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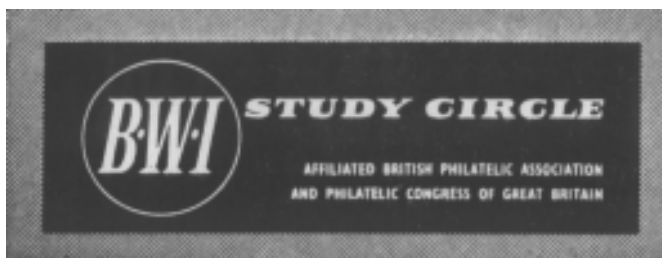

BAHAMAS

Check List of Essays and Proofs

The following check list is compiled from my own records, gathered over the last sixteen years. I should appreciate any additions or corrections from members, with a view to making it as complete as possible before publishing, by the Circle.

1859 Chalon Head Issue by Perkins, Bacon

Essays

- (1) Made-up Essay from die proof of the head of the first issue of Tasmania, with design sketched in pencil, Indian ink and Chinese white, on card. (Size 31mm. x 25mm.).
- (2) Engine-turned background, Chalon Head in oval, "Bahamas" at top and "One Penny" below. St. Andrew's Cross in the four corners. (Size 31mm. x 26mm.).
- (3) Similar size, but with more intricate background and additional rays to crosses. Black panels at top and bottom (no lettering).
- (4) Die proof of background only with black circles drawn over the central oval, and ovals showing where the conch shell and the pineapple were to fit.
- (5) Whole design, but with ovals for shell and pineapple and ribbon over centre oval left blank,
- (6) Finished design as eventually approved, but with the ribbon bearing the words "Interinsular Postage" minus scrolls at each end. These were added when the final die was prepared.

Die Proofs. One Penny Value

- (1) Finished design in Black on India paper, backed with soft white card. In some cases this card has become detached. Most copies show rust stains.

Plate proofs

- (1) Finished design in Black on India paper, on white card.

1861 Chalon Head Issue by Perkins, Bacon

Essays

- (1) Chalon Head in square frame with engine turned borders, and a background identical with that of the contemporary issue of the Ionian Islands. No value.
- (2) Chalon Head in oval, with the remainder of the design as finally adopted, but without the word "Postage." ("Fourpence").

Both these were made-up essays with portions of the design sketched-in in pencil, Indian ink, and Chinese white.

Die Proofs. Fourpenny and Sixpenny Values

- (1) Finished design in Black on India paper, on white card.

(2) Finished design in Black on card, showing guide lines.

These proofs have also been reported in Black on thin wove paper, and further information about these is required.

Plate Proofs

(1) Proofs in Black on India paper, on white card.

(2) Proofs in Black on white card.

Colour Trials

(1) Fourpence in Red, and Sixpence in Lilac.

(2) Fourpence in "French Lake."

These were submitted to the Agents General for the Crown Colonies, for approval.

1862 Chalon Head Issue by De La Rue

Die Proofs

(1) I have been told that proofs in Black on India paper, on card, were taken by De La Rue, and that these may be distinguished from the original Perkins, Bacon die proofs by the fact that they are generally cleaner and without rust stains. Can any member confirm this?

(2) Die Proofs of the 1d., 4d., and 6d. in the issued colours on glazed card, overprinted "Specimen." These came on the market in 1950, and were described by Robson Lowe at that time as being "made about 1873." Unfortunately I never saw these, and I should be very interested to hear from the present owner.

Plate Proofs

(1) Plate proofs of the 1d., 4d. and 6d., in the issued colours on thick, highly-glazed card. Reported by Gisburn, presumably ex Bradbury, as "plate proofs," thus differing from the above, which I presume to have the usual very large margins, etc.

(2) Plate proofs of the 1d., 4d. and 6d., in the issued colours on gummed paper, Watermark Crown CC, imperforate. These may perhaps have been colour trials, or had similar status to the G.B. imprimatus.

1863 One Shilling Value by De La Rue

Essays

(1) An enlarged drawing on card, in Chinese white and Indian ink, with the central oval left blank, dated 15/1863. Below this on the same card, is a similar drawing in the size of the issued stamp.

Die Proofs

(1) Progressive proofs in Black, on card. I have recorded ten of these, showing various states of the engraving. Of a series of nine, which I examined in 1957, the fifth state of the head differed so very considerably from the subsequent proofs of the sixth state, etc., that I doubt whether it is possible for them to be taken from the same die. I would appreciate further comments on this from the present owner of these proofs.

BAHAMAS (contd.)

- (2) Die Proofs on card in Black, Brilliant Blue, Brown and Dark Green.
- (3) Die Proof on glazed card, similar to the Chalon Head proofs above, again described as being "made about 1873," overprinted "Specimen."

Plate Proofs

- (1) Plate proofs in the issued colour on gummed paper. Watermark Crown CC, imperforate. Again, perhaps colour trials or imprimaturs.

1882 One Penny Value by De La Rue Plate

Proofs

- (1) The Royal Collection contains a proof in Olive Brown, presumably on Watermark Crown CA paper.

1863 One Shilling Value by De La Rue

In 1883 De La Rue made two die proofs of the 1863 1/- value, one in Brown and one in Bright Blue, dated 5 Sep. 1883, and marked in pencil "1s. Duty scratched away," on white card. These are now in the Royal Collection.

1884-1902 Surface-printed Issue

Essays

- (1) Five Shilling value. A Die Proof of the 1863 1/- with the bottom tablet painted in and overpainted in white.
- (2) One Pound value. A large design in the Official Receipt size.
- (3) Two essays by Jean Joubert made from the contemporary design of Antigua on watermark Crown CC paper, perf. 11½ the name and duty being painted-in in water-colour.
5/- Colour, dull rose. Value in Lake.
£1 Colour, bistre. Value in Sepia.
- (4) Two designs for a 2½d value, made from the blank duty die proof, one with the duty reading "37 2½d. 87" and the other reading "2½d. Penny" both hand-painted, the latter in Red.

- (1) Master Die Proof of head-plate, with duty tablet blank, in Black on white card.

(1) Master Die Proof of headplate, with duty tablet blank, in Black on white card. Marked "Before Hardening."

(2) Master Die Proof of headplate, as above, but marked "After Hardening" and initialed.

(3) Master Die Proof of Duty Value only, "Half Penny" dated "16 Feb. 06."

Essays and Die Proofs for the general issue are in the Royal Collection, without the name of any Colony.

1935 8d. Flamingoes Issue

Essays

(1) Sketch on card in issued colours, all handpainted except for the King's Head. In the Royal Collection.

1938 Pictorial Issues

Essays

(1) 4d. Value. Orange frame and Deep Blue centre, painted in water-colours with King's Head in three-quarter profile.

(2) 6d. Value. Deep Blue frame and Deep Olive centre with head in profile as above.

(3) 8d. Value. Made up from a specimen of the 8d. 1935 issue in Ultramarine and Scarlet, but with the head of King George VI superimposed on that of King George V.

1948 Eleutheran Tercentenary

An imperforate copy of the ½d. value, stuck on card, is known, ex Canadian Bank Note Co. Ltd.

1959 Bahamas Postal Centenary

Essays

(1) Paste-up essay made from Chalon Head 1d. Interinsular stamp with a centre from a current 1/- value of G.B.

(2) Ditto with a centre cut from a current 1/value of New Zealand,

(3) Ditto with a centre cut from the Bahamas Coronation issue.

BRITISH HONDURAS

Belize Post Office

The post office in Belize was opened on April 1, 1860. The names and dates of postmasters are: W. J. McKinney, 1860; W. B. Gutteron, 1897; G R

Hulse, 1908; G.S.W. Smith, 1919; H.W.Beaumont, 1924; F. C. P. Bowen, 1935; P. M. Ewing, 1954.

Airmail is sent abroad daily via U.S.A. and Jamaica; Surface mail for abroad is sent once weekly or more often if opportunity presents itself, via Pto. Barrios thence to U.S.A. or direct to U.S.A. if occasion presents itself. Occasionally mail is sent direct to U.K.

In February, 1962, there were three cancelling devices in current use (see illustrations below) - the stamp cancelling machine was damaged in Hurricane Hattie and I haven't yet learned of its repair. Another article will be devoted to the many postal markings of this office.

The STANLEY FIELD AIRPORT POST OFFICE, opened February 2, 1960, is really an extension of the General Post Office in Belize. It is served by officers who go out on rotation each week to Stanley Field. No postmaster, since its establishment, has been appointed. It is housed in a small room in the Stanley Field Terminal Building. The cancelling device is type A illustrated above.

BAKING POT, Cayo District Post Office

BAKING POT, located on the Western Highway, 16 miles from the Guatemala frontier, was opened either in 1949 or 1950.

This sub-office is situated at Central Farm, in the two-story Department of Agriculture office building. The ground floor is the Leisamaniasic Research Unit and on the second floor is the Post Office desk and the Director of Agriculture's office. The postal clerks have all been Agricultural clerks who had this additional duty. I believe the current one is Mr. Philip Tate. His duties include signing for the mail bags, looking after registration, and selling

stamps. The chief function of the post office is to act as a receiving station for all Department of Agriculture mail and the forwarding of it abroad.

Letters are collected, franked, and distributed three days a week, Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Mail arrives Monday, Wednesday and Friday, is dispatched on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, by a CMC diesel, 30-passenger bus, via Benque. Viejo, to Belize.

The current postmark is illustrated below.

Stann Creek Valley P.O.s

About 30 miles south of Belize, on the "B.H." coast lies the village of Stann Creek, from which runs inland, a fertile valley about 24 miles long. This valley is the citrus-growing area, primarily grapefruit and oranges, but just after the turn of the century, bananas were the large main crop, and a narrow gauge railway was providing transportation by about 1910 to Commerce Bight port. The banana industry, hard hit by the Panama Disease, soon died. For the citrus industry a new all-weather motor road was completed in 1940 to Stann Creek Town, and now connects with other roads to Belize.

Disregarding the long-established Stann Creek P.O., these few paragraphs will deal solely with P.O.s along the Valley itself - and a puzzle they are indeed! My notes are based only on the few items of postmarks, covers, and data in my files, and do not attempt to solve anything, serving only to organize the confusion!

First item in my collection is a double-circle 31mm. datestamp (TRD?) in purple dated MAR/25/ 1915 which apparently reads "STANN CREEK RAILWAY," although not all of the last word is on the stamp. A 34mm. TRD similarly worded has been reported used in 1919. This would appear to have

been a Travelling P.O. (TPO) aboard the train serving the whole valley. COMMERCE BIGHT, the port, had a P.O. sometime during this period, but postmarks and dates are unknown to me. In 1944, Robert S. Gordon listed the existence of a P.O. named " STANN CREEK VALLEY," but my only example of a postmark so inscribed is on a 1952 cover, a small purple double-oval TRD. In 1958 Belize G.P.O. Lists the P.O. was listed as "STANN CREEK VALLEY - 22 MILES"; was a postmark so inscribed? POMONA, about 15 miles up the Valley, was listed by 1944. I have a Jan. 1947 registered cover (small double-oval TRD). The P.O. was closed certainly by .1958, my next G.P.O. List.

As STANN CREEK VALLEY P.O. has continued to be listed, I have tried repeatedly since the war to obtain its postmarks on cover, with only the one cover to show for my efforts, and that one having been bought from a dealer! J. Lea recently reported it had in 1962 a postmark (c.d.s.?) inscribed "18¼ Miles S/C VALLEY."

My curiosity again picqued, I decided this time on a new approach, and asked assistance of the Manager of the Citrus Co. of Br. Honduras Ltd., residing at Pomona in Stann Creek Valley. This time proved successful, and he most kindly sent a Company officer up the Valley for information and postmarks. According to his letter (June, 1963), mail to Valley residents normally comes and goes through Stann Creek Town P.O., and there is now "only one Government Post Office in the Valley and this is at MILE 20." It serves about 45 families, with mail arriving by truck once or twice a week to the P.O., which is the farm-home of Issac Daniels, Postmaster. He reports opening date of his P.O. as Mar. 2, 1963, which might well be, since less than a year ago it was located at MILE 18t! And yet his ONLY CANCELLER is already almost illegible; an undated seal-type cancel, white letters against black background, "20 MILES" at top, "STANN CREEK, B.H." at bottom. The boxed rubber stamp registration mark is inscribed "20 MILES, STANN CREEK, BRITISH HONDURAS, R.No.—." So that would seem to be now the P.O. name rather than the earlier "Stann Creek Valley" - or is it - 22 MILES, 18¼ MILES, or 20 MILES? Have there been even earlier designations, with distinctive cancels? It is quite a mystery, this hodgepodge of Valley P.O.s and postmarks, and unlikely to be cleared up without some postal-historian actually visiting the Valley. Any volunteers? Well, at least you CAN send in any and all information from YOUR collection to the author - please - dates, tracings, information, toward solving the "MYSTERY OF STANN CREEK VALLEY."

DOMINICA

Postal Stationery, 1d. red envelope of 1903

It would appear that this envelope is found made up from different papers,

1. a matt paper, watermarked "Original/Turkey Mill/Kent" in three well spaced lines. This is, I believe, the original issue and is found with the Specimen overprint.
2. a high glazed paper, watermarked "De La Rue & Co. in an arc above a Doric column with London in an arc below."

This issue is known used in 1920.

Was this normal practice, i.e. a change of paper by design, or was the second issue a temporary one? Do similar papers occur in other B.W.I. stationery issues?

JAMAICA

For some time I have had a cover sent from England to Jamaica, with, apart from many other markings, an Unclaimed marking in black. This marking is about 4mm. longer than M3 in the Jamaican Handbook. On checking the G.P.O. proof book I found that the handstamp sent out in 1843 is as the example on the cover, and not the type recorded in the handbook. This means that the M3 marking must have been sent out at a later date, or were there two of them? My cover is dated Feb. 3, 1849 in Jamaica. I would like to know the earliest date, in fellow members' collections, of the M3 marking, also if anyone has a copy of this other mark.

With reference to the early inland rates of Jamaica, there are full tables of these in "Jamaica" by Fred J. Melville (a copy of which is in the Group's library). The rates are in shillings and pence or Ryals, which raises the question "What are, or were, Ryals"?

POSTAL STATIONERY

Postal Stationery

Recently I have been attempting to list the Postal Stationery of Montserrat. The material is not too common; in fact, some items would appear to be distinctly scarce. In the list given below I have indicated with an (s) those items which I have found to be scarce, and an (r) those which appear to me to be rare; I should be pleased to have comments from other Members on this classification. Incidentally, none of them seems to be very common in a used state.

All the specimen examples I have seen have been overprinted in black, in serif capitals, 9mm. high, the overprint being 89mm. long, placed diagonally on the card, envelope, or wrapper, sloping upwards from the bottom left,

One or two obvious queries remain to be answered. e.g.:

1. Are there any other types and/or varieties to be added to this list?
2. Who produced the various items? Messrs. De La Rue & Co.?
3. Do "Specimens" exist of those numbers not so marked?
4. What were the quantities printed?

Perhaps some of our Members can help in elucidating some of these problems; if so, I should be extremely pleased to hear from them.

In the case of the pre-paid cards it will be noticed that the sizes are slightly larger than the corresponding normal cards. In the specimen examples of the pre-paid cards the word "Specimen" is, of course, printed on each of the cards.
