money order transactions with the United States (including the Canal Zone of Panama) showed £4,701, being an advance of £1,156 on the figures of the previous year. An increase of £278 is recorded against the United Kingdom, the total transactions of which in 1910-11 were £1,448. On the whole the increase was £1,563 over 1909-10, and £978 over 1908-09. Table VIII fixes the sources of the various amounts issued and paid. The aggregate value of money order transactions is represented by the very creditable sum of £9,386 7 1.

British Postal Orders and Poundage.

15. The public has been enabled to make more advantageous use of this service since its admission to internal exchanges. 3,280 postal orders to the value of £1,410 6 11½ were issued and 1,889 to the value of £834 6 8 were paid in 1910-11 as against 2,561 to the value of £1,101 0 4½ issued and 1,668 to the value of £768 6 1 paid in 1909-10, resulting in a total increase of £375 7 2 for the year. The values principally favoured in the transactions of 1910-11 are the four shillings and the twenty shillings. The numbers of the various denominations issued and paid may be seen on reference to Tables IX and X.

16. The allowance received from the London Office in this system was £5 3 6 which added to the local poundage of £19 17 8 gave a total of £25 1 2 representing the full poundage included in Table XV and transferred to General Revenue.

Registered Articles.

17. In the registration system 4,269 articles were transmitted in 1910-11 recording an increase of 118 registered articles over the figures for the previous year as marked out in Table XI.

To all appearances the transmission of American Dollar Bills, Colonial Bank Notes and other valuables through this channel was in no wise decreased during the year.

It is satisfactory to note that there has been no instance of any loss in the

service in 1910-11, thus maintaining the standard of efficiency in this branch during the period of my administration.

Insured Letters.

18. There were 16 insured letters value £1,796 14 2 received and 7 insured letters value £554 13 4 despatched in 1910-11. Table XII gives a comparison of the exchanges in this system.

The large decrease in value of the insured letters despatched is due to the Colonial Bank having made use of the parcel post service for the transmission of their bank notes. In the aggregate, 23 insured letters were dealt with representing a sum total of £2,351 3 2. The amount of insurance fees collected on the 7 insured letters despatched was 18/-.

Registered and Insured Parcels.

19. The registration of parcels carried on only with the United States of America and its territories records 79 registered parcels received as compared with 73 in the previous year and 53 in 1908-09 with the corresponding values of £62, £60 and £48 respectively. The number and values of the despatches are set out in Table XIII.

20. There were 147 insured parcels value £2,761 dealt with in 1910-11 as compared with 140 value £460 and 175 value £752 in 1909-10 and 1908-09 respectively. The large value of insured parcels despatched in 1910-11 as shown in Table XIV is due to the Colonial Bank having made use of the insured parcel post system for the transmission of their bank notes as already pointed out in a previous paragraph.

Trade Charges.

21. Not a single Cash on Delivery packet has been posted in this Colony since the establishment of the service on 1st September 1908; but its growth as far as those received are concerned is proof of the appreciation of its use by the public; and from personal observations, there is every indication to anticipate a large development in this business.

Of the 209 "C.O.D." packets received, the Department effected delivery of 206 on which Trade Charges amounting to £232 1 8 were collected, and no less than 170 remittances were made. Two of the remaining "C.O.D." packets were redirected to Barbados and Grenada respectively, and the other returned to the sender in England.

Apart from the monetary and other responsibilities attendant in this direction, the undertaking has, of necessity, claimed much time and labour from the officers of the Department during the year. The service was extended on 1st November 1910 to Barbados, Jamaica, Leeward Islands, St. Lucia, and Trinidad and Tobago.

Returned Correspondence.

22. A total of 3,435 postal articles fell in the Dead Letter Branch; of these 1,795 were returned by the Colony to their respective places of origin; and 1,304

of the 1,640 received in the Colony from abroad were returned to the writers, and the remainder was treated as unreturnable.

The total in 1909-10 was 2,171 being 970 received from abroad and 1,201 returned to places abroad.

SECTION III.—REVENUE.

23. The total revenue received in 1910-11 was £2,031 7 6. A sum of £388 5 4 for Revenue Stamps in addition to £193 19 9 for Import Duty, collected by the Department, was duly transferred to General Revenue of the Colony and is included in Table XV. The net revenue of the Department therefore was £1,449 2 5.

All the various heads of revenue in 1910-11 with the exception of the first show an increase over those of the previous year. The decrease appearing in the first head is explained in the next paragraph.

Stamp Dealers.

25. The sales of stamps to dealers abroad realized during the year a sum of £508 0 10, being a decrease of £142 2 11 as compared with the sales in the previous year. This is principally due to less sales of 2/- and 5/- stamps in 1910-11, which values in 1909-10 were printed in new colour ink on coloured paper and, being new, produced increased sales to Dealers. The decrease in sales to dealers is mainly responsible for the decrease shown in the first head of revenue in the preceding paragraph. In 1910-11 there were supplied 174 orders for stamps from Dealers abroad as against 164 in 1909-10. Care and attention to a very great degree had, as usual, to be exercised in the execution of these orders. New regulations affecting this head were made on 20th September, 1910.

SECTION IV.—EXPENDITURE.

26. The total expenditure of the Department in 1910-11 was £1,212 11 0 and was divided into £375 17 2 as salaries and £836 13 10 as working expenses. The amount for salaries was allotted to ten Post Officers in the district parts and to five Post Officers (including the Colonial Postmaster) at the Central Office. The amount for working expenses included conveyance of mails in and out of the Colony, and represented 69 o/o of the total expenditure.

SECTION V.—FINANCIAL RESULTS.

28. Notwithstanding a diminution of £183 16 8 in sales of postage stamps and an increase of £55 9 4 in expenses as compared with the figures of 1909-10, the financial condition of the Department at the close of the year was a healthy one. The result on the year's working consequently shows £236 11 5 as a surplus of revenue over expenditure.

The surplus in the previous year was £458 8 7: the Department therefore has contributed to the Colony's chest the substantial sum of £695 in two consecutive years.

Payment of about £37 being the proportion from 18th January to 31st March 1911 of an additional subsidy of £200 per annum to the Royal Mail Company will appear in the following year as payment for one quarter usually takes place in the quarter next following. A sum of £41 was voted for this additional subsidy in 1910-11 and remained untouched at the close of the year.

SECTION VI.—GENERAL AND DEPARTMENTAL REMARKS.

Appointments.

29. District Post Officers were appointed as follows :—

On 1st April—Mr. N. Blencowe at Cumberland and Mr. T. W. Clarke at Troumaca; on 1st June—Mrs. Jestina Lyndsay at Layou; and on 1st January—Mr. H. E. A. Daisley at Stubbs.

Mr. L. M. Merrick was appointed on 8th November to act as clerk in place of Mr. Egerton A. O. Sardine transferred to the post of Revenue Officer, Leeward District.

Leave of Absence.

30. Mr. Sardine obtained leave of absence for 12 days from 23rd August; and on 10th December a period of three months followed by an extension of three more months was granted to Mr. F. A. Thompson, District Postmaster at Bridge-

town, whose duties during the said period were performed by Miss Gertrude Thompson.

Staff.

31. At the General Post Office the staff consisted of one Clerk, two Assistants and one Postman; and an extra assistant for the nocturnal sorting of the fortnightly English and Intercolonial Mails was, from 6th July, added to the staff. In the Districts the services of 2 Revenue Officers, 3 Police and 10 private individuals were enlisted.

Consequent on the loss of a trained and valuable officer in November, a change in the limited staff at the Head Office took place; nevertheless, the work of the Department was carried on, under my immediate direction, with commendable results; and I now record my appreciation of the zealous and satisfactory manner the officers of the Department, in general, performed their respective arduous duties.

THE EXCISE ORDINANCE 1911.

Conditions imposed by the Governor in Council under Section 14 of the Ordinance, governing indulgences to dispense with certain requirements of the Excise Ordinance, 1911.

1. Permission to dispense with the spirit store, spirit vat, and close metal pipe leading from the spirit receiver to vat in store as required by Section 21 of the Ordinance and Section 11 of the First Schedule thereto will, on the recommendation of the Chief of Excise, as a rule be granted, provided that there is erected at the distillery—
 - (a.) A Spirit Receiver capable of holding at least 6 days' distillation.
 - (b.) A Storage Tank of greater capacity than the Spirit Receiver.
2. All the spirits in the Receiver, after an account thereof has been taken, must be immediately removed direct to the Storage Tank, except as provided for in clause 3.
3. On notice being given, and subject to the regulations governing removal into packages, a distiller may fill packages from the Spirit Receiver, but the Receiver must in such case be completely emptied by transferring the balance or remnant therein to the Storage Tank.

His Honour also moved that the Hon'ble J. G. W. Hazell be appointed as the Commercial Adviser referred to in the Secretary of State's despatch. He regarded it as highly important that a member of the commercial community should accompany the representative. A great many points might arise in which he could give invaluable assistance to that officer. He also believed that at least one man of commerce in St. Vincent should come into contact with and gain experience of the conditions existing in Canada to-day.

Mr. Simmons said it gave him much pleasure to second both motions and added that he did not think that two better representatives could have been chosen.

Mr. Hazell thanked the Administrator and the Council for the confidence reposed in him and said that although he felt a little diffident about going into the cold weather of Canada he hoped that by the time they got there the worst portion of it would have passed and that his health would allow him to go when the time came.

Mr. Griffith also expressed his thanks to His Honour for nominating him as representative of the Colony and to the Council for supporting it. He sincerely appreciated the honour he said and hoped that the step it was proposed to take would eventuate in considerable gain to the community.

The motions were then formally put and carried unanimously.

Appointment of Committee.

The Administrator said there was one other point connected with this matter and that was the appointment of a committee to draw up instructions for the guidance of the representative at the Conference. A Committee had sat and reported some time ago on this question of Reciprocity with Canada, and with this report to go on the work of the new Committee should not be very difficult. He moved that His Honour the Chief Justice, and the Hon'bles F. W. Griffith, Conrad J. Simmons, J. G. W. Hazell and F. A. Corea should form the new committee.

Motion seconded by the Acting Attorney General.

Mr. Hazell moved that the Hon'ble D. A. MacDonald, who would be back by that time, and the Hon'ble R. E. Noble should be included in the Committee. Seconded by Mr. Griffith and carried.

The original motion was then put and carried.

On the termination of Messrs. Pickford and Black's contract last year, he had received an intimation from Mr. Pickford that unless St. Vincent would agree to pay a subsidy to his company the service of their steamers to the Colony would cease.

The Governor was communicated with and His Excellency succeeded in inducing the Company to continue their calls at this port for three months until something definite could be settled, on the understanding that subsidy at the rate of £300 per annum, which Hon'ble Members at an informal meeting had expressed their willingness to pay, would be forthcoming.

Some dissatisfaction had arisen over the manner in which this service had been performed, and the Company, as the result of subsequent negotiations, had agreed

to accept the reduced sum of £31 5 0 for the calls of their ships during the period from June to August.

An arrangement had also been made with them to continue the service from 18th October, 1911 until June this year for subsidy at the rate of £300 per annum, and the second vote for £136 5 10 was the sum required to pay this subsidy up to the end of the present financial year. Provision would be made in next year's estimates for the proportion due for the period from April to June, 1912.

His Honour then moved the suspension of the Standing Orders to enable the votes to be taken at this meeting. Motion seconded by Mr. Shaw and carried without dissent.

On motion similarly made and seconded the two votes were then formally passed.

Mr. Hazell asked if it was known whether a better Steamship Service between Canada and the West Indies would be provided, and whether it was intended to vote the expenses of the Delegates to Canada at this meeting.

The Administrator said he was afraid he was unable to give the Hon'ble Member any information on the first point. He had certainly heard the rumours that many other people had heard, but all he knew was that the present contract would terminate on 30th June. As to whether it would be replaced by a better service it was probable that the Hon'ble Member, in the course of his visit to Canada, would be likely to learn something definite about it sooner than he would.

In regard to the second enquiry the question of expenses was being arranged and he would have to refer his proposals to the Governor for approval before bringing them formally before the Council.

Adjournment.

The Council was then adjourned *sine die*.

REGULATIONS made by the General Health Authority under the authority of Section 55 of "The Public Health Ordinance 1910".

1. In the event of the occurrence within the Colony of any case or cases of infectious disease notifiable under any law for the time being relating to Quarantine it shall be the duty of every Local Sanitary Authority to at once notify the General Health Authority what special steps they propose to take within their district to prevent the occurrence of or check the spread of the disease.

2. In the event of the General Health Authority not being satisfied with the sufficiency of the steps so proposed to be taken the General Health Authority may appoint during such period as they may think fit such special Sanitary Inspectors or Officers for any sanitary district as they may consider necessary, who shall have all such powers within such district as they would have had under the provisions of the Public Health Ordinance, 1910, had they been appointed by the Local Sanitary Authority for such district and shall be under the control and direction of the General Health Authority.

On re-assembling the consideration of the Estimates of Expenditure in Committee was proceeded with.

Head 14. Post Office. Total £1,776. The first change in this head, the Administrator said, occurred in the salary of the Clerk, which had been raised to £72. It had originally been placed on the incremental system going from £50 to £72 by £7 6 8 per annum but it was now deemed expedient to give the Clerk the maximum pay straight away. His position was one of considerable pecuniary responsibility, as much as £800 to £900 passing through his hands in some months. It was not fair to give an Officer possessing such responsibility a salary of £50 per annum and he asked the Council to agree to the change.

It was also proposed to appoint an Assistant Clerk at £30 per annum and increase the salary of the clerical assistant.

A third point related to the vote for Conveyance of Mails. The cost of the service this year would be £252. Next year however the vote would have to be £300 to meet the increased cost of the carriage of mails on the Windward Route. There was only one person willing to tender for the conveyance of mails on this route. This person who was the present Contractor, had found it impossible to carry out his Contract satisfactorily in the manner tendered for on account of the growth in quantity of the mail matter to be carried and had intimated that it was impossible to go on at this year's figure of subsidy. He had however consented to provide an improved service for a sum of £175 per annum. Under the new arrangements the mails would be carried by trap and by horse. In the mail week they would go out to Georgetown on Wednesday by horse, which would return on Thursday afternoon. On the morning of Thursday a covered conveyance, with accommodation for two passengers would go out. On Friday the mails would go out by horse. On Saturday morning the covered carriage would come in from Georgetown and in the afternoon of that day the horse which went out on Friday would return, thus allowing the inhabitants of Georgetown and the Windward District several hours more for replying to their correspondence. In the off week, and on Mondays and Tuesdays of the mail week, the mails would be carried out and in by trap on alternate days. This was the best arrangement the Government could make and he asked the Council's approval thereof. It had been suggested that this contract should run for two years instead of one as formerly and negotiations to that end were proceeding.

The Vote for "Supply of Stamps" had also been increased to meet the cost of a new issue with the King's Head as design. His Majesty had intimated his wish that his effigy should be adopted as the design for stamps and St. Vincent was no doubt very anxious to fall in therewith. At the same time there was a feeling that it would be a pity to discontinue altogether the present allegorical design so the Government had decided, and he now asked the Council's ratification thereof, to adopt the new design for the values from $\frac{1}{2}$ d to 1/- and to retain the allegorical design for the higher values up to £1. By this arrangement the stamps that were used mainly for postage purposes and which went out of the Colony would have on them the effigy of His Majesty while those used chiefly for revenue purposes would remain as at present. The sum put on the Estimates was based on the cost of the new issue of 1902 and he hoped it would suffice but the Crown Agents had been asked to furnish exact figures. The expenditure would be recouped by the sale of the new stamps.

With respect to the item "Purchase of Yale Letter Boxes", there was at present a larger demand for boxes than could be supplied so it was proposed to purchase another nest of Yale Boxes and do away with the present wooden ones which took up more space than the Yale Boxes. The cost, £56, would be defrayed from rents in 6 years.

On motion by the Administrator seconded by Mr. Shaw the head was ordered to stand part of the Estimates.

Mr. MacDonald moved that the salary of the Medical Officer, Kingstown District, be made £350 and that his horse allowance be abolished. Seconded by Mr. Corea.

Mr. Griffith pointed out that in taking this action Hon'ble Members might be spoiling the chance of all Medical Officers getting horse allowances in the future.

Mr. MacDonald could not agree with the Chief of Police. He had already asked that horse allowances might be extended to all Medical Officers. This particular allowance however had been started for a special purpose, which was now to be discontinued, and under the circumstances it would be impossible to have two medical officers drawing the same allowance for performing the same work.

Mr. Kernahan took it that Dr. Durrant, as Adviser to the Government on medical questions, under the new arrangement would have to visit other districts, and pointed out that he would then be without a travelling allowance.

His Honour replied that this allowance would cover all travelling, whereupon Mr. MacDonald said that if the allowance was given to him for that purpose there was some reason in it and he therefore withdrew his amendment.

The original motion was then put to the vote and was agreed to without dissent.

Head 13. Capitation Fees to Head Master, Grammar School, £50.—This increase, the Administrator explained was due to an augmentation of the number of boys admitted. On motions by His Honour, seconded by the Treasurer, the increase was agreed to and the necessary changes in totals of the head made.

Head 14. Supply of Stamps.—The Administrator informed the Council that the Crown Agents estimated that the new supply of King's Head stamps would cost £278. He therefore moved the increase of the vote from £250 to £280. Seconded by the Treasurer and agreed to. Necessary changes in totals effected on motions similarly made and seconded.

Head 15. Telephone Department.—Mr. MacDonald pointed out a mistake in the total of the "Personal Emoluments" portion of this head. £308 should be £318. It did not affect the grand total. Change made.

Mr. Griffith asked whether there was any possibility of extending the telephone line to Owia. It was needed and the people of that district would be grateful for the facility.

The Administrator said it had been thought of but he had not been able to make the proposal yet. It might be dealt with in next year's estimates.

Head 16. Subsidy for Canadian Steamer Service.—The Administrator said Hon'ble Members had already informally agreed to the extension of the contract until the end of December, 1912. He moved the increase of the vote for subsidy to £225. Seconded by the Treasurer and formally agreed to.

Head 16. Expenses of investigating possibility of establishment of a Sponge Industry in the Grenadines, £50.—This vote also had already been informally approved. He now moved its formal insertion in the estimates. Seconded by the Treasurer and agreed to.

Head 16. Re-erection of the Royal Arms on the Court House Gate, £12.—It had been recommended by the Committee appointed last year to report on Historic Sites and Monuments that the Royal Arms should be re-erected over the Court House Gate. Enquiries had been made and it was found that suitable Arms made of a material known as "fibrous plaster" could be obtained for a sum of £7 10 0. Arms made out of terra cotta were far too expensive and iron would not suit. He would not go so far as to say that "fibrous plaster" would prove absolutely satisfactory but it was so cheap that it was worth risking. He therefore moved the insertion of a vote of £12 to obtain and erect these Arms. Seconded by the Treasurer and agreed to.

Head 16. Grant to St. Vincent Fine Needlework Industry, £15.—The object of this grant, the Administrator explained, was to assist the Committee which fostered the industry to pay a small regular salary to their Secretary and to meet certain other minor expenses, and he thought it

producers of this article if a market could not be found for it. The owner of the Carib Country for instance under such circumstances had better give up cultivating the article. He was not one of those people who believed that sugar cultivation in this Colony was dead. He believed that there was a future before it and if we gained nothing else by the Agreement we would secure a market for our sugar. Arrow-root also would benefit. It was possible that it would be quite worth our while to put it into the Canadian market in time to come.

There was also the question of Steamship Communication. The Canadians were not going to establish trade relations with us without providing the means of carrying it on. We were bound to have steamship communication with Canada and those people who made use of the present service, poor though it was, held that we could not possibly do without it. For St. Vincent to lose the opportunity of participating in this service would he thought be a serious mistake.

Apart from this phase of the question, there was to be considered the money which the calls of such steamers brought into the Colony and the employment they created. He had recently gone closely into the matter. Stevedores, boatmen, porters and clerks, not to speak of the Agents, all benefitted from the calls of the Pickford and Black steamers. The Government derived at least £150 per annum in tonnage and other dues, and the Company, he thought, must spend at least another £800 in the Colony one way and another. In other words if these steamers ceased to call here close on £1,000 per annum now put into circulation would be lost to the Colony.

He then moved the following Resolution :—

“*Be it resolved* that this Council approves of the Agreement between Canada and certain of the West Indian Colonies entered into at Ottawa on the 9th April, 1912, for the mutual preferential treatment in regard to Customs duties and rates of certain specific articles set forth in the schedules to that Agreement, together with all the other conditions contained in that Agreement, and further approves of granting the same preference on similar articles imported into this Colony from the United Kingdom and Newfoundland as will be granted to Canada on the same articles under that Agreement.

“Further, that this Council approves of the introduction and promulgation of such legislation as may be necessary to ratify legally and to bring into force and operation in this Colony, the aforesaid Agreement”.

In seconding the motion, Mr. Hazell begged to endorse a good deal of what had been said by Mr. Griffith. While in Canada he had been very much impressed by the eagerness shown by Canadians to have our trade. Each day this trade increased. Especially so was this in regard to flour. A few years ago all our flour came from the United States ; now the whole of it, besides oats and other cereals came from Canada. If the benefits to be derived in St. Vincent from reciprocity were not immediately seen they would, he thought, be very generally felt in the long run.

The Administrator said that he did not think that the motion should be put to the vote to-day. The question was one of such importance that Members should have a full opportunity of considering the matter with their colleagues in business outside of the Council and generally to take the feeling of the public.

The Agreement itself had not been made public until to-day. It was generally known that an Agreement had been signed but the details had not been given out. It was not right therefore to pass it out of hand. He proposed therefore after a few remarks regarding the legislation that would be necessary if the Agreement was ratified that the House should stand adjourned until Monday the 8th July at 11.30 a.m.

The Bill which accompanied his Minute No. 5 provided for the adoption of the Agreement. One of its features was that it preserved the principle adopted in the Customs Duties Ordinance of 1895 of amending the Tariff by means of Orders-in-Council which had to be laid before the Legislative Council and published in the Gazette for a month before coming into operation. This was

He did not think there were any specific points that needed dealing with to-day, the various details having been explained at the last Meeting. If the Resolution was passed therefore he proposed to introduce the Bill and to leave it at that stage while it was being referred to the Secretary of State for approval. It was probable that the Agreement would not come into force until the 1st January next so there was no need for hurry. Time was also needed to enable the negotiations with British Guiana and Barbados in regard to Biscuits, Shingles and Arrowroot to be carried out and then all the tariff changes could come into effect simultaneously.

He would now therefore put to the vote the Resolution which was before the House and he hoped that the decision they had come to, would turn out to be as Mr. John Burns, President of the Local Government Board once said to him, a "wise, just and pre-eminently Scotch decision".

The Resolution was then put to the vote accordingly and was carried unanimously.

The Customs Duties Ordinance, 1912.

On motion by Mr. Noble, seconded by the Treasurer, leave was granted for the introduction of a Bill for "An Ordinance to amend 'The Customs Duties Ordinance, 1895' and to give effect to the Canadian-West Indian Reciprocity Agreement signed at Ottawa on the 9th April, 1912".

Steamer Service between Canada and West Indies.

Mr. Corea said he had noticed in the Report of the proceedings of the Conference circulated to Members a suggestion that the proposed steamer service should be a trunk line to the larger islands with intercolonial connections to the smaller islands. This he said was not suitable to the smaller islands on account of damage to goods in transshipment and the increase of freight rates such transshipment was bound to cause. He desired therefore to move the following Resolution:—

"Be it resolved that in any arrangements for the establishment of a new Steamship Service between Canada and the West Indies, an essential feature of the agreement should be the provision of a Direct Line of Steamers between Canada and this and the other smaller Colonies, and that the Scheme for a Trunk Line Service to Barbados, Trinidad and British Guiana with Intercolonial vessels running to the other Colonies would prove quite unsuitable, owing to the losses which would be incurred by the damage (as a result of the necessary additional handling during transshipment) to the class of goods which will be shipped between the two places.

"And be it further resolved that steps be taken to communicate a copy of this resolution to the Government of the Dominion of Canada".

Mr. MacDonald seconded the motion which he thought deserving of support. It was impossible of course to say whether the resolution would receive the consideration hoped for it. The matter had been more or less thrashed out already. He noticed in the Report that the Trinidad Representative had stated at the Conference that the disadvantages as to transshipment could be got over. It did not follow that the care observed at Trinidad in the transshipment of goods for Venezuela would be taken with goods for other places and in regard to the ill-treatment of cargo in transshipment he could speak from experience. We ought to stand out for getting more under the contemplated steamer service. As it was, freight rates to St. Vincent by the present line were considerably higher than they were to the larger islands and it was safe to conclude that with an intercolonial service they would increase.

Mr. Kernahan said he supported the Resolution very heartily. It was very necessary to have a direct service both ways to prevent damage to goods. An article which would suffer especially from transshipment was fancy molasses. This took very careful handling and transshipment would certainly result in considerable

loss to the shippers. As regards goods coming from Canada, flour was shipped in bags and was liable to plenty of loss in handling. It was very essential to ask for a direct service and he hoped that the Canadian Government would see their way to grant the request.

Mr. Griffith was entirely in accord with the Resolution. The losses that occurred in transshipment were untold. In a recent news telegram he had noticed that tenders had been called for a service "to all the islands". The Canadian Government, he thought, understood that these islands would object to a trunk line system.

Mr. Hazell thought we were asking for something we would not get. We could hardly expect the transatlantic boats of the Royal Mail line to come to St. Vincent. Although he supported the Resolution he did not look to a successful result.

The Administrator thought the Resolution a highly important and necessary one. Not only was opinion in Canada favourable to a trunk line with inter-colonial connections but that system seemed to be viewed with favour in some of the West Indian Colonies also. He was quite in accord with the Hon. Members who had urged the great inconvenience and loss that would result from such a system. As regards Mr. Hazell's point he did not think the Royal Mail and Canadian Steamer Services were on all fours in the matter. The former came straight across the Atlantic and struck the islands in the middle and it would be difficult for that reason for them to feed these islands without an intercolonial subsidiary service. The Canadian line on the other hand came down the whole line of islands one after the other. The suggestion put forward from this Colony in regard to a steamer service at the time of the Royal Commission seemed to be the one for the Canadian Government to consider. He would forward the Resolution to the Secretary of State with pleasure and if possible he would get the other small Colonies to co-operate so as to make the representation to the Canadian Government more effective.

The Resolution was then formally put to the vote and passed unanimously.

The "Shakerism" Prohibition Ordinance.

The Administrator asked for leave to introduce a Bill for "An Ordinance to render illegal the practice of 'Shakerism' as indulged in in the Colony of St. Vincent".

The practice of Shakerism had been indulged in for many years and the Government and all respectable people had viewed it with disfavour. No action had been taken to deal with the nuisance because it was hoped that with the aid of material progress, the spread of education and the general increase of moralising influences it would disappear and its adherents join the various Christian denominations. But, far from disappearing, there was evidence that the practice was on the increase and, at night, those who lived in the vicinity of meeting houses might listen to sounds which reminded them of the habitations of savages.

He regarded the practice as a relic of barbarism, an appanage of paganism, a blot on our civilization and a stain on the history of the Colony. The day had come, he thought, when all the inhabitants of St. Vincent would co-operate with the Government in stamping it out and he therefore now begged leave to introduce the Bill. It was not his intention to proceed with the measure at this sitting but to suspend action in regard to it for 7 or 8 weeks so as to give an opportunity to people to consider whether the time had not come for them to cease being partakers in shakerism. In the meantime he would ventilate the Bill and acquaint people with the penalties to which they would become liable if they did not take steps to separate themselves from the sect.

He did not wish anyone to think that the Government had any objection to ordinary decent and respectable prayer meetings. But the Shaker meet-

Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies for transmission to the various Governments concerned.

A Duplicate copy was handed to each Representative for transmission direct to the Colony represented by him. This copy has been already duly forwarded.

A Resolution on the subject of improved Cable and Telegraph communication was moved by Mr. E. J. Cameron, seconded by Mr. Auchinleck and adopted by the Conference. A copy of this Resolution is attached.

Report of the Sub-Committee of the West Indian Section on Steamship Communication.

The West Indian section of the Select Committee appointed to report on the question of steam communication between Canada and the British West Indies regard the establishment of a suitable steam service as altogether essential for the successful maintenance and progress of a trade compact between these two places and the drawing together of the two peoples.

2. The history of previous steam services and contracts dating from 1900 to 1910 is contained in the Report of the Royal Commissioners on Trade Relations between Canada and the West Indies, Part XII pp. 29 to 36.

With the general views of the Commissioners as there expressed the West Indies are in substantial agreement.

3. The service as performed in the past and the class of boats employed have been very far from satisfactory, and as far as passenger traffic is concerned, have given no stimulus whatever to increased intercommunication, while in the matter of trade facilities there have been frequent complaints.

4. At the present time the position as regards payment of any subsidy is, that the Imperial Government have discontinued the subsidy formerly contributed by them and the burden is on the shoulders of the Canadian Government alone. The West India Islands make no contribution save that the islands of St. Lucia and St. Vincent which were excluded from the latest itinerary recognizing the value of the connection and desiring to preserve continuity in the hope of an early more satisfactory adjustment of the matter, agreed in September last to jointly contribute at the rate of £800 per annum to secure the call of a boat every 22 days giving both cargo and passenger accommodation. Such arrangement being however binding only up to June next, at which date the present temporary compact with the Canadian Government for continued subsidy will it is understood expire.

5. The subject was discussed by the West-Indian representatives and their advisers during the voyage to New York, and there was full concensus that no contract would be satisfactory which did not provide for a service to be performed by vessels specially built for the trade. Such vessels should be what are known as "Tween decks" boats capable of *maintaining* a speed of at least 11 knots throughout the voyage of from 1600 to 2000 tons net tonnage with accommodation for 30 to 36 first class and 20 second class passengers.

That freight rates should be under control is a *sine qua non*.

This represents the minimum requirement of the present day. As to itinerary what is known as the St. Vincent plan which commended itself to the Royal Commissioners appears to have considerable points in its favour, although it is not improbable that some modification in connection with the duration of the calls at the large islands in view of future trade developments may be necessary. Some revision from the practical steamship running point of view may also be found expedient.

6. With regard to the amount of any subsidy that it may be requisite to provide, it is unlikely that the West India Colonies could at the present time put up any appreciable sum. The larger islands are already paying very considerable subsidies for the Royal Mail Steam Packet Companies Ocean and Intercolonial Services, amounting in the case of Trinidad to £18,000 and British Guiana £7,700, and Barbados £4,000 per annum while the smaller colonies are all contributing within the full limit of their existing revenue capacity and these obligations are an enduring quantity until at least the year 1917.

7. In the absence of any assistance therefore from the Imperial Government in this connection the question becomes a very difficult one and in view of this fact and the strong representations of the Royal Commissioners on this subject (vide paragraphs 155 and 160 of their Report) it can but be hoped that the latest decision is open to consideration.

8. It may be well to mention that Mr. A. H. Harris of the C. P. R. at a meeting of the Committee of the representatives unfolded a project for the establishment of a first class steamship service between Canada and the West Indies including inter alia due provision for passengers, mails and cargo, with guaranteed minimum ocean and railway rates and with further tonnage to lift any surplus cargo. Provided that details were satisfactorily drawn up on the lines set out by Mr. Harris and secured, the proposals appear to open up a wider prospect of advantage to both Canada and the West Indies than has yet been presented.

REPORT ON THE POSTAL DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR

1911—12.

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
ST. VINCENT, B.W.I.,
18th May, 1912.

Sir,—I have the honour to submit the annual Report on the Postal Department of this Colony and its dependencies for the official year 1911—12, accompanied by the usual fifteen Returns.

Charge of the Post Office.

2. The administration of the Department was in my hands throughout the year under review.

SECTION I.—INLAND SERVICE.

Post Offices and Posting Places.

3. The number of Post Offices was sixteen. Eight were of the first class and eight of the second class. Private individuals worked three of the first class offices and the Police worked three of the second class.

The number of posting places remained unchanged.

Communication.

4. The mails of the Colony have been conveyed for a number of years on the Leeward Coast in an open canoe, which carries a limited number of passengers. The need for a better and more comfortable service on this route is manifesting itself more and more, and it will be a boon to the inhabitants of the Island when a steamer service worked in conjunction with the Grenadines route is established.

It was decided to improve at the close of the year the conveyance on the Windward Route, as the conveyance was found insufficient for the growth of the mails.

The service on the Grenadines route was carried on by a sailing boat of three tons burden.

The British blue ensign was flown on the sea-borne conveyances during the year.

Letters and Other Articles.

5. The exchanges in the inland post in 1911—12 under this head consisted of 100,367 letters and 36,881 other articles. The work done by each office in this respect is shown in Table I, where a total increase of 16,026 postal articles over the exchanges of the previous year is recorded.

Parcels Post.

6. An increase of 235 parcels is shown in the inland service; the total number transmitted was 577, of which no less than 233 were handled at Georgetown.

Registered Articles.

7. This branch has also shown an increase. 2,932 registered articles were dealt with, being an advance of 127 registered articles above the figures of the previous year. 420 were transmitted through Georgetown, being 25 less than through Bridgetown. Detailed information in this service is included in Table III.

Money Orders.

8. The money orders issued and paid showed 11% more in value as compared with those of 1910—11. Inland Official money orders were more numerous owing

to increased magisterial work in the districts. In Table IV will be seen the amounts issued and paid at each money order office for both inland and foreign money orders. Special notice, however, must be taken of the work done at Layou, where over £1,000 were handled. The second place was held by Bridgetown with £752.

British Postal Orders.

9. The value of these orders issued and paid in the districts was £275 13 7 and £188 3 7 respectively as against £201 5 6½ and £162 16 0 in the previous year. The extension of this system to inland exchanges is much appreciated by the public. The secrecy with which the system is worked is widely recognized.

SECTION II.—FOREIGN AND COLONIAL SERVICE.

Mail Service.

10. The intercolonial steamers of the Royal Mail Steamer Packet Company connecting with the Ocean Steamers of Trinidad called here fortnightly. Although greatly desired that there should be a daylight service for this island yet the steamers did not infrequently arrive with the English Mails till after sunset, on such occasions the sorting and distributing work at the head office extended to midnight and the small hours of the morning. It would be much appreciated for the time of arrival with the English Mails, viz. 5 p.m. to be observed by the steamers.

The Pickford and Black service terminated on 30th June, 1911 and after a couple months, a temporary service was established serving this Island at intervals of 22 days. This Colony contributed at the rate of £300 a year towards the subsidy.

The recommendations of the Royal Commission of 1910 for improved steam communication between Canada and the West Indies are still pending, but there are signs that a better service will be established in the near future.

Occasional calls were made by the steamers of the Asiatic Company and of the Joint Cargo Service of Royal Mail and Scrutton.

Barbados, Grenada and Trinidad were the intermediaries for the transmission of our mails to and from the United States.

The weekly conveyance of mails to and from Carriacou and Grenada by the Grenadines Mail boat was satisfactorily carried out.

Mail Conveyance and Receptacles.

11. Mails were brought to the Colony by 100 steamers and 90 sailing vessels, and 95 steamers and 95 sailing vessels took away mails.

There were 938 bags, 40 parcels of mails, 140 parcels post packages received and 598 bags of mails and 101 parcel post packages despatched. Inclusive of the mails received and despatched in transit over 2,000 mail packages were handled by the Department in 1911-12.

Letters and Other Articles.

12. The number of letters and other articles dealt with during the year reached 260,968, being more than a quarter of a million, as against 218,538 in the preceding year. The distribution is shown in Tables V and VI. 68,998 letters were exchanged with Trinidad showing a percentage of 35.15 out of a total of 196,289 letters dealt with. The next place was given to the United Kingdom with a total of 30,487 or 15.53%. Barbados occupied the third place with 23,890 or 12.17%. In other articles the total of which was 64,679 the United Kingdom was easily first with 31,578, and the United States second with 16,383.

Parcels Post and Import Duty.

13. Year after year this service shows an increase and 1911-12 was marked with progress. The Department delivered 2,319 parcels and 563 other articles on which Import Duty to the amount of £215 1 1 was collected.

Money Orders.

14. The total money order transactions for the year amounted to £10,395 13 10 as against £9,386 7 1 in 1910-11. Table VIII gives the places and their respective amounts issued and paid.

The total amount paid appearing against the United States and Canal Zone was almost entirely made up of remittances from the labouring class and principally from the Canal Zone of Panama. This large sum of over £5,000 may be looked upon as a record, for as the canal works in the Zone are now nearing completion those remittances will naturally be on the decrease in the near future.

£455 more in Trinidad orders were paid. It was observed that many remittances were made from La Brea evidently by labourers from St. Vincent working in the Pitch Lake and Oil Fields.

British Postal Orders and Poundage.

15. From its inauguration, the British Postal Order System has made a steady advance. In both issued and paid an increase of 725 in number and £437 11 7 in value is recorded as compared with the transactions in 1910-11. The growth of this system will be seen from the following figures :—

It will be seen that the Orders issued have more than doubled in five years time while those paid have consistently increased. The numbers of the different values issued and paid are stated in Tables IX and X.

16. The total poundage collected and transferred to General Revenue was £31 12 9.

Registered Articles.

17. The number of registered articles transmitted was 4,338, being only 63 more than in the previous year. Efficiency was maintained in this branch. 1,595 were exchanged with the United Kingdom and 905 with the United States.

Insured Letters.

18. Twenty-two letters with a declared value of £2,361 were dealt with as compared with twenty-three with a declared value of £2,351 in 1910-11. Reference to Table XII will show that only one insured letter value £5 was despatched for the year, the valuables transmitted as insured through the post were mailed by parcels post instead of by letter post and the insurance fees on the single letter despatched was eight pence.

Registered and Insured Parcels.

19. The work done in these branches is set out in Tables XIII and XIV. 102 registered parcels worth £85 6 4½ were exchanged in 1911-12 as compared with 83 registered parcels worth £70 12 11½ in 1910-11.

20. An increase of £1,755 in insured parcels despatched and £1,602 in those received, is recorded in Table XIV. The aggregate increased value was £3,357 over 1910-11 and £5,660 over 1909-10.

Trade Charges.

21. One "Cash and Delivery" parcel was received from Barbados and 270

were received from England. 266 were delivered and a total sum of £297 14 1 in Trade Charges was collected and remitted to the respective senders less money order commission and delivery fees. The fees amounted to £4 9 8. The business transacted in this branch of the postal work from 1st September 1908 is exhibited as under :—

Returned Correspondence.

22. In the Dead Letter Branch 1,095 postal articles were returned to their respective places of origin, and 807 postal articles were received from abroad for return to their senders. The Department effected the return of 662, and was unable to return 145 on account of insufficient address and want of signatures.

SECTION III.—REVENUE.

24. The revenue collected by the Department fell short by only £49 of the largest revenue in the last ten years when in 1902-03 the King Edward stamps created abnormal sales to Dealers abroad. The net postal revenue, after deduction of the amounts for Revenue Stamps and Import Duty as set out in Table XV, was £2,053 7 9 and is detailed below :—

Stamp Dealers.

25. The introduction of a £1 stamp during the year is responsible for the larger portion of the £947 9 7 worth of stamps sold to Dealers abroad. This value of postage and revenue stamps was issued to meet the requirements of stamp duties on deeds, etc., in the Registry and the system of overprinting 5/- stamps for revenue duties abolished.

There were 170 orders from Stamp Dealers executed in 1911-12 as against 174 in 1910-11 and 164 in 1909-10.

SECTION IV.—EXPENDITURE.

26. The expenditure for the year reached the sum of £1,370 3 10. Salaries claimed £391 15 0 or 29% and working expenses £978 8 10 or 71%. The total amount voted was £1,445.

SECTION V.—FINANCIAL RESULTS.

27. The surplus of revenue over expenditure was £683 3 11. This is the largest net postal revenue realized for any single year during the last ten years. Considering the yearly increase of work, expenditure has been kept well within limits and revenue on the whole has been on the increase. After payment of all expenses, more than £2,300 has been transferred to General Revenue of the Colony for the past seven years.

SECTION VI.—DEPARTMENTAL REMARKS.

Appointments.

28. On 1st April 1911, Mr. L. M. Merrick was confirmed in the Post of Clerk at the Head Office, and Mr. L. P. Spence was appointed second Assistant on 16th May of the same year.

An Assistant Postman was added to the staff on 16th November, 1911.

Leave of Absence.

29. Three weeks leave was granted to the District Postmaster at Canouan, and the Clerk obtained ten days sick leave followed by 29 days vacation leave during the year.

Staff.

30. At the Head Office another assistant for the nocturnal sorting of the English and Intercolonial mails was taken on. The staff, at the close of the year,

consisted of one Clerk, two Assistants, two Postmen, and two sorters on mail nights. In the Districts, the work was performed by 3 Revenue Officers, 3 Police and 9 private individuals, three of the last named were in charge of money order and parcel post offices.

I take this opportunity to thank all the members of the postal service of this Colony for the valuable assistance they have rendered by their care and assiduity in the discharge of the duties assigned to them respectively.

REPORT ON THE POSTAL DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR

1912-13.

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
ST. VINCENT, B.W.I.,
29th May, 1913.

Sir,—I have the honour to submit the annual report on the Postal Department of this Colony and its dependencies for the official year 1912-13 accompanied by the usual fifteen returns.

Charge of the Post Office.

2. During the year under review the administration of the Department was in the hands of the undermentioned officers who occupied the post of Colonial Postmaster during the period which appears opposite to the names.

Mr. V. J. Monplaisir, from 1st April to 10th June, 1912, and from 21st January to 13th February, 1913. (Mr. Monplaisir left on the 16th February, 1913, to take up an appointment as Provincial Postmaster in Southern Nigeria.)

Mr. H. A. Bascom, from 10th June, 1912, to 21st January, 1913, during which period Mr. Monplaisir was on leave.

Mr. D. S. Aikman, from 13th February, 1913, to the end of the year.

SECTION I.—INLAND SERVICE.

3. A District Post Office was opened at Orange Hill on the 1st June, 1912, and the Parcel Post Service was established at Bequia on the 1st September, 1912.

The number of Post Offices was seventeen. Eight were of the first class and nine of the second class. Private individuals worked three of the first class offices and the Police worked two of the second class.

The number of posting places was twenty.

Communication.

4. The mail services mentioned in the last report were maintained throughout the year with the addition that since the opening of the office at Orange Hill calls have been made there on the up and down route three times a week.

Letters and Other Articles.

5. The exchanges in the Inland Post during the year were 100,087 letters and 58,425 other articles. The total increase in postal articles over the exchanges of the previous year was 21,264. The details of the work done by the various offices is shown in Table 1.

Parcel Post.

6. A total of 723 parcels were handled by the inland service as against 577 in the previous year. Of these 293 were dealt with at Georgetown. This Office handled three times as many parcels as any other district office.

Registered Articles.

7. Detailed information regarding this service is given in Table 3. The total number of 3,003 articles handled is an increase of only 71 on the figures for the previous year.

Money Orders.

8. Money Orders issued and paid shewed an increase of 13% more in value as compared with those of 1911-12. Detailed information as to the amounts issued and paid at each of the Money Order Offices is given in Table 4.

British Postal Orders.

9. The value of these orders issued and paid at the district offices was £290 5 3½ and £184 3 6 respectively as against £275 13 7 and £188 3 7 in the previous year.

SECTION 11.—FOREIGN AND COLONIAL SERVICE.

10. The intercolonial steamers of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Co. connecting with the Ocean Steamers at Trinidad called here fortnightly.

The steamers of the Pickford and Black line carried on a 24 day service throughout the year. Occasional calls were made by the steamers of the East Asiatic Company and the Joint Cargo Service of Royal Mail and Scrutton.

Mails were conveyed to and from the United States via Barbados and Grenada.

The weekly conveyance of mails to and from Carriacou and Grenada by the Grenadines Mail Boat was satisfactorily carried out.

Mail Conveyance and Receptacles.

11. Mails were brought to the Colony by 95 steamers and 97 sailing vessels and 93 steamers and 87 sailing vessels took away mails.

There were 1,046 bags and packets of mails received and 123 parcel post packages. 668 bags of mails and 101 parcel post packages were despatched.

Letters and Other Articles.

12. The number of letters and other articles dealt with during the year was 297,941 as against 260,968 in the previous year.

Out of this total the letters numbered 204,491 and the other articles 93,450.

Of the letters 33% were exchanged with Trinidad, 18% with the United Kingdom and 13% with Barbados. Whilst 42% of the other articles were exchanged with the United Kingdom and 38% with the United States.

Further details will be found in Tables 5 and 6.

Parcels Post and Import Duty

13. The Department delivered 2,730 parcels and 663 other articles on which the duty collected amount to £251 12 9.

Money Orders.

14. The total value of the Money Order transactions for the year was £12,006 1 1 as against £10,395 13 10 for the previous year. Table 8 gives the places and their respective amounts issued and paid.

The amount of United States Money Orders, principally from the Canal Zone, which were paid during the year exceeds in value by more than £1,350 that of any previous year. The value of Trinidad orders paid was however less, by nearly £450, than in 1911-12.

Money Orders from the United Kingdom paid during the year were more than double the value of those paid during 1911-12. Remittances by Money Order from Stamp Dealers in the United Kingdom and the Continent were largely responsible for this increase.

British Postal Orders and Poundage.

15. In Tables 9 and 10 will be found the numbers of British Postal Orders issued and paid for each value from 6d. to 21/-.

The total value of orders issued is considerably less than in 1911-12 although the number of orders sold is greater. Orders paid during the year were £198 more in value than in the previous year.

16. The total poundage collected and transferred to General Revenue was £31 10 9.

Registered Articles.

17. The number of registered articles exchanged was 5,204 as against 4,338 in the previous year. Of this total 2,074 were exchanged with the United Kingdom and 1,065 with the United States. Further particulars of the exchanges will be found in Table 11.

The efficiency of this branch was maintained throughout the year.

Insured Letters.

18. Thirty-one letters with an insured value of £3,370 10 4 were dealt with as compared with twenty-two with a declared value of £2,361 in the previous year.

Registered and Insured Parcels.

19. The extent of the work done in these branches is shown in Tables 13 and 14. 147 Registered parcels with a value of £121 13 1 were exchanged as compared with 102 parcels valued at £85 6 4½ in 1911-12.

20. Insured parcels received were 171 as against 136 in the previous year. The value of these, however, was only £480 12 1 as against £1,885 17 0½. Insured parcels despatched were 26 with a value of £978 1 0 as against 33 valued at £4,263 3 7 in 1911-12.

Trade Charges.

21. One "Cash on Delivery" parcel was received from Trinidad and 453 from the United Kingdom. 422 parcels were delivered, 5 were returned to the senders and one was redirected. The amount of Trade Charges collected was £441 3 11. The Delivery fees amounted to £7 5 6.

Returned Correspondence.

22. 491 postal articles were returned through the Dead Letter Branch to their respective places of origin and 815 postal articles were received from abroad for return to the senders. The Department effected the return of 731 and was unable to return 84 on account of insufficient address and want of signature.

SECTION III.—REVENUE.

23. The Revenue collected by the Department is the largest on record exceeding that of any previous year by over £1,900. For this increase the sale of Stamps of the King George V issue to dealers abroad is almost entirely responsible. Further particulars of these sales will be found in the next section under the heading of 'Stamp Dealers'. The net postal revenue, after deduction of the amounts for Revenue Stamps and Import Duty as set out in Table 15, was £4,037 2 4 and is detailed below :—

Stamp Dealers.

24. The introduction of the new issue of 'King George V' Stamps on the 1st January, 1913, was responsible for the receipt of many valuable orders from dealers abroad. Previous to the issue of the new stamps, 196 orders had been supplied of the value of £891 4 0. Since the 1st January, 1913, orders for the new issue have been supplied to the number of 92 and value of £1,868 0 2½, making a total of 288 orders supplied for the year 1912-13 with a total value of £2,759 4 2½.

SECTION IV.—EXPENDITURE.

25. The total expenditure of the Department during the year was £1,817 13 6. Of this salaries claimed £478 7 6 and working expenses £1,339 6 0. Details of expenditure during the last three years are given below :—

SECTION V.—FINANCIAL RESULTS.

26. The surplus of revenue over expenditure was £2,219 8 10. This amount is more than 3 times as great as the largest net amount transferred to General Revenue in any previous year and exceeds the combined total surplus of the past six years.

SECTION VI.—DEPARTMENTAL REMARKS.

Appointments.

27. The following appointments made during the year are given in order of date.

At the General Post Office.

On the 1st April, 1912, Mr. C. L. Douglas was appointed second Assistant Clerk.

On the 10th May, Mr. D. S. Aikman was appointed Assistant Clerk.

On the 10th June, Mr. H. A. Bascom, Third Clerk of the Treasury in Grenada, was appointed to act as Colonial Postmaster during the absence on leave of Mr. V. J. Monplaisir.

On the 1st July, Mr. D. S. Aikman was appointed to act as Clerk during the absence on leave of Mr. L. M. Merrick. Mr. C. L. Douglas was appointed to act as Assistant Clerk in place of Mr. Aikman.

On the 1st August, Mr. H. B. Isaacs was appointed to act second Assistant Clerk.

On the 13th February, 1913, Mr. D. S. Aikman was appointed to act as Colonial Postmaster in place of Mr. V. J. Monplaisir. Mr. C. L. Douglas was appointed to act as Chief Clerk and Mr. H. B. Isaacs as Assistant Clerk. Mr. N. H. Cordice was appointed second Assistant in place of Mr. Isaacs.

District Offices.

On the 1st June, 1912, Mr. A. K. John was appointed District Postmaster at Orange Hill.

On the 1st September, Mrs. Louisa Pole was appointed to act as District Postmistress at Orange Hill in place of Mr. John, resigned.

Mention may be made under this head of the appointment of Mr. V. J. Monplaisir to the post of Provincial Postmaster in Southern Nigeria.

Mr. Monplaisir has been Colonial Postmaster of this Colony for the past eight years and during that period his energetic and efficient administration of this Department has been universally recognised and appreciated.

Leave of Absence.

28. Six months leave of absence was granted to Mr. Monplaisir from the 10th June, 1912, with a subsequent extension of six weeks until the 21st January, 1913.

Mr. L. M. Merrick, Chief Clerk, obtained ten days sick leave in June followed by six months vacation leave from the 1st July, 1912. Mr. Merrick was subsequently granted an extension of leave until the 30th June, 1913.

Mr. H. A. Allen, District Postmaster at Barrouallie was granted 37 days leave from the 7th January, 1913. Mr. R. K. Durrant acted for Mr. Allen in his absence.

Fifteen days leave was also granted to the District Postmasters at Canouan and Bridgetown during the year.

Staff.

29. The staff at the General Post Office consisted of one clerk, two assistants, two postmen and two sorters on mail nights.

In the Districts the work was carried on by 3 Revenue Officers, 3 Police and 10 private individuals.

I take this opportunity of thanking all the members of the postal service of this Colony for the valuable assistance they have rendered in the discharge of their duties.

vote from time to time such sums as may be necessary to enable officials of this Colony to take advantage of those benefits and, further, this Council desires to place on record its appreciation of the consideration which His Majesty the King has shown for the welfare of the officials of this and other Colonies in deciding that they should be admitted to a share of those benefits".

The Acting Attorney General in seconding the Resolution pointed out that no distinction was being made between what were generally termed "the Services", namely the Navy and Army, and the Civil Services. He rejoiced that all were being placed on the same footing. "Peace has its victories as well as war" and "Those also work who merely stand and wait" he said were metooes worth remembering.

He hoped the Council would see fit to adopt the Resolution.

Mr. Simmons regarded the proposal as a beautiful thought materialised by His Majesty in a beautiful way. He objected however to the colony being burdened with the cost of the maintenance of officers whom he held in most cases would be well able to bear the full charge of 10/6 a day themselves. He asked further whether the benefits were to be extended to all officials in the Colony? In this objection he was supported by Messrs Hazell and Corea.

The Administrator replied that he could not define more definitely the class of officer who would receive the benefits of the scheme but suggested that arrangements might be made to the effect that each case for entry into the home should be considered on its merits by the Governor in Council, and that only those cases that were obvious cases for relief should be submitted to the Legislative Council for payment of the 8/6 amount by the Colony.

After further discussion an amendment to the resolution substituting for "as may be necessary" the words "as may be deemed by the Council to be necessary" proposed and seconded by Messrs Corea and Hazell respectively, was accepted by the Council, and on motion by the Administrator, seconded by the Acting Attorney General, the resolution, as amended, was finally adopted.

Reduction of the West India and Panama Telegraph Company's Rates.

Legislative Council Minute No. 8 of 1913 on the subject of an offer from the West India and Panama Telegraph Company to reduce their rates on stated terms was formally laid before the Council.

The Administrator after pointing out the previous arrangements with the Company showed that according to the terms of the present offer the rates were to be reduced by half. His Honour then moved the adoption of the following resolution :—

"*Be it resolved* that this Council approves of the terms of the offer from the West India and Panama Telegraph Company to reduce their rates for telegraphic communication with the West Indies, and, in return for the benefits which will thereby accrue to the Colony, undertakes to pay a subsidy of £300 a year for a term of ten years instead of from year to year as at present".

Motion seconded by Mr. Simmons and carried.

Motor Car Mail and Passenger Service.

Legislative Council Minute No 9 of 1913 on the subject of a proposal for the establishment of a Government Motor Car Mail and Passenger Service on the Windward Route between Kingstown and Georgetown was formally laid before the Council.

The Administrator referred to the difficulties of the mail service on the windward side of the Island and pointed out that a sea-borne service was impossible, whereas horses (for this purpose) were slow, and that more modern means had become necessary. Alluding to the proposals before the Council there were, he went on, two alternative methods (a) a contract service (b) a government service,

which latter he favoured on the grounds of economy and efficiency if it were to be conducted as proposed by a Motor Service. According to this scheme there would be a service each way between Kingstown and Georgetown on five days of the week instead of on three as at present, and in addition there would be a passenger service. He proposed that the present cost of fares of 12/- single fare in covered conveyance, and 10/- in an open one, and of 24/- and 20/- return fares, should be reduced in future per motor to 6/- single and 10/- return, and he also had in his mind that Government Officials should be allowed to travel at $\frac{3}{4}$ fare. Referring to the estimates of expenditure on motor cars he pointed out that in order to avoid the necessity carrying spare tyres of different sizes the wheels were to be made uniform in size, and this would entail an additional cost of £4. He also informed the Council that the Ford Car Company had reduced the price of their five-seater Cars to £122 F.O.B. New York, since the estimate in the Legislative Council paper was prepared. He then formally moved the following resolution:—

“Be it resolved that this Council being of opinion that the time has now arrived when the mail and passenger service between Kingstown and Georgetown should be conducted by a Motor Car Service in preference to the present mode of conveyance by horse and trap, thus enabling an increase of transport facilities for both mails and passengers on the windward coast, and being of the opinion also that such mail service should be inaugurated and operated by the Government at the expense of the Colony;

“Now therefore this Council agrees to vote a sum not exceeding £400 for the capital expenditure in the establishment of such a service and to provide from year to year, commencing with the financial year 1914-15, such funds for its maintenance as may be found necessary”.

In seconding the resolution the Acting Attorney General pointed out that it would seem that for a small additional amount beyond the present subsidy this service could be inaugurated, and that there would be this further advantage, that the car could be let out for hire at 9d a mile, but it was especially in anticipation of the progress that would ensue that he supported the proposal.

Mr. Hazell also spoke in favour of it and laid stress on the fact that considerable improvement in the roads ought to follow. He referred in terms of appreciation to the manner in which Mr. Spence had carried out his contract and also to the work done by Mr. Fraser in the same connection.

In reply to Mr. Hazell the Administrator stated that the wheels would be sufficiently high for the motor cars to cross any small streams if carefully driven.

Mr. Corea asked if season tickets would be issued to which His Honour replied in the negative.

The Resolution was then unanimously adopted.

Subsequently the Treasurer moved that a vote of £400 be taken for capital expenditure in connection with the installation of the motor car service and garage.

Motion seconded by the Acting Attorney General and passed unanimously.

Piano removed from Government House to the Court House.

The Administrator stated that before adjourning he desired to move a Resolution to the effect that the old Piano from Government House which had been removed temporarily to the Court House, should be allowed to remain there for use in connection with any entertainments that might take place in the Council Chamber. He informed the Council that he was of opinion that it was preferable to let the Piano end its days in that way than to dispose of it for some small sum like £5 or £10 which had been offered for it.

He formally moved the following resolution:—

“Be it resolved that this Council approves of placing the Piano lately in use at Government House in the Council Chamber in lieu of selling it as originally contemplated”.

following Resolution on the subject will be moved at the next meeting of the Council:—

“*Be it resolved* that this Council approves of the terms of the offer from the West India and Panama Telegraph Company to reduce their rates for telegraphic communication with the West Indies, and, in return for the benefits which will thereby accrue to this Colony, undertakes to pay a subsidy of £300 a year for a term of ten years instead of from year to year as at present”.

Sir,—With reference to your letter of the 7th February last, No. 32841/1912, respecting the question of West Indian telegraphic communication, I am directed by the Postmaster General to say for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, that he has received an offer from the West India and Panama Telegraph Company to reduce the rates between the West Indies on the one hand and the United Kingdom and the First Zone of North America on the other hand

to 2/6 and 1/6 a word, respectively, to reduce the existing rates between the British West Indian islands by one half (with a maximum rate of 1/3 per word and a minimum charge of 1/- per telegram), to continue a deferred rate for plain language telegrams at half the normal rate, to reduce the press rates to half the new ordinary rates (without deferment), to abolish the existing discrimination against the Bermuda route, and to give an undertaking that the Company shall retain a British Directorate and management in return for a subsidy of £16,000 a year (to be paid by the British and Canadian Governments) together with payment of the existing subsidies of £10,300 a year from the West Indies. A copy of the relative correspondence with the Company is enclosed.

It will be seen that it is proposed that the subsidies of £16,000 and £10,300 should be paid for a term of 10 years, that no deduction should be made for the first 4 years, and that for the remainder of the period a half share, up to the amount of the subsidy, of any excess revenue over the existing revenue (to be taken as £74,000), is to be repaid by the Company. It may, however, be more convenient that after the fourth year the British and Canadian Governments should pay to the Company such sum only as is properly payable under the Agreement after ascertainment of any deduction to be made from the subsidy in consequence of growth of revenue; and, if Mr. Harcourt concurs, the Postmaster General will arrange accordingly with the Company.

In all the circumstances the Postmaster General thinks that the term of 10 years pressed for by the Company might be granted and also that the proposed payments to the Direct West India Company and the Western Union and other Companies might be approved.

The Postmaster General will seek the concurrence of the Treasury in the proposals, so far as the British Government is concerned, on learning that the Canadian Government and the Secretary of State concur. Mr. Harcourt will probably think it desirable that the proposals should be communicated to the Government of Canada by telegraph, and that that Government should be asked to state by the same means whether they agree to pay one half of the suggested sum of £16,000.

In view of the great benefits which will accrue to the West Indies under these proposals the Postmaster General assumes that they will not object to undertake to pay the subsidy of £10,300 a year for a term of 10 years, instead of from year to year as at present, and if the Secretary of State concurs the Postmaster General will be glad if the necessary arrangements can be made by the Colonial Office with the West Indian Governments.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL MINUTE.

(No. 9 of 1913.)

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,

I have the honour to lay before you the appended correspondence relating to a scheme for the establishment of a Motor Car Mail Service between Kingstown and Georgetown on the Windward side of the Island of St. Vincent.

2. Your approval of the scheme will be invited at the next meeting of the Legislative Council in the form of the following resolution:—

“*Be it resolved* that this Council being of the opinion that the time has now arrived when the mail and passenger service between Kingstown and Georgetown should be conducted by a Motor Car Service in preference to the present mode of conveyance by horse and trap, thus enabling an increase of transport facilities for both mails and passengers on the Windward coast, and being of the opinion also that such mail service should be inaugurated and operated by the Government at the expense of the Colony;

“Now therefore this Council agrees to vote a sum not exceeding £400 for the capital expenditure in the establishment of such a service and to provide from year to year, commencing with the financial year 1914-15, such funds for its maintenance as may be found necessary”.

Sir,—I have the honour to inform Your Excellency that the Executive Council has recently been considering the question of the mail and passenger service on the Windward side of the Island and has, after due deliberation, come to the conclusion that the best solution will be the institution of a motor car mail and passenger service established and managed by the Government.

2. During the past few years the subsidy payable for the mail service from Kingstown to Georgetown, a distance of 48 miles there and back, has risen from £89 per annum in 1908-9 to the rate of £250 per annum for the last nine months of the current financial year, and it is possible that a further increase may be demanded when tenders are called for for the next financial year, 1914-15. Although I do not believe that the subsidy paid in 1908-9 could have left the contractor any margin of profit—indeed he probably lost by it—and although the service has improved since then in manner of conveyance and in the class of animal used and by an additional mail one way per week, still I am not satisfied with the results given for the expenditure. For the past three years moreover, I have had demands by petition and otherwise for a daily service to Georgetown instead of a three day service one way and the four day service the other way which now exists, and for a service which will provide more frequent accommodation for passengers than is now available. These demands the Government has been unable to meet although as Georgetown and District are rapidly developing recognizing the reasonableness of them.

3. In these circumstances it would appear to be the duty of the Government from the point of view of efficiency and economy to undertake the mail contract itself especially if it can be shown that a much improved service may be obtained

for approximately the same cost as at present. The members of the Executive Council are strongly of this opinion and I concur.

4. In the enclosed statement it will be found that it is estimated that for an outlay of £325 two Ford cars, one a two-seater and the other a five-seater car, may be purchased capable of performing the work that is required. It is obvious that two cars will be necessary for such a service in case one goes wrong at any time. The second car could be hired out when not required for mail service purposes under certain specified Regulations. It is further estimated that for a yearly expenditure of £346 (from which should be deducted the estimated passenger receipts of £85 per annum) the mails may be run to Georgetown and back the same day, five days a week—and in addition it must not be overlooked that passenger accommodation of a much improved nature would be provided every day. In considering the annual expenditure of £346 it is to be especially observed that £60 or 20% is allowed for depreciation on the two cars, as Ford cars are not supposed by those who know them to have a longer life than five years.

5. The main reasons however why Ford cars have been selected as best for our purpose are (a) they are much in use in the neighbouring Colonies of Trinidad and Barbados and so spare parts and tyres are easily obtainable also chauffeurs who know how to drive them, (b) they are very light on tyres, are good hill climbers, and, being light in weight consume less petrol than the heavier types of car. The first, (a), of these reasons are very important in this Colony where there are at present no motor cars and therefore no knowledge of them. It is important however to point out in this connection that the engineer at the Government Cotton Ginnery has had a little experience of repairing motor engines, which would easily be augmented by a few weeks tuition visit to a Barbados or Trinidad motor workshop.*

6. By the end of this financial year the principal rivers on the road to Georgetown will have been bridged and the new road out of Kingstown will be very near completion so that there should be no difficulty in running a motor car mail service commencing on the 1st April 1914, the date upon which the present horse mail service contract terminates.

7. It is extremely unlikely that anyone here will tender for a motor car mail service to Windward except at a rate very much in excess of that at which the Government could run it.

8. Certain simple legislation will be necessary controlling the running of motor cars and licensing of drivers &c., but there will be plenty of time to prepare and pass this by March of next year.

If Your Excellency and the Secretary of State for the Colonies approve of the scheme the Legislative Council might be invited to vote the necessary capital outlay from Surplus Assets and the amount for upkeep would be provided on next year's Estimates.

The two cars should be ordered from the Ford works in Manchester and shipped to St. Vincent in February so as to give experience of them running before the mail service commences.

9. In conclusion I venture to express the hope that Your Excellency and the Secretary of State for the Colonies will consider favourably this solution of the Windward mail service problem which has caused much trouble and vexation in the past and which owing to lack of competition here will I believe never be satisfactorily and economically performed until undertaken by the Government itself.

Sir,—I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 2nd October, No. 32431/1913, asking for our observations on proposals for the establishment of a motor mail and passenger service on the Windward side of the Island of St. Vincent, submitted in a report by the Administrator which accompanied your letter.

2. It appears that the present mail service from Kingstown to Georgetown, a distance of twenty four miles, is run in one direction only each day and that it is now proposed, if possible, to run a service in each direction five days in the week. To run this improved service the Government suggest that two motor vehicles shall be purchased. As only one of the motor vehicles is proposed to be used at a time, the other being a standby, it is clear that the service could be run more than five days a week, if desired.

3. The Colonial estimate is £325 for one two-seater Ford car, one five-seater Ford car, certain accessories and spares, and freight from England. The prices for the cars are correctly stated in the detailed estimate, but insufficient provision is made for an adequate supply of spare parts, while nothing is allowed for the packing of the vehicles.*

Making allowance for this would require the estimate of £325 to be increased to approximately £400, since it would be very inadvisable to endeavour to run a continuous service without a sufficient stock of spares.

4. The cars are not made by the "Manchester" works as suggested in the Colonial despatch, but in the United States, so that the Colonial Government might be able to purchase them more cheaply direct from the United States. It would be preferable to employ cars of British make, and it should be borne in mind that the Ford cars being manufactured in enormous numbers, there would be no likelihood of our being able to obtain in this country anything but the absolutely standard model, whereas with English cars we are of course able to

introduce a number of features which experience in the Colonies has shown to be highly desirable. We do not, however, think that any efficient British car could be bought as cheaply as those proposed, and we do not think that undue risk is incurred in adopting Ford cars, as that company has had large experience in supplying their cars to all parts of the world, their *daily* output at the present time, being we believe, 700.

5. With regard to the estimated Colonial expenditure for the proposed service, the only items that we can check are the running costs for oil, petrol, tyres, repairs and deterioration. The other items, mainly relating to wages, have doubtless been settled with full local knowledge. The Ford Company, it is true, claim that their cars can be run at extremely low cost. To check the estimate, we have obtained from a well-known engineer, a member of the Institute of Civil Engineers, the following figures for running costs:—

“I took out the cost of running my Ford car after running 12,000 miles, and made out that tyres were costing me 0·73 pence per mile. I am running 24 miles per gallon or 0·79 pence per mile at 1s. 7d. a gallon, making a total cost per mile of about 1½d. For 7,000 miles in 1912 petrol cost about £22, tyres £22, insurance, tax, subscriptions, to automobile Clubs, etc., £25, washing, repairs and sundries £11, making a total cost of £80, or 2¾d. per mile. This however, must be taken as to some degree approximate as it is very difficult to estimate exactly”.

It will be seen that the cost approximately has been found to be 2¾d per mile which compares with the Colonial estimate of 2½d. As however, the 2¾d includes the item for insurance, tax, subscriptions to Automobile Clubs, etc., it confirms the Colonial figure of 2½d very fairly, provided of course that petrol can be obtained in Saint Vincent* at a figure not very greatly exceeding that prevailing in this country. The item for tyres would of course be increased by the freight from England to St. Vincent, but the discount we obtain from the tyre makers would more than compensate for this.

6. Ford cars are very cheap in capital first cost and if well cared for will run a considerable mileage. The car above referred to, after running 15,000 miles, is now going as well as ever. The Ford is, however, a car that needs to be skilfully driven, and on bad roads it is absolutely essential that the speed should be kept much below what would be possible if the engine were put on open throttle. We observe that the item for depreciation included in the Colonial estimate is based on a life of five years. We consider it would be advisable to increase the allowance to 30% per annum, making this item, on a capital cost of £400, equal to £120 per year, or £60 in excess of the Colonial estimate.

Summing up, therefore, we consider that the vehicles proposed by the Colonial Government would be suitable if carefully driven, but that the capital expenditure would be about £75 more and the running expenditure about £60 more on the score of depreciation, and possibly something still more if the local cost of petrol is unduly high.*

7. We do not know whether the Governor has considered the possibility of carrying the mails on a motor cycle (with or without the side car). If practicable this should prove an economical alternative on days when there may be no passengers, and the necessity for buying a second car might be obviated.

Sir,—I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of the Secretary of State's despatch No. 83 of the 4th November and to note with satisfaction that Mr. Harcourt has approved generally of the proposals with regard to the proposed establishment of a motor mail and passenger service on the Windward side of the Island of St. Vincent.

2. The Executive Council has given very serious consideration to the alternative proposal for substituting a motor cycle (with or without side car) for the second motor car but the members are unanimous in agreeing that they would prefer to adhere to the original proposals and purchase a second car of two seating capacity.

3. They were influenced in coming to this decision not only by the fact that in a rainy Colony like this (over 60 inches of rain has been registered at the Botanic Station since the 1st August) it would not be fair on the chauffeur to expose him to the weather in the degree that would happen if the mails were carried by motor cycle but also that the initial cost of a motor cycle with side truck (which would be absolutely necessary) would be in the vicinity of £75 or nearly as dear as a two-seater runabout or even a cycle car, a proposition which was also considered.

4. Since writing my despatch No. 76 of the 15th August, 1913, I have ascertained that the Ford Company place their 5 seater touring car F.O.B. the steamer at New York at a cost (including packing) of £121 17 6 and their two-seater Runabout model F.O.B. steamer New York at a cost of £111 9 2. The freight and landing here of the two cars will, I am advised, be altogether another £17 11 9, thus my original estimate of £325 including purchase, packing, freight and landing of the two cars here, is now reduced to £291 (which includes an additional £20 added for spares as suggested by the Crown Agents). A Ford agent has recently been appointed here and spare parts will in future be obtainable on the spot.

5. The estimate as originally submitted showed an estimated revenue of £45 for the hire of the second car. If a motor cycle is purchased this revenue will disappear.

6. The cost of petrol, retail, here at present is 1/8d per gallon after duty of 4d a gallon has been paid so that as the Government will be absolved from duty, petrol will be rather cheaper than in England at present.

7. I note that the Crown Agents advise a 30 per cent depreciation fund; this will mean an allocation of £75 upon an outlay of £250, the cost of the two cars without spares. This will signify an increase of £15 on the annual expenditure.

8. In view of these further explanations I trust that there will be no objection to continuing on the lines originally proposed, namely to purchase two motor cars. Pending a settlement of the issue discussed in this despatch only one five seater car will be ordered direct from the Company in America, subject of course to the approval of the Legislative Council to the whole scheme, which I intend to submit to it at a meeting to be held in about 10 days time.

GOVERNMENT OFFICE,

Regulations made by the Governor in Council to govern and control the Motor Mail Service between Kingstown and Georgetown to commence on the 1st April, 1914, and to regulate the hire of cars for private use when not employed on Government service.

1. The Motor Cars shall be under the complete control of the Colonial Postmaster who will be responsible that they are kept in order and that the mail

service is, so far as he can influence circumstances, run efficiently and up to time.

2. A mail passenger service will be run on each of the following days both ways between Kingstown and Georgetown, namely on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

3. The Car will leave the Post Office, Kingstown, at 10.45 a.m., arrive at Georgetown nominally at 12.45 p.m., and leave the Revenue Office, Georgetown, again at 3.15 p.m. to return to Kingstown.

4. The following fares will be payable by each passenger travelling on the mail car. Tickets will be obtainable only at the various Post Offices along the line of route. Return tickets will be available for 14 days. No reductions will be made for shorter journeys than those on the table of fares. The number of passengers will be limited to four:—

5. Government Officials when travelling on duty will take priority of ordinary travellers; otherwise all applications for seats will be dealt with in sequence of receipt by the Colonial Postmaster.

6. Seats may be pre-booked with the Colonial Postmaster but persons desirous of travelling between Kingstown and Georgetown or vice versa shall have priority in pre-booking over persons desirous of making any of the other journeys.

7. No passenger on the mail car should in any way interfere with the Chauffeur or with the running of the car or with the speed at which it is travelling unless in his opinion it is being driven so fast as to exceed the speed limit or to be dangerous to the safety of the occupants of the car or to the public. In that case a passenger may caution the Chauffeur to drive more slowly. Should the Chauffeur take no notice of the warning, the passenger should report him to the Postmaster at the first Post Office at which the car stops.

8. (1) No passenger will be allowed to enter the car until he has delivered to the Chauffeur a ticket for the journey on which he is desirous of going and the Chauffeur will be held responsible for the correct delivery of all tickets at the General Post Office daily.

(2) In any special case a Government Official travelling on duty may be permitted to enter the car between stations without a ticket. It shall be the duty of the said Government Official so entering the car to communicate the circumstance as soon as possible afterwards to the Colonial Postmaster and the amount of fare to be paid by him shall be the fare payable from the last station of stoppage by the car. The said fare shall be paid to the Postmaster at the station at which such Government Official terminates his journey.

(3) The Chauffeur shall on no account permit any unauthorized person to drive in a Government Motor Car. Should the Chauffeur commit a breach of this Regulation he will be liable to a fine of 4/- for each unauthorized person so carried.

9. Particular attention is drawn to section 48 (1) of the Public Health Ordinance, 1910, which reads as follows. It is to be noted that a breach of this section carries with it on conviction a liability to a penalty not exceeding £10:—

“48. (1.) The owner or driver of a vehicle used for “the carrying of persons for fee or reward shall not “knowingly convey, nor shall any other person “knowingly place in such vehicle, a person whom he “knows to be suffering from any infectious disease, nor “shall a person suffering from any such disease enter “any such vehicle unless so authorised to do by a “Local Authority or Medical Officer”.

10. If the driver of a carriage or cart or a rider coming towards the mail car holds up his hand, then the mail car must be at once brought to a stand still and then driven carefully and slowly past the carriage, cart or rider.

11. Motor Cars will only be hired out for private use when not required for Government service.

12. All applications for the hire of Motor Cars for private use must be made to the Colonial Postmaster who has the sole power to deal with them and who will inform applicants of the charges.

13. Any person hiring a car or any guest of his, must not attempt to drive the car or to interfere in any way with the driving gear or running of the car. Any person committing a breach of this regulation will be held liable to make good any damage that may accrue to the car as a result of his interference.

14. Any person hiring a car should warn the Chauffeur should he suspect that the speed limit laid down by the law is being exceeded, or should the Chauffeur be driving in such a way as in his opinion constitutes a danger to the safety of the car or to the public.

15. Passengers are particularly requested not to give liquor to the Chauffeur.

16. The amount of personal baggage to be carried by a passenger whilst travelling in a car will, subject to the following proviso, be limited to a handbag or

small grip, and any small parcels that a passenger can carry in his hands. Provided however that if in the opinion of the Chauffeur there is no room for baggage owing to the size of the mail or any other reason, then such Chauffeur shall have full discretion to decline to allow a passenger to carry any baggage beyond what he can carry in his hands without taking up any additional room in the car.

17. For the present no car will be hired out to travel on any but the main road between Kingstown and Georgetown, Kingstown and Mesopotamia Police Station, in the town of Kingstown, or between Kingstown and Government House and Kingstown and Fort Charlotte Draw Bridge and the Yaws Hospital.

Additional Regulation made under the authority of Section 4 of "The Customs Preferential Duties Ordinance 1913" to govern the entry of Goods under the British Preferential Tariff into St. Vincent.

THE Regulations made by the Governor in Council under the authority of Section 4 of the Customs Preferential Duties Ordinance 1913 and brought into force on the 1st day of October, 1913, are hereby amended by the addition of the following Regulation:—

In the event of goods having been passed out of Bond in any West Indian Colony entitled to the advantages of the Agreement entered into on the 9th day of April, 1912, between Canada and certain of the West Indian Colonies, and such goods having been duty paid under the Preferential Tariff of that Colony, then upon a certificate (in the form attached) being granted by an authorised Customs Officer at the said Colony where such goods are being re-shipped on drawback under Customs supervision that such goods were admitted to the said Colony under the Preferential Tariff, the said goods shall likewise be duty paid under the Preferential Tariff of St. Vincent as if such goods had been admitted into St. Vincent under Regulation 1 of the Regulations passed by the Governor in Council which came into force on the 1st day of October, 1913.

POST OFFICE NOTICE.

It is notified for general information that by regulations of the Department of Agriculture of the Dominion of Canada the importation of potatoes into Canada from Europe, Newfoundland or the Islands of St. Pierre and Miquelon is prohibited, and that packets containing potatoes coming into Canada by Mail should be accompanied by a certificate stating that they were not grown in the above-mentioned countries.

It is further notified that under a further regulation of the Department of Agriculture, which will take effect on the 1st of March, 1914, the importation of all nursery stock, including trees, shrubs, plants, vines, grafts, scions, cuttings or buds, through the mail is prohibited, excepting green-house-grown florists stock, cut flowers, herbaceous perennials, and budding plants which will be admitted provided that a detailed statement of the contents is attached to parcels containing such matter.

Panama Canal and the increasing tourist activity, necessitating greater vigilance in these affairs on the part of the authorities in these West Indian Colonies and I am sure that you will desire to see the Government of St. Vincent taking such prominent part in the general movement as is consonant with its financial position. I cannot refrain here from an expression of eulogy of the progressive spirit in which the Kingstown Town Board is at present attacking the sanitary problems in our capital town and in this campaign the Board may rely upon the cordial co-operation of the Government and its Sanitary Department should you consent to vote the necessary funds to establish it. I may remark that it is proposed that the Sanitary Department should include in its personnel a Sanitary Inspector trained in one of the large English or Scottish Towns, who would be engaged on the recommendation of the English Local Government Board. The advantages of having such an official on the staff of the Sanitary Department are too obvious to need justification.

Public works of considerable importance have already been completed during the year whilst others are still in progress. Those completed are four reinforced concrete bridges on the Windward road. The uncompleted works include a small bridge over the New Adelphi river on the Windward road, nurses quarters at the Colonial Hospital and a residence for the Chief Justice. The first two of these will be finished by the 31st March, whilst the Chief Justice's residence will probably not be ready for occupation until July or August.

The new road out of Kingstown by Richmond Hill has, I regret to say, proved a bigger undertaking than anticipated chiefly owing to the rocky nature of the ground along the line of route. This has involved an additional amount of blasting and other unforeseen difficulties. I am satisfied that the work so far accomplished has been performed as economically as possible and for that reason and for the reason that the further this work advances the more obvious grow the advantages to be derived from this easily graded exit from the town, I do not hesitate to ask you to vote a further sum of £800 which I am advised will be required to complete the road. Included in the provisions on next year estimates is £450 for the purchase of a Motor road roller which amongst other things should prove of great assistance in laying the macadam on the new road and giving it a permanently good surface.

In December you approved of the establishment as from the 1st April 1914 of a Government Motor Car mail and passenger service on the Windward route. In order to render the Windward road more suitable for such a service you will be invited to sanction a loan for £1,500 to complete the chain of bridges along that road including a bridge over the Mount Bentinck River, a necessity of long standing, and also two foot bridges, one over Dicksons River and one over South Rivers.

The Government has on several occasions called for tenders for a motor boat mail and passenger service on the Leeward coast but without response. It is satisfactory now to be able to inform you that I have received intimation that during this year it is probable that a private tender will be made for such a service. For the present the service will as hitherto, continue to be conducted by canoe.

The need for a larger sized Post Office has for some time made itself felt both to the public and to the Government. Accordingly you will be invited to consider proposals for the purchase of and alterations to a building most suitably situated for this purpose in the corner of the Government Office grounds and adjacent to the Government Offices.

As at present arranged the most important Legislation to be introduced during the year will include (a) The Appropriation Ordinance, (b) a Motor Car Ordinance, (c) a Public Works Loan Ordinance (£1,500 for Bridges), (d) a Notaries Public Ordinance, (e) a Small Towns Regulation Amendment Ordinance, (f) An Ordinance to control and regulate Secondary Education (both male and female).

You will observe from the Estimates that the estimated balance on the

Resumption of business.

The Council re-assembled at 2 p.m., all members, including Mr. Corea, being present.

Confirmation of Minutes.

On motion by the Acting Attorney General seconded by the Treasurer, the minutes of the meeting held on 2nd December, 1913, as printed and circulated to members, were taken as read and were confirmed.

New Premises for General Post Office.

Legislative Council Minute No. 1 of 1914 (annexed) dealing with a proposal to purchase Lot 102, Kingstown, with all the buildings and erections thereon for the better accommodation of the General Post Office, was formally laid before the Council.

The Administrator said he had endeavoured to deal with the question as clearly as possible in his minute to the Council and the correspondence appended thereto. It was not necessary to justify the removal of the Post Office as he had received many representations to the effect that the present building was too small, with which the Government was in agreement.

He had gone carefully into the question of new premises and good fortune had put it into his way to negotiate for the purchase of an eminently suitable building owned by Mrs. Charles Simmons. These premises adjoined the Government Office grounds. To all appearances, in fact, they seemed to form part of those grounds and it would be an eminently suitable thing if they became actually so. He had little hesitation in recommending the proposal to the Council's favourable consideration.

The general substance of the proposition was that the owner was willing to sell the site and buildings for a sum of £700 and to wait for five years for the payment of the money, accepting in the meantime rental at the rate of £30 per annum for the premises. Financially and otherwise this arrangement was very convenient to the Government as they could enter into possession right away, turn the building in the yard into a garage and by July this year, after effecting certain necessary alterations which were estimated to cost £150, transfer the Post Office to the new building. He had therefore very great pleasure in moving the adoption of the following Resolution:—

“Be it resolved that this Council having considered the proposals contained in the Administrator's despatch No. 135 of the 6th December, 1913, relative to the purchase from Mrs. Charles Simmons of Lot 102, Kingstown, with all buildings and erections thereon for the purpose of transferring to them the Department of the General Post Office, accepts the proposals contained therein and agrees to vote the necessary monies to carry them into effect”.

Motion seconded by the Treasurer.

Mr. Hazell asked what was the ground floor space of the present building as compared with that of the new building.

The Administrator replied that he was not able to give exact figures but pointed out that there was a second storey in the new building which doubled its accommodation. Further, it was proposed to augment the ground floor space by an extension of the building towards the present carriage shed at the Government Office. This would provide very much more space than at present. The frontage would be on both Egmont and Back Streets and the portion of the pavement lying adjacent thereto would be cemented.

Mr. MacDonald said that while recognising that the site was the most advantageous to be obtained he could not but think that the cost of the extension that would be necessary was underestimated. He could not see how a building of even twice the size of the one proposed would be sufficient and he thought it very probable that the Council would be asked to vote another £150 very shortly.

The Administrator mentioned that £100 was the sum originally estimated for the extension and that he had taken the responsibility of increasing that sum by £50 to meet unforeseen contingencies.

Mr. Corea remarked that the new building would double the present accommodation so far as the public was concerned but he doubted whether it would allow sufficient room for sorting. He could not altogether agree with the Superintendent of Public Works in his estimate of the value of property in Kingstown. He thought the value high. The arrangement however seemed the best under the circumstances.

The Administrator pointed out that in estimating the price we should take into consideration the convenience to the Government of the extended period over which it would be possible to pay the purchase money. He added that Mr. Lawrence would soon be coming here and he would go into the whole question with that officer. As matters stood at present the amount provided for the extension seemed to him to be adequate.

Mr. Simmons suggested that the private letter boxes in the new Post Office should be so arranged as to be accessible at any time, that is accessible whether the Post Office was open to the public or not. He also suggested that the boxes for receiving letters should have a perpendicular drop instead of an inclined one as at present. When recently posting some of his own letters he could without difficulty have extracted from the box letters posted by other people which continued to lie on the slide instead of dropping into the box. To post his own letters, in fact, he had to push down those others with his carriage whip. He felt little doubt that this accounted for the loss in transit of two letters recently posted by him to America. Also the opening for receiving letters should be a little larger. At present letters of a size at all beyond the normal could not go through the opening.

Mr. Hazell said he was quite in sympathy with the proposal although, as Mr. Corea had remarked, we were perhaps paying too much. The site however was, to the Government, a valuable one and as the terms were easy he thought the proposal should be approved.

The Administrator said he was entirely in sympathy with Mr. Simmons' suggestion regarding the private letter boxes and he would see whether it could be adopted. As regards the receiving letter boxes he had no idea that conditions were such as had been pointed out by the Hon. Member and he undertook to have them remedied straight away.

The motion was then put and agreed to unanimously.

Principal Medical Officer for Windward Islands.

Legislative Council Minute No. 2 of 1914 (annexed) containing a proposal made by His Excellency the Governor for the appointment of a Principal Medical Officer in charge of the Medical Departments of the Windward Islands was formally laid before the Council.

The Administrator said the Governor had requested him to submit this question to the Council as His Excellency wanted to ascertain the views of Hon. Members on the proposal. He would be glad if Hon. Members would express their views accordingly. In reply to a question from Mr MacDonal His Honour added that he was not aware of the views of the Legislative Councils of Grenada and St. Lucia on the proposal or whether they had yet expressed any.

The Acting Attorney General said he noticed that His Excellency laid stress on the necessity for co-ordination and control in the Medical Departments and on the need for an officer on whom the Governor could rely for advice on questions of Sanitation and Public Health. So many of these questions arose nowadays, and there was so much legislation connected with them that he (the speaker) thought it was necessary to have a Principal Medical Officer at the seat of Government and he was therefore in favour of the proposal. The office was not without precedent elsewhere as there had been a Principal

Dr. Durrant pointed out that the important thing in plague prevention was the extermination of rats, and owing to the campaign that had been carried on against them here there were to-day over 4,000 less rats to carry the disease if it got in. The examination of rats was a further precaution which provided for the detection of plague infected rats and prevented the careless disposal of such rats.

Mr. Hazell thought rats ought to be dissected and examined. People were coming here every day from Trinidad where plague had occurred.

Motion put and vote passed.

Grant to Carnegie Library.—The Treasurer explained that this vote was to provide a locum tenens for the Librarian who had not had leave since the year 1904 and whose salary was only £50 a year. He moved that the vote be passed. Seconded by Acting Attorney General and passed.

Completion of Water Supply at Medical Officers Quarters, 3rd District.—The Treasurer said it was thought that the £12 originally provided for this service would suffice but it had become necessary to ask for a vote of £15 more to complete the work. He moved that the vote be passed.

Motion seconded by Acting Attorney General.

The Administrator stated that the work had not been carried out as well as it might have been owing to the fact that the Warden had been so much occupied with bridge building that he had been unable to give to the Belmont work as much personal supervision as was necessary. It was regrettable, but he hoped the Council would agree to the vote.

Vote passed.

Completion of Sea-bath at Yaws Hospital.—The Treasurer said that the sum provided in the Estimates for this service had proved inadequate. It was, he understood, an excellent job. He moved that the vote be passed.

Motion seconded by the Acting Attorney General.

The Administrator stated that work had to be stopped during the last month or two owing to rough weather. It was proposed to erect a wall on the three sides of the bath which were exposed to passing boats to make the bath private. It would be a very useful piece of work.

Vote passed.

The Motor Car Ordinance, 1914.

The Acting Attorney General moved for leave to introduce and read for a first time by title a Bill for "An Ordinance to regulate the use of Motor Cars". Motion seconded by Treasurer, leave granted and bill read a first time by title.

On motion similarly made and seconded Council went into Committee over Bill.

Section 1. Mr. Simmons pointed out that the definition of "Motor Car" was not accurate. He had been advised that if the machinery was working properly vapour was bound to be emitted and it was only when the lubrication level had got too low that it ceased doing so. After some discussion the Acting Attorney General moved that the words "means any vehicle propelled by mechanical power, and so constructed that no smoke or visible vapour is emitted therefrom except from any temporary or accidental cause, and includes a motor cycle" be deleted and the definition altered to read "'Motor Car' shall include a motor cycle and a cycle car". Seconded by Mr. Simmons and agreed to.

Section 2. Mr. Simmons urged that there should be no provision for "identification marks" on the ground that there would not be a sufficient number of cars to necessitate the precaution. In Barbados where there were a number of cars identification marks were not required.

The Administrator thought it was hardly fair to expect the Police to control the motor traffic without providing them with some means of distinguishing the

cars. In places where cars were largely of the same make, as was likely to be the case in St. Vincent, it was he thought especially a necessity. He ventured to think that Barbados was a place in which identification marks were particularly needed.

The point was not pressed.

Section 2 (3). On motion by Mr. MacDonald seconded by the Acting Attorney General, the places of the words "also" and "shall" in the penultimate line were exchanged.

Section 3 (3). Mr. Simmons suggested that unless wanted for Revenue purposes the fee for registering a car might be done away with.

The Administrator explained that the registration of a car took up a certain amount of time and involved the use of paper &c. When completed it conferred a certain immunity on the owner and he thought a small sum ought to be paid for the service. He had no objection to the reduction of the fee to say five shillings.

Mr. Simmons considered that inasmuch as the roads did more harm to the wheels than the wheels to the road the Government ought to do away with the registration fee and reduce the licence on cars.

The Administrator pointed out that in England there was a special tax on motor cars of £7 or £8. In neighbouring Colonies also cars were subject to special taxes and he could not see why we should differ from other places in this respect.

Mr. Simmons said his point was that the venture was a new one and should be aided as far as possible, and not hampered, by legislation.

Mr. Hazell moved that the registration fee for cars be reduced to 5/-.

Mr. Simmons moved that section 3 be deleted altogether. Motion not seconded and therefore not put.

The original motion was then put and carried, Mr. Simmons voting against it.

Mr. MacDonald moved that the fee for motor cycles be reduced to 2/6d. Seconded by Mr. Corea and agreed to.

Mr. Simmons suggested that the fact that only one registration of a car was necessary should be clinched by some addition to sub-section (1).

The Administrator informed the Hon. Member that there was no intention on the part of the Government of requiring a car to be re-registered every time it changed hands. Only one registration was intended, but it would be necessary for the owner to notify the Chief of Police of a transfer.

Mr. Simmons thought that the owner should not be made to go to the station to notify the change of hands.

The Administrator was of opinion that if there was going to be any system of registration or control the authorities should be kept advised of changes of ownership.

Mr. Simmons said the matter seemed to be on all fours with the licensing of horses, vehicles, &c. We did not want to make the procedure unnecessarily onerous.

The Administrator pointed out to the Hon. Member that having got rid of a car it would be to the owner's interest to rid himself, so far as the authorities were concerned, of all responsibility for the future career of that car.

After further discussion on the point the Acting Attorney General moved that the words "but the said registration fee shall only be paid once in respect of the same motor car" be added at the end of sub-section (3). Seconded by Treasurer.

Mr. Simmons moved as an amendment that the word "once" be inserted between the words "registered" and "with" in the first line of sub-section (1). Seconded by Mr. Hazell.

The Administrator intimated on behalf of the Government that he could not accept that amendment.

Mr. Simmons' motion was then put to the vote and there appeared:—

Section 3 (2). On motion by Mr. Simmons seconded by the Acting Attorney General the words "in such manner as the Chief of Police may require" were deleted.

Section 3 (4). Mr. Simmons objected to the fee of one pound for a dealer's general identification mark prescribed in proviso (b).

The Administrator explained the object of the provision but added that he had no objection to eliminating proviso (b) altogether.

On motion by Mr. Simmons seconded by the Acting Attorney General the proviso was eliminated accordingly.

Section 4 (2). On motion by Mr. Simmons seconded by the Acting Attorney General the fee for a driver's licence was reduced to two shillings.

Section 4 (4). Mr. Simmons thought it would be wise to curtail the power of a Constable to stop a car for the production of a licence and suggested that this could be done by inserting the word "reasonably" between the words "when" and "demanded" in the second line of the sub-section.

Mr. MacDonald suggested that the procedure in regard to licences should be assimilated to the procedure under the Licences Ordinance; under that Ordinance it was not necessary to carry a licence all over the place with one.

The Administrator explained that this law had a rather different purpose to the law requiring the licensing of guns, boats, &c. The driver of any car might be unlicensed, and might be unfit to have a licence, and such a person could be stopped by the police and prevented from continuing to be a public danger.

After further discussion the Acting Attorney General moved that the words "for any reasonable cause" be inserted at the end of the first sentence of the sub-section. Motion seconded by Mr. Simmons and agreed to.

Section 8. Mr. Simmons said that this section gave the Governor in Council very wide powers in the making of Regulations and moved that the following sub-section be added.—"(3) Any Regulations made by the Governor in Council under this Ordinance shall be laid before the Legislative Council for approval".

Motion seconded by Mr. Corea and agreed to.

Section 9 (1) (a). Mr. Corea moved that the speed limit of 16 miles an hour should be increased to 20 miles an hour.

The Administrator said he was prepared to go to 20 miles an hour but no further. Twenty miles was the speed limit provided in the English Act and he thought the Secretary of State would not agree to an increase of that speed. This is a hilly island and it was therefore dangerous to travel at very high speeds. The speed limit in Trinidad he mentioned was only 15 miles an hour.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL MINUTE.

(No. 1 of 1914.)

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,

I have the honour to lay before you correspondence relative to the proposed purchase of lot No. 102 with all the buildings and erections thereon for the purpose of transferring to them the Post Office Department, the present accommodation for which is on account of the augmentation of business proving much too small for the needs of that office and the public.

2. £150 has been provided on the Estimates for necessary alterations to the buildings and if the Council approves of the proposals I trust that the alterations may be made and the Department transferred by the 1st July, 1914.

3. I may state that I have had an offer to purchase the house on the opposite corner to lot 102 at a considerably lower figure, but I rejected it for these reasons (a) that it is not half so suitable as the site now proposed to be purchased, (b) that it would practically have to be rebuilt and therefore in the long run would cost in the aggregate just as much and probably more than lot 102, (c) that there are no conveniences for a motor garage for the Government Mail Service, (d) that rebuilding would mean (1) that probably a whole year would elapse before the new premises could be occupied by the Post Office, and (2) the immediate provision of a largish amount to pay for the site and rebuilding necessitating the elimination from the Estimates next year of important works.

4. I recommend these proposals to the favourable consideration of Hon. Members on the grounds that they are the most suitable and in all the circumstances the most advantageous that can be adopted for the objects in view.

Their acceptance will be moved in the following Resolution :—

“Be it resolved that this Council having considered the proposals contained in the Administrator’s despatch No. 135 of the 6th December, 1913, relative to the purchase from Mrs. Charles Simmons of lot 102 Kingstown with all buildings and erections thereon for the purpose of transferring to them the Department of the General Post Office, accepts the proposals contained therein and agrees to vote the necessary monies to carry them into effect”

Sir,—I have the honour to inform Your Excellency that notwithstanding the addition to the Post Office three years ago I have for some time past recognized that the present building is inadequate for the volume of business now

passing through it and that some special step must be taken to cope with the difficulty and to provide more suitable and commodious accommodation for the Postal Department. I have received representations from numerous quarters to this effect and as a result of them and in order to relieve the pressure I made temporary arrangements 4 months ago for the delivery of letters and for the sale of stamps in mail weeks in one of the rooms in a rented Government Building adjoining the Post Office.

2. As it happens Mrs. Charles Simmons, the widow of the late Mr. Charles Simmons, has offered for sale to the Government a building on a site eminently suited for the Post Office. The site must evidently at one time have been part of the Government Office grounds as will be observed by the attached sketch* and in my opinion this opportunity should be taken to acquire it back again. Of when and why it was sold there is no available record.

3. The dwelling can with an expenditure of £150, I am advised, be turned into an excellent Post Office whilst in the yard is a substantial masonry shed building opening on to the main street, that can be adapted for a garage for the Government Mail Service Motor Cars (vide Secretary of State's despatch No. 83 of 4th November). In addition, a living room can at small expense be provided for the chauffeur.

4. I enclose a copy of a report by the Superintendent of Works on the buildings and site. He estimates them together to be worth £600 to £700. The owner having asked me £800 for the site and all the buildings as they stand is now after negotiation willing to accept £700. She is also agreeable to the following terms:—

(a) The Government to lease the lot (No. 102) and all buildings and erections thereon for a term not exceeding five years at a yearly rental of £30 per annum.

(b) The Government to undertake to purchase the lot and all buildings and erections thereon for a sum of £700 not later than five years from the date upon which the deed of agreement is finally signed and concluded, such deed to be signed not later than 15th June, 1914.

(c) The Government to be permitted to purchase and obtain freehold possession of the lot and all buildings and erections thereon on payment of a sum of £700 at any time within the said period of five years. All payment of rental by the Government to cease from date of purchase.

(d) The Government to be permitted during the said term of five years to make any alterations in or additions to the buildings and erections on the lot as may be deemed necessary or expedient to the Government.

5. The gist of these terms is that the Government must pay the purchase price some time in the next five years. This is a convenience to the Government for whilst I am unable to propose that the capital expenditure be included in next year's Estimates still I may remark that the revised surplus assets after providing for all probable supplementary votes is estimated to be, on 31st March, 1914, £9,193†. Therefore as £8,000 is the floating balance considered necessary (vide Secretary of State's 1913-14 Estimates despatch St. Vincent No. 31 of 25th April, 1913) it might be possible if all goes well to liquidate the debt next year. In the meantime rental at the rate of £30 per annum would be payable.

6. I recommend that Mrs. Simmons's offer be accepted for the reasons:—

(a) that if the Government miss this opportunity of acquiring this site, it may not have the chance again and it is an important site for the Government to possess.

(b) that the building already there is of good solid masonry and can very easily be adapted for a Post Office and in addition there are the other advantages referred to in paragraph 4 of this despatch.

(c) taking the value of the site at £100 and the buildings, paved yard, stone drains, etc., at £600 it would not be possible to put up a similar building and surroundings at that price and in addition the amount of time saved in erecting a completely new Post Office would be considerable.

7. I therefore ask Your Excellency and the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for the Colonies to approve of my submitting these proposals with the financial estimates to the Legislative Council in February involving during next financial year an expenditure as follows:—

(a) Capital Expenditure £150* on alterations and additions to the Building.

(b) Rental £30.*

8. As against (b) in the preceding paragraph I may state that as a result of these arrangements it would be possible to terminate when the new Post Office was ready for use the rental of the building mentioned in paragraph 1 of this despatch now rented by the Government at £30 a year and occupied by the Department of the Government Veterinary Surgeon, for that Department can then be accommodated in the vacated Post Office building.

9. A telegraphic reply is necessary if the matter is to be considered with next year's Estimates. Besides which I have to make arrangements for a garage at an early date as the Government Motor Mail Service comes into being on the 1st April, 1914.

His Honour The Administrator,

I have the honour to report that in accordance with Your Honour's request I inspected the premises, Lot 102, adjacent to the Government Offices and grounds owned by Mrs. Charles Simmons.

The dimensions of the lot are approximately 56 ft. wide (frontage on Back Street) 70 ft. deep (frontage on Egmont Street.)

The main building, formerly occupied as a residence, contains 4 rooms (drawing room and dining room on the ground floor and two bedrooms on the upper floor) with an extension which contains the staircase.

The outbuildings comprise a bath house which opens on the street and has been fitted with entrance doors for the accommodation of a carriage, a kitchen, pantry, servant's room, stable with two stalls and two E.C.'s.

Owing to the small number of rooms and the exposed position of the ground floor rooms, I do not think that a higher rent than £36 per annum would be obtainable if let for residential purposes.

The buildings are substantially built and in good repair, the yard is paved and is enclosed with masonry boundary walls.

The situation is an important one being on a corner and bounded on the interior sides by Government property.

The locality is a convenient one for a Post Office and the premises can be easily adapted for that purpose. The yard space admits of an extension of the building at any time if required.

The value of the premises to the Government I estimate at £600 to £700. To provide a new building upon another site will cost about £800 and if the Government acquire Mrs. Simmons' property for £700 and spend £100 on its adaptation (including a small extension) the necessary accommodation would be obtained.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL MINUTE.

(No. 2 of 1914.)

HONOURABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,

I have the honour by direction of the Governor to lay before you the appended extract from a speech delivered by His Excellency on the 17th January, 1914, to the St. Lucia Legislative Council in which is outlined a proposal for the appointment of a Principal Medical Officer in charge of the Medical Departments of the Windward Islands. I would ask you to give earnest consideration to the proposal and at the next meeting of the Council this minute will be laid for discussion and with the object of ascertaining the views of Hon. Members on the subject.

Mr. Corea then asked the following question:—

“Will the Government take steps to alter the wording of that section of the “Customs Duties Ordinance, 1913, which applies to the Import Duty on Fine Salt, “in view of the fact that the present wording practically prevents the importation “of Fine Salt in any package containing less than 180 lbs.”

And received the following reply:—

“On the next occasion that any alteration is being made to the Tariff the “Government is prepared to include an amendment making the duty payable on “Fine Salt 4d. a bag on a bag not exceeding 90 lbs.”

Mr. Hazell pointed out that bags weighing 60 lbs were imported as well as half bags of 90 lbs and said he thought that the contemplated amendment should include such bags. The Customs authorities had recognised these half bags and accepted the proportionate amount of duty on them and he did not see why bags of 60 lbs should not be similarly treated.

The Treasurer explained that as the law stood bags of less than 180 lbs were liable to the same rate of duty as bags of 180 lbs. There was no alternative. In the case of half bags he had used his discretion and authorised acceptance of half the duty but he was not prepared to go further than that as this would eventually mean the recognition of all sorts of odd weights. If the words “and so in like proportion for any greater or less quantity” had been in the tariff against this item it would have been possible to accept duty on *any* weight of salt, but they had not been inserted.

Mr. Corea said that the amendment proposed was a partial one and that the matter could only be remedied by the insertion in the tariff of the words mentioned by the Treasurer.

Mr. Hazell thought that it was only fair and honest to exact duty on actual quantities. He also expressed the opinion that 60 lb bags could not be classed as bags of “odd” weight.

The Acting Administrator suggested that the matter might be left in his hands. He would endeavour to ascertain whether the words referred to by the Treasurer had been left out of the tariff without intention and if so he would see whether they could not be inserted.

New Post Office.

Legislative Council Minute No. 4 of 1914 (annexed), containing proposals for meeting the cost of certain necessary alterations and additions to the building recently leased for the accommodation of the Post Office Department was laid before the Council.

The Acting Administrator said that as this Minute had been circulated to Hon. Members prior to the meeting they would be aware of the proposals and would have given them consideration. He therefore moved the adoption of the following Resolution:—

“*Be it resolved* that this Council having considered certain proposals contained “in Legislative Council Minute No. 4 of 1914 for additional expenditure on the “proposed new Post Office premises whereby the Estimates for 1914-15 will “not be increased, and having also considered the plan of the proposed alterations “submitted therewith, now hereby expresses its approval of both the proposals “and the plan and recommends that the work be proceeded with forthwith “upon the lines suggested in that Minute.”

Motion seconded by the Treasurer and Resolution passed unanimously.

REPORT ON THE POSTAL DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR 1913-14.

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
ST. VINCENT, B.W.I.,
7th August, 1914.

Sir,—Accompanied by the usual fifteen returns, I have the honour to submit the report on the Postal Department of this Colony and its dependencies for the year 1913-14.

Charge of the Office.

2. The Administration of the Department was in the hands of the under-mentioned officers who occupied the post of Colonial Postmaster during the year under review.

Mr. D. S. Aikman from 1st April to 1st July, 1913. Mr. P. L. Hutchinson from 2nd July to the end of the year.

SECTION I.—INLAND SERVICE.

3. The establishment of an office at New Adelphi on 1st July 1913, made the number of Post Offices eighteen and these were maintained throughout the year. Of these eight were of the first and ten of the second class.

The number of posting places remained unchanged.

Communication.

4. The mail services remained the same as during the previous year with the addition that calls have been made at the New Adelphi Office on the up and down route three times a week. The mails for the Grenadines were from the 1st September, 1913, to the 31st March, 1914, conveyed by sloop of twelve tons instead of by boat of three tons burthen and schedule time was adhered to except in a few instances when weather conditions were unfavourable.

Letters and Other Articles.

5. In Table 1 is shown the exchanges in the Inland Post which consisted of 105,844 letters and 26,403 other articles. These figures shew an increase of 5,757 letters and a decrease of 32,022 other articles on the exchanges of the previous year. This table also shews, in detail, the work done by each office.

Parcel Post.

6. The number of parcels, viz. 883, shews an increase of 160 on the figures of the previous year. Of these 248 were handled at Georgetown as shown in Table 2.

Registered Articles.

7. Detailed information regarding this service is given in Table 3 which shews an increase on the previous year's figures; the number of articles handled being 3,027 as against 3,003.

Money Orders.

8. There was an increase of £720 0 11 in the value of paid Money Orders and a decrease of £33 15 8 in the value of those issued as will be seen from Table 4.

SECTION II.—FOREIGN AND COLONIAL SERVICE.

9. There was a regular fortnightly call of the Intercolonial Royal Mail Steamers connecting at Trinidad with the Homeward Bound Steamers. The contract for the Canadian Service with the Pickford and Black Company expired in November, 1913. The new contract with the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company began in December, 1913, and these callings were very regular. Other lines called occasionally during the year.

Mail Conveyance and Receptacles.

10. 176 Steamers and 85 sailing vessels brought and took mails to and from the Colony. There were 989 bags and packets of mails received and 96 parcel post packages.

Letters and Other Articles.

11. Letters and other articles dealt with during the year numbered 275,058 as against 297,941 for the previous year. Tables 5 and 6 giving details shew an increase of 14,596 in letters and a decrease of 37,479 in articles.

Parcel Post and Import Duty.

12. 3,173 parcels were received and 524 despatched totalling 3,697, and the Import Duty collected amounted to £246 3 3. This shews a decrease of £5 9 6 on the previous year's collections. Table 7 gives details.

Money Orders.

13. Money Order transactions shew an increase on last year's figures of £892 15 10 as will be seen from Table 8. Those from the Canal Zone and Trinidad are responsible for this increase while those from the United Kingdom shew a decrease.

British Postal Orders and Poundage.

14. British Postal Orders issued during the year numbered 4,719 of a value of £2,002 1 2 including poundage. This is an increase on last year's figures of 742 orders to the value of £263 12 8. In Table 9 will be found the number of each value from 6d. to 21/-.

Table 10 shews the number and value of orders paid; the increase on last year's figures being 328 orders value £104 18 6.

15. Poundage collected and transferred to general revenue totalled £35 18 9.

Registered Articles.

16. An increase in these articles is shewn in Table 11. The number exchanged was 5,726 as against 5,204 in the previous year. Of this total 2,342 were exchanged with the United Kingdom and 1,353 with the United States of America and Canada.

Insured Letters.

17. The number of insured letters dealt with was forty-two with an insured value of £4,067. 9. 2, as against thirty-one with a declared value of £3,370. 10. 4 in the previous year.

Registered and Insured Parcels.

18. Tables 13 and 14 shew the extent of the work done in these branches. 146 registered Parcels with a value of £120. 13. 9½ were exchanged which is a slight decrease on last year's figures.

19. Insured parcels received and despatched were 194 with a value of £1,183. 1. 8½.

Trade Charges.

20. 510 "Cash on Delivery" parcels were received from the United Kingdom, one from Barbados and one from Trinidad. Of these 482 were delivered, and 30 were returned to the senders.

SECTION VI.—DEPARTMENTAL REMARKS.

Appointments.

26. The following appointments were made during the year—

At the General Post Office.

Mr. P. L. Hutchinson was appointed Postmaster on 2nd July, 1913.

On the 27th October Mr. B. A. Spence was appointed to act as Chief Clerk, Mr Aikman having been transferred to Grenada.

On the 27th October Mr. N. H. Cordice was appointed to act as Assistant Clerk in the Post Office in place of Mr. H. B. Isaacs who was appointed to act as Clerk to the Police Magistrate, Second District.

District Offices.

Miss Grace Allen was appointed District Postmistress at New Adelphi from the 1st July, 1913.

Staff.

27. The number of Officers at the General Post Office remained the same as during the previous year. The work in the seventeen District Offices was performed by 3 Revenue Officers, 3 Police and 11 private individuals.

It is a pleasure to record the valuable assistance rendered by all the members of the Postal Service during the year.

The Bill having been considered throughout in Committee the Council resumed on motion by the Treasurer seconded by Dr. Durrant, and on motion similarly made and seconded the Bill was read a third time by title and passed.

The Murray Road (Regulation of House Building) Ordinance.

The Administrator moved for leave to introduce a Bill for "An Ordinance to regulate the building, alteration, and reconstruction of houses situated within a defined area near to a certain part of the road from Kingstown to Windward known as 'The Murray Road'".

During the construction of the Murray Road, His Honour said, a number of houses had been erected in the Richmond Hill Valley and the locality bade fair to become a very pleasant residential part of Kingstown. Unless regulated the tendency would be for small and in some cases disreputable buildings to spring up in the neighbourhood of good houses. Indeed a most unsightly building had already made its appearance. This was a case in which "a stitch in time" would have a good effect and the Government having considered the matter had decided that it was desirable to define an area in which only buildings of fair proportions and good appearance would be allowed to be put up. It was not improbable that this district might eventually become part of Kingstown and if that should come to pass we should, by adopting the measure proposed, be doing very good service to the town. This possibility however was not a matter of practical importance just at present.

As would be found from the plan before Hon. Members the area proposed included the Agricultural Experiment Station, a portion of the Richmond Hill Valley extending to the ridge on the north-east thereof and the tract around the Government Cotton Ginnery. Only about half the road would be affected. On the remaining half there would be no restrictions beyond those imposed by ordinary sanitary requirements.

A few small buildings had already been erected on the reserved area but it was not proposed to require them to be removed. The Ordinance would only relate to houses built after its enactment. The Government hoped that these small buildings would gradually disappear from natural causes such as sale of the sites at enhanced values to people able to erect better houses.

Also it would not be possible to alter or reconstruct these small buildings without approval being first obtained under the Ordinance and this would not be readily given unless the alterations were satisfactory.

The plan of the area it was proposed to reserve would be on view at the Crown Lands Office. It was at present only a draft plan and if on consideration by the Council it was decided to amend it he did not anticipate that there would be any difficulty in doing so.

He hoped that the Council would see fit to pass the measure for although the road had the makings of a very fine one a series of unsightly buildings around it would detract considerably from its appearance.

Motion seconded by the Treasurer and leave granted.

Motor Car Service.

Reverting to the Return relating to the Government Motor Car Mail and Passenger Service which had just been laid before the Council, Mr. Hazell asked what the prospects were in regard to this service and whether it would effect a saving in the cost of conveying mails to Windward.

The Administrator referred the Hon. Member to the note at the foot of the Return and said he hoped the recent improvement in the service would continue.

He was not surprised that the return had been asked for as it must have been obvious that everything had not been going as it should.

The service had been started on a venturesome basis. There were no Chauffeurs to be had in the Colony and those imported had not all been successes. He hoped however gradually to get together a staff who would treat the Cars more carefully and be less costly to the Government.

In his management of the service the Colonial Postmaster had done some extremely good work under difficult circumstances. That officer's great difficulty lay in the fact that he could exercise no proper supervision over the Cars when they left Kingstown. With a view to removing this disability the service, except as regards the booking of seats and the issue of tickets, had recently been placed under the control of the Windward Warden whose continuous visits to Georgetown and other parts of the Windward District would enable him to have the Chauffeurs frequently under his eye and to supervise them more closely than was possible to the Postmaster.

It had also been arranged recently that the time taken in making the journeys out and in should be reported to headquarters. This constituted a further check on the Chauffeurs and forced them to drive at a more regular and moderate speed than formerly. The roads were by no means good yet. The surface needed a great deal of attention and unless the cars were driven carefully they were bound to suffer, as they had already suffered, from careless driving.

Notwithstanding the excessive cost of repairs however receipts from passenger fares and private hire of the cars had been so good that it was probable that the Government would not have to come to the Council for more money than that already voted, and with better treatment of the cars receipts ought nearly to equal expenditure next year.

Should a new car be needed there would shortly be two instalments of the depreciation fund available for its purchase. The Ford Cars were strong cars but ours had received bad handling at the hands of the Chauffeurs. He had recently arranged for the Engineer attached to the Public Works Department in Grenada to come up to St. Vincent and overhaul the cars and he trusted in view of all these measures to be able to make a fresh start with them in the New Year. The service was a great boon to the Windward District and he had received representations in Georgetown that on no account should it cease. The receipts from fares showed how much it was appreciated, and with the growth of traffic it might in the future become necessary to provide char-a-bancs to cope with it.

Mr. Hazell thought the Government could with advantage engage older and more responsible persons as Chauffeurs than the present boys. He had also heard a complaint that the starting of the cars from Georgetown on the return journey was sometimes delayed because of the non-arrival of the Orange Hill Mail. He did not think the public should be inconvenienced by delay for this reason.

The Administrator thought the case was probably an isolated one but said he would enquire into the matter.

Adjournment.

The day's business being completed, the Council was adjourned *sine die*.

NOTE.—Owing to difficulties in connection with the Chauffeurs and the unevenness of the surface of the road the cost of operation has been greater than anticipated. As however the receipts for passenger fares have been very much greater than was expected—£85 was the Estimate for the whole year whilst as a matter of fact £154 has been collected during the first 7 months—it is probable that by the end of the financial year the difference to be defrayed between the receipts and the working cost including Depreciation Fund, will not be larger than was estimated when the scheme was submitted to the Legislative Council, namely £276. It is to be noted that this is practically the same amount (*i.e.* only £26 more) as that which was formerly paid for a much more inconvenient and infrequent mail and passenger service to Georgetown than the service that is operated by motor car by the Government to-day.

NOTICE WITH REGARD TO GOODS SENT ABROAD AND RECEIVED FROM ABROAD BY PARCELS' POST.

1. With a view to preventing breaches of His Majesty's Proclamation dated the 9th September, relating to Trading with the Enemy it is hereby notified that the Postmaster has been authorised by the Government to require Certificates of Origin or Declarations of Ultimate Destination respectively to be presented in respect of all goods, wares, or merchandise sent into the Colony by parcels' post from or sought to be sent out of the

colony by parcels' post to any foreign place in Europe or on the Mediterranean or Black Seas, with the exception of those situated in Russia, Belgium, France, Spain, and Portugal.

2. Declarations of Ultimate Destination will consequently be required until further notice in respect of all parcels, without regard to their value addressed to all the foreign places referred to above.

3. For the present, however, Certificates of Origin will not be required in respect of any parcels sent into the Colony from places other than those situated in Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Holland, Switzerland, and Italy, or in respect of individual consignments not exceeding £25 in value. The Declarations of Ultimate Destination must be in the form prescribed by the Schedule hereto.

4. Any parcels of goods, wares, or merchandise sent into the Colony by parcels' post from the above mentioned foreign places, except as provided in paragraph 3, unaccompanied by Certificates of Origin will be detained by the Postmaster until the requisite certificates are produced. The Postmaster is, however, authorised in such cases, and at his discretion, to allow delivery of the goods on the security of a deposit or of a bond to the amount of three times the value of the goods with a view to the production of the necessary certificates within a prescribed period, provided that he sees no reason for suspecting that the goods emanate from an enemy country.

5. Parcels of goods, wares, or merchandise addressed to any foreign places in Europe or on the Mediterranean or Black Seas, with the exception of those situated in Russia, Belgium, France, Spain and Portugal will not be forwarded until Declarations of Ultimate Destination in the form prescribed have been lodged with the Postmaster.

6. A single Declaration of Ultimate Destination may be used to cover any number of parcels delivered by the same sender to the Postmaster at the same time.

7. Declarations of Ultimate Destination must be made by the actual sender or by some responsible representative of the actual sender (or in the case of a limited Company by a Director, Secretary, Manager or other responsible officer) having a personal and first-hand knowledge of the enquiries made and of the facts stated in the Declaration.

8. Goods sent into the Colony under licence will be exempt from these requirements.

9. This notice is supplementary to a notice entitled a "Notice to Importers and Exporters".

And whereas it is desirable to provide protection within the said Dominions for the unpublished works of Citizens of the United States of America:

Now, THEREFORE, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority conferred upon him by the Copyright Act, 1911, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The Copyright Act, 1911, including the provisions as to existing works, shall, subject to the provisions of the said Act and of this Order, apply—

- (a) to literary, dramatic, musical and artistic works the authors whereof were at the time of the making of the works Citizens of the United States of America, in like manner as if the authors had been British Subjects:
- (b) in respect of residence in the United States of America, in like manner as if such residence had been residence in the parts of His Majesty's Dominions to which the said Acts extends.

Provided that—

- (i) the term of Copyright within the parts of His Majesty's Dominions to which this Order applies shall not exceed that conferred by the law of the United States of America:
- (ii) the enjoyment of the rights conferred by this Order shall be subject to the accomplishment of the conditions and formalities prescribed by the law of the United States of America:
- (iii) in the application to existing works of the provisions of Section 24 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the commencement of this order shall be substituted for the 26th July, 1910, in subsection 1 (b).

2. This Order shall apply to all His Majesty's Dominions, Colonies and Possessions, with the exception of those hereinafter named, that is to say:—

The Dominion of Canada.
The Commonwealth of Australia.
The Dominion of New Zealand.
The Union of South Africa.
Newfoundland.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1915, which day is in this Order referred to as the commencement of this Order.

WITH reference to the subjoined Regulations for the government and control of the Motor Mail and Passenger Service between Kingstown and Georgetown, the Administrator desires to explain that the general increase in passenger fares which will be seen therein is unavoidable and has been rendered necessary by the wear and tear imposed on the cars by the roughness of the roads and the heavy cost of tyres and repairs caused thereby.

It should be noted moreover that the service has been further improved and that a motor car will now run every day instead of 5 days a week and in addition from Georgetown to Kingstown and back one day a week.

Regulations made by the Governor in Council to govern and control the Motor Mail Service between Kingstown and Georgetown and to regulate the hire of cars for private use when not employed on Government service.

1. The Motor Cars shall be under the complete control of the Windward Warden who will be responsible that they are kept in order and that the mail service is, so far as he can influence circumstances, run efficiently and up to time.

2. A mail passenger service will be run as far as circumstances will permit upon the following programme :—

4. Government Officials when travelling on duty will take priority of ordinary travellers; otherwise all applications for seats will be dealt with in sequence of receipt by the Colonial Postmaster.

5. Seats may be pre-booked with the Colonial Postmaster but persons desirous of travelling between Kingstown and Georgetown or vice versa shall have priority in pre-booking over persons desirous of making any of the other journeys.

6. No passenger on the mail car should in any way interfere with the Chauffeur or with the running of the car or with the speed at which it is travelling unless in his opinion it is being driven so fast as to exceed the speed limit or to be dangerous to the safety of the occupants of the car or to the public. In that case a passenger may caution the Chauffeur to drive more slowly. Should the Chauffeur persist the passenger should report him to the Windward Warden.

7. (1) No passenger will be allowed to enter the car until he has delivered to the Chauffeur a ticket for the journey on which he is desirous of going and the Chauffeur will be held responsible for the correct delivery of all tickets at the General Post Office daily.

(2) In any special case a Government Official travelling on duty may be permitted to enter the car between stations without a ticket. It shall be the duty of the said Government Official so entering the car to communicate the circumstance as soon as possible afterwards to the Colonial Postmaster and the amount of fare to be paid by him shall be the fare payable from the last station of stoppage by the car. The said fare shall be paid to the Postmaster at the station at which such Government Official terminates his journey.

(3) The Chauffeur shall on no account permit any unauthorized person to drive in a Government Motor Car. Should the Chauffeur commit a breach of this Regulation he will be liable to a fine of 4/- for each unauthorized person so carried.

8. Particular attention is drawn to section 48 (1) of the Public Health Ordinance, 1910, which reads as follows. It is to be noted that a breach of this section carries with it on conviction a liability to a penalty not exceeding £10:—

“48. (1.) The owner or driver of a vehicle used for “the carrying of persons for fee or reward shall not “knowingly convey, nor shall any other person “knowingly place in such vehicle, a person whom he “knows to be suffering from any infectious disease, nor “shall a person suffering from any such disease enter “any such vehicle unless so authorised to do by a “Local Authority or Medical Officer”.

9. If the driver of a carriage or cart or a rider coming towards the mail car holds up his hand, then the mail car must be at once brought to a stand still and then driven carefully and slowly past the carriage, cart or rider.

10. Motor Cars will only be hired out for private use when not required for Government service.

11. All applications for the hire of Motor Cars for private use must be made to the Windward Warden who has the sole power to deal with them and who will inform applicants of the charges.

12. Any person hiring a car or any guest of his, must not attempt to drive the car or to interfere in any way with the driving gear or running of the car. Any person committing a breach of this regulation will be held liable to make good any damage that may accrue to the car as a result of his interference.

13. Any person hiring a car should warn the Chauffeur should he suspect that the speed limit laid down by the law is being exceeded, or should the

Chauffeur be driving in such a way as in his opinion constitutes a danger to the safety of the car or to the public.

14. Passengers are particularly requested not to give liquor to the Chauffeur.

15. The amount of personal baggage to be carried by a passenger whilst travelling in a car will be limited to a handbag or small grip, or any small parcels that a passenger can carry in his hands. Such handbag, small grip or small parcels so carried weighing not more than 30 lbs. will be charged for at the following rates:—

Up to 12 lbs.	6d.
For every 6 lbs. over 12 lbs.	6d.

Provided however that if in the opinion of the Chauffeur there is no room for baggage or parcels owing to the size of the mail or any other reason, then such Chauffeur shall have full discretion to decline to allow a passenger to carry any baggage beyond what he can carry in his hands without taking up any additional room in the car.

16. For the present no car will be hired out to travel on any but the main road between Kingstown and Georgetown, Kingstown and Mesopotamia Police Station, in the town of Kingstown, or between Kingstown and Government House and Kingstown and Fort Charlotte Draw Bridge and the Yaws Hospital.

17. The Regulations for the government and control of the Motor Mail Service between Kingstown and Georgetown made by the Governor in Council on the 4th day of March, 1914, are hereby repealed.

18. These Regulations will come into force on the 1st May, 1915.

Regulations made by the General Health Authority under sub-section 1 of Section 9 of the Public Health Ordinance, 1910.

1. The following are hereby declared to be nuisances:—

- (1) All so-called surface latrines and privies;
- (2) All latrines or privies to which beast and poultry have access;
- (3) The deposit, within the limits of any Town, of human faeces on to or in any premises or place other than into a properly constructed closet or into a privy of such description and construction as is approved for the time being by the General Health Authority;
- (4) The deposit outside the limits of Towns, of human faeces on to or in any premises or place other than a pit, hole or trench of such description and construction as the General Health Authority may for the time being require;
- (5) Human faeces lying exposed or uncovered on the surface of the ground of any premises or place within or without a Town.

2. This Regulation may be cited as The Public Health (Ankylostomiasis) Regulation, 1915.

THIS was an appeal from the decision of the learned Acting Magistrate of the Kingstown District that a Planter is liable under the Kingstown Board Ordinance 1897 to payment of traders' stock rate in respect of sugar and arrowroot, the produce of his plantation, sold by him in Kingstown or exported by him.

SUBSECTION (b) of section 2 of the Rules for the purchase and reception for kiln-drying purposes at the Government Cotton Ginnery of Corn, which were approved by the Governor in Council on the 3rd day of July, 1915, is hereby amended by the addition at the end thereof of the words "except from those persons who have previously sold corn during the then current season".

ST. VINCENT GOVERNMENT COTTON GINNERY.

1. The Ginnery will be opened each working day from 7 a.m. until 5 p.m. Seed cotton will be received for ginning purposes during these hours.

2. All written communications connected with the business of the Ginnery should be addressed to:—
The Manager, Government Cotton Ginnery, Kingstown.

3. In all cases the bags containing the seed cotton must bear the name of the grower, or the mark of the estate, and a statement of the number of bags and total weight must accompany them. The Manager will not be held responsible for unmarked bags.

4. On delivery of the cotton at the Ginnery, the Manager will issue a receipt for the number of bags and actual weight, after the latter has been duly checked. Such receipts will form the basis of all business transactions between the grower and the Ginnery.

5. For carefully picked and *thoroughly dried* Sea Island Cotton free from leaves, trash, etc., the charge for ginning and baling will be at the rate of two cents (one penny) per lb. of lint. The seed will be returned to the grower in the bags in which his seed cotton was sent in.

N.B.—The usual proportion of lint to seed cotton is at the rate of 22 to 26 lbs. of lint to every 100 lbs. of seed cotton. Unless the seed cotton is very thoroughly dried and well picked beforehand, there is usually a loss in ginning ranging from 2 to 5 lbs. per 100 lbs. of seed cotton.

6. The seed from white seed cotton will be received at the Oil-expressing Department of the Ginnery upon the following terms:—For every ton of seed delivered 1,700 lbs. of meal will be returned together with six

dollars 50 cents in cash or more or less in cash according to the fluctuations of the market for crude oil. The meal must be taken away within 7 days after due notice has been given that it is ready for delivery otherwise a storage charge will be made of 3*d.* per bag per week or part of a week.

7. The charge for disintegrating seed from stained cotton for manurial purposes will be at the rate of 12 cents per 100 lbs. for quantities not exceeding 1,000 lbs. in weight to growers whose whole crop does not exceed 1,000 lbs. in weight. The charge to growers whose whole crop exceeds 1,000 lbs. will be at the rate of \$4.00 per ton. Disinfection of seed prior to disintegration will be at the rate of \$2.00 per ton. A similar storage charge to that made under Rule 6 will be made for seed left at the Ginnery for more than 7 days after disintegration.

8. The charges for ginning and baling and disintegrating must be made before delivery of the lint and seed from the Ginnery, except by those who are allowed to settle their accounts monthly.

9. After ginning and baling cotton notice shall be given by the Manager of the Ginnery when cotton has been ginned and baled, but such cotton will not be stored for a longer period than two months from the date of such notice except at a charge of 6*d.* per bale per month or any part of a month.

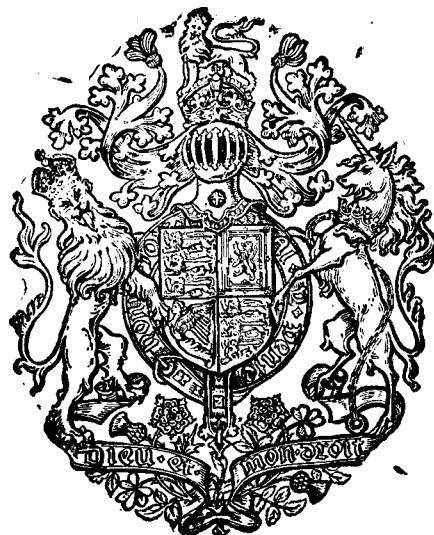

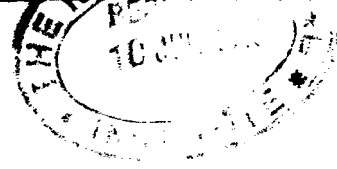

Mr. Richards remarked that the grant was in his opinion richly deserved. The motion was then put to the vote and the Resolution adopted *nem. con.*

The War Stamp Ordinance, 1916.

The Attorney General moved for leave to introduce a Bill for "An Ordinance to require a special War Postage Stamp of the denomination of one penny to be affixed to certain postal packages posted in the Colony".

Seconded by the Treasurer and leave granted.

The Attorney General stated that the special circumstances which had given rise to the Bill were fully set out in the Administrator's Minute No. 4 of 1916. It did not seem necessary to add anything further except to point out that the stamp must be affixed to all postal matter sent inland and to letters and parcels posted to the United Kingdom or to any other part of the British Empire.

On motion by the Attorney General seconded by the Treasurer, the Bill was read a first time by title.

The Attorney General stated that as it was proposed to bring the Bill into operation on the 1st of June it was desirable that the measure should be passed at this meeting. The same action was being taken in the other Colonies of the Windward Islands group and it was desirable that we should fall into line. He moved therefore that the Standing Orders be suspended to allow the Bill to be proceeded with.

Seconded by the Treasurer and agreed to.

On motion similarly made and seconded the Council went into Committee on the Bill.

At this juncture Mr. Simmons entered the Council Chamber and took his seat.

In Committee Mr. Richards asked whether it was not an opportune time to reduce the rate of postage to the United States of America to one penny. It had been done in Barbados and in certain other Colonies.

The Administrator said the Hon. Member's question was not quite in order on the Bill before the Council. He would mention however that the matter had already been raised and that he personally was in agreement with the proposal and would endorse it if satisfied that we would not be losing more than we could afford by adopting it.

Mr. Richards said he doubted whether there would be a loss. It was likely that the volume of correspondence would increase, as on previous occasions when the postal rates had been reduced, and with it the revenue therefrom.

Mr. Simmons said that as the Hon. Member had raised the question he desired to state that the Unofficial Members would make no objection to the War Stamp Bill provided the Government could see its way to negotiate a penny postage with the United States of America. The new impost was not contemplated at the time when the Administrator had placed before the Council his proposals in regard to additional taxation to meet falling revenue. The sum which it was anticipated would be realised from the new tax was extraneous and additional to the proposals then made. Unforeseen increases in expenditure were given as the cause of its introduction. He desired to say that from the point of view of the Unofficial Members the policy of endeavouring to meet current expenditure by increasing taxation was wrong. Increasing expenditure should be met by retrenchment. He was sorry to use that word as it caused pain in some directions but in a small place like this it represented the only possible course to follow. In speaking of retrenchment he meant radical retrenchment. The Government had had to ask for increased taxation too frequently of late. Drastic economies should be the rule except where matters of life and death were involved. The Colony had been through days of greater financial severity when it had been necessary to retrench heavily, and the economies then effected had proved of great assistance when a period of comparative prosperity arrived. Inasmuch as we had now practically reverted to a position almost similar to that which had preceded that prosperous period the time had come, he thought, to resort to the

policy that had then been expedient. If we continued to increase taxation the inevitable result would follow. He asked the Government to consider seriously the advisability of endeavouring to effect economies. Mr. Richards' suggestion would be a *quid pro quo*, though not altogether so, and it would help a section of the community which after all provided a good deal of revenue, namely the business section. Such indirect help would re-act in the Government's favour by producing eventually an augmented revenue from postal sources. The Unofficial Members did not ask that their request should be granted as an act of grace. It was a matter of business and the proposal was put forward in that light.

The Administrator said that as regards the general question of radical retrenchment, he need hardly remind the Hon. Member that that was the Government's attitude. There had for instance been a reduction of some £1,500 in this year's Estimates, and he was unable to see in what further respects there could be economies without loss of efficiency. He was however at all times prepared to consider sympathetically any suggestion Hon. Members might be able to put forward which did not involve the sacrifice of efficiency. We were in fact somewhat in the position of a merchant vessel. In good times freights and profits were good; in bad times there was a loss; but whether the times were good or bad the ship had still to be adequately officered and manned.

In the case of a ship however it was always open to the owners to lay her up and cut their losses. In the case of a Colony this was not possible.

The utmost that could be done was to discontinue expenditure on services that were not absolutely necessary. Government had done their best to do so but he would welcome any practicable suggestions for further reduction in working expenses.

His Honour expressed the view that a Select Committee of the Council including unofficial and official members would be the best method of dealing with the matter.

As regards the question of reducing the postage to the United States of America he had already informed the Governor that he was entirely in agreement with the proposal but having regard to the heavy and increasing expenditure which it was necessary to meet on account of increased cost of supplies, the Contingent, &c., &c., any step which would result in a reduction of revenue at this time was of doubtful expediency. If by any possibility however it was found practicable to introduce the lower rate he would be willing to accept a motion in its favour.

Mr. Simmons said he thought His Honour's proposal for the appointment of a Select Committee would be the best course to follow, and if sufficient time were allowed for a thorough consideration of the matter it would probably be productive of beneficial results.

Mr. Richards agreed.

The consideration in Committee of the Bill having been completed, Council resumed on motion by the Attorney General seconded by the Treasurer and on motion similarly made and seconded the Bill was read a third time by title and passed.

Adjournment.

On motion by the Attorney General seconded by the Treasurer, the Council was adjourned *sine die*.

Age must be proved by baptismal or other proper certificate before the day of examination.

3. That exhibitions be opened to pupils of any Primary School, but that no pupil, whose parent resides within a mile of the boundaries of Kingstown, be eligible to compete for a scholarship.

4. That no candidate will be elected to fill a vacancy who does not obtain at least one-third of the maximum in each subject, and one-half the possible total in the subjects of the examination.

5. That the parent or guardian of the successful candidate provide all the necessary books of study during his attendance in the Grammar School, and send him to school regularly, punctually and in a tidy condition from the September following the award of the scholarship or exhibition.

6. That the scholarship or exhibition be held on condition of good behaviour and punctual attendance,

absence for more than one-third of a term, except in cases of illness proved by medical certificate, rendering it liable to forfeiture.

Any scholar or exhibitioner, on whose conduct, attendance or progress the Head Master of the Grammar School reports unfavourably will forfeit his scholarship or exhibition, forthwith, or at the end of the school year according to the circumstances of the case and the decision of the Governor, which shall be final.

I have the honour to lay before you, in accordance with the Governor's desire, a copy of a despatch which His Excellency has addressed to the Secretary of State for the Colonies relative to the proposal for a reduction in the rates of postage between the Windward Islands and the United States of America.

Sir,—With reference to your despatch No. 61 of 18th April, 1916, the Councils of the different Islands are in favour of the reduction of postal rates between the Windward Islands and the United States as they are of opinion that the commercial gain would be greater than any loss of postal revenue that might accrue.

2. In view of the introduction of the Postage War Tax if the reduction was made at present it would give a preference to the United States of America as against the United Kingdom and British Possessions. I therefore do not propose to take advantage of the authority granted to me under your despatch above quoted until the termination of the war.

The War Stamp (Inland Post Exemption) Ordinance.

On motion by the Attorney General seconded by the Treasurer, Council went into Committee on Bill for "An Ordinance to exempt newspapers posted to places in the Colony from the provisions of the War Stamp Ordinance, 1916".

The Administrator stated that since the last meeting he had ascertained from the Governments of Grenada and St. Lucia that the War Stamp in those Colonies did not apply to inland postal matter. He had been led to understand after discussing the matter with His Excellency the Governor that the War Stamp was to apply to all classes of postal matter. If he had known that this was not the intention in Grenada and St. Lucia he would not have proposed its application to inland postal matter in this Colony. In the circumstances he thought we should fall into line with the sister Colonies and amend our law so as to exempt all inland postal matter from the provisions of the War Stamp Ordinance, 1916.

Mr. Simmons moved that the law be amended accordingly. Seconded by the Attorney General and agreed to.

On motions by the Attorney General seconded by the Treasurer, the word "Post" was substituted for the word "Newspapers" in the second line of section 1; the words "all letters, papers, newspapers, books, parcels, and other packages," were substituted for the word "newspapers" in lines one and two of section 2; and the words "all postal matter" substituted for the word "newspapers" in line one of the title.

On motions similarly made and seconded the Council resumed and Bill was read a third time by title and passed.

The Volunteer (Extra Colonial Discharge) Ordinance.

On motion by the Attorney General seconded by the Treasurer, Council went into Committee on Bill for "An Ordinance to provide for the discharge of members of the Volunteer Force who are subject to the Army Act in virtue of "The Volunteer Ordinance, 1915."

Bill was then read through in Committee.

On motions similarly made and seconded the Council resumed and Bill was read a third time by title and passed.

The Magistrates (Accounting and Disposal of Monies) Ordinance.

On motion by the Attorney General seconded by the Treasurer, Council went into Committee on Bill for "An Ordinance to provide for the disposal of monies received by Magistrates and for matters incidental thereto."

The Administrator stated that since the last meeting of the Council he had gone into the suggestion made by Mr. MacDonald that provision should be made in the Bill for a refund of costs being made by Magistrates, instead of by the Treasurer, in cases where defendants were committed to prison in default of payment of a fine and costs.

The Magistrates had informed him that no useful purpose would be served by the insertion of such a provision. Cases were of such rare occurrence that it was not worth while. That was the opinion of Mr. Isaacs whose experience as a Magistrate extended over a period of twenty years and the same view was held by the former Magistrate of the Leeward District and the present Magistrate of the Second District. By inadvertence he had not referred the matter to the Magistrate of the First District and he proposed therefore to leave the Bill in Committee to enable him to do so.

Bill was then read through in Committee.

On motion by the Attorney General seconded by the Treasurer, Council resumed.

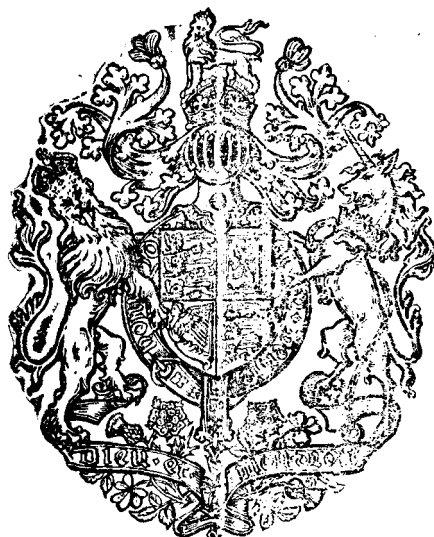

Referring to the first paragraph of the Regulation I am to state that the classes of persons in respect of whom the persons authorized by the Governor will be empowered to grant exemptions, will be British subjects who are known to be regular traders between Trinidad and neighbouring British Colonies, or well known inhabitants of such Colonies.

3. All other persons landing in, or embarking from Trinidad are requested to produce passports.

Regulation made by the Governor under the provisions of the Order-in-Council of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria of the 26th day of October, 1896, (published in Proclamation No. 33 of 1914) as amended by the Order-in-Council of His Majesty of the 21st day of March, 1916, (published in Proclamation No. 32 of 1916) and of all other powers him enabling in that behalf.

(1.) A person coming from, or intending to proceed to, any place out of the Colony as a passenger shall not, without the special permission of the Governor, or of any person authorized by him to grant permission, land or embark at any port in the Colony unless he has in his possession a valid passport issued to him not more than two years previously, by or on behalf of the Government of the country of which he is a subject or a citizen, or, in the case of a person coming from a place outside the Colony, either such a passport or some other document satisfactorily establishing his nationality and identify.

To every such passport and document as aforesaid there must be attached a photograph of the person to whom it relates.

(2.) If any person lands or embarks in contravention of this regulation, or if where any such special permission to land has been granted by the Governor or such authorized person subject to any conditions, the person to whom it was granted fails to comply with any such condition, he shall be liable on summary conviction before a Magistrate to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for any period not ex-

ceeding six months, or to a fine not exceeding £100, or to both such imprisonment and fine.

(3.) For the purpose of this regulation the expression "passenger" includes any person carried on a ship other than a master or persons employed in the work or service of the ship.

(4.) The Regulation of the 30th October, 1916, is hereby revoked.

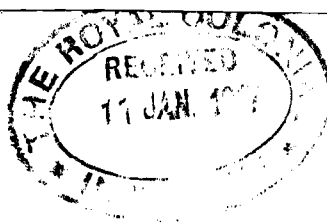

Regulations made by the Administrator under the provisions of a Royal Order in Council of the 26th of October, 1896, as amended by Royal Orders in Council of the 20th August, 1914, the 28th August, 1914, and the 21st March, 1916, respectively, whereof proclamation was made in the issue of the Gazette of the 11th December, 1916.

REGULATIONS WITH REGARD TO THE EXTINGUISHMENT AND SUPPRESSION OF LIGHTS AND FIRES ON LAND AND OF SHIPS' LIGHTS.

1. All lights and fires on land shall between the hours of 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. be extinguished or obscured to such an extent as to render them invisible from any part of the sea.

If any light or fire is not extinguished or obscured as required by this Regulation, any person having control of the light or fire for the time being, and the occupier or other person having control or management of or being in charge of any premises or any vehicle in or on which such light or fire is displayed, shall be guilty of an offence against these Regulations, and any person authorised by the Chief of Police in that behalf, or any member of the police force, may extinguish or obscure any light or fire which is not extinguished or obscured in accordance with this Regulation, and for that purpose may enter any premises, or stop

and seize any vehicle, or do any other act which may be necessary.

2. No light, either aloft, on deck or below, shall be permitted to be visible from outboard. This shall apply to all vessels of every description, other than His Majesty's Ships, whether under way or at anchor within the territorial water of the Colony.

If any vessel fails to comply with this regulation, the master or other person in command or charge of the vessel shall be guilty of an offence against these Regulations.

REGULATION PROVIDING FOR A CENSORSHIP OF POSTAL MATTER.

3. The Colonial Postmaster, or any person appointed by him for the purpose, may open any letters, papers, newspapers, books and parcels and any other postal package, and

(a) May with the written authority of the Administrator detain or destroy any such package, or

(b) may transmit the same to its destination, with, in the case of letters, papers, newspapers and books, such passages deleted or cut out as the Administrator may direct.

REGULATIONS PROHIBITING THE IMPORTATION INTO THE COLONY OF NEWSPAPERS CONTROLLED BY W. R. HEARST AND GIVING OF INFORMATION TO THE INTERNATIONAL NEWS SERVICE, ETC.

4. Any person who knowingly brings into the Colony, or who procures the introduction into the Colony of, any newspapers controlled by W. R. Hearst, and in

particular the newspapers mentioned in the Schedule hereto, shall be guilty of an offence against these Regulations.

5. The Colonial Postmaster, or any person appointed by him under Regulation 3 hereof, may, without reference to the Administrator, detain and destroy any copies of newspapers controlled by W. R. Hearst, and in particular the newspapers mentioned in the schedule hereto.

6. Any person who gives any information to, or affords any facilities for the acquisition of any information to, the International News Service shall be guilty of an offence against these Regulations.

GENERAL.

7. Any person alleged to be guilty of an offence against the Regulation may be tried by a court of summary jurisdiction, and, on conviction for such an offence, shall be liable to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term not exceeding six months, or to a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds, or to both such imprisonment and fine.

and the Colonial Surgeon but some time would elapse before it would be possible to place the matter before the Council.

Since the Schedule as it stood was not suited to our present needs it was proposed to take power to appoint as Medical Officers any persons holding medical qualifications who might be deemed fit and proper persons to hold that office.

His Honour said he could discern no other way of dealing with the difficulty. It was possible that he might shortly receive a telegram saying that a qualified candidate was ready to sail from New York and if his qualifications were not included in the Schedule to the Medical Registration Ordinance it would be necessary to take steps to legalise his appointment in some other way. A case of this sort would be covered by the Bill under consideration.

Mr. MacDonald suggested that the proposed short title of the Bill should be amended so as to indicate more clearly that the measure was an emergency one and after some discussion he moved that the words "War Period" in parentheses should be inserted between the words "Officers" and "Ordinance" in section one.

Motion seconded by the Acting Attorney General and amendment made.

On motion by the Acting Attorney General seconded by the Colonial Surgeon the Bill was then read a first time by title.

On motions similarly made and seconded the Standing Orders were suspended, the Council went into Committee on the measure, resumed, and Bill was read a third time by title and passed.

Government Motor Car Service.

The Administrator said that he desired to make an explanation regarding the Government Motor Car Service between Kingstown and Georgetown.

When the Colonial Estimates were under consideration on the 24th of March last, the Council approved of a reduced weekly service of three round trips in order to keep the expenditure on the service within the limit of £500, for the year, as compared with the £666 spent in 1915-16.

As Honourable Members were aware, the Governor in Council had recently sanctioned an improved weekly service of four round trips, as the three trip service had proved very inconvenient. When that decision was taken the decision above mentioned was overlooked and the proposed change should properly speaking have been referred to the Council for their approval.

The estimated extra cost of the improved service will be £55 per annum. The passenger receipts on the basis of the late three trip service were estimated at £350 per annum. The earnings for the first five months of the current financial year however were at the rate of £412 per annum, an excess of £26.

As the addition of an extra trip makes it certain that that excess rate will be at least maintained and probably increased, the total excess revenue for the year will more than cover the cost of the extra service.

The service is a great public convenience and His Honour said he felt sure the Council would agree that whenever it could be increased without extra cost, as in this case, that course should be adopted in the public interest.

No objection was raised by the Council to the alteration made in the service.

Adjournment.

REPORT ON THE POSTAL DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR 1915-16.

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
SAINT VINCENT, B.W.I.,
20th September, 1916.

Sir,—I have the honour to submit the report on the Postal Department of this Colony and its dependencies for the official year 1915-16 accompanied by the usual returns.

SECTION I.—INLAND SERVICE.

2. Of the eighteen Post Offices which were maintained throughout the year, eight were of the first and ten of the second class. Three of the former were worked by private individuals and the Police worked two of the latter.

The number of posting places remained unchanged.

Communication.

3. Throughout the year there was a daily conveyance by Motor Car of mails to the Offices on the Windward portion of the Island, except during the month of April when the Car did not run on Tuesdays. A weekly mail service with the Grenadines was maintained throughout the year by sloop of 14 tons burthen.

On the Leeward coast there was no change in the daily conveyance of mails by canoe.

Letters and Other Articles.

4. The exchange in the Inland post under this head consisted of 87,453 letters and 31,889 articles; a decrease on the figures of the previous year of 20,268 letters and an increase of 2,158 articles. The work done by each Office in this respect is shown in detail in Table 1.

Parcel Post.

5. A decrease of 146 parcels is shown in the Inland Service. Of a total of 674, 218 were dealt with at Georgetown as shown in Table 2.

Registered Articles.

6. The number of registered articles dealt with was 2,871. This is a decrease of 57 on the figures of the previous year. Detailed information regarding this service is given in Table 3.

Money Orders.

7. Inland Money Orders to the value of £204 0 11 were issued and £209 10 11 were paid during the year as compared with £236 1 0 issued and £235 9 0 paid in 1914-15. Table 4 gives detailed information regarding this service.

SECTION II.—FOREIGN AND COLONIAL SERVICE.

8. Regular fortnightly calls by the Inter-colonial Steamers of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company connecting at Trinidad with the homeward bound Steamers were made up to the 25th December, 1915, from which date the service was

carried on by the Canadian Royal Mail Steamers. From this date the Colony was not served with direct communication with the United Kingdom and mails have been despatched through Barbados and Grenada viâ Canada and the United States. Occasional calls were made during the year by steamers of other lines.

Mail Conveyance and Receptacles.

9. 82 Steamers and 86 sailing vessels brought mails to the Colony and mails were taken by 84 Steamers and 46 vessels. There were 1,192 bags and packets of mails received and 68 Parcel Post packages 540 bags of mails and 58 Parcel Post packages were despatched.

Letters and Other Articles.

10. The letters and other articles dealt with during the year numbered 244,283. This shows a decrease of 40,289 on the previous year's figures. Tables 5 and 6 show the distribution of these.

Parcel Post and Import Duty.

11. 2,396 parcels were received and 437 were despatched as against 2,818 received and 426 despatched during 1914-15. The amount collected from Import Duty was £221 11 0, an increase of £8 0 10 on the figures of the previous year. Table 7 gives details.

Money Orders.

12. Money Order transactions show an increase of £1,469 17 5 on the previous year's figures as will be seen from Table 8. This increase is due to unusually large remittances to the United States of America.

British Postal Orders and Poundage.

13. Tables 9 and 10 show the number of British Postal Orders issued and paid for each value from 6d to 21/-. Of those issued, the value, including poundage, is £504 14 3 less than those of the previous year and of those paid £212 1 4. Poundage collected and transferred to General Revenue totalled £25 1 8.

Registered Articles.

14. These articles numbered 4,621 as shown in Table 11 as against 5,116 in 1914-15. Of this total 1,383 were exchanged with the United Kingdom and 1,344 with the United States of America and Canada.

Insured Letters.

15. Twenty-nine insured letters with a declared value of £380 4 10, as against eighteen with a declared value of £1,409 8 4 in 1914-15 were dealt with.

Registered and Insured Parcels.

16. The work done in these branches is shown on Tables 13 and 14. 111 registered parcels worth £122 1 3 were exchanged as compared with 132, worth £134 14 8½ in 1914-15. Insured parcels received and despatched numbered 127 with a value of £580 5 4.

Trade Charges.

17. Of the 278 "Cash on Delivery" parcels received during the year 267 were delivered and 11 returned to the senders. These were all received from the United Kingdom. The amount of Trade Charges collected was £258 6 10. The Delivery Fees amounted to £4 15 8.

18. The Revenue collected by the Department amounted to £1,471 16 5 after deducting the amounts for Revenue Stamps and Import Duty as set out in Table 15. These figures shew a decrease on those of the previous year of £779 8 8.

Stamp Dealers.

19. 101 Orders from Stamp Dealers abroad were received during the year amounting in value to £130 13 9. These figures compare unfavourably even with those of the previous year being a decrease of £648 14 2 and 142 orders. A better result in this direction can hardly be looked for until the cessation of the war.

20. Of the total expenditure for the year of £2,074 13 9 salaries claimed £519 4 8 and working expenses £1,555 9 1. The expenditure for the past two years is detailed below :—

Staff.

23. The staff at the General Post Office consisted of a Chief and Second Clerk, a Clerical assistant and two Postmen.

In the Districts the work was carried on by 3 Revenue Officers, 3 Police and 11 private individuals.

REPORT ON THE POSTAL DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR 1916-17.

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
SAINT VINCENT, B.W.I
28th August, 1917.

Sir,—I have the honour to submit the report on the Postal Department of this Colony and its dependencies for the official year 1916-17 accompanied by the usual fifteen returns.

SECTION I.—INLAND SERVICE.

2. The number of Post Offices was eighteen and these were maintained throughout the year—of these eight were of the first and ten of the second class. Private individuals worked three of the first class and the Police worked two of the second class.

The number of posting places was twenty.

Communication.

3. From the 1st April to 11th September there was a daily conveyance by Motor Car of mails to and from the offices on the Windward portion of the Island except on Tuesdays. From the latter date to 31st March, 1917, the conveyance was a daily one. The weekly mail service with the Grenadines was maintained during the first three months of the year. From the 1st of July to the end of the year mails have been despatched by the Revenue Cruiser "Carib" at irregular periods on an average of once a fortnight.

There was no change in the daily conveyance of mails by canoe on the Leeward coast.

Letters and Other Articles.

4. In Table 1 is shewn the exchanges in the Inland Post which consisted of 70,648 letters and 24,856 other articles. These figures shew a decrease of 16,805 letters and 7,033 other articles on the exchanges of the previous year. This Table also shews, in detail, the work done by each office.

Parcel Post.

5. The number of Parcels, viz. 572, shews a decrease of 102 on the figures of 1915-16. Of these 192 were handled at Georgetown as shewn in Table 2.

Registered Articles.

6. Detailed information regarding this service is given in Table 3 which shews an increase of 16 articles on the previous year's figures.

Money Orders.

7. In Table 4 is recorded a comparison of the value of both Inland and Foreign Money Order transactions at the seven district Post Offices and the General Post Office in 1916-17 and 1915-16. These figures shew a decrease on those of the previous year of Inland Money Orders issued and paid.

SECTION II.—FOREIGN AND COLONIAL SERVICE.

8. Fortnightly calls by the Canadian Royal Mail Steamers were made during the year and mails for the United Kingdom have been despatched through Bar-

badon and Grenada via Canada and the United States. Steamers of the Direct Line made occasional calls during the year.

Mail Conveyance and Receptacles.

9. 58 steamers and 109 sailing vessels brought mails to the Colony and 59 steamers and 91 vessels took away mails. There were 1,132 bags and packets of mails and 54 parcel post packages received and 774 bags of mails and 162 parcel post packages were despatched. Compared with those of the previous year, these figures shew a decrease in the number of bags of mails and of parcels received, and an increase in the number despatched.

Letters and Other Articles.

10. Letters and other articles dealt with during the year numbered 224,874 as against 244,283 for the previous year. The distribution is shown in Tables 5 and 6.

Parcel Post and Import Duty.

11. 2,430 parcels were received and 487 despatched and the Import Duty collected amounted to £214 13 6. This shews a decrease of £6 17 6 on the collections of the previous year. Details are given in Table 7.

Money Orders.

12. The total Money Order transactions for the year amounted to £14,136 1 9 as against £12,180 1 6 in 1915-16. Table 8 gives the places and their respective amounts issued and paid.

British Postal Orders and Poundage.

13. British Postal Orders issued during the year numbered 2,596 of a value of £1,085 9 10 including poundage. This is a decrease on last year's figures of 635 Orders and £291 18 8 in value. In Table 9 will be found the number of each value from 6d. to 21/-.

Table 10 shews the number and value of Orders paid; the decrease on the figures for 1915-16 being 198 Orders, value £73 5 9. The total poundage collected and transferred to General Revenue was £20 3 6.

Registered Articles.

14. An increase in these articles is shewn in Table 11. The number exchanged was 4,856 as against 4,621 in 1915-16. 1,440 were exchanged with the United Kingdom and 1,528 with the United States of America and Canada.

Insured Letters.

15. The number of Insured Letters dealt with was twenty-six, with a declared value of £121 7 8; a decrease of three letters and £258 17 2 on those of the previous year.

Registered and Insured Parcels.

16. Tables 13 and 14 shew the work done in these branches. 238 registered parcels of a value of £285 11 1 were exchanged during the year and 101 insured parcels of a value of £1,436 6 8.

Trade Charges.

17. 302 "Cash on Delivery" parcels were received during the year. 301 were from the United Kingdom and one from Barbados. Of these 249 were delivered and 53 were returned to the senders. The amount collected from Trade

Charges was £284 5 4 and from delivery fees £4 5 0. The following figures shew the work done in this branch during the past three years.

SECTION III.—REVENUE.

18. The net Postal Revenue after deducting the amounts for Revenue Stamps and Import Duty as set out in Table 15 was £2,056 14 4 and is detailed below. In this Table appears a new head of Revenue, viz., War Stamps. These came into issue on and from the 1st of June, 1916, under authority of Ordinance No. 13 of 27th May, 1916. Under the authority of Ordinance No. 20 of 28th July 1916 Inland correspondence was exempted from War Stamps.

Stamp Dealers.

19. The number of orders received from Stamp Dealers abroad during the year was 237 amounting in value to £340 17 2 ; an increase of £210 3 5 on the figures of the preceding year.

SECTION IV.—EXPENDITURE.

20. The total expenditure for the year was £1,345 6 10 of which salaries claimed £517 19 10 and working expenses £827 7 0. Details of expenditure during 1916-17 and 1915-16 are given below—

Appointments.

21. On the 22nd May 1916 Mr. F. V. Jacobs was appointed Second Clerk *vice* Mr. C. L. Douglas who had been transferred to the Audit Office as Second Clerk. On the 30th September Mr. D. S. Aikman, Chief Clerk, resigned his appointment and Mr. L. E. Dasent was appointed in his place. Mr. H. B Isaacs, Clerical Assistant, resigned on the 20th March, 1917 and Miss Beryl Merrick was appointed in his place.

Leave of Absence.

22. Fourteen days vacation leave from the 8th July inclusive was granted Mr. P. L. Hutchinson. During this period Mr. D. S. Aikman acted as Postmaster.

Staff.

23. At the General Post Office the Staff consisted of a Chief and Second Clerk, a Clerical Assistant and two Postmen.

The work in the seventeen District Offices was performed by three Revenue Officers, three Policemen and eleven private individuals.

5. Any person who destroys, mutilates, defaces or tampers with any notice relative to these regulations put up on a prohibited place, or with the permission of the owner of the prohibited area, or other persons entitled to give such permission, on or near the prohibited area, shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

6. Any person who is guilty of an offence against these regulations shall be liable on summary conviction before a Magistrate to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for any period not exceeding three months or to a fine not exceeding £50, or to both such imprisonment and fine.

7. These Regulations may be cited as the Cane Garden Battery Regulations, 1917.

NOTICE.

THE following rules which are published for general information by direction of the Administrator will until further notice govern the operations at the Government Cotton Ginney. These take the place of all former Rules.

ST. VINCENT GOVERNMENT COTTON GINNEY.

1. The Ginney will be opened each working day from 7 a.m. until 5 p.m. Seed cotton will be received for ginning purposes during these hours.

2. All written communications connected with the business of the Ginney should be addressed to:—
The Manager, Government Cotton Ginney, Kingstown.

3. In all cases the bags containing the seed cotton must bear the name of the grower, or the mark of the estate, and a statement of the number of bags and total weight must accompany them. The Manager will not be held responsible for unmarked bags.

4. On delivery of the cotton at the Ginney, the Manager will issue a receipt for the number of bags and actual weight, after the latter has been duly checked. Such receipts will form the basis of all business transactions between the grower and the Ginney.

5. For carefully picked and *thoroughly dried* Sea Island Cotton free from leaves, trash, etc., the charge for ginning and baling will be at the rate of two cents and a half (one penny and a quarter) per lb. of lint. This is an increase over previous charges of one farthing per lb. of lint, which is intended to meet the present extra cost of ginning and baling. Should there be a further increase in the price of materials, &c., during the current crop the charge per lb. will be proportionately raised. The seed will be returned to the grower in the bags in which his seed cotton was sent in.

N.B.—The usual proportion of lint to seed cotton is at the

rate of 22 to 26 lbs. of lint to every 100 lbs. of seed cotton. Unless the seed cotton is very thoroughly dried and well picked beforehand, there is usually a loss in ginning ranging from 2 to 5 lbs. per 100 lbs. of seed cotton.

6. The seed from white seed cotton will be received at the Oil-expressing Department of the Ginney upon the following terms:—For every ton of seed delivered 1,700 lbs. of meal will be returned together with a certain amount in cash according to the fluctuations of the market for crude oil.

7. The charge for disintegrating seed from stained cotton for manurial purposes will be at the rate of 12 cents per 100 lbs. for quantities not exceeding 1,000 lbs. in weight to growers whose whole crop does not exceed 1,000 lbs. in weight. The charge to growers whose whole crop exceeds 1,000 lbs. will be at the rate of \$4.00 per ton. Disinfection of seed prior to disintegration will be at the rate of \$2 00 per ton.

8. The charges for ginning and baling and disintegrating must be paid before delivery of the lint and seed from the Ginney, except by those who are allowed to settle their accounts monthly.

Regulations for the management of the Motor Mail Service between Kingstown and Georgetown, the hire of Cars for private use, the repair of private Cars, and for the control of the Government Garage.

1. The Government Motor Cars and Garage shall be under the control of the Colonial Engineer who shall, with the approval of the Governor, appoint one of the officers of the Public Works Department as Supervisor of the same.

Mail Passenger Service.

2. A Mail Passenger Service will be run so far as circumstances permit in accordance with a programme to be approved by the Governor from time to time.

No undertaking is given that a car or a passage will be provided, notwithstanding that an intending passenger has paid his fare and obtained a ticket.

3. The following fares will be payable by each passenger travelling on the mail car. Tickets will be obtainable only at the various Post Offices along the line of route. Return tickets will be available for 14 days. No reductions will be made for shorter journeys than those on the table of fares. The number of passengers will be limited to 3 adults and one child.

In the case of passengers leaving or proceeding to Kingstown there will be added to the fares above prescribed—

- (a) a charge of sixpence in cases where, before its departure, the car calls for a passenger at any place in Kingstown, and
- (b) a further charge of sixpence in cases where, on its return, the car leaves a passenger at any place in Kingstown.

In cases where the car calls for or leaves a passenger at a place outside Kingstown the charges for each such additional journey will be one shilling for each mile or part of a mile.

4. Government Officials when travelling on duty will take priority of other intending travellers; otherwise all applications for seats will be dealt with in sequence of receipt by the Colonial Postmaster.

5. Seats may be pre-booked with the Colonial Postmaster, but persons desirous of travelling between Kingstown and Georgetown or vice versa shall have priority in pre-booking over persons desirous of making any of the other journeys.

6. Fares for tickets must be paid at the time of booking, but any person who is unavoidably prevented from travelling on the day booked, may, in the discretion of the Colonial Postmaster, be refunded the fare so paid.

7. (1) No passenger will be allowed to enter the car until he has delivered to the Chauffeur a ticket for the journey on which he is desirous of going, and the Chauffeur will be held responsible for the correct delivery of all tickets at the General Post Office daily.

(2) In any special case a Government Official travelling on duty may be permitted to enter the car between stations without a ticket. It shall be the duty of the said Government Official so entering the car to communicate the circumstances as soon as possible afterwards to the Colonial Postmaster and the amount

of fare to be paid by him shall be the fare payable from the last station of stoppage by the car. The said fare shall be paid to the Postmaster at the station at which such Government Official terminates his journey.

(3) The Chauffeur shall on no account permit any unauthorized person to drive in a Government Motor Car. Should the Chauffeur commit a breach of this Regulation he will be liable to a fine of 4/- for each unauthorized person so carried.

8. No passenger on the mail car should in any way interfere with the Chauffeur or with the running of the car or with the speed at which it is travelling unless in his opinion it is being driven so fast as to exceed the speed limit or to be dangerous to the safety of the occupants of the car or to the public. In that case a passenger may caution the Chauffeur to drive more slowly. Should the Chauffeur persist the passenger should report him to the Supervisor.

Conveyance of Parcels in Cars travelling on the Mail Service.

9 Parcels and articles not exceeding 30 lbs. in weight and suitable for conveyance in a car used for carrying passengers will be received for transmission in a car travelling on the Mail Service, and will be charged for at the following rates :—

Up to 12 lbs. 6d.
For every 6 lbs. or part thereof over 12 lbs. 6d.

10. A Chauffeur carrying any parcel or articles on the Mail Car for which no fee has been prepaid shall upon arrival at the office of destination deliver the same to the Postmaster, who shall, upon delivery to the addressee, collect the necessary fees. A Chauffeur delivering a parcel without payment of the necessary fee shall be liable to a fine of one shilling for the first offence and to a fine not exceeding four shillings for any subsequent offence.

Hire of Cars for Private Use.

11. Motor Cars will only be hired out for private use when not required for Government service.

12. All applications for the hire of Motor Cars for private use must be made to the Supervisor who has the sole power to deal with them and who will inform applicants of the charges.

13. Cars may be hired to travel on the following roads only :—

(a) Main roads in Kingstown, Georgetown and Calliaqua,

(b) Main roads between Kingstown and Government House, Kingstown and the Yaws Hospital, Kingstown and the junction of the Gomea Byeway with the Vigie Road, Kingstown and Georgetown,

(c) Any road upon which in the opinion of the Colonial Engineer a car can travel without risk of extraordinary wear and tear.

14. Any person hiring a car or any guest of his must not attempt to drive the car or to interfere in any way with the driving gear or running of the car. Any person committing a breach of this regulation will be held liable to make good any damage that may accrue to the car as a result of his interference.

15. Any person hiring a car should warn the Chauffeur should he suspect that the speed limit laid down by the law is being exceeded, or should the Chauffeur be driving in such a way as in his opinion constitutes a danger to the safety of the car or to the public.

16. Passengers are particularly requested not to give liquor to the Chauffeur.

Repairs to Private Cars.

17. Repairs to private Motor Cars will be under taken at the Government Garage Kingstown, when convenient to the Department, at rates to be approved by the Governor.

18. (a) Materials supplied from the Public Works stores will be charged for at the usual sale price to private purchasers.

(b) Owners may supply their own materials.

General.

19. A Chauffeur upon being reported late for duty, either on the mail service or when a Car is engaged for private hire, shall, unless he has a reasonable excuse, be liable to a fine of one shilling for the first offence and to a fine not exceeding four shillings for any subsequent offence.

20 Any member of the Garage Staff shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Two Shillings for any neglect of duty or misconduct in or about the Garage.

21. All fines shall be deducted monthly from the salary claims and be paid into the Treasury for the public uses of the Colony.

22. If the driver of a carriage or cart or a rider coming towards the mail car holds up his hand, the car must be at once brought to a standstill, and then driven carefully and slowly past the carriage, cart or rider.

23. Particular attention is drawn to section 48 (1) of the Public Health Ordinance, 1910, which reads as follows:—

“48. (1) The owner or driver of a vehicle used for the carrying of persons for fee or reward shall not knowingly convey, nor shall any other person knowingly place in such vehicle, a person whom he knows to be suffering from any infectious disease, nor shall a person suffering from any such disease enter any such vehicle unless so authorised to do by a Local Authority or Medical Officer”.

N.B.—Any person guilty of a breach of this section is liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding £10.

24. Where it is desirable that any person who has met with an accident or is suffering from disease or illness (other than an infectious disease or illness) should be conveyed to any hospital, and his condition is such—

(a) that it is necessary that he should be taken to such hospital as quickly as possible, or

(b) that conveyance by motor car is preferable to any other means of conveyance available,

and it does not appear that either such person or any other person liable in law to support him can afford to pay the usual charge for such conveyance in a Government Motor Car, a Chauffeur may with the permission of the Supervisor, and in any case of great emergency without such permission, convey such person to such hospital at a reduced charge or free of charge as the Supervisor or the Chauffeur may decide.

A Chauffeur shall at once report to the Supervisor any case in which he has acted under this Regulation without permission, and the Supervisor shall report to the Colonial Engineer any case which has been so reported to him by a Chauffeur and any case in which he has given a Chauffeur permission to act under this Regulation.

Provided further that in any case in which a person who has met with an accident or is suffering as aforesaid has been conveyed to any hospital by a Government Motor Car the Governor in Council may in a

proper case remit or order the repayment of a part or the whole of such fare.

25. The Regulations made by the Governor in Council on the 26th April, 1915, the 23rd August, 1915, the 26th January, 1916, the 1st May, 1916, the 15th March, 1917, and the 11th April, 1917, are hereby repealed.

26. These Regulations may be cited as the Government Motor Cars and Garage Regulations, 1917.

NOTICE

RELATIVE TO THE EXPORTATION FROM THE COLONY
OF CERTAIN ARTICLES.

WHEREAS by Section 77 of the Customs Ordinance 1900, it is enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time by notice in the Gazette absolutely prohibit, either to be exported or carried coastwise, arms, ammunition, gunpowder, military and naval stores, and any articles which the Governor in Council shall deem capable of being converted into, or made useful in increasing the quantity of military or naval stores, provisions or any sort of victual which may be used as food for man;

AND WHEREAS by the said Section such prohibition may be restricted as to place, time or otherwise;

AND WHEREAS by Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Ordinance, 1915, it is enacted that it shall be lawful whilst a state of war in which His Majesty is engaged exists for the Governor in Council by notice in the Gazette to prohibit the exportation of all articles of every description or any specified articles or classes of articles either generally or to any country or place therein named whenever the Governor in Council shall deem it expedient so to do;

AND WHEREAS by Section 2 of the said Ordinance it is enacted that all the provisions of the Customs Ordinance, 1900, so far as they are applicable to the exportation of prohibited goods shall apply as if they were embodied in the said Ordinance, and as if Section 1 of the said Ordinance were part of Section 77 of the Customs Ordinance, 1900;

AND WHEREAS a Notice was given by the Governor in Council in pursuance of the aforesaid powers on the 30th July, 1917, prohibiting the exportation of certain articles therein referred to from the Colony to certain destinations and was published in the Gazette on the 2nd August, 1917;

AND WHEREAS the said Notice was amended by Notices given by the Governor in Council on 31st August, the 29th September, the 15th October, and the 10th November, 1917, and published in the Gazette;

AND WHEREAS it is expedient that the said Notice of the 30th July, 1917, as amended by the said Notices of the 31st August, the 29th September, the 15th October, and the 10th November, 1917, should be further amended.

NOW THEREFORE, I have thought fit, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, and in virtue and in exercise of the powers aforesaid, to issue this Notice declaring, and it is hereby declared, that the Schedule to the said Notice of the 30th July, 1917, as amended

TENDERS will be received at this Office up to 4 p.m. on *Thursday, the 28th of February, 1918*, for the maintenance of a constant supply of Ice in the Town of Kingstown for twelve months from the first day of April, 1918.

Tenders should state:—

1. The amount of subsidy required,
2. The place at which Ice will be sold.
3. The price per pound at which it will be sold :
 - (a) to public institutions upon the order of the responsible officer,
 - (b) to sick persons, upon the certificate of a medical practitioner.
 - (c) to the public generally.

The contractor will be required to sell Ice for sick persons and for the public institutions at any hour of the day or night, and to the general public on the following days and hours:—

Sundays and Public Holidays—from 7 to 9 a.m., 12.30 p.m. to 2 p.m., and from 5 to 6.30 p.m.

Failure on the part of the contractor to supply to any one person the quantity of ice demanded to be sold to him, being (except in the case of a sick person or of a public institution when more may be demanded) not more than twenty pounds on any one day, will be considered a breach of the contract, and will, in addition to the liability to cancellation thereof, render him liable to a penalty per diem for each day that he so fails to supply ice, the amount of such penalty to be fixed and agreed upon at the time of the acceptance of the tender.

Regulations made by the Governor in Council under section 22 of the Post Office Ordinance, 1882, for conducting Intercolonial money order business between St. Vincent and Grenada.

MONEY Order business shall be conducted between the Colonies of St. Vincent and Grenada in accordance with the terms of the Convention set out in the Schedule hereto which has been concluded between the Postmasters of the respective Colonies.

SCHEDULE.

CONVENTION BETWEEN THE POST OFFICE OF ST. VINCENT AND THE POST OFFICE OF GRENADA FOR THE EXCHANGE OF MONEY ORDERS.

In order to establish an exchange of Money Orders between St. Vincent and Grenada the undersigned acting on behalf of the Government of the said Colonies respectively, have agreed upon the following articles.

Article I.

There shall be a regular exchange of Money Orders between St. Vincent and Grenada by means of the Mail Services usually used for the exchange of correspondence.

Article II.

The Money Orders exchanged shall be expressed in English Sterling Money.

Article III.

The maximum amount for which a Money Order may be drawn in either Colony upon the other shall be £40.

Article IV.

No Money Order shall contain a fraction or part of a penny.

Article V.

Each Colony shall have power to fix the rates of Commission on the Money Orders issued within its jurisdiction, and shall keep the commission charged on all Money Orders issued. The tariff of charges or rates of Commission shall be communicated by the one Colony to the other, and upon every occasion of an alteration being made therein.

Article VI.

Money Orders shall be issued only on the applicant furnishing particulars of the name, surname and address of the person to whom the amount is to be paid, and his own name and address except in the case of business firms whose usual designation will be sufficient.

Article VII.

A Post Office in either Colony which issues a Money Order payable in the other is required to transmit to the Post Office charged with its payment, by the first mail after the issue thereof, an advice corresponding in number, date and amount to the Money Order of which it forms a part. These advices must be enclosed in envelopes specially provided for the purpose and are to be carried free from any charge.

Article VIII.

Money Orders issued by St. Vincent on Grenada or by Grenada on St. Vincent shall be subject, as regards payment, to the Regulations in force governing the payment of Money Orders in the Colony on which drawn. On the receipt of a written application from the payee payment of a Money Order may be stopped by the Colony of payment. The holder of an Order may direct, by crossing it, that the Order be paid through a Bank.

Article IX.

Applications by remitters for the alteration or correction of the name of the payee shall be received under

about £14 in each case:—The Girls' High School, The Yaws Hospital, The Police barracks and Treasury, and the Layou Government Stables. General repairs to the Colonial Hospital and the Government House Water Supply each amounted to £21.

Minor repairs were carried out on several other buildings.

Jetties.—No damage occurred to Jetties, but as they all sustained damage in the latter part of the previous year some of the repairs rendered necessary thereby were made good in 1917-18. The total expenditure under the Head came to £85, of which £42 were spent on the Barrouallie jetty and £36 on the Georgetown jetty.

Other Works.—A warehouse for storing kilndried corn and other agricultural products and an oil tank of reinforced concrete were commenced and all but completed at the close of the year for the Government Cotton Ginnery.

Defence works were carried out by the Department for the Admiralty during the year and on completion they were handed over to the Commanding Officer.

Observation Station.—The Young's Island Observation Station was occupied for four months by the Medical Officer, District 3; and for the remaining eight months it was hired to various persons as a sanatorium.

The rents collected came to £35. The station boat was repaired and painted.

Cemeteries.—Exclusive of the Small Towns cemeteries there were sixteen cemeteries in different parts of the island under the control of the Department. The fees collected were £10 3 3 and the upkeep cost £23 3 0.

General.—The cost of building material was at the close of the year so excessive as to render structural work of any nature prohibitive in cost, the advance in price being in some cases over 100%. Apart from high prices, which are continually rising, many necessary materials are unobtainable.

Small Towns.

Jetties.—The jetties of the Leeward Small Towns at the close of the year were in fair condition.

The exposed situation of the Georgetown Jetty together with its great length makes it an expensive structure to maintain. Its condition at the close of the year indicated the need for extensive repairs of an expensive nature in the near future.

Water Supplies.—The Water Works of the Small Towns were maintained at small cost in an efficient manner.

Sanitary.—The sanitary condition of these Towns was satisfactory. Regular inspections are made by the Police who submit reports to the District Wardens as Local Sanitary Authority of their respective districts. Nuisances are thus promptly dealt with.

General.—By the resignation of Mr. H. A. Allen, Revenue Officer of Barrouallie, this town has lost the services of an efficient Warden who for a number of years assisted the Department in carrying out works there.

A summary of the Revenue and Expenditure of the Small Towns for the year 1917 is shown in Appendix F.

Motor Services.

Motor Cars.—The motor mail service was efficiently maintained with two Ford Cars. One was kept permanently on the road for mail purposes, only being relieved as breakdowns occurred. The second car filled in spare time by running for private hire.

The opening of a private garage during the year resulted in the Government cars being relieved of a good deal of the hard wear and tear of private hire.

Maintenance expenses were in consequence considerably reduced notwithstanding the increased cost of fuel and other materials.

The Garage staff were thus afforded sufficient time to effect repairs and keep the cars in efficient working order, a condition that did not previously

exist owing to pressure in filling engagements. The revenue however has in no way suffered thereby as will be seen by reference to Appendix E.

The net gain was £176 after allowing £250 per annum for the conveyance of the Windward Mails, a result due in a great measure to the efficiency of the present staff.

Motor Roller.—The road roller was occupied during the first part of the year on the streets of Kingstown and at the commencement of the Windward Highway Reconstruction it was transferred to section 6 of that Highway. The cost of upkeep for the year was £71.

Motor Boat.—Work on the Government Motor Launch which was commenced in 1916 had to be suspended for the want of materials ordered from the United Kingdom. The hull is completed and apart from the installation of the engines very little remains to make her ready for the sea.

Survey Department.

During the year being reviewed the following surveys were made:—Five surveys for Land Settlement purposes, five for Public Works and three of Crown Boundary lines. Of the last named one was in connection with the Small Towns. A detail of these surveys appears in Appendix D.

Land Department.

Crown Lands Sales.—Six applications for the purchase of Crown Lands were accepted. They comprise an area of 106 acres with a value of £222 10 0. Of this amount £196 10 0 was paid prior to occupation. The small island of Petit Mustique which was sold by auction for £170 is included as one of the applications dealt with.

Crown Grants.—No grants for Crown Lands Sales were prepared during the year.

Revenue and Expenditure.—The revenue for land sales and land rents realized was £702 15 9.

Arrears of Revenue.—The sum of £460 9 11 appears as arrears at 31st March, 1918. Of this sum £246 17 6 form land purchase arrears and the balance land rent arrears.

Land Settlement Sales.—Accepted applications for the sale of land settlement lands numbered seventeen (17) of which two were township lots. The area occupied by these is 27A. 2R. 0P. and the value £173 15 0. Twenty-seven pounds of that amount represents deposits prior to occupation.

Land Settlement Grants.—Forty grants were prepared in duplicate and one copy of each was recorded with the Registrar. As a large number of final instalments were paid up during the year a correspondingly large number of grants remains to be prepared.

Revenue and Expenditure.—The Revenue derived from all sources under the Land Settlement Scheme was £1,556 11 7 and the expenditure exclusive of remittances to the Crown Agents was £1,184 1 6.

At the close of the year the credit balance in the hands of the Treasurer was £2,486 8 0.

Arrears of Revenue.—At 31st March, 1918, the total arrears under this head was £676 2 1 of which £559 8 8 was on account of purchase money.

Staff.

The year under review is the first completed year of management since the amalgamation of the Public Works, the Survey and Lands Departments.

The total fixed establishment charges under the present system cost 77% of the expenditure for the corresponding period before the change.

Leeward Warden.—Mr. D. Allan Richards, Acting Leeward Warden, resigned on the 15th June, 1917, and Mr. A. V. Spence of the Customs was appointed acting Leeward Warden in his place from that date. Mr. Spence

REPORT ON THE POSTAL DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR 1917—18.

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
SAINT VINCENT, B.W.I.

SIR,—I have the honour to submit the report on the Postal Department of this Colony and its dependencies for the official year 1917-18, accompanied by the usual returns numbering fifteen.

SECTION I.—INLAND SERVICE.

2. Of the eighteen Post Offices which were maintained throughout the year, eight were of the first and ten of the second class. Three of the former were worked by private individuals and the Police worked two of the latter.

The number of posting places which was twenty, remained unchanged.

Communication.

3. From the 1st April to the 29th September, 1917, mails were conveyed by Motor Car to and from the offices on the windward portion of the Island every other day with the exception of Saturday. On Monday in each week the Car made a round trip. From the latter date to the end of the year the conveyance was every other day with a round trip, on Wednesdays. There was no conveyance of mails on Saturdays.

Mails for the Grenadines were conveyed throughout the year by the Revenue Cruiser "Carib" at irregular periods but on an average of once a fortnight. The daily service on the Leeward Coast was carried on by canoe throughout the year.

Letters and other Articles.

4. Table 1 shows the exchanges in the Inland Post which consisted of 72,592 letters and 22,451 other articles. From these figures an increase is shown of 1,944 letters and a decrease of 2,405 other articles on the figures of the previous year. Details of the work done by the various offices are also shown in Table 1.

Parcel Post.

5. This service is recorded in Table 2 which shows an increase of 48 parcels on those received during the previous year. Of a total of 620 parcels dealt with 220 were handled at Georgetown.

Registered Articles.

6. Table 3 gives detailed information regarding this service. 2,767 registered articles were dealt with as against 2,837 during 1916—17.

Money Orders.

7. Inland Money Orders to the value of £161 1 0 were issued and £164 14 0 were paid during the year as compared with £174 15 3 issued and £181 4 10 paid during the preceding year.

Table 4 gives detailed information regarding this service.

SECTION II.—FOREIGN AND COLONIAL SERVICE.

8. The Canadian Royal Mail Steamers made fortnightly calls during the year. Mails for the United Kingdom have been despatched through Barbados

and Grenada via Canada and the United States of America. Occasional calls by Steamers of other lines were made during the year.

Mail Conveyance and Receptacles.

9. Mails were brought to the Colony by 57 Steamers and 113 sailing vessels and 58 Steamers and 66 sailing vessels took away mails. 897 bags and packets of mails and 332 bags of parcels were received and 419 bags of mails and 13 bags of parcels were despatched.

Letters and other Articles.

10. 188,387 letters and other articles were dealt with during the year as against 224,874 in the previous year, showing a decrease of 18,037 letters and 18450 articles. The distribution is shown in Tables 5 and 6.

Parcel Post and Import Duty.

11. The number of parcels received was 2,459 and of those despatched 431. These figures show an increase in the number received of 29 and a decrease of 56 in the number despatched. The Import Duty collected during the year was £313 10 1; an increase of £98 16 7 on the collections in 1916—17.

Table 7 gives details of the parcels dealt with.

Money Orders.

12. Money Order transactions show a decrease on last year's figures of £2,609 13 0 as will be seen from Table 8 which gives the places and their respective amounts issued and paid.

British Postal Orders and Poundage.

13. In Tables 9 and 10 will be found the number of British Postal Orders issued and paid for each value from 6d. to 21/-. The value of those issued including Poundage is less by £92 0 2 than that of the previous year, and the value of those paid is £80 12 1 in excess. The poundage collected during the year and transferred to General Revenue was £18 8 4.

Registered Articles.

14. Table 11 shows the number of registered articles received and despatched during the year which is an increase of 332 of those received and of 106 of those despatched during 1916—17.

Insured Letters.

15. The aggregate value of insured letters dealt with as shown in Table 12 was £1,130 14 5 and 21 in number as against £221 7 8 in value and 26 in number during the previous year.

Registered and Insured Parcels.

16. 311 registered parcels with a value of £337 16 9 were exchanged as compared with 238 parcels valued at £285 11 1 in the preceding year. The number of insured parcels received and despatched was 84 with a value of £1,769 1 1. In Tables 13 and 14 are to be found the figures in respect of this service.

Trade Charges.

17. 102 "Cash on Delivery" parcels were received from the United Kingdom during the year. 98 of these were delivered and 4 were returned to the senders. The amount collected from Trade Charges was £139 3 7 and from delivery fees £1 13 4. The following figures show the business transacted in this branch of the postal work for the past three years.

SECTION III.—REVENUE.

18. The Revenue collected by the Department amounted to £2,247 19 1 after deducting the amount for Revenue Stamps and the amount collected in Import Duty. This is an increase of £191 4 9 on the amount collected during 1916—17 as set out in Table 15.

19. 228 orders were received from Stamp Dealers abroad during the year, amounting in value to £548 9 5. These figures show an increase of £207 12 3 on those of the previous year.

20. The expenditure for the year was £1,328 11 7, of which salaries claimed £508 18 7 and working expenses £819 13 0.

SECTION V.—DEPARTMENTAL REMARKS.

Appointments.

21. Mr. S. E. Harry was appointed District Postmaster at Canouan from the 14th January 1918, inclusive, on the resignation on the 30th November, 1917, of Mr. Samuel Martin. From the 1st December, 1917 to the 13th January, 1918, this Island was without a District Postmaster. On the appointment of Mr. F. V. Jacobs as Second Audit Clerk, Mr. C. H. Providence was appointed Second Clerk, Post Office on the 19th April, 1917. Mr. L. E. Dasent, Chief Clerk, Post Office, was appointed to act as Audit Clerk for three months from the 7th August inclusive, and from the 19th December, 1917 to the end of the year as Revenue Officer, Georgetown. During those periods Mr. L. P. Spence, was appointed to act in Mr. Dasent's place.

Leave of Absence.

22. One month's vacation leave from the 5th June, inclusive, was granted Mr. P. L. Hutchinson, during which period Mr. H. A. Bascom acted as Colonial Postmaster.

Staff.

23. The Staff at the General Post Office consisted of a Chief and Second Clerk, a Clerical Assistant and two Postmen. At the seventeen District Offices the work was performed by three Revenue Officers, three Policemen and eleven private individuals.

(1) No animal from the Colony of St. Vincent shall be landed in this Colony unless it appears to the Visiting Officer to be in good health and is accompanied by a certificate signed by the Government Veterinary Surgeon, or by the Government Anthrax Vaccination Officer, of St. Vincent showing that it was vaccinated against anthrax on a date not more than three days before the date of its exportation from that Colony.

Sir,—With reference to my Circular despatch of the 3rd of September, I have the honour to inform you that the Government of the Nyasaland Protectorate (which is not included in the Postal Union) has imposed a war tax of one penny on all letters and postcards posted in the Protectorate for delivery in other parts of the world. Letters and postcards addressed to any member of His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces on active service will be exempt from these charges.

2. The Nyasaland Government have at the same time reduced the unit of weight for letters delivered within the Empire from one ounce to half an ounce, and have also revised the unit of weight for other postal matter as follows:—

Newspapers.—The initial rate of one penny for two ounces remains unchanged, but for each successive two ounces the rate is reduced from one penny to one halfpenny.

Sample Packets.—The minimum charge of twopence is abolished. The new rate is one penny for two ounces and one penny for each additional two ounces, the maximum weight being increased from twelve ounces to five pounds.

Commercial Papers.—The new rate is twopence-halfpenny for packets not exceeding four ounces, threepence for packets not exceeding six ounces, with one penny for each additional two ounces.

3. These new rates took effect as from 16th September, 1918.

6 (a) All Cinematograph projectors shall be fitted with two metal film boxes of substantial construction, to and from which the film shall travel. Such boxes shall be made to close in a manner which will prevent the ingress of fire, and shall be fitted with a film slot so constructed as to prevent the passage of flame to the interior of the film box.

(b) All films when not in the machine, and while in the operating room shall be covered by a blanket and kept on a shelf.

7. No smoking shall at any time be permitted on the premises.

8. No inflammable article unnecessary for the purpose of the exhibition shall be taken into or allowed to remain in the operating room.

9. During an exhibition adequate fire appliances sufficient to deal promptly with a local outbreak of fire, including a bucket of dry sand, shall be kept available inside the operating room.

10. (a) Electric wiring shall be subject to the approval of the Kingstown Board, and subject also to periodical expert inspection at the cost, if any, of the Theatre Company.

(b) The electric wiring shall be properly insulated and provided with switches to enable the operator to control the lights in the operating room, the auditorium and the exits, and there shall also be separate and independent means of control outside and away from the operating room.

11. Within the operating room the insulating material of all electric cables including "leads" to lamps, shall be covered with fire resisting material.

12. Cables for Cinematograph lamps shall be taken as separate circuits from the source of supply and from the supply side of the main fuses in the general lighting circuit.

13. The number of persons admitted to any exhibition shall not exceed the maximum prescribed by the Chief of Police.

14. All entrances to the auditorium shall be open during exhibitions, and they shall open outwards.

15. No exhibition shall be given on Sundays.

16 (a) Before any film is advertised or exhibited its title and a synopsis of it shall be submitted to a Committee composed of the Chief of Police, the Chairman of the Kingstown Board and such other persons not exceeding 4 as the Governor may appoint, with a statement as to the authority by whom it has been censored and the place where it was last exhibited.

(b) Four members of the Committee shall form a quorum.

(c) The Committee may cause any film to be exhibited before them on the Cinematograph before approving of it.

(d) If the film is approved by the majority of the Committee it may be licensed by the Chief of Police.

17. The Chief of Police is authorized to see that the foregoing regulations are complied with, and he and persons authorized by him shall be at liberty to inspect

and examine any part of the premises and apparatus from time to time.

18. The floor and roof of the auditorium shall, to the satisfaction of the Colonial Engineer, be made sufficiently strong to ensure the safety of the audience.

19. The foregoing regulations shall not apply to occasional Cinematograph exhibitions. It shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to permit such exhibitions to take place subject to such conditions or restrictions as he may see fit.

20. These Regulations may be cited as the Cinematograph Regulations, 1919.

REPORT ON THE POSTAL DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR 1918-19.

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
SAINT VINCENT, B. W. I.,
15th August, 1919.

Sir,—I have the honour to submit the report on the Postal Department of this Colony and its dependencies for the official year 1918-19 accompanied by the usual fifteen returns.

SECTION I.—INLAND SERVICE.

2. The number of Post Offices was eighteen. Eight were of the first class and ten of the second class. Private individuals worked three of the former and the Police worked two of the latter. For the first month of the year the number of posting places, which was twenty, remained unchanged. Three of these were closed on the 1st May for the purpose of fitting new keys to the doors of the receptacles. Two were re-opened on the 26th November 1918.

Communication.

3. Mails were conveyed by Motor Car to and from the Offices on the Windward portion of the Island every other day with a round trip on Wednesdays. There was no conveyance of mails on Saturdays. Mails were despatched by Special Car on ten occasions during the year. There was no change in the daily conveyance of mails by Canoe on the Leeward Coast.

Letters and Other Articles.

4. The exchanges in the Inland Post during the year were 58,799 letters and 15,873 other articles. These figures shew a decrease of 13,793 letters and 6,578 other articles on the figures of the previous year.

Table 1 shews in detail the work done by the various offices.

Parcel Post.

5. 599 parcels were handled by the Inland Service as shewn in Table 2 as against 620 in 1917-18. Of these 176 were dealt with at Georgetown.

Registered Articles.

6. Detailed information regarding this service is given in Table 3. The total number of 3,343 articles handled is an increase of 576 on the figures of the previous year.

Money Orders.

7. Money Orders issued and paid shew an increase of £105 1 10 and £120 9 4 respectively on the figures of the preceding year. Detailed information as to the amounts issued and paid at each of the Money Order Offices is given in Table 4.

SECTION II.—FOREIGN AND COLONIAL SERVICE.

8. Up to the end of December the South-bound Canadian Royal Mail Steamers called at St Vincent at approximate intervals of three weeks, while the interval between steamers going north was very irregular. This was in consequence of the

withdrawal of two of the steamers from this service. From January 1919 to the end of the year these steamers were replaced, resuming the regular fortnightly service. Mails for the United Kingdom have been despatched through Barbados and Grenada via Canada and the United States of America. Steamers of other lines made occasional calls during the year.

Mail Conveyance and Receptacles.

9. 39 steamers and 155 sailing vessels brought mails to the Colony and mails were despatched by 40 steamers and 160 vessels. 842 bags and packets of mails and 324 bags of parcels were received, and 398 bags of mails and 22 bags of parcels were despatched.

Letters and Other Articles.

10. The number of letters and other articles dealt with during the year was 204,933 as against 188,387 in the previous year. Of this total the letters numbered 154,743 and the other articles 50,190. Tables 5 and 6 give further details.

Parcel Post and Import Duty.

11. 2,311 parcels were received and 551 were despatched as against 2,459 received and 431 despatched during 1917-18. The Import Duty collected during the year which amounted to £367 14 11 is an increase of £54 4 10 on the figures of the preceding year. Table 7 gives details.

Money Orders.

12. The total value of the Money Order transactions for the year was £12,403 4 5 as against £11,526 8 9 for the previous year. Table 8 gives the places and their respective amounts issued and paid.

British Postal Orders and Poundage.

13. The number of British Postal Orders issued and paid for each value from 6d. to 21/- will be found in Tables 9 and 10. Of those issued, the value, including poundage, is £24 18 6 less than those of the previous year, and the value of those paid is £461 9 6 in excess. Poundage collected and transferred to General Revenue totalled £18 11 9.

Registered Articles

14. These articles numbered 6,205 as shewn in Table 11. These figures shew an increase of 729 received, and 182 despatched on those of the preceding year.

Insured Letters.

15. Twenty-four Insured Letters with a declared value of £668 12 3 were dealt with as shewn in Table 12. This value is a decrease on the figures for 1917-18 of £462 2 2.

Registered and Insured Parcels.

16. Tables 13 and 14 shew the work done in these branches. 368 registered parcels with a value of £428 16 0 were exchanged as compared with 311 parcels valued at £337 16 9 in the previous year. 67 Insured Parcels, with a value of £753 19 9 were received and despatched during the year. These figures shew a decrease on those for 1917-18 of 17 parcels and of £1,013 1 4 in value.

Trade Charges.

17. Two "Cash on Delivery" parcels were received from Trinidad and 71 from the United Kingdom. Of these 70 were delivered and 3 with a value of

£3 3 9 were returned to the Senders. The amount of Trade Charges collected was £130 12 10½. The Delivery fees amounted to £1 4 0. The work done in this branch during the past three years is shewn below :—

Stamp Dealers.

19. The number of orders received from Stamp Dealers abroad during the year was 231 amounting in value to £557 6 7, an increase on the previous year's figures of 3 orders and £8 17 2 in value.

SECTION IV.—EXPENDITURE.

20. The total expenditure of the Department during the year was £2,108 6 9. Of this salaries claimed £513 1 0, working expenses £895 5 9, and the cost of the Post Office premises £700 0 0. Payment for these premises was effected in February 1919. Details of expenditure during 1918-19 and 1917-18 are given below:—

SECTION V.—DEPARTMENTAL REMARKS.

Appointments.

21. From the 1st April to the 19th June, on which date Mr. L. E. Dasent resumed his duties, Mr. L. Spence acted as Chief Clerk, Post Office. From the 21st to the 24th June Mr. D. S. Wilson was appointed to act as Chief Clerk while Mr. L. E. Dasent acted as Revenue Officer, Georgetown. Mr. L. E. Dasent resumed his duties on the 24th June and from the 12th July was again appointed to act as Revenue Officer, Georgetown. From the 12th July to the 11th October Mr. S. O. Dasent acted as Chief Clerk, Post Office and from the 12th October to the 14th November Mr. C. H. Providence was appointed to act as Chief Clerk and Mr. H. F. Wall as Second Clerk. On the 14th November Mr. F. V. Jacobs was appointed Chief Clerk and Mr. C. H. Providence resumed his duties as Second Clerk.

Staff.

22. At the General Post Office the staff consisted of a Chief and Second Clerk, a Clerical Assistant and two Postmen. The work at the seventeen District Offices, was performed by three Revenue Officers, three policemen and eleven private individuals.

ORDER-IN-COUNCIL

Prohibiting the importation into the Colony of dyes and dyestuffs not of British origin.

WHEREAS by section seventy-five of "The Customs Ordinance, 1900" it is enacted that the Governor-in-Council may at any time, by notice in the Gazette prohibit the importation into this Colony of any goods or articles of any kind whatsoever.

AND WHEREAS by section two of "The Customs (Importation Prohibition) Ordinance, 1917" it is enacted that the Governor may in particular cases by licence authorise the importation of goods or articles the importation of which is subject to either general or limited prohibition under section seventy-five of the Customs Ordinance, 1900.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to prohibit the importation into the Colony of dyes or dyestuffs which are not the produce or manufacture of any part of the British Empire.

NOW THEREFORE the Administrator is pleased, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, to declare that the importation into the Colony or into any part or parts thereof, of any dyes or dyestuffs enumerated in the Schedule hereto, which are not the produce or manufacture of any part of the British Empire is prohibited until further notice, except under licence of the Governor.

SCHEDULE.

(a) All derivatives of coal tar generally known as intermediate products capable of being used or adapted for use as dyestuffs, or of being modified or further manufactured into dyestuffs, and

(b) All direct cotton colours, all union colours, all acid colours, all chrome and mordant colours, all alizarine colours, all basic colours, all sulphide colours, all vat colours (including synthetic indigo), all oils, spirits, and wax colours, all lake colours, and any other synthetic colours, dyes, stains, colour acids, colour lakes, leuco acids, leuco bases, whether in paste, powder, solution, or any other form.

CASH ON DELIVERY SERVICE.

Regulations governing the exchange of Postal Parcels subject to Trade Charges, between this Colony and other places, made under the authority of the Post Office Ordinance 1882.

1. The Regulations made by the Governor-in-Council on the 22nd August, 1908, 20th September, 1910, 1st November, 1910, and the 28th May, 1915 are hereby rescinded.

2. On and after the 1st January, 1920, the Postmaster undertakes, on certain conditions, to collect from the addressee the value of an article sent by parcel post and to remit it to the sender (by Money Order.)

3. The service shall apply to parcels only sent from St. Vincent to the United Kingdom, and to similar parcels sent from the United Kingdom to St. Vincent.

4. The amount to be collected under the "Cash on Delivery" system shall be called the "Trade Charge".

5. The maximum Trade Charge shall in no case exceed £40 per parcel.

6. A special fee of 2½d. on every £1 or fraction of a £1 of Trade Charge shall be levied on the sender of a parcel subject to a Trade Charge. In addition to the special fee fixed by this regulation a posting fee of 2d. shall be charged on every parcel bearing a Trade Charge posted in St. Vincent, and in addition, a fee of 4d. will be charged on each parcel in the United Kingdom for the delivery service. The delivery fees to be charged in this Colony on such parcels when received from the United Kingdom shall be as follows:—

The fee due to the office of posting must be paid with the other postal charges; but the amount of the fee due to the office of delivery will be collected at the office of destination.

7. The sender of a parcel on which a Trade Charge is to be collected will be required to sign a declaration that the parcel is sent in fulfilment of an order from the addressee.

8. The sender of a parcel may not have the amount of the Trade Charge reduced or cancelled after posting.

Posting.

9. Parcels on which Trade Charges are to be collected shall be accepted at the General Post Office in Kingstown.

10. The sender must—

- (a) Write, on the cover of the parcel, his name and permanent address, the amount in British currency of the Trade Charge in figures and words, and the name of the office on which the Money Order is to be drawn. These particulars may be written on the back of the parcel if there is not room for them to be written clearly in front. No erasure or alteration of the entry of the money is allowed. An incorrect entry must be completely obliterated and a fresh entry made;
- (b) Fill up a Request Form (to be obtained at the General Post Office in Kingstown) which includes the prescribed declaration that the parcel is sent in fulfilment of an order;
- (c) Prepay the special fee, by affixing 2d. in postage stamps to the Request Form. The other charges must also be prepaid.
- (d) Sign a request to be attached to the cover of the parcel that if the parcel is undeliverable at the expiration of 15 days from its arrival at the place of destination, it is to be (a) abandoned or (b) returned to him at his expense.

11. He must then hand in the parcel at the office, where he will receive a Certificate of posting, which he will be required to give up when he presents the Money Order to be cashed.

Delivery.

12. Parcels bearing Trade Charges will be delivered only at the General Post Office in Kingstown. Notice of the arrival of such a parcel will be sent to the addressee.

13. No such parcel will be delivered or allowed to be opened by the addressee until the amount of the Trade Charge and any other charges due have been paid. But the addressee will see from the entry on the parcel the name and address of the sender, who must have sent the parcel in fulfilment of an order.

14. The parcel will be kept at the Post Office for 15 days, including the day of arrival, and, if not called for by that time, will be dealt with in accordance with the request made by the sender.

15. Cheques will not be accepted in payment of Trade Charges.

16. In no case will a Trade Charge, once paid, be refunded to the addressee.

Payment of Money Order to the Sender of Parcel.

17. The sender of a parcel on which a Trade Charge has been collected will receive in a closed envelope the Money Order representing the amount. When cashing the order, he must present and give up at the paying office the Certificate of posting which was given to him when he handed in the parcel.

Incidental Services.

18. Parcels on which Trade Charges are to be collected will in other respects than those above specified, be treated like other parcels.

19. When a Trade Charge has been collected, the Post Office undertakes responsibility for the due remittance of the amount to the sender of the parcel.

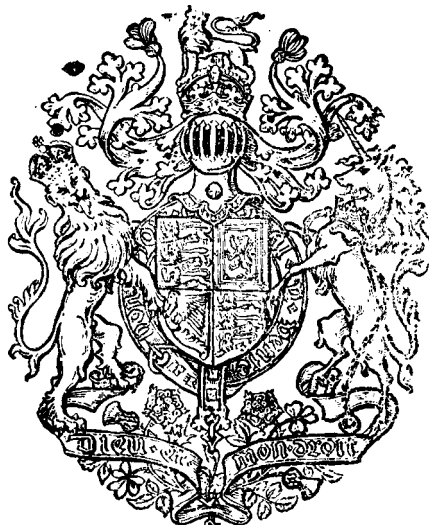

cept of packages on arrival of the Launch at the port of destination of the packages, and no responsibility will be accepted for packages after they have been unloaded at the port of destination.

6. Motor Mail Service.

The revenue collected for this service for the period under review, amounted to £327 19 0 this being £50 1 0 short of the estimate. The amount expended being £603 12 6 a saving of £9 7 6 on the estimate was effected. It will be observed however that of this expenditure the sum of £136 11 0 was used towards the payment of £157 11 0 for the purchase of a new car the cost of which is £34 7 6 more than was paid for a similar car in 1917.

The net result of the year's working shows a deficit of £2 13 6 but it is well to point out that the amount assumed to be paid for the carriage of the Windward Mails is only £250 which is the same as was paid for the old horse-carriage system.

During the year, the cars covered a total distance of 10,945 miles and consumed 911 gallons gasoline.

There were run 155½ regular mail trips and 11 extra trips and there were 27 breakdowns, 6 of which caused the holding up of the service for more than one hour.

7. Lands.

Crown Lands.

Sales. An unusually large area of Crown Lands were sold during the year, the total being 927 acres valued at £481 8 4.

Two blocks aggregating 866 acres are responsible for this unusual sale.

Grants issued. Seven grants conveying 332 acres were issued. Of these three were for the exchange of 27 acres previously sold, and one was for a block of 212 acres of indifferent land which the owner of Owia Estate acquired for the protection of the water shed of his arrowroot works.

Revenue. The revenue under this head exceeds the highest on record and was £505 19 4 in excess over the estimated revenue. This increase is mainly due to the large sale of lands referred to above.

Expenditure. The expenditure was £90 0 0 which when deducted from the revenue leaves a surplus of £1,015 19 4 carried over to General Revenue.

Arrears. The arrears of purchase money and rents at 31st March, 1919 show a decrease of £127 0 7 on the previous year. They are made up as follows:—

Land Settlement.

Available Lands. The lands of the acquired estates now available for sale lie in the Cumberland Valley and at Belair and are mostly of indifferent quality, the best having already been disposed of.

Sales and Grants issued. Applications for eight allotments comprising 22 acres were dealt with, and nineteen grants were issued. The value of the former was £129 10 6.

Revenue and Expenditure. The total revenue and expenditure for the year is shown in Appendix B, and the arrears at 31st March last were:—

The minutes of the meetings of the 13th and 16th March, 1920, which had been circulated to members, on motion of the Attorney General, seconded by the Treasurer, were taken as read and confirmed.

Supplementary Votes.

On motion of the Treasurer, seconded by the Attorney General, the Standing Rules were suspended and the Council went into Committee on the Supplementary Votes for the service of the year 1920 as shown in the Schedule attached.

Head 15, Post Office.—Mr. Fraser said he had been present and realised the danger of using such a small boat for conveying passengers and mails to and from the Motor Boat at Cumberland. He thought that the "St. Vincent's" boat should be used for the purpose, that it would be more suitable and safer and the sum of £5 16 0 would be saved.

Mr. Sprott supported Mr. Fraser. Representations had been made to him by persons who had been conveyed in the boat and he considered that Mr. Fraser's suggestion would benefit the people.

The Treasurer—Cumberland was not considered of sufficient importance to be included in the schedule of calls by the Motor Launch. This arrangement was subsequently made and no complaints had reached him.

The Administrator instructed the Treasurer to make enquiries and report.

On motion by the Treasurer, seconded by the Attorney General, the votes were agreed to.

Export Duties Ordinance.

The Attorney General in introducing the Bill said that the state of the Colony's finances rendered it imperative to impose additional taxation. It was considered equitable to increase the export duty to 15/- per cwt. on Sea Island Cotton, the selling price of which was today quoted at 8/4 per lb. When the value of cotton was 3/4 per lb. the export duty of 5/- per cwt. was not considered excessive so now that Planters were getting more than double, the Government was justified in asking for this increase. The Income Tax, he feared would fall short.

For dinner the black eyed peas and beef will be made into soup, the meal and flour made into dumplings, boiled and served in the soup, the vegetables served separately but partaken of along with the soup. On other days the rice, black eyed peas and fresh beef, boiled together. Each portion turned out in a large bowl, and buttered with the allowance of butter

On days in which fresh fish cannot be obtained substitute 2½ oz. salted cod.

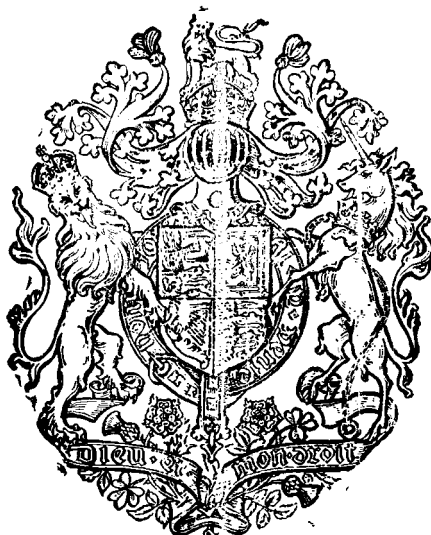

and 44 steamers and 100 sailing vessels took away mails. There were 679 bags and packets of mails received, and 361 parcel post packages. 351 bags of mails and 151 parcel post packages were despatched.

Letters and Other Articles.

10. 140,480 letters and other articles were dealt with during the nine months as against 204,933 in the year 1918-19. Consequent on the reduction in the postage from 2½d. to 1d. per ounce on letters to the United States from the 1st of July inclusive, there was a noticeable increase in the number of letters despatched to that place during the latter four months of the period under review. From the 1st July inclusive, the War Stamp was withdrawn from circulation.

Tables 5 and 6 give details.

Parcel Post and Import Duty.

11. Table 7 shews an increase of 74 parcels received and a decrease of 133 despatched in 1918-19. The Import duty collected amounted to £319 2 0.

Money Orders.

12. The value of Foreign Orders issued during the period April to December exceeds that of Orders issued in 1918-19 by £2,452 17 3. This is due to abnormal remittances to the United States and Canada consequent on increased Bank rates.

Detailed information as to the amounts issued and paid is given in Table 8.

British Postal Orders and Poundage.

13. In Tables 9 and 10 will be found the numbers of British Postal Orders issued and paid for each value from 6d to 21/-. The total value of Orders issued is £58 16 2 less than in 1918-19, and of those paid, £519 17 6. The total Poundage collected and transferred to General Revenue was £16 18 5.

Registered Articles.

14. The number of registered articles exchanged was 4,639 as against 6,205 in 1918-19. Of this total 1,334 were exchanged with the United Kingdom and 1,651 with the United States. Further particulars of the exchanges will be found in Table 11.

Insured Letters.

15. Thirty five Insured Letters with a declared value of £1,024 1 5 were dealt with as shewn in Table 12. These figures shew an increase of 11 letters and £355 9 2 on the figures for 1918-19.

Registered and Insured Parcels.

16. The extent of the work done in these branches is shewn in Tables 13 and 14. 357 registered parcels with a value of £393 19 8½ were exchanged as compared with 368 parcels valued at £428 16 0 in the year 1918-19.

Insured parcels received were 57 with a value of £236 14 3½ as against 59 received during 1918-19 with a value of £277 14 3. Insured parcels despatched were 17 with a value of £2,156 10 10 as against 8 valued at £478 5 6 in 1918-19.

Trade Charges.

17. Of the 99 "Cash on Delivery" parcels received, 81 were from the United Kingdom 7 from Trinidad and 2 from Barbados. 86 were delivered and 4 were returned to the senders. The amount of Trade Charges collected was £147 3 8½ and the Delivery fees amounted to £1 9 6.

NOTICE is hereby given that under the provisions of section 20 (1) of the above mentioned Ordinance:—

"Every person liable to pay Income Tax shall on or before the thirty-first day of March in every year, make and deliver to the Official Assessor a true and correct return of his whole income for the year ended thirty-first day of December then last past as in the form in the first Schedule to this Ordinance".

Printed copies of the Form of Return may be obtained from the Registry, Kingstown, and from Police or Revenue Officers in charge of the Districts of the Colony.

Any Return addressed to the Official Assessor, Kingstown, may be forwarded through the Post Office, exempt from stamp duty.

Sir,—With reference to Circular despatch of the 29th of March, 1919, I have the honour to inform you that an Act has been passed in Bermuda abolishing the surtax imposed on letters posted to other parts of the Empire, with effect from the 1st ultimo. The Act provides that after the abolition of the surtax the stamps which have been overprinted WAR TAX will be available for ordinary postage purposes.

2. I take this opportunity to inform you, with reference to Mr. Walter Long's Circular despatch of the 3rd of December, 1918, that the Government of Nyasaland has increased its postal rates on letters for other parts of the Empire to twopence for the first ounce and one penny for each additional half-ounce. The rates for newspapers, sample packets and commercial papers remain unaltered.

3. I have also to inform you, with reference to Mr. Long's Circular despatch of the 8th of June, 1917, that the High Commissioner for South Africa has issued a Proclamation which repeals the Northern Rhodesia War Postage Proclamation, 1917, and increases the rates of postage on letters posted in the territory for all other parts of the Empire to twopence for each half-ounce.

4. The Government of the Commonwealth of Australia has adopted the following increased rates of postage for letters, etc., for delivery in other parts of the Empire:—

Letters—Twopence per half-ounce or fraction of half-ounce;

Letter Cards, single, twopence;

Postcards, single, three halfpence.

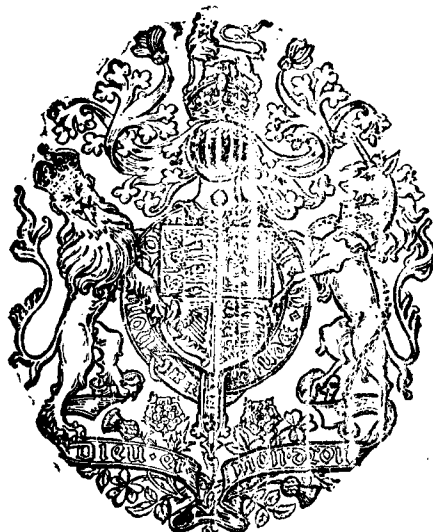

REPORT ON THE POSTAL DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR 1920.

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
SAINT VINCENT, B.W.I.,
29th April, 1921.

Sir,—I have the honour to submit the report on the Postal Department of this Colony and its dependencies for the official year 1920, accompanied by the usual fifteen Returns.

SECTION I.—INLAND SERVICE.

2. Of the seventeen Post Offices which were maintained throughout the year, eight were of the first class and nine of the second class. Private individuals worked three of the former and the Police worked two of the latter. The number of posting places was twenty.

Communication.

3. On the Leeward coast mails were conveyed from the beginning of the year by Government Motor Launch. There was no change in the mail service on the Windward portion of the Island and to the Grenadines.

Mails were despatched by special car on 24 occasions during the year.

Letters and other Articles.

4. Table 1 shows the exchanges in the Inland Post which consisted of 117,390 letters and 17,238 other articles. These figures show an increase in letters and a decrease in other articles on the figures of the nine months April to December, 1919.

In Table 1 is shown in detail the work done by the various offices.

Parcel Post.

5. This service is recorded in Table 2 which shows 1,204 parcels received and despatched during the year as against 592 dealt with during the nine months in 1919. Of a total of 1,204 parcels dealt with, 303 were handled at the branch Post Office, Georgetown.

Registered Articles.

6. Detailed information regarding this service is given in Table 3, which shows an increase on the figures for the period April to December, 1919.

Money Orders.

7. Inland Money Orders to the value of £289 19 3 were issued and £285 17 6 were paid during the year as compared with £232 18 11 issued and £235 5 10 paid during the nine months of 1919.

Table 4 gives detailed information regarding this service.

SECTION II.—FOREIGN AND COLONIAL SERVICE.

8. The Canadian Royal Mail Steamers made fortnightly calls during the year. Mails for the United Kingdom have been despatched through Barbados, Grenada, Trinidad and the United States of America. Occasional calls by steamers of other lines were made during the year.

Mail Conveyance and Receptacles.

9. 59 steamers and 88 sailing vessels brought mails to the Colony and mails were taken by 62 steamers and 132 vessels. 981 bags and 2 packets of mails and 681 bags and 1 packet of parcels were received and 575 bags of mails and 195 bags and 49 packets of parcels were despatched.

Letters and other Articles.

10. The letters and other articles dealt with during the year numbered 281,538. This shows an increase on the figures for the period April to December, 1919. Tables 5 and 6 show the distribution of these.

Parcel Post and Import Duty.

11. 5,001 parcels were received and 895 were despatched as against 2,385 received and 418 despatched during the nine months of 1919. The amount collected from Import Duty was £715 12 11.

Money Orders.

12. Money Order transactions show a decrease in the value of those issued, and an increase of those paid during April to December, 1919, as will be seen from Table 8.

British Postal Orders and Poundage.

13. Tables 9 and 10 show the number of Postal Orders issued and paid for each value from 6d. to 21/-. Of those issued, the value, including poundage, is £1,237 6 5 and of those paid, £1,080 9 11; as against £909 15 0 issued and £947 3 6 paid during the period April to December, 1919.

Registered Articles.

14. These articles numbered 7,298 as shown in Table 11, as against 4,639 in 1919, April to December. Of this total 1,295 were exchanged with the United Kingdom and 3,913 with the United States of America and Canada.

Insured Letters.

15. The aggregate value of Insured letters dealt with as shown in Table 12 was £2,043 12 9 and 23 in number; a decrease of 12 letters and an increase in value of £1,019 11 4 on those dealt with during April to December, 1919.

Registered and Insured Parcels.

16. 686 registered Parcels with a value of £1686 9 4½ were exchanged as compared with 357 parcels valued at £393 19 8½ during the nine months of 1919. The number of Insured parcels received and despatched was 153 with a value of £986 6 7. In Tables 13 and 14 are to be found the figures in respect of this service.

Trade Charges.

17. 143 "Cash on Delivery" parcels were received during the year. Of that number 133 were from the United Kingdom and 10 from Trinidad. 136 were delivered and 7 were returned to the senders.

The amount collected from Trade Charges was £285 1 6 and from delivery fees £2 2 8. These fees were collected in Cash from the beginning of August under the regulations governing the exchange of Parcels subject to Trade Charges passed on April the 10th 1920. Prior to that date they were paid in Stamps. The following figures show the business transacted in this branch of the Postal work for the past three years.

19. The number of Orders received from Stamp Dealers abroad during the year was 104, amounting in value to £417 12 9; an increase of £172 13 5 on the figures for the period April—December, 1919 from 127 Orders.

Leave of absence.

21. Two months leave were granted Miss Merrick, Clerical Assistant, from 22nd January inclusive. From 2nd February inclusive Mr. P. L. Hutchinson

was granted six weeks leave. During that period Mr. H. A. Bascom acted as Colonial Postmaster.

Appointments.

22. On the resignation of Mr. C. H. Providence on February 29th, Mr. A. L. Dopwell was appointed Second Clerk. Miss Douglas was appointed Clerical Assistant on the resignation of Miss Merrick on the 22nd March. From the 21st June to 3rd July Miss Collymore was appointed to act as Second Clerk, Mr. A. L. Dopwell having been appointed to act as Second Clerk to the Attorney General. On the 29th July Mr. D. Daisley was appointed to act as Second Clerk, Mr. A. L. Dopwell having been appointed to act as Second Clerk to the Attorney General. These latter acting appointments continued to the end of the year. At the expiration of three months' leave from the 15th May, Miss Grace C. Allen, District Postmistress, New Adelphi, resigned and Mr. G. N. Allen was appointed to her place.

Staff.

23. The staff at the General Post Office consisted of a Chief and Second Clerk, a Clerical Assistant and three Postmen; an additional Postman having been appointed on 4th May.

At the sixteen District Offices the work was performed by three Revenue Officers, three Policemen and ten private individuals.

Regulation made by the Governor in Council under Section 22 of the Post Office Ordinance 1882, for conducting Money Order business between St. Vincent and the Colony of Barbados.

ON and after the first day of January, 1922, the practice of exchanging advices of Money Orders without the employment of advice lists which obtains between this Colony and the United States of America shall be adopted between this Colony and the Colony of Barbados and no commission on Money Orders payable shall be collected by either Colony.

Within one month after the close of each quarter, two copies of an Account, similar to the specimen hereto attached, shall be prepared and transmitted by the Post Office of St. Vincent to the Post Office of Barbados exhibiting the balance found due on the exchange of Money Orders during the quarter, one copy of which, after proper verification and acceptance shall be returned to the Post Office of St. Vincent. The balance shown on such accounts shall be adjusted by means of a Bank Draft in favour of the Colonial Secretary, and the expense attending the remittance of the balances shall, invariably, be borne by the debtor Colony.

Regulations made by the Governor in Council under the authority of the Post Office Ordinance, 1882, No. 8 of 1883.

REGULATIONS WITH RESPECT TO RATES OF POSTAGE AND ADVICE OF DELIVERY OF REGISTERED ARTICLES.

UNDER the authority of section 22 of the Post Office Ordinance, 1882, the following regulations are hereby made by the Governor in Council.

Postage on Correspondence to Foreign Countries.

1. The postage to be prepaid on correspondence posted in Saint Vincent for places beyond the limits of the Colony, except to the United Kingdom and British Possessions generally, and the United States of America shall be as follows:—

- (1) On letters, 3d. for the first ounce and 1½d. for each succeeding ounce or fraction thereof.
- (2) On Postcards, 1½d. each.
- (3) On printed Papers and Books, ½d. for 2 ounces. Literature for the blind ¼d. per lb.
- (4) On commercial Papers, 3d. for the first 12 ounces and ½d. per 2 ounces thereafter.
- (5) On Samples, 1d. for the first 4 ounces and ¼d. per 2 ounces thereafter.
- (6) Registration fee, 3d.

Postage on correspondence to the United Kingdom, British Possessions generally, and to the United States of America.

2. The postage to be prepaid on correspondence in Saint Vincent for the United Kingdom, and other parts of the British Empire beyond the limits of the Colony and for the United States of America shall be as follows:—

- (1) On Letters, 2d. for the first ounce and 1½d. for each succeeding ounce or fraction thereof.
- (2) On Postcards, 1½d.

- (3) On printed and commercial Papers and Samples, ½d. per 2 ounces: Provided that there shall be a minimum rate of 3d. for commercial papers, and 1d. for samples.
- (4) On literature for the blind, ¼d. per lb.
- (5) Registration fee, 3d.

Advice of Delivery of Registered Articles.

3. The following Rule shall be substituted for Rule 21 of sub-section (Q) of the Regulations made by the Governor in Council under the Post Office Ordinance 1882, on the 23rd October, 1886:—

"21. The sender of a registered article addressed abroad may obtain an advice of its delivery on application at the office of posting, either at the time of posting or subsequently, on payment of a fee of 3d. The same fee will be charged for enquiries concerning registered articles, if the sender has not already paid the special fee for an advice of delivery."

4. Regulations 1 and 3 of these Regulations shall be deemed to have come into effect on the 1st day of December, 1921, and Regulation 2, shall come into force on the 1st day of January, 1922.

POST OFFICE (AMENDMENT NO 2) REGULATIONS.

(Gazetted 9th May, 1950).



1. Short title. These Regulations may be cited as the Post Office (Amendment No. 2) Regulations, 1950, and shall be read as one with the Post Office Regulations, 1938, (hereinafter referred to as the principal Regulations) and all amendments thereto.

2. Regulation 4 revoked and replaced. Regulation 4 of the principal Regulations as replaced by the Post Office (Amendment) Regulations, 1941, (S.R. & O. 1941, No. 30) is hereby further revoked and replaced as follows:—
"LETTERS AND POST-CARDS.

4. The prepaid rate of postage on letters shall be as follows:—
Not exceeding one ounce in weight — — — — 4c
For every additional ounce or fraction of an ounce — — — — 2c
The prepaid rate of postage on a post card shall be two cents.

3. Regulation 6 revoked and replaced. Regulation 6 of the principal Regulations is hereby revoked and replaced as follows:—
NEWSPAPERS.

6. The prepaid rate of postage on newspapers, including any supplement thereto, shall be two cents for every copy, not exceeding six ounces in weight, with a further charge of two cents for every additional six ounces or fraction of six ounces. If two or more copies are sent in a single packet, each copy shall be liable to the same postage as if it had been posted separately: Provided that in no case shall a packet of such copies be chargeable with a higher rate than that chargeable on a book packet of the same weight."

4. Regulation 13 revoked and replaced. Regulation 13 of the principal Regulations is hereby revoked and replaced as follows:—
"PRINTED PAPERS AND COMMERCIAL PAPERS.

13. The prepaid rate of postage on printed papers and commercial papers shall be:—
For every two ounces or fraction thereof — — — — 2d"

5. Regulation 20 revoked and replaced. Regulation 20 of the principal Regulations is hereby revoked and replaced as follows:—
"PATTERN AND SAMPLE PACKETS.

7. Regulation 98 revoked and replaced. Regulation 98 of the principal Regulations as revoked and replaced by the Post Office (Amendment) Regulations, 1943, (S.R. & O. 1943, No. 5) is hereby further revoked and replaced as follows :—

" LETTERS.

98. The prepaid rate of postage on letters to the United Kingdom and other parts of the British Empire generally, Mandated Territories (except Trans-Jordan), Egypt, the British Postal Agencies in Morocco and His Majesty's Ships in Home or Foreign Waters shall be 8¢ for the first ounce, and 4¢ for each additional ounce or fraction thereof; the rate to all other places (including Iraq and Trans-Jordan) shall be 10¢ for the first ounce, and 8¢ for each additional ounce or fraction thereof."

8. Regulation 100 revoked and replaced. Regulation 100 of the principal Regulations is hereby revoked and replaced as follows :—

" POST-CARDS.

100. The prepaid rate of postage on every Post-Card for a destination to which the 8¢ letter rate applies (as prescribed in Regulation 98) shall be 4¢ and to all destinations outside the Colony shall be 6¢."

9. Regulation 111 revoked and replaced. Regulation 111 of the principal Regulations as revoked and replaced by the Post Office (Amendment No. 3) Regulations, 1943, (S. R. & O. 1943, No. 75) is hereby further revoked and replaced as follows :—

" PRINTED PAPERS AND COMMERCIAL PAPERS.

111. The rate of postage (which must be prepaid) on Printed Papers and Commercial Papers shall be :—

(a) on Printed Papers—

4¢ for the first 2 ounces or fraction of 2 oz. and 3¢ for each additional 2 ounces or fraction of 2 ounces;

(b) on Commercial Papers--

4¢ for the first 2 ounces or fraction of 2 oz. and 2¢ for each additional 2 oz. or fraction of 2 ounces with a minimum charge of 10¢.

10. Regulation 121 revoked and replaced. Regulation 121 of the principal Regulations as amended by the Post Office (Amendment) Regulations, (S. R. & O. 1947, No. 10) is hereby revoked and replaced as follows :—

"LITERATURE FOR THE BLIND.

121. Packets containing papers impressed for the use of the blind shall be accepted up to a maximum weight of 15 lb. The prepaid rates on such packets shall be :—

1¢ for 2½ lb or fraction of 2½ lb."

11. Regulation 122 revoked and replaced. Regulation 122 of the principal Regulations is hereby revoked and replaced as follows :—

"SAMPLES.

122. The postage (which must be fully prepaid) on sample packets for all places abroad shall be :—

4¢ for the first 2 ounces or fraction of 2 oz. and 2¢ for each additional 2 ounces or fraction of 2 ounces."

12. Regulation 134 revoked and replaced. Regulation 134 of the principal Regulations is hereby revoked and replaced as follows :—

"SMALL PACKETS.

134. The rate of postage on small packets to any destination to which the service applies is 4¢ per 2 ounces with a minimum charge of 20¢. The postage on small packets shall be fully prepaid."

13. Regulation 220 revoked and replaced. Regulation 220 of the principal Regulations is hereby revoked and replaced as follows :—

"INDEMNITY FOR LOSS.

220. If a letter or packet duly admitted to registration has been entirely lost whilst in the custody of the Post Office the Colonial Postmaster undertakes to pay indemnity of 25 gold francs, (\$13.92) (or £2. 15. 0) except in cases beyond control, (e.g. tempest, shipwreck, earthquake and war). No compensation shall be payable except in the case of the loss of the entire letter or packet except in the case of the United Kingdom of Great Britain with whom exceptional arrangements exist for the loss of the contents of a registered letter. In the case of the United Kingdom of Great Britain payment of indemnity for the loss of the contents of a registered letter shall be limited to the payment of an indemnity of 25 gold francs (\$13.92) or £2. 15. 0; and no claim shall in any case be entertained unless it be made within one year from the date of posting."

14. Table B revoked and replaced. Table B to the principal Regulations as replaced by the Post Office (Amendment) Regulations 1949, (S. R. & O. 1949, No. 68) and amended by the Post Office (Amendment) Regulations, 1950, (S. R. & O. 1950, No. 7) is hereby revoked and replaced as follows :—

N.B.—Air Mails are despatched from and received in St. Vincent via Trinidad.

Air Mails are despatched from and received in St. Vincent by Air whenever opportunity offers. Whenever it appears to the Trinidad or to the St. Vincent Administration that time will be gained such Air Mails are however forwarded to destination by vessel or steamer, to St. Vincent for delivery or to Trinidad for onward transmission by Air. In the case of the 8 cents rates Air Mails are sent direct to the country of destination by vessel or steamer from St. Vincent whenever a saving of time is likely to be effected by such despatch.

Air Mails addressed to places on the 8 cents rate will be despatched by sea to Trinidad for onward transmission by B.W.I. Airways or vice versa.

Air Mails of the 8 cents rate addressed to places not served by the B.W.I. Airways will be accepted and despatched to the nearest Colony served by B.W.I. Airways or vice versa.

Air Mail is forwarded by the Intermediary Postal Exchange of Trinidad daily by Foreign Carriers and by British Carriers on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

Air Mail intended to be forwarded by Foreign Carriers should be marked clearly "By Foreign Carrier", otherwise they may be forwarded by "British Carrier."

15. Revocation. The following Regulations are hereby revoked:—

GERMAN ISSUED SECURITIES EXPRESSED IN GERMAN CURRENCY.

The Board of Trade announced that H.M. Government in the United Kingdom have decided to waive certain of their rights in respect of such German-owned securities as are expressed in German currency and issued by the German State or by a body of persons constituted or incorporated in or under the laws of Germany.

Accordingly, the Board of Trade is prepared to receive applications from their former German owners for the release from control under Trading with the Enemy legislation of securities of German issue expressed in German currency, whether issued in registered or bearer form, and also of certain documents evidencing ownership in such securities. GENERAL POST OFFICE.

REPLY TO HOLDERS OF UNDELIVERED PARCELS.

The attention of importers is drawn to the following extract from the Post Office Ordinance, 1950, on the subject of "Undeliverable Parcels from Abroad":—

133. Parcels received from other countries, except the United States of America, which remain undelivered after 15 days (exclusive of the day of arrival) and which do not bear a definite request for abandonment, shall be returned to the country of origin.

134. A parcel bearing alternative addresses shall be held for fifteen days at the disposal of the first addressee and for 15 days at the disposal of the second addressee, before being treated as abandoned (if so marked) or returned to the country of origin.

135. Parcels received from the United States which are unclaimed after 90 days shall be returned to that country.

136. If at any time while a parcel remains in the possession of the Colonial Postmaster it becomes offensive or injurious it may forthwith be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Colonial Postmaster may in his discretion direct or authorize notwithstanding that the provisions of these Regulations as to the return of such parcel have not been or have only partially been complied with.

These provisions in the law have not been rigidly enforced for many years and the result has been that many importers have permitted their parcels to lie at the Post Office for months, and even years in some cases, thereby causing an accumulation of packages which now greatly exceeds the space available in the Post Office for the storage of parcels.

Arising out of the recent "Organisation & Methods" survey of the Post Office, it has now been decided to enforce the laws quoted above more rigidly than has been the case in the past. Until the end of this year, therefore, the following procedure will be followed:—

(1) Thirty days after the receipt of a package in the Post Office a printed notice from the Post Office will be served on the importer and/or the Bank

wherever the Bank may be involved stating that, unless the package is cleared from the Post Office within the succeeding thirty days, it will be returned to sender. No further notice will be sent, and the importer must then assume at the end of this period of grace, for which, it will be assumed, no provision is made within the existing laws, that the package will be returned.

(2) The Postmaster will, however, retain a discretionary power to retain the package for a further period not exceeding thirty days if the Inspector proves to his satisfaction that—

- (i) necessary documents concerning the package involved have not yet been received, or
- (ii) some error on the part of the sender would make withdrawal of the package from the Post Office work a clear hardship on the importer, or
- (iii) there is any other reason in which a discretionary power may be equitably exercised.

This temporary concession will cease at the end of this year, and, as from the beginning of next year, the warring notice will be served forty-one days after the receipt of the package, and, if it is not claimed within the following nine days, it will then be returned.

It is normally the duty of the importer to keep in touch with the movement of his merchandise and to assure himself of the approximate date of its arrival in the Colony and, in that connection, he would make enquiries at the Post Office and/or the Bank where the latter is concerned. It will be appreciated therefore that any warning notices sent under the above procedure are merely a courtesy service and are not obligatory.

Importers are requested to arrange their business that the need for returning unclaimed and undelivered packages will be reduced to the minimum.

POST OFFICE (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS

(Enacted 26th August, 1952).



1. **Short title.** These Regulations may be cited as the Post Office (Amendment) Regulations, 1952, and shall be read as one with the Post Office Regulations, 1946, (hereinafter referred to as the principal Regulations) and all amendments thereto.

2. **Regulation 269 revoked and replaced.** Regulation 269 of the principal Regulations as amended by the Post Office (Amendment No. 3) Regulation, 1946, made by the Governor in Council on the 29th day of May, 1949, is hereby revoked and replaced as follows:—

"269. The following rates of postage shall be payable on the several denominations of Postal Orders issued in the Colony namely:—

Amount of Order.	Postage payable.
Value 8d. to 1/-	2d.
1/6 to 2/6	4d.
3/- to 5/-	5d.
7/6 to 21/-	6d.
42/-	10d."

3. **Regulation 324A of principal Regulations amended.** Regulation 324A of the principal Regulations as added by the Post Office (Amendment No. 3) Regulations, 1951, (S.R. & O. 1951, No. 48) is hereby amended by deleting the words "on stamp duties" at the end thereof and substituting therefor the word "duties".

4. **Revocation.** The Post Office (Amendment No. 5) Regulations, 1951, (S.R. & O. 1951, No. 62) are hereby revoked.

5. **Commencement.** These Regulations shall come into operation on the first day of September, 1952.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

To commemorate the coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, arrangements are being made for a special issue of Colonial postage stamps to be placed on sale on Coronation Day. The stamps will remain on sale until the end of 1953 unless stocks have previously been exhausted. It has been found necessary to restrict the issue to a single value for each participating Administration in a design common to all.

BRITISH WEST INDIES INTER-ISLAND SHIPPING SERVICES.

Plans for improved shipping communications among the territories of the British Caribbean have taken an important step forward with the recommendations by the Regional Economic Committee of the British West Indies, British

Govern and British Members of a. Notice inviting proposals by operators for the establishment of two subsidised services. The Government, acting through the Committee, have decided that they are prepared to consider ways and means of jointly providing some form of financial assistance or guarantee to a selected private operator or operators of shipping in return for an undertaking to run these Services, which shall consequently both passengers and freight.

The invitation defines requirements as to routes, range of services, accommodation, periods of voyages etc.; specifies non-objection data required for shipping offers, and indicates the procedure which will be adopted in dealing with applications. Proposals are invited for a limited period of three years beginning 1st January, 1956. The Notice is appearing in London, Montreal and New York as well as in the West Indies.

While concessional Services are prescribed, it is not essential that both of them must be written, run by the same operator. The details of the Services are as follows—

Eastern Caribbean

Requiring 2 vessels of approximately 700 tons deadweight capacity, with limited refrigeration, and accommodation for 10-20 Cabin and 15 Deck Passengers. The vessels to be based on Port-of-Spain, Trinidad, and its schedule will be to Grenada, St. Vincent, Barbados, St. Lucia, Dominica, Montserrat, Antigua, St. Kitts, returning to Port-of-Spain by calls on the same route. The vessels to have a speed enabling the circuit to be completed in approximately 15 days.

North/South Caribbean

Requiring a vessel of approximately 1,500 tons of deadweight capacity with refrigeration, and accommodation for 20-30 Cabin and 100 Deck Passengers. This vessel is to be based on Kingston, Jamaica, and its schedule will be to Antigua, St. Lucia, Barbados, Grenada, Trinidad, British Guiana, returning to Kingston by calls on the same route. This Service may be extended to other ports of call where Indian trade exists. The vessel to have a speed enabling the circuit to be completed in approximately 20 days.

Applications will be first to carry out a reasonable extent, either way, the prescribed size or character of the vessel(s) in order to take advantage of favourable offerings in the charter market. At the same time, vessels must conform to the requirements of the Imperial Merchant Shipping Act and arrangements as regards Passenger accommodation, life saving appliances and navigation equipment. As regards refrigeration, particulars of temperature control system and cubic capacity should be furnished.

Charter hire or remuneration in respect of vessels employed in the Services shall be paid in sterling, plus Freight and Passenger receipts will be earned mainly in sterling and any residual financial assistance paid in that currency.

The Notice delegates certain duties to which special importance will be attached. Chief facts a being, etc., importance will be given to a relatively high ratio of Cabin to Deck Passenger accommodation, to Freight capacity. Proposals which contemplate calling West Indian ports will also be considered.

The submission of applications relate to the first stage of the procedure. Proposals are required to include estimates of annual cost of operation including charter hire, loading, stowage, crewing and victualling, administrative expenses, repairs, maintenance and depreciation. None of these estimates is to be binding on applicants, nor are the Governments bound to accept the lowest or any estimate for further negotiations. The Governments in this initial stage wish to observe the underlying principle of competition by tender, and the estimates are required as one of the factors influencing the selection of parties with whom further negotiations may be conducted, and to assist the Governments to get a clearer view of the order of subsidy or grant's contribution which may be involved in the scheme.

The later phase of negotiations with a selected applicant or applicants, will comprise listing specifications of operating costs with a similar clause as may be appropriate, formula of gross and net Freight and Passenger proceeds and determination of a reasonable formula, with or without inclusion of risk remuneration, as may be mutually agreed-in-principle, the contracting parties.

Proposals should be submitted by writing by 10th November to the Rights (for Recovery, Regional Economic Committee, Barbados. It is understood that proposals will be considered by the Regional Economic Committee at its next meeting by the end of November, 1955, which invitation will be made to the participating Governments.

POST OFFICE (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS.

(Gazetted 12th April, 1954).

1. Short title. These Regulations may be cited as the Post Office (Amendment) Regulations, 1954, and shall be read as one with the Post Office Regulations, 1938, (hereinafter referred to as the principal Regulations) and all amendments thereto.

2. Regulation 320 of principal Regulations revoked and replaced. Regulation 320 of the principal Regulations is hereby revoked and replaced as follows:—

Claims relating to losses of earnings and to personal injury are specifically excluded from the agreement.

The registration of property or claims with the Foreign Office, the Administration of Enemy Property Department (formerly the Trading with the Enemy Department) or any other British Government Agency (at home or abroad) is not in itself sufficient to constitute a claim.

British subjects should submit their claims direct to the Office des Domaines de Guerre, Luxembourg, within three months of the date of publication of the agreement in Luxembourg, viz July 30, 1954.

Her Majesty's Legation at Luxembourg cannot act as agent in presenting individual claims. The judgment of claims must be made by her letter from October 28, 1952 and any necessary correspondence conducted by individual claimants, with the Office des Domaines de Guerre direct.

WINDWARD ISLANDS PROPOSED SHIPPING SERVICES

CENTRAL AMARANTH FACTORY.

ADVISE TO GROWERS.

1. The Central Amaranth Factory at Heli Vaa will start grinding amarant for growers on Monday, 11th November, 1955.
2. Roots sold to the factory should contain not less than 15% extractable starch; this may be ascertained by growers by means approved way at the proper stage of maturity yields at least 15% starch. The best time for picking is about 25-30 days after sowing.
3. Roots will be weighed at the factory at \$2.00 per 100 pounds. Payment for roots will be made on Thursday of every week for roots purchased during the previous week. A receipt must be obtained from the office showing the weight of roots and percentage of starch they contain.
4. In addition to the basic price of \$1.60 per 100 lb. a bonus will be paid at the end of each crop year, i.e. about June, for roots containing more than 15% starch, as follows:—

Roots yield up to 15%	No Bonus.
" " " 15% up to 17%	5c. per 100 lb.
" " " 17% " " 19%	10c. " " "
" " " 19% " " "	15c. " " "

paid as soon as the Accounts are made up at the end of the Crop.

5. No less than 1,000 pounds of roots will be accepted at the Factory from any grower for any one delivery.
6. The Factory reserves the right to reduce the price of roots below \$1.60 per 100 pounds to any grower who consistently delivers roots containing less than 15% extractable starch.
7. The Factory also reserves the right to make a reduction in the effective weight of any roots that are old and drying, or that have an excessive amount of mud, earth, stones, sticks, or any foreign matter.
8. All growers who intend to grind at the Central Factory are asked to send their names to the Manager Mr. H. CHRISTIE, at Heli Vaa at the Factory, giving the approximate amount of roots available, and when they were sown; the Manager will then arrange with him when his roots are to be dug and delivered. This is very essential for the efficient running of the Factory; there can be no guarantee that roots will be accepted from any grower who has not communicated with the Manager.
9. It is very necessary for growers to keep abreast of other sources which are continually improving their manufacturing methods. The future of our amarant industry depends on the high and uniform quality of starch exported. This factory is a joint plant put down by the Government for the benefit of the amarant industry in St. Vincent. It is equipped with the most modern machinery, and the latest developments in obtaining a high rate of starch extraction and in producing a starch of the very highest quality, have been incorporated.
10. The Central Factory is not profit making concern. The loan from which it was built has to be repaid; but after interest and principal have been paid each year and a proper amount allowed for the efficient running and maintenance of the factory, any excess funds will be added to the bonus paid to growers who have delivered roots that contain over 15% extractable starch; such growers are more likely to write after the first three or four years of operation; it is therefore essential that growers should preserve carefully the receipts given to them for roots delivered.

POST OFFICE (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS.

(Gazetted 3rd December, 1957.)

1. **Short title.** These Regulations may be cited as the Post Office (Amendment) Regulations, 1957, and shall be read as one with the Post Office Regulations, 1938, (hereinafter referred to as the principal Regulations) and all amendments thereto.

No.

2. **Regulation 88 of principal Regulations revoked and replaced.** Regulation 88 of the principal Regulations, as revoked and replaced by the Post Office (Amendment No. 5) Regulations, 1951, (S.R. & O. 1951, No. 106) is hereby further revoked and replaced as follows:—

“88 (1) The charges for private letter boxes at the General Post Office, Kingstown, shall be as follows, payable in advance at the General Post Office:—

For a large box \$10.00 per annum.

For a medium sized box \$7.50 per annum.

For a small box \$5.00 per annum.

(2) A broken period of a year shall be reckoned as a full year ending 31st December: Provided that for a broken period after 30th June in any year half rate shall be payable.”

3. **Commencement.** These Regulations shall be deemed to have come into operation on the 1st September, 1957, in respect of new box holders, but shall otherwise come into general operation on the 1st day of January, 1958.

Every person concerned, not being a Government Officer, is hereby reminded that the latest date for the submission of Income Tax Returns for assessment in the year 1938 is the 31st March, and that failure to give notice of chargeability is an offence against the Income Tax Ordinance, rendering the person concerned liable to a fine not exceeding SEVEN HUNDRED AND FIFTY DOLLARS.

I have the honour to submit a report on the work of the Post Office for the year 1958, together with the necessary detailed statements in support.

POST OFFICES AND POSTAL AGENCIES

The number of Post Offices and Postal Agencies in operation during the year were as follows:—

At four of the ten District offices the postal work is performed by the District Revenue Office staff.

REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE

Revenue in 1958 exceeded Expenditure by \$45,024. The total Revenue, \$122,134, was \$14,815 in excess of the estimate, due to increased sales of stamps. This figure represents an increase of \$2,250 over 1957 total.

For the record, note should also be taken of the Import Duty on parcels collected by the Postal Department included under the general Customs Revenue. This amounted in 1958 to \$54,200 as against \$52,500 in 1957.

The total Expenditure for the year was \$76,799 which was \$4,654 over the estimated amount and \$12,211 over the 1957 total. The increase over 1957 was due to the general 3.5% increase in salaries, the increased cost of conveying foreign mails and the purchase of a second mail van, for use on the Leeward route.

PERSONNEL

The Colonial Postmaster was assisted by a total STAFF of 42—18 at the G.P.O. and 27 (non-pensionable) officers in the country districts. The Headquarters Staff consisted of:—

- 1 Principal Clerk (Deputy Postmaster)
- 1 Senior Clerk
- 1 Junior Clerk
- 5 Class III Clerks
- 1 Probationary Clerk
- 5 Postmen.

The probationary clerk was transferred periodically and was not attached to the Department throughout the year.

AIR MAIL SERVICES

Air mails were conveyed twice weekly to and from Trinidad and Barbados and once a week to Grenada and Dominica by a Crumphyll Goose plane chartered from B.O. Airways Ltd. Linking up with the B.W.I.A. flights in Trinidad and Barbados. The Goose being a small 5 passenger plane was occasionally unable to bring all the incoming mail and transit Air Mail from the U.K. and U.S.A. had on 8 or 7 occasions during the year to be offloaded, and conveyed to St. Vincent by sea, causing delays of 2 days or more in each case.

It is expected that this unsatisfactory state of affairs will be ending as the new airfield at Arnos Vale comes more fully into operation.

SURFACE MAILS

The Banana Boats operated by Geest Industries Ltd. conveyed mail to and from the U.K. regularly each week.

Surface mails to the other West Indian Islands, Canada, the U.S.A. and other countries were forwarded and received via the Federal Steamers (fort nightly) as well as by schooners and various steamships calling at the Territory from time to time. The small motor vessel 'Medinina' maintained a regular weekly service to Grenada and Trinidad while the M.V. 'Carib Clipper' made a similar though less regular weekly run to Barbados.

INLAND MAILS

Inland mails were conveyed overland daily on the Windward route between Kingstown and Georgeown by the Government Mail Van. On the Leeward coast a contract lanch service was employed. There was a daily contract service by sloop to Bequia. Mail to the other St. Vincent Greenhouses was carried bi-weekly by the 'Medinina' under Government contract.

MISCELLANEOUS

New Postal Agencies

Two new Postal Agencies were opened during the year, at Myers Hill and Marisque, bringing the total number of Post Offices and Agencies to 34.

Filter Boxes

There were 3 Filter Letter Boxes in Kingstown, cleared twice daily.

GENERAL

The past 4 or 5 years have witnessed a great increase in the volume of postal work in St. Vincent largely due to emigration of Vincentians, to the United Kingdom, and to a lesser extent to Trinidad, the U.S.A. and Canada. To give an example from one branch of the Department's work: the amount paid out for Parcel Orders increased more than ten fold between 1964 and 1968.

Most Firms are using the Post Office parcel service for forwarding goods to St. Vincent, and the available space for stacking incoming bags of parcel mail and for individual parcels is extremely cramped.

The staff is also inadequate for the increased volume of work, as can readily be seen by a comparison with the Post Offices in the other Islands of the Windward Group. In addition there is need for training in some larger Post Office. It is noteworthy that only one post office clerk from St. Vincent, Miss D. M. Munro, who was attached to a Post Office in the U.K. for a work while on vacation leave in 1967, has ever had the opportunity of a course of training in any Post Office outside of the Territory.

My thanks are due to the Post Office staff, both at the G.P.O. and in the District Offices, for their assistance throughout the year.

With a small staff the overtime, which is an inescapable aspect of post office work, has to be done almost always by the same people. Yet they have done it on the whole cheerfully, although there is a point at which, especially in the case of lady clerks, leisure time at home becomes more valuable than overtime pay.

The District P.M.s are usually regarded as part-time employees, but in fact many of them are available for the full day, and even part of the night, to facilitate late comers for stamps or letters.

I should like to record here my appreciation of their work and their devotion to duty.

STATUTORY RULES AND ORDERS,

1967, No. 5.

POST OFFICE (AMENDMENT) REGULATIONS.

(Gazetted 24th January, 1967).

1. **Short title.** These Regulations may be cited as the Post Office (Amendment) Regulations, 1967, and shall be read as one with the Post Office Regulations, 1966 (hereinafter referred to as the principal Regulations) and all amendments thereto.

2. **Regulation 245 of principal Regulations amended.** Paragraph (1) of Regulation 245 of the principal Regulations is hereby amended by inserting the words "and parcels" between the words "packets" and "transmitted" appearing in the first line thereof.

3. **Table A of principal Regulations revoked and replaced.** Table A of the principal Regulations is hereby revoked and replaced with the following:—
