POST OFFICE NOTICE.

It is notified for general information that the British Customs Authorities in London, have through the Postmaster-General of London, notified this Administration that the speedy clearance of parcels sent to the United Kingdom would be facilitated, if senders would follow the undermentioned instructions:—

Customs declarations must show the nett weight or the quantity of each kind of goods and the value (not including the cost of conveyance and insurance), and must bear the signature of the sender.

If goods are liable to any *ad valorem* duty, an invoice showing the contents in detail and the value of each article, should be enclosed, and the cover of the parcel should be marked on the address side "Invoice enclosed." When the invoice relates to more than one parcel, the cover of each parcel should be marked "Invoice enclosed in parcel No....."

Parcels despatched from places within the British Empire.

A Certificate of Origin in the prescribed form should be enclosed in parcels posted in the British Empire containing goods claimed to be of British Empire growth, produce or manufacture. The parcels should be marked on the address side of the wrapper "Certificate of Origin enclosed" or where the consignment comprises more than one parcel "Certificate of Origin enclosed in parcel No....."

Provided the value does not exceed £10, the prescribed Certificate of Origin may be dispensed with for parcels not containing Tobacco, or not being merchandise for sale despatched from a place within the British Empire to Great Britain or Northern Ireland, where the sender has definite knowledge that the contents have been grown, produced or manufactured in the British Empire, provided a signed declaration in the following terms is affixed to the outside of each parcel:—

"The Contents of this parcel are not merchandise for sale, and every dutiable article herein is the growth or produced or, if a manufactured article, is to the extent of at least *..... of its present value, *bona fide* the manufacture of.....(Empire country of origin)."
