One of our U.K. members writes that he doesn't think that we have done enough to publicize the Group in the U.K. If so, we would appreciate suggestions as to anything more it is possible to do in this respect. Our able Public Relations Officer, Chuck Cwiakala, has been successful in having a high percentage of his frequent press releases published in the major British philatelic magazines. Each has had as a final paragraph, a 'plug' for our Group, telling the readers where and how to find out more about the BCPSG.

The same British member comments that he thinks our low membership fees cause some to write us off as second rate without bothering to investigate further. This could be, for many other societies in which we maintain membership do have higher dues, yet provide lesser membership benefits.
Setting the rate of membership dues is no easy matter, for it is difficult to determine how much members are able and willing to pay. If dues are set too high, membership drops and total income decreases. If too low, the activities must be restricted to fit the limited income. Your comments will be greatly appreciated.

# A Guyana Overprint Variety

On 17th November 1969, Guyana released a set of four stamps as a Christmas issue. They consisted of two designs, $5 \xi$ and $25 \xi$ depicting "Mother Sally Dance Troupe", and $6 ¢$ and $60 ¢$ showing "City Hall". The four stamps were overprinted in black "Christmas 1969". They had been printed by Waddington's sometime previously, possibly intended for release in the un-overprinted state as two separate sets, "Arts and Culture Week", and "Public Buildings", scheduled for 1969 and 1970, respectively, but which never appeared. The overprinting was done locally by the Guyana Lithographic Company, the same firm that produced the 1967-68 "Independence" local overprints.


The Scott Catalogue lists this 1969 Christmas set as \#'s 102-105, showing no varieties, and by note indicates that they were not issued without the overprint. However, in the Commonwealth QE II Catalogue where they are designated $S 53$ through 556 , several varieties of the overprinting are given. The type apparently was hand set, and in positions R2/2, R2/10, and R5/4 for the $5 ¢$ and $25 \xi$, and R4/2 for the $6 ¢$ and $60 ¢$, the first "s" of Christmas is inverted. This is easily spotted, as the type face is "Black Letter" or "Old English", in which the "s" has a thin line joining the top and bottom ends of the letter and extending above the top. With the inverted letter this line, of course, extends downward. Since the second " $s$ " is upright in all cases, we have a built-in standard for comparison.

Commonwealth also shows "Overprint omitted" for the $5 ¢$, $6 \hat{6}$, and $25 ¢$, double overprint for the $5 ¢$, and inverted overprint for the $6 \zeta$. No explanation is given for the omitted overprint, and I cannot say if copies reached philatelic hands by accident, fraud, or favor.

In the Stanley Gibbons Elizabethan Catalogue, the stamps are listed as \#'s 511-514, with the omitted overprint varieties shown as "a" suffix numbers. The inverted " s " varieties are not listed, but a "broken h " variety of the $60 ¢$ is listed as \# 514 V 21 . The break consists of a bit of the right leg of the ' h " of stamp $\mathrm{R} 5 / 2$ missing, as illustrated above.

In examining some copies of these stamps in my collection, I noted that on one of the 6 cents overprints there is a fill at the bottom of the " h " joining the two legs together. I might have dismissed this variety as a non-constant one, had I not found an identical one on a copy of the 60 cents stamp. Since this "joined $h$ " shows up on two different denominations, it appears to me that it must be due to a defect in the overprinting plate. Since the catalogue publishers did not record it, I must assume that it did not show up on all sheets, for it would be hard to miss. All elements of the original ' h ' appear intact, and the joining of the two legs could be due to something becoming lodged in the type. Perhaps it appeared at the end of the printing run of one denomination, and was corrected only after a number of sheets of the other value had been run off. Having only these two single examples, I can't tell the sheet position. The "joined $h$ " variety is shown above at left, with a normal overprint at right for comparison.

Any reader having copies of this 1969 Christmas set is urged to check his copies to ascertain if he has examples of this "joined $h$ " variety. Reports will be greatly appreciated.

## Boer P.O.W. Literature Available

A very comprehensive and interesting article 'The Handling, Censoring and Distribution of Boer Prisoners' Mail: 1901-2" was published in the Winter 1972 issue (Vol. XXIX, No. 4) of the Bermuda Historical Quarterly. It was written by Colin Benbow and Neil Snowden, both members of the Anglo-Boer War Philatelic Society, and is profusely illustrated with photographs of covers and post cards bearing censorship and other markings, and with examples of the various markings applied in Bermuda to Boer P.O.W. mail.

As might be expected, the names of several BCPSG members appear in the article, including Morris Ludington, Henry Pattiz, and this writer. While some of the information repeats that found in Ludington's 'Bermuda", there is much other data provided, and those interested in Bermuda postal history would do well to obtain a copy of this publication. It may be obtained from the Editor, Mrs. Terry Tucker, P. O. Box 1051, Hamilton, Bermuda, the price being $\$ 1.25$ for a single issue, or $\$ 5$ for an annual subscription. I am placing a copy in our BCPSG Library, from which it is available for loan to members.

Under the sponsorship of the Bermuda Historical Society, Colin Benbow has written a booklet bearing the title "Boer Prisoners of War in Bermuda" (Occasional Publication No. III of that Society). Also available from Mrs. Tucker, it contains maps and plans of the islands in the Great Sound occupied by the prisoners in 1901-02, as well as prison scene photographs. The price of the booklet is $\$ 1.25$.

## ROSES WIN BCPSG AWARDS AT YORKSHIRE CONVENTION -- by Thomas Foster

Three BCPSG members received BCPSG Medal awards at the 27 th Annual Convention of the Yorkshire Philatelic Association, held in the Victoria Galleries, Kingston upon Hull, on 12th May 1973. A BCPSG Bronze Medal went to Malcolm D. Watts of Wetherby, Yorks. for his Jamaica Postal History entry. BCPSG Pewter Medals were awarded Dr. Geoffrey G. Ritchie of Harrogate, Yorks. for St. Lucia, and to A. P.D. Sutcliffe of Huddersfield, Yorks. for his display of Jamaica Airmails.

All three of these members have been very active in the Roses Caribbean Philatelic Society, their entries being part of the Roses competitive entries in the Y.P.A. annual competitions. Over 22 societies competed in each class at this convention, the standards for awards being very high.

A FAKED BERMUDA BISECT -- by Col. Lynn D. Wallace
In the April 1970 BCP Journal, James B. Hale in his article entitled 'Bermuda 'Cancelled to Order' Stamps" reported having two sets of G VI Coronation issue that were stuck down on a sheet of note paper and cancelled-to-order with Bailey's Bay cds dated May 14, 1937. M. H. Ludington stated that he had not seen this usage, and that it was definitely against regulation. Hale indicated that he would be interested in knowing if any other readers had similar items.

I have one item that might be considered in this class. It consists of a bisect on cover that is cancelled with a CTO Bailey's Bay cds dated 11 April 1959A. The bisect is one half of the 3d map stamp, Scott 149. The cover bears no address, but is backstamped with a Crawl cds of

11 April 1959B. All that would be required to complete the fraud would be the addition of the name and address of some person living in Crawl!

The cover was prepared by a young airman, who said he did it as a joke. He obtained the cooperation of the Postmistresses of both Bailey's Bay and Crawl, without their realizing just what the young man was doing. I believe they were only trying to be accommodating. I was given one of the two covers the airman had, and I kept it as evidence of this fraud. If you are offered any Bermuda 'bisects", view them with a jaundiced eye! My cover is evidence that a fake is not too difficult to produce, and others may be floating around.

## Leeward Islands Coils

With reference to George Bowman's query in the April Journal about Leeward Islands stamp rolls, as what we call coils are known in the U.K., I can add a bit of additional information. I have vertical pairs of SG 96, the $\frac{1}{2} d$ blue-green of 1938, and SG 99, the 1d scarlet (Die B) of 1940. These were sold to me as coils, although they are not "coil-join" pairs where strips from the parent sheets are pasted together. That these stamps did exist as coils is indicated by the Crown Agents' records.

Through the kindness of Frank Saunders and Michael Boyle, I recently obtained transcripts of the shipping records covering the period 31 March 1937 (Coronation issue) and 9 December 1943. Included are the following entries relative to Leeward Islands coils:

Requisition $901,12 \mathrm{stamp}$ rolls of 1 d value, each containing 480 stamps ( 48 sheets; 5,760 stamps), shipped 18 August 1938 (included also are 54 sheets of 120 stamps each of KG V 1d stamps).

Requisition $894 / 1,50 \mathrm{stamp}$ rolls each of KG VI $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$ and 1 d values, each containing 480 stamps ( 200 sheets; 24,000 stamps each), shipped 6 October 1938 , along with sheets of all values of KG VI between $\frac{1}{4} \mathrm{~d}$ and 10 s and various items of postal stationery.

Requisition $948 / \mathbf{1}, 25$ stamp rolls of 1 d value, each containing 480 stamps ( 100 sheets; $\mathbf{1 0 , 0 0 0}$ stamps), shipped 13 July 1940.

Requisition $976 / 1$, 12 stamp "reels" of $\frac{1}{2} d$ value and 24 stamp 'reels" of 1 d value, each containing 480 stamps, shipped either on 19 August or 9 December 1943, along with sheets of all KG VI values between $\frac{1}{4} \mathrm{~d}$ and $£ 1$.

Since the initial date of issue of the KG VI definitive stamps was 25 November 1938, and the ld Die B stamps did not appear until 1940, it is deduced that the stamp rolls recorded above comprise the following stamps: Requisition 901, KG V 1d, SG 83; Requisition 894/1---KG VI $\frac{1}{2} d$, SG 96, and 1d, (Die A), SG 98; Requisition 948/1---KG VI 1d, SG 98, (Die A) or SG 99, (Die B); Requisition 976/1--KG VI $\frac{1}{2} d$, SG 98, and 1d, (Die B), SG 99. Thus Leeward Islands coil stamps known to exist are SG $83,96,98$, and 99 . Further probable coils are KG V $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$, SG 82, and possible coils are $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$ and 1 d values as shipped by the Crown Agents subsequent to 9 December 1943 of KG VI and QE II Leeward Islands definitives.

# Antigua War Tax Variety

Collectors of BWI material are well aware of the great number of catalogued varieties of the WAR TAX stamp overprints for certain islands, particularly Jamaica and St. Vincent. For Antigua, however, the WAR TAX issue is quite regular, and clean to the point that neither Scott nor Gibbons lists any varieties whatsoever. I was fortunate in recently being able to inspect and purchase some large multiple pieces of the $1 \frac{1}{2} d$ Antigua WAR TAX overprint, and was surprised to see that these blocks, or at least some of them, contain what appears to be an incomplete "S" in the word STAMP. In this "variety", if I may use that word for the time being, a portion of the bottom loop of the " S " is missing.


The basic stamp issue, as well as the companion pair of $\frac{1}{2} d$ green stamps overprinted WAR TAX in either black or red, was produced by De La Rue in sheets of five horizontal rows of twelve subjects. Plate No. 1 (a white numeral in a circular colored background) appears in each corner. Interrupted jubilee lines surround the stamp group, and an arrow-type figure is located in both the top and bottom selvedge between the sixth and seventh stamps.

The stamp with the bad " S " is Number 9 in the fourth row. I have a total of four lower right corner plate blocks of eight of this stamp (SG \#54), and the variety shows in three of these blocks in the noted position, i.e., stamp No. 45. The fourth block, strangely, contains the word stamp with a normal " S ". The bad " S " does not appear on stamp 45 in sheets of either of the $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$ green stamps (SG \#'s 52 and 53) that I have been able to examine.

A sketch of the approximate appearance of the " S " as seen under a magnifying glass is shown above. Also illustrated is one of the affected blocks, the stamp in question being the one in the top left position of the block.

Perhaps some reader will be able to verify that this could be considered a constant variety. Is it evidence of a cracked letter or damaged electroplate, later replaced, or showing up in the latter part of the printing run, or would it be possible for under-inking to produce a few identical incomplete impressions of the " $S$ "? Comments from readers having copies of this, or any other abnormal overprint variety of SG \#54, would be greatly appreciated. Perhaps it will be possible to establish the character of my broken " S " overprint.

Correspondence from the February Journal led to Louis E．Zell becoming Group Leader for the Turks and Caicos Islands，to cover the period of issue by these islands under the joint title beginning in 1900．All members with an interest in this colony are asked to forward any data and queries to Louis at 22 Larchmont Road，Binghamton，NY 13903．Other responses to the February Journal are in the process of being firmed up，and details will be forthcoming in future issues．

The BCPSG Awards Program under the direction of Paul Larsen，who is being assisted by Al Branston，has been bringing the BCPSG to the attention of a wider and wider audience．Both in the USA and in England，we have made awards available to coming shows．Our medals will be awarded at ROPEX＇ 73 in Rochester，NY，June 22－24，1973．A combined meeting at the invitation of the＇Roses＂is planned for September 21－23， 1973 at Leeds，England．BCPSG medals will be available for this meeting．Let me urge all BCPSG members to support these shows，particularly by exhibiting．There is also a need for qualified members of the BCPSG to assist in the judging at those shows which will award the BCPSG medals to assure that the criteria are met．Please respond favorably if you have the opportunity．

## The 21 mm St. Lucia "C" Code

The mystery of the "C" coded date stamps of St. Lucia was mentioned in the April 1972 BCP Journal (page 52), namely, from what office did the 21 mm " C " code marks originate? This mark was first recorded by Robert J. Devaux in the May 1965 issue of this Journal, but as it appears to be comparatively rare and hitherto known only on loose stamps, there is yet no conclusive proof for the theory that it was used at Choiseul, or Canaries, or both. The latest date quoted for this mark was 15 JA 04 , but the writer now has a very clean strike of 6 OC 14 on a KG V $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$ value. This is many years later than the latest known date of the Castries $19 \frac{1}{2}$ mm "C" mark (11 NO 98), and Jaffé (Stamp Collecting, 13 July 1951) stated that the Castries date stamp which succeeded it, still with "C" but with the name now in full at the top and St. Lucia at the bottom was dispatched from London on 15 February 1899.


This is in accord with the LDK for the $19 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~mm}$ " C " mark of 11 NO 98 , and with the writer's earliest strike ( 11 AP 00) of the new mark with the full name. Now, Jaffé also states that the Canaries date stamps in this new type were dispatched from London on 15 August 1906 and 29 September 1909, but he makes no mention of any similar Choiseul mark. The earliest date I know for this Choiseul stamp (but with an asterisk, not a C) is 20 NO 15. The finding of the date 6 OC 14 mentioned above for a 21 mm " C " code ST. LUCIA stamp is therefore consistent with it being from Choiseul, but not from Canaries or Castries!

Since publication of our April 1972 article, a member has written that he has several covers bearing strikes of the 21 mm "C" code mark, but details are not yet available. Recently, I obtained my first such cover, illustrated above. The strikes are dated 14 MY 97, but as the place of origin is not shown on the envelope, no solution is provided as to where the postmark was applied. However, used on the reverse as a transit mark is the normal $19 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~mm}$ " C " code cds of Castries of the same date, and the difference between the impressions of these marks leaves no doubt that they were struck at different offices. The blue lines for registration and the blue figures over the stamps would have been added in London. The British Post Office has long had the reputation of spoiling stamps from abroad with blue pencil markings, and it is only comparatively recently that the regulations for registered letters have ceased to demand the crossed blue lines.

Perhaps a word on the "Myerscough" covers may be of interest. A considerable amount of correspondence addressed to this firm of merchants came on the market about three years ago. A large portion of this "find" was from the smaller British Colonies in Africa, as well as in the West Indies, but what was unusual was the large number of letters that were franked with multiples of $\frac{1}{2} d$ values. This was due to a request printed on the brown-paper envelopes provided for the customer's reply. Normally covered by the stamps, in this case a bit of the wording can be seen to the left of the adhesives, and it reads as follows:

THE HIGHEST PRICES PAID FOR USED STAMPS OF ALL KINDS SEE PRICE LIST/EVERY DESCRIPTION OF GOODS SUPPLIED ILLUSTRATED PRICED CATALOGUES POST FREE ON APPLICATION/Kindly put (for postage) on your letters and parcels HALFPENNY Stamps ONLY or provisionals, /or receipt stamps that may be used for postal purposes. The stamps can if necessary be put on/the back of this envelope as well as the front. PLEASE COVER THIS PRINTED MATTER/WITH STAMPS. All stamps on letters and packets will be paid for at the same rates as others./ESTABLISHED NEARLY TWENTY YEARS.

Evidently A. Myerscough \& Co. preferred quantity of stamps to quality, presumably for the packet trade, but luckily they never got around to using them all, and from this source have come covers which otherwise would be rarities, if they existed at all. I have, for example, a cover of 12 October 1897 from Soufriere with a block of 12 and a pair of halfpenny stamps to pay the 7d double-weight registered rate to London.

Finally, the LDK for the M (Micoud) code stamp must be later than the 1911 given in our 1972 article, as the writer now has it on a KG V halfpenny. Unfortunately the only part of the date visible is JY 1, but the year could be no earlier than 1912. Guy Kilburn provides an LDK for the VF (Vieux Fort) code, with a clear 25 SP 12 strike on a post card.

## WAR COVER CLUB PUBLISHES NEW A. P.O. GUIDE---

The War Cover Club has announced the publication of the Third Edition-1973 of its "Locations and Assignments, U.S. Army Post Offices, World War II and Later". It is a book that will be a most useful addition to your philatelic library, if you have any interest whatsoever in the mail emanating from A.P.O.'s, many of which operated in British Caribbean countries.

The book was compiled by the late Kevin P. Rogan and Thomas F. McGrath. Those who were at our NOJEX meeting several years ago will remember meeting Kevin whose bright Irish personality and friendly manner impressed all who came into contact with him. The book has been dedicated to Kevin, who unfortunately did not live to see it completed.

For each A. P.O., dates of establishment and closing at all of the locations from which it operated are shown. Special features that facilitate use of the book and add to its usefulness are a flow chart of mail from overseas and a page of explanatory notes which are invaluable in helping the postal historian untangle the confusing story of A.P.O. mail transmission.

It is clearly printed in $8 \frac{1}{2}$ " x $11^{\prime \prime}$ size, and its 102 pages contain enough information both to encourage the novice and satisfy the expert. The price is $\$ 5.00$ to non-members of the War Cover Club, while members of that club are offered a special price of $\$ 4.00$. Copies can be obtained from our fellow-BCPSGer, Lincoln E. ## BOMEX

BOMEX is an acronym, standing for Barbados Oceanographic \& Meteorological Experiment, a three-month-long, massive oceanographic project, which took place in the tropical Atlantic in 1969. The project officially started on May 3, 1969, and it utilized the services of about 1,500 people, 13 ships, various aircraft, buoys, and satellites. Its purpose was to study the links between sea and air, and it was a cooperative effort of the U.S. and Barbados. BOMEX was part of a much larger program called GARP (Global Atmospheric Research Program), a cooperative effort of 12 nations in a World Weather Watch. Only $10 \%$ of the earth's surface has adequate weather observing stations. Focal point of BOMEX was a $\mathbf{9 0 , 0 0 0}$ square mile area of the tropical Atlantic, east of Barbados.


Ships taking part in BOMEX were: SS ADVANCE II, USCGC COURAGEOUS (WMEC-6220), USC\&GSS DISCOVERER (OSS-02), R/P FLIP, USS SALISH (ATA-187), USC\&GSS RAINIER, USNS GILLISS (T-AGOR-4), USCGC LAUREL (WAGL-291), USC\&GSS MT. MITCHELL (MSS22), USNS LYNCH (T-AGOR-7), USC\&GSS OCEANOGRAPHER (OSS-01), R/V UNDAUNTED, and USCGC ROCKAWAY (WHEC-377) \& (WAGO-377). In addition to the above ships, the USS KALMIA took part to a point, towing the R/P FLIP from Scripps Institution of Oceanography in California to the Pacific side of the Panama Canal. Covers exist documenting this trip. The USS SALISH towed R/P FLIP through the Canal and to the Barbados work site where she was on station from May 2nd through early June.

The FLIP is well named, for by flooding internal tanks a portion of its hull can be flipped 90 degrees to a vertical position, thus providing an underwater observatory. It is operated by a unit of the University of California, the Marine Physical Laboratory, at San Diego.

Each of the ships serviced covers with a specially designed BOMEX cachet, one such cover being shown above. # Eagle Hall's Cancelling Machine

At sometime in 1971, an electrical cancelling machine was installed at Eagle Hall's new Post Office. In trying to track down the exact date, I ran into a dead end, but did come up with a bit of interesting information.

This machine apparently was a second hand one, handed down from the G.P.O. No record of
 the date on which it was installed was kept, but Mrs. Newton who was Post Mistress at that time, as well as the senior postmen who are responsible for cancellations, recall that it would not work satisfactorily so was sent to the Emtage Electrical Company for repairs. It can be established that it was returned in satisfactory condition in May of 1971. There is some uncertainty as to the earliest date of its use, but Mrs. Newton thinks it may have been May 15th 1971. In any event, we do know for sure that the month, May, and year, 1971, are correct.

CHAPTER V
THE RARE "G" POSTMARK OF GRENADA
From the limited number of Grenada covers available of the period of Grenada's First Inland Post, October 1, 1861 to December 31, 1862, it has generally been established that the double circle "G", type P.O.1, postmark was occasionally used at the GPO, St. George's, as a date stamp during that period. When the First Inland Post was abolished on December 31, 1862, this postmark was withdrawn from use, as were the other double circle alphabet postmarks (types C. 1 "A" to "F").

It had been assumed by most collectors that when Grenada established its Second Inland Post on October 1, 1872, the double circle "G", type P.O.1, was returned to use at the GPO in St. George's. Since this " $G$ " postmark is not recorded as a datestamp after the First Inland Post and is one of the rarest Grenada postmarks, there was little evidence to back up that belief. Peter Jaffé, in the February 27, 1953 issue of "Stamp Collecting", presented the theory that this postmark was not reissued to the GPO in 1872, but in fact the double circle "G" was used at a second post office established in the sparsely populated parish of St. David. Jaffé argued that in addition to the double circle " E " being assigned to the chief St. David Parish town of St. David's, the small St. David Parish village of Perdmontemps was given the double circle "G" postmark.

The authors were not able to discover any further research on this subject subsequent to that of Jaffé in 1953. However, while working at the British Museum Newspaper Library late in 1972, we uncovered evidence which fully supports Jaffe's theory. A Post Office Notice dated October 26, 1872 announced that an additional Inland Post Office would be set up in the Parish of St. David as from November 1, 1872, at the premises of Mr. Samuel St. Bernard, who was also appointed District Post Master. All subsequent postal notices concerning St. David Parish referred to either St. David's (E) or St. David's (G) post offices. Thus the question of the allocation of the rare double circle " $G$ " postmark during the Second Inland Post was settled.

Pinning down the actual location of the St. David's (G) post office has required a bit of further research. In Peter Jaffé's February 27, 1953 article is the following quote: "On March 29th 1886, J. Griffith, the Colonial Postmaster, announced the removal of District Post Office ' $G$ ' (St. David's) from Perdmontemps to Park River Road on the boundry between St. David and St. George Parishes". From this quote we can conclude that the premises of Samuel St. Bernard were located in the small village of Perdmontemps when the St. David's (G) post office was opened on November 1, 1872. St. Bernard was still listed as District Postmaster in 1896 and 1897, so it appears that the change in location of the St. David's (G) post office on March 29, 1886 was due to a change of residence on his part. A fortunate contact with several presentday residents of Grenada, has enabled the authors to discover the precise spot to which this office was moved in 1886.

With the active help of the Department of Extra-Mural Studies, University of the West Indies, St. George's, the authors were put in touch with Miss Ivy St. Bernard of Perdmontemps. She had a vague recollection of the name Samuel St. Bernard, although she could not confirm just which member of the family he might have been. However, in talking to her next-door neighbor, Miss Sarah Robertson, who happens to be one of the oldest members of the village, she came up with the required information. Quoting from Miss St. Bernard's letter: 'While Miss Sarah Robertson, an old lady who has lived all her life within a few hundred yards of the place where Samuel St. Bernard resided, does not remember when the house was destroyed, she has shown me the spot where the house in which he lived, kept a shop and ran the post office was. This place is approximately 40 ft from Park Bridge, on the St. Paul's, St. George's side (not on the Perdmontemps side). The Park Bridge is regarded as the boundary between St. Paul's and Perdmontemps."

Sometime between 1897 and 1899, Mr. St. Bernard was replaced as the Postmaster by a Miss Hiloria Catto. The exact location at which Miss Catto operated is unknown, but is believed to have been on the Perdmontemps side of the boundary between St. David and St. George. The 1899 Post Office Annual Report informs us that "....Miss Catto, the District Postmistress at Perdmontemps, was dismissed, and the Post Office removed from her premises there to the shop of Mr. Jonathan Ellis, near the entrance to Montpelier and the Morne Delice Road, in St. Paul's, with Mr. Ellis as District Postmaster". This transfer took place on October 2nd 1899, and the new post office is always referred to as the St. Paul's post office located in the Parish of St. George's. Since a postmark with the village name of St. Paul's was not sent out from London until February 13, 1907, it can be assumed that the single circle "G" postmark, type C. 1 (G), was transferred from the closed Perdmontemps post office to the new office at St. Paul's, and that this postmark remained in use until the spring of 1907. Since St. Paul's was also a small village, this second "G" postmark doubtlessly saw little use there.

The two " G " postmarks were always located in a post office handling small amounts of mail, thus the rarity of both marks. Even when the double circle " $G$ " was in use at the G.P.O., it was employed as a datestamp, with the P.O. 2 obliterator cancelling the stamps.

As indicated in the previous chapter, Perdmontemps (or Piedmontagnes) ultimately obtained a postal facility in its own right when a postal station was opened there in 1915.

# More about Trinidad Meters 

by Fred F. Seifert

Response to our appeal for more information on Trinidad Postage Meters, voiced in the BCP Journal of October 1972, pages 147-152, was far greater than anticipated. Many gaps in the lists have been filled, and much other interesting information on meters has been provided.

René Léotaud, who can speak with authority on just about anything connected with Trinidad \& Tobago philately, overwhelmed us with data on meters. He managed to locate an amendment to the Post Office Ordinance which first authorised use of "postal franking machines" in 1931, many years earlier than we had thought they came into use in Trinidad. He also reported the actual use of meters in 1932, with two examples of N 3. The earliest of these bears the date 30 VIII 32, and one shows the value as $\frac{1}{2} d$, the other as 1 d . An N 4 strike for 28 III 38 shows the postage as 1 c , and Rene believes that this switch to cents came in 1935, since the change to decimal currency on stamps came in that year. However, there may have been no retrofitting of meters already in use, at least until some later date, as René has a strike of N 1 of $2 \times 38$ showing the value as 1 d .

The 1931 amendment authorising the use of meters, mentioned above, reads as follows:
The following section shall be inserted as Section 13A of the Principal Ordinance:
(1) The Postmaster-General may grant licences to use postal franking machines in the Colony on such terms and conditions (including the payment of fees) as may be set in the licence.
(2) The Postmaster-General may cancel a licence granted under this section if any of the terms and conditions thereof or if any regulation made under this Ordinance in relation to postal franking machines is contravened.
(3) Any person using a postal franking machine without having a licence in force therefor shall be guilty of an offence, and on summary conviction before a Magistrate shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding $£ 100$ and in case of a continuing offence to a further penalty of $£ 20$ for each day during which the offence continues.

Passed in Council this 20th day of March in the year of our Lord 1931.

A non-member of our Group, Mrs. Maria de Freitas of Trinidad, saw our meter article at the Trinidad Philatelic Society, and sent us data on the 70 or so meters in her collection, a number of items being new to us. Brian Renshaw also confesses to being interested in this not too popular area of T \& T philately, and provided a two-page list of his holdings.

Bill Matthews, who is employed at Texaco Trinidad Inc., Pointe-a-Pierre, wrote to explain how mail from there is handled. It seems that the Pointe-a-Pierre Post Office was located just inside the Texaco Camp, and it was closed when the Marabella P.O., just outside of the Camp and towards San Fernando opened about ten years ago. Two meters are used at Texaco Pointe-a-Pierre, U 77 (Pointe-a-Pierre) in the Shipping Office, and U 64 (San Fernando) in the Administrative Building.

According to Bill, Texaco mail is delivered and dispatched by special mail bag on the Port of Spain - San Fernando Mail Van, which in effect makes the Texaco office a private P.O. Bill
also notes that the Forest Reserve P.O. is located inside Texaco's Forest Reserve Field, so is not available to the general public. This is also true of the Abyssinia P.O., located inside Texaco's Guayaguayare Field.

Useful information also came from Reg Lant, Ben Ramkissoon, Jim Chalmers, John Cronin, and Paul Bondor. All of this new data has been put together to prepare supplementary lists of Trinidad \& Tobago postage meters, which follow.

Visiting the recent IBRA International Exhibition, Munich, Germany, I noted there were only a few BWI exhibits, but the quality was high. It was especially pleasing to note that a BCPSG member, H. Frank Deakin, was awarded a Silver-Gold for his Barbados display. The only BWI entry to receive a large Gold, was the Trinidad of Hiroyuki Kanai of Japan.

Two other British Caribbean entries took awards; William Frazer of England was presented a Gold for a British Virgin Islands display, and Dr. K. Havelka of Czecho-Slovakia received a Silver for his Bermuda entry. As is normally the case for exhibitions on the Continent, a gret majority of the entries were of the European countries.

## BITS \& PIECES from HERE \& THERE

ANGUILLAA -- The Philatelic Squad at Scotland Yard is trying to track down a small quantity of imperforate color proofs of Anguilla stamps up to 1969. The proofs which are on different paper than that used for printers' working proofs, were pulled without authority. Anyone who is offered such material is asked to notify Scotland Yard.

ANTIGUA -- On a cover to St. Lucia posted sometime in January, Guy Kilburn found a boxed handstamped slogan, "Antigua/Sailing/Week/5-12 May 1973". The strike is in light blue, an illustration from a tracing by Guy being shown below.


BERMUDA -- Lynn Wallace reports a new first flight to Bermuda. In the monthly magazine "The Bermudian" for April 1973, he found the following notice: "A new air service between Atlanta, Georgia, and Bermuda will be inaugurated on April 29 by Eastern Airlines. There will be one flight each way every day of the week via Newark, NJ, with no change of plane en route...." Have any first flight covers been seen?

In the October 1972 BCP Journal, Bruce Walker reported a MISSENT TO BERMUDA mark of 4 MAY 1967. Bruce has since found several later strikes of this mark, and says that it was badly deteriorated by the latest use of 23 SEP 1970, with the A of Bermuda hardly visible and the T's looking like I's. The initial M was badly distorted, and Bruce comments that either there is a large amount of mail missent to Bermuda, or the clerks don't take very good care of their handstamps.

GRENADA -- A handstamped slogan GRENADA/INDEPENDENCE/1974 has been appearing on mail from that island recently. Gus McVicker reports that about half of the mail he received from there in April and May bore this mark. Tom Giraldi has found a number of covers that show this handstamp, and strikes are in both black and violet over the period of use noted, so it appears that there are at least two of these stamps in use.

Al Piringer has shown us a copy of the 10 $¢$ AIR MAIL overprinted definitive of Grenada which has the overprint double. Al also reports having the $15 ¢$ with double overprint, but says that the doubling is not as obvious as on the $10 ¢$.

Arthur Maudens reports having an entire letter from Grenada to Trinidad postmarked 23 FEB 1859. It is franked with a 4 d GB adhesive, cancelled with the "A15" obliterator. The strike is smudged, but looks like Type A.13. This betters the Cronin/Walker EKD by two months.

JAMAICA -- A copy of the Jamaica Philatelic Society Newsletter that was postmarked at Half Way Tree, 25 May 1973, and endorsed "Via Surface Mail", was delivered to us on 31 May!

Not only the small offices are guilty of inverted dates on postmarks. Bert Schaffner reports a Cross Roads machine cancel with both date and time inverted, while a recent letter that we received has the entire cds of the Half Way Tree machine mark inverted. Even our local PO here in Albuquerque is not above an occasional upside-down date.

ST. LUCIA -- Tom Giraldi reports a new EKD for the GPO oval, Figure 13 of Geoff Ritchie's article in the February 1973 BCP Journal. Tom's strike is dated 28 MAR 1967. Tom also provides LKD's for Figure 16 and Figure 17 of Geoff's article, the new dates being 19 JAN 1971 and 28 MAR 1967, respectively.

TRINIDAD -- According to the Trinidad Philatelic Society's Bulletin, the current $1 ¢$ and $5 ¢$ definitives on glazed paper have been found with watermark sideways inverted.

A new slogan "BE ACCDENT FREE/IN 1973" has been noted from both Port of Spain (March) and San Fernando (March, April, May).

SILVER WEDDING OMNIBUS -- To meet the demand for copies, the SW Omnibus was printed in two batches, and in some instances the colors of the second printing do not exactly match those of the first one. The April issue of the Philatelic Magazine (London) reports that the Anguilla second printing of the $25 ¢$ was in a much paler olive, and the $40 ¢$ in a paler maroon. The Dominica $5 ¢$ was a paler olive, while the Grenada $8 \grave{\phi}$ was a deeper olive. The Turks \& Caicos $20 \hat{c}$ came out as a much paler green.
