## AUTUMN MEETING

This was held at 41 Devonshire Place, London. W.1. on Saturday, October 22nd, 1960, at 2.30 p.m. Twenty-two members attended with Commander G. Bridgmore Brown in the chair.

The Hon. Secretary read a letter from the President, Mr. G. W. Collett regretting his inability to attend through illness. The Hon. Secretary was requested to send Mr. Collettt the members' sincere wishes for his speedy recovery.

The Hon. Secretary reminded those present that the 7th Anniversary Meeting of the Circle would be held at 41 Devonshire Place, W.1. on Saturday, March 25th, 1961, with the informal dinner following at Lord's Tavern, St. John's Wood. Although the last day of "Stampex" was on the same date he earnestly hoped that this would not prevent a good number attending. Sir Edward Beetham, former Governor and Commander-in-Chief of Trinidad and Tobago for five years, and Major K. M. Beaumont, Past President of the Royal Philatelic Society London, had accepted invitations to be the Circle's guests at dinner.

Mr. Saunders also referred to the question ventilated at the Spring meeting of holding a Convention in Bedford in addition to the gathering proposed to be held in the North of England. Despite the fact that the idea had been publicised in the Bulletin no replies had been received from members. The question of holding Conventions in Bedford and the North of England was discussed at length and it was generally thought that plans were too premature to turn the idea down and that in order to give northern members a chance to attend such a Convention the invitation made by Mr. Fred Myers to organise one in Harrogate should definitely be accepted. The dates, 21-23 April, 1961, were agreed. Mr. Myers outlined an attractive programme for the 3 days and he was asked to go ahead with plans.

The chairman suggested that full details should appear in the January, 1961 Bulletin and the Editor might also arrange for a "booking-in" slip to be inserted in the same issue for the use of members.

It was essential that it should be known as early as possible how many were likely to attend as hotel bookings had to be made well in advance. It was unanimously agreed that the Circle's Anniversary and Autumn meetings should continue to be annual events, and that Bedford would seem a good venue for a Convention in 1962.

The Hon. Secretary intimated that the Wallington Philatelic Society had invited the Circle to give a display on January 17th, 1961, and volunteers were
asked for. The following agreed to visit this Society and take material: Commdr. G. Bridginore Brown and Messrs. A. E. Beach, B. B. Benwell and P. W. Hosking.

The Hon. Secretary spoke of the great difficulty the Editor was having in obtaining material for publication in the Bulletin and earnestly asked members to do all they could to support him in his work. He also reminded those present that the annual subscription to the Circle would be increased to $£ 1$ as and from February 1st, 1961. He had sent out over 90 fresh Bankers' Order forms to those who already paid their subscriptions in this way.

Mr. W. H. H. Crow, Hon. Secretary Sales Circuit reported on the Packet position. He said he had little to add to his last report but renewed his request for much more material, as at present, due to lack of this very few packets could be circulated. Cardboard boxes were now used and these he hoped would minimize complaints by members as regards the transport of the packets.

The Chairman in referring to the Hon. Secretary's comment on the difficulty in maintaining contributions to the Bulletin asked all members to bear in mind that whenever they had a new problem it would be useful if they sent it in to the Editor as in many cases replies would be forthcoming and these would be of interest not only to those who posed the problem but to many with similar collecting interests. Obtuse problems might be left to the Research Leaders. Mr. Saunders wondered if excerpts from the Circle's Papers might be included preparatory to publication as evidence of the work which the Circle was doing, and suggested this would in no way impair the sales of any works produced by the Circle.

Mr. B. B. Benwell, Editor, said he was appreciative of Mr. Saunders' interest but since this meeting began he had received several concrete promises of articles including one on Bermuda by the Chairman. He suggested that the Research Leaders could assist by contributing a few lines for the Bulletin from their compilations.

The chairman gave a progress report on the work of the Publications Subcommittee. Work on the next "Paper," "The Postal Markings of Barbados," was in its semi-final draft stage. This had been circulated to a great many Barbados specialists in this country and in the United States and it was hoped to publish the Paper early in the New Year. So far as could be estimated at present it was planned to publish Paper No. 2 at $12 / 6$ a copy and it was proposed to make it available to members of the Study Circle at $8 / 6 \mathrm{~d}$ providing they placed a firm order before publication and it was further proposed that a leaflet should be circulated with the January issue of the Bulletin inviting members to place a firm order for the work Commander Bridgmore Brown stated he felt the Circle could reasonably expect to dispose of a fair number of

copies to members because Barbados was one of the most popular of the B.W.I. group and he was quite sure a substantial number could be sold to dealers. The Paper would include a full Bibliography.

This concluded the business of the meeting and the following showed items of interest, as follows:-

Raymond H. Austin: BAHAMAS: A pre-adhesive missionary cover dated 1855, Nassau to London. The crowned circle "PAID AT BAHAMAS" in red on registered cover, Dec. 16, 1864. 1864, CC, perf. 1212, 4d. bright rose on cover to St. Thomas (an "Unclaimed" letter). A selection of shades of the 4d. S.G.26/28, including multiples. 1d. CA, perf. 14, strip of 3 on cover used to Germany, sent via Havana. Not often seen was a group of fiscal cancellations, viz. "E.R.P." (E.R. Pashley, Comptroller of Customs at Nassau,) "J.H.P." (J. H. Peak, Comptroller of Customs and Postmaster at Nassau).
Arthur E. Beach: TOBAGO: The $1 / 2$ PENNY on 6d. orange-brown showing wide spacing variety on the 3rd stamp of the sheet, dated AU 5 87: this is two years earlier than the accepted date of the issue (Oct. 1889). The query being was this an error of postmark? If not then the surcharge was probably printed before the 1 PENNY on $2 \frac{1}{2}$ d. blue (issued July, 1889). A block or horizontal strip from the left hand side of the sheet would probably prove this. The $1 / 2$ PENNY on 6d. stone, 2nd Setting characteristics, a mint block of 24 showing head plate varieties - broken second "O" in TOBAGO (No. 27 on sheet) and "G" of POSTAGE joined to circle (No. 45 on sheet), also the inverted surcharge, unused. The $1 / 2$ PENNY on $21 / 2$ d. with the same 2 nd Setting as the 6d. stone, only known on the dull blue (shades) and ultramarine, not on the bright blue. Also shown were the different types of the codes A, B, C on the circular date stamps of Tobago.
A. J. Branston: BAHAMAS: Q.V., 4d. on cover, with New York Steamship marking.

Commdr. G. Bridgmore Brown: BERMUDA: K.G.VI, $2 / 6$ on cover to Colombo with large "O.A.T" in oval, in red. He wondered if this was for Official Air Transport (or Transmission). This query was answered by Dr. B. de Burca who stated that the letters represented Onward Air Transmission. March, 1875, One Penny surcharged provisionals, mint and used with what the exhibitor considered might be a new type of forged surcharge. (The scribe of this report suggests that this is a very suitable note for Commander Bridgmore Brown to write up with an illustration, for the Bulletin!)
J. J. Challis: BRITISH GUIANA: 1853/60, 4c. blue, an unused pair, the query being if it was unused.

MONTSERRAT: The Q.V.4d. S.G. 12 in pink instead of mauve? If a colour changeling or a proof.
L. R. Coasby: BAHAMAS: a selection of covers including a Landfall issue 2d. with ROCK SOUND cancel; Ship Mails of Free Port. "Unclaimed" on letter to Tarpum Bay with K.G.V. War Tax ½d. "SPECIAL DELIVERY" overprint on 5 d . red and orange on cover with Canada 2 c .
P. W. Hosking: ST. LUCIA: a fine study of the obliterations commenced with the "All" postmark of Castries, followed by circular date stamps with code letters placed immediately below the word "ST. LUCIA" and above the date, used for the post offices at Castries and the district post offices set up at Soufriere, Vieux Fort, Dennery, Laborie and Micoud, etc.
C. E. Roland Jones: BERMUDA: printing varieties including the so-called double strike on the 300th Anniversary issue 3d. discovered by Mr. J. Turner of West Point, Bermuda. This phenomenon was caused by paper stretch resulting in a second impression of a large part of the design. BRITISH GUIANA: 1889, strip of 4, " 2 " in red on 2c. tied to cover by Trinidad arrival cancellation. TURKS AND CAICOS ISLANDS: paper varieties of the 1950 and 1955 issues.
K.J.Robertson: JAMAICA: an interesting series of Postal Fiscals including Jan. 1858 issue with "SPECIMEN" ( $20 \times 2 \mathrm{p}, \mathrm{m}$ ) in a single and a block of 4 (18 x $21 / 2 \mathrm{~mm}$ ); also "Specimen" in ms., and blocks of 8 each of the $5 /-$ and $10 /-$ "SPECIMEN."
P. T. Saunders: CAYMAN ISLANDS: K. E.VII the "ID" on 4d. unused and used. This stamp was accorded catalogue status in 1909 (S.G.31) and renumbered S.G. 33 in 1911. Since it was only issued for fiscal purposes it was removed from the catalogue in 1929. The used example shown was either cancelled by favour or through an oversight. In all, 396 stamps were surcharged - some on May 12th, 1908, and the balance on May 14th. It is of interest to note that the reason for the issue of this stamp was to satisfy an application of an American resident who 'speculatively demanded' a sheet of 1d. value for receipt purposes. Since no stamps of this value were available the Commissioner directed that a small provisional issue be made by surcharging the 4 d . value, his explicit instructions being that they were to be issued as fiscals and used for that purpose only and not for postage. The Rural Posts cancellation of EAST END on cover (K.G.V. $1 / 2$ d. and pair of $1 / 4$ d.) The 5th GEORGETOWN cancellation (1909-1927) on cover with earliest recorded date MR 2 09, with " RETURNED FOR POSTAL ADDRESS" marking.

Michael Steward: BERMUDA: K.G.VI High values mint, a fine study of the shades with the various printings analysed. CAYMAN ISLANDS: 1938/48 printings. JAMAICA: K.G.VI, £1 deep brown and violet; re-entry on No. $1 / 5$ in which the right-hand vertical frame lines in the S.E. corner are doubled, and also the tobacco leaf shading lines and the words "CIGAR MAKING" in the same comer. K.G.VI, 1/- Sugar Industry, the variety showing vertical line cutting smoke to left of the taller chimney, with part of a parallel line between the two chimneys, stamp 51 (1st in 11th row): this flaw occurred on early printings with the blue-green centre and was later corrected, VIRGIN ISLANDS: K.G.VI, lc., mint block of 21 showing re-entry on No. $5 / 5$ where all the lines in the lower half of the design are doubled.
E. Victor Toeg: LEEWARD ISLANDS: an almost complete collection of the Village postmarks including JOHNSONS POINT, LIBERIA, OLD ROAD, PARHAM ST. MARY'S, ST. PAUL'S. ST. PETER'S, ST. PHILIP'S and SEATONS, etc.

An interval was taken for tea and after the conclusion of the displays the chairman expressed appreciation to all those who had contributed material of such varied interest, and to those who had participated in the discussions.

## NOTES AND QUERIES

## BAHAMAS

I am doing some work on the Duty Plates used by Messrs. De La Rue to print certain Bahamas stamps, and I would like some information from other members of the Circle. The Duty Plates used consisted of sixty multiples of

the value only, and because of this, were very liable to damage during storing and printing.

According to the De La Rue Records, the 1d, 4d, 6d, 5/- and £1 plates were completed and invoiced by the 12 th May, 1884, and the $2 \frac{1}{2}$ d plate by the 10th January, 1888. The 1/- value in this design did not appear until 1902, followed by the $1 / 2 d$ value in 1906. A number of constant flaws in these plates are already known, and sufficient evidence exists to prove that the 6d plate was in use from 1884 up until about 1918-19. Would members please let me have details of any constant flaws, i.e. broken or malformed letters, etc. with position on the sheet, if known, in any of these issues from 1884-1919.

In March, 1918, Messrs. De La Rue took a number of new die proofs, and laid down new plates for the $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}, 1 \mathrm{~d}, 2^{1 / 2} \mathrm{~d}, 6 \mathrm{~d}$ and $1 /$ - values, along with one new value, the 2 d . I have never seen, or recorded a die proof of the 4 d value taken at this time, but unless the old 4 d plate was in very good condition, it seems likely that it would also be replaced along with the others. I have no proof of this at present, however. In my opinion, these plates, with the further addition of two extra new values $11 / 2 d$ and 3 d , in 1931 and 1937, respectively, were used to print not only the K.G.V. issues of 1921-29, but also the early K.G.VI issues. I have insufficient evidence, at present, to prove this for all values, and, again, details of flaws on these issues would be of great help.

So far as the K.G.VI issues are concerned, a great deal of information is available here, due to the efforts, mainly of H. Moreton Black, and these flaws fall into two groups, those found on the early printings, and those which appeared later. All the later flaws are from completely different plates and it seems fairly reasonable to assume that the 1918 plates were damaged or destroyed during the 'Blitz' and that these new plates were laid down about that time to replace them. However, a considerable amount of work remains to be done on these plates before definite answers can be given to most of these theories, and I will be grateful for any help and information.

However, one cover returned with the stamps cancelled across by pen with mss. "GUINEA GRASS", with date written below. Learning of this, I too sent covers to that P.O. The covers are just back (one registered) with the same pen-cancellation, dated Sep. 28, 1960,

"StL*, $\mathrm{StV}^{*}$, xPS" followed by "C of All xBrG, xBrH " means the Member has specialised collections (as defined above) of St. LUCIA and St. VINCENT but excluding Postal stationery; he also collects Cancellations of all colonies within the Circle's field except Br. Guiana and Br. Honduras.

## LEEWARD ISLANDS

## By Air Mail from the Leeward Islands :

I would like to refer to Mr. C. D. Paton's comments under "Antigua" in Bulletin No. 23, Mr. G. W. Bowman's remarks under a similar heading in

Bulletin No. 24 and Dr. B. de Burca's notes in Bulletin No. 25 under the heading "By Airmail from B.W.I." Regarding the Lindbergh flight several collectors have now mentioned the postages on covers in their collections and it is quite clear that $9 \mathrm{~d}, 1 / 0^{1} / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ and $1 / 41 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ postages and possibly others were used. In the note in Bulletin No.21, I stated that as the particular postage on the cover I was writing about amounted to $1 / 4 \frac{1}{2}$ d the writer of the letter obviously intended the cover to go by airmail. I did not then know, nor do I know now for certain, the airmail rate to the United Kingdom, in 1929, but I think it was most likely $1 / 3 d\left(1 / 3 d\right.$ airmail rate plus $1 \frac{1}{2} d$ letter rate for the first ounce or fraction thereof making up the postage of $1 / 41 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ on the cover mentioned in Bulletin No. 21).

Mr. C. D. Paton refers to his Lindbergh covers, and I note that two of these covers addressed to San Juan, Porto Rico, bear 9d postage only. I have a cover from Antigua postmarked 26th September, 1929, addressed to St. Thomas, Virgin Islands with a similar amount of postage.

It occurs to me that possibly airmail letters destined for the Caribbean area might have required only 9 d postage i.e. 8 d airmail rate plus 1 d letter rate, as distinct from $1 / 41 / 2 d$ for the United Kingdom. I think this is unlikely, but can anyone corroborate this or show that it cannot be so ?

I have come to the conclusion that on the evidence at present available Dr. B. de Burca is right when he says that the Lindbergh flight was full of philatelic material and that it seems a waste of time trying to draw conclusions from it, but it must be borne in mind that the rate of $1 / 41 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ is to be found in the Lindbergh flight.

With regard to Airmail rates which came into existence after 1929, information concerning the same appears to be somewhat scanty and I thoroughly endorse the plea by Mr. G. W. Bowman for data being made available by anyone who may be able to help. From the material in my collection I am able to give the following information and I have also formed some conclusions:-

The special flight on the 20th August, 1931, of the Dornier DO-X with PanAmerican Airways cooperating as special agents appears likely to be in the philatelic category and thus to be in a similar position to that of many of the covers in the Lindbergh flight. I have a cover stamped $1 / 0^{1 / 2 d}$ from St. Johns, Antigua to the United Kingdom via Miami and another cover with 8d postage sent from St. Johns, Antigua, to St. Thomas in the American Virgin Islands, and neither cover seems to be correctly stamped - both covers have a Dornier DO-X cachet. The only covers I have seen or heard of so far in respect of this
flight are those emanating from St. Johns, Antigua. Can anyone indicate the route of this flight and at what places stops were made?

Between 1930 and 1939 (and possibly later) the combined sea and air rate for a letter to the United Kingdom seems to have been $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ made up as to $1 / 0^{1} / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ the airmail rate plus $1^{1} / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ letter rate for the first ounce or fraction thereof. I have a cover posted from St. Johns, Antigua, to the United Kingdom sent on 27th September, 1935, which seems to indicate that this was so, and another airmail cover from Antigua to Trinidad dated 29th April, 1939, which also has 1/2d postage. Mr. G. W. Bowman mentions a cover postmarked St. Johns, Antigua on 23rd January, 1930, addressed to Bedford Park, London bearing $\mathrm{I} / 0^{1} / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ postage.

It seems to me that in all probability the airmail rate was reduced in late 1929 or very early 1930 from $1 / 3$ d to $1 / 0 \frac{1}{2}$ d although Dr. B. de Burca has said that he cannot find any evidence from Post Office Guides that the airmail postage was reduced. The obvious method of settling this point is to look through the Leeward Islands Post Office Guides for 1929 and 1930. Has Dr. B. de Burca seen these particular Guides?

Subject to any further information and evidence becoming available, I take the view that the airmail rate from the Leeward Islands to the United Kingdom remained stable at $1 / 01 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ possibly from 1930 up to at least the outbreak of war in 1939, and also that the airmail rate to the Caribbean area in 1929 may have been only 8 d .

Rising costs due to wartime inflation clearly broke down the stability of postal rates: all collectors will, I feel sure, agree with this if they look at covers in their collections during the period in question. I have never seen Post Office Guides for the Leeward Islands during 1940-46 but I assume that postal rates were changed frequently as the war went on. On p. 25 of Bulletin No. 25, Dr. B. de Burca mentions referring to Post Office Guides (which I assume from the context to be Leeward Islands Post Office Guides) but he does not indicate the years in which they were published. In any event will Dr. B. de Burca please indicate which Leeward Islands Post Office Guides he possesses or has seen?

I possess a cover posted at St. Johns, Antigua, in October or November, 1943, to an address in the United Kingdom. This cover is endorsed "Via Miama Fla. U.S.A. by Airmail, By Ordinary Mail, from U.S.A. to England" and the postage is $1 / 0^{1} / 2 \mathrm{~d}$. I do not understand how this postage was arrived at and certain questions cross my mind concerning the same. First, is it a coincidence that the postage is exactly the airmail rate up to 1939 or did this rate extend to late 1943 at least? Secondly, notwithstanding the wording of the endorsement, did the cover make the entire journey to the United Kingdom by air?

## LEEWARD ISLANDS (cont)

I have a further airmail cover from St. Kitts to the United Kingdom which I think is postmarked 18th October, 1943 (but the year is not clear) and it has been stamped $1 / 0^{1 / 2 d}$. It is a pity that the year of this postmark cannot be deciphered as if it were clear it should establish whether the airmail rate of $1 / 0^{1 / 2 d}$ continued until at least October, 1943. I shall be very glad if anyone can give me any help about these last two covers.

Dr. B. de Burca will probably be interested to learn that I have an airmail cover sent in July, 1944, from Antigua to the United Kingdom via Transatlantic mail on which $2 / 61 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ postage was paid, also a similar cover posted in September, 1944, but in this case with only 2/6d postage.

It seems on the evidence available so far that the airmail rate may have been $1 / 0^{1 / 2 d}$ as late as October or November, 1943, and some time prior to July, 1944 , increased to $2 / 4$ d per half-ounce plus $21 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ letter rate as Dr. B. de Burca has already stated. On the other hand could not the Transatlantic mail have travelled entirely by air which would mean a higher airmail rate of $2 / 61 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$ ?

Some time during 1945 the airmail rate seems to have been reduced as I have a cover from Antigua to the United Kingdom on which there is a $1 / 11 \mathrm{~d}$ postage: could this have been 1/- airmail rate on the assumption that the letter travelled by air throughout its journey to the United Kingdom?

Further, I have another airmail cover posted in January, 1946, from Antigua to the United Kingdom with only 9d postage paid. Was the airmail rate further reduced to 9 d on the same assumption as above ? This may well be so as I have also a registered airmail cover from Barbuda to the United Kingdom postmarked 18th June, 1946, and stamped 1/-, the additional 3d being the registration fee.

I now come to four airmail covers posted between December, 1952, and September, 1953, each bearing $1 / 11 \mathrm{~d}$ postage. These are followed by five airmail covers sent between December, 1954, and March, 1956, each stamped 40 cents, being the equivalent of $1 / 8 \mathrm{~d}$. I have assumed up to the present that these last nine covers were carried at airmail rate and it would seem that the rate jumped from 9d to 1/11d between June, 1946, and December, 1952 (possibly with intermediate increases between those dates) and was reduced from $1 / 11$ d to $1 / 8 d$ some time between September, 1953 and December, 1954.

## MONTSERRAT

At the recent International Exhibition at the Royal Festival Hall, I was very interested in the invited display of Montserrat by Dr. R. H. Urwick.

Unfortunately it was restricted to one frame, but that frame contained many gems.

Of special note were the following:

1. MONTSERRAT, in serif capitals, $39 \times 31 / 2 \mathrm{~mm}$., on an entire dated 3rd April, 1796.
2. MONSERRATT (with two final T's) in serif capitals, $43 \times 4 \mathrm{~mm}$., on an entire dated 12th October, 1796. Dr. Urwick exhibited this one also in the 1950 Exhibition.
3. The Montserrat fleuron, enclosed in a single line circle 30 mm . in diameter, dated 3rd July, 1838. (This mark was sent out from the G.P.O. on 5th July, 1836).
4. The c.d.s. (R.L. Type PJ), 27 mm . in diameter, dated 16th November, 1841. (This mark was registered at the G.P.O. on 4th November, 1840).
5. The c.d.s. (R.L. Type P.L.), 25 mm . in diameter, in sans serif capitals, dated 16th July, 1851.
6. The c.d.s. (R.L. Type P.Q.), 20 mm . in diameter, in sans serif capitals, dated 25th November, 1868.
7. The Crowned Circle, in red, on an entire dated 25th June, 1853.

Among other items in the frame were two bisects.

1. The normal 1d. bisect of 1883 well tied with the A08 obliterator; this cover also bore the Paid mark (R.L. Type H) dated 14th June, 1883.
2. The bisect, on entire, with the unofficial surcharge $1 / 2 \mathrm{~d}$. This cover also bore the Paid mark, dated 14th July, 1884, and the Dominica receiving mark dated 17th July, 1884.
I am hoping shortly, on behalf of the Study Circle, to begin collating information on the postal markings of Montserrat, and I should be pleased if all those members who are interested in these marks, would kindly contact me either through the Hon. Sec. or Editor.
